





The peaceful disposition of these tribes made it possible for them to intermingle without conflict so that there were no distinct tribal boundries.

Today there are four Indian reservations in Michigan. The largest one is in the L'Anse area of Baraga County, in the Upper Peninsula. This has a population of 1,300. The other Upper Peninsula reservations are the Hannahville Indian Community in Menominee County with 140 persons and the Bay Mills Community in Chippewa County with 300.

The one reservation in the Lower Peninsula is in Isabella County. This is the residence of the Saginaw Chippewa Tribe, numbering about 400 persons.

The office of sheriff appears in English jurisprudence about A. D. 1000 and every English speaking nation has such an office. The sheriff is the only police officer ELECTED BY AND RESPONSIBLE DIRECTLY TO THE PEOPLE of the county.

Where some law enforcing agencies have only criminal jurisdiction the sheriff's responsibility goes much further and includes CIVIL CASES as well. Also his jurisdiction covers

the entire county. He must enforce all laws enacted for protection of lives, persons, property, health and morals of the people. It is his duty to act as conservator of peace within the county, using such forces as may be necessary and to prevent breaches of the peace, suppress affrays and unlawful assemblies. It is also his right and duty to arrest all persons who oppose ex-

ecution of process. He is an officer of the Circuit Court, aids in drawing prospective jurors, and by deputies acting as court officers, is responsible for juries during court trials and while they are de-

liberating on cases. The sheriff is responsible for the confinement, safe-keeping and feeding of all jail inmates, must present them in court and convey them to any state institution to which they

may have been committed by the court.

Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell and the Iosco Sheriff's Department have been cited several times for operating a competent and efficient organization and have received a high rating each year from the Michigan Department of Corrections.



Operating on the Michigan State Police radio network, this department's patrol cars have instant communications with all police patrol cars in the area, including state, city and township police departments, as well as monitoring radio traffic in the sheriff's office. This system is adequate for our radio needs at the present time. If the department had its own independent radio network, it would necessitate an increased budget for radio operators, plus cost of installing a base station and antennas.


