## Natural Gas Now Serving Iosco Area

Natural gas arrived in Tawas City and East Tawas this week, almost exactly one year from the time Michigan Consolidated Gas Company announced that it desired to serve this area.

City officials of both communities joined MC executives this morning (Wednesday) for valve turning ceremonies which permitted natural gas to flow into mains supplying 925 customers in the two cities.

The utility installed 16 miles of mains to supply 454 customers in Tawas City and 12.5 miles to serve 471 customers in East Tawas.

The turn-on in the Tawas brings Michigan Consolidated close to the completion of its 13.5 million dollar expansion program in the northeastern half of the Lower Peninsula. In all, the utility is expanding service to 44 cities, villages and townships, including Lake Huron communities from Tawas to Alpena, and up the center of the state from Houghton Lake to Gaylord.

Construction is nearing completion at Houghton Lake and Prudenville while gas has been turned on in all the rest of the communities.

William A. Smith, manager for the Tawas area of the utility, said that service pipes have been laid to about 60 percent of the customers who have applied for gas service so far. When a Tawas customer has had the fuel lines installed in his home and connected to an appliance or furnace, he should call 362-4458 and order his meter installed. ## Oral Vaccine Program Soon to Combat Polio

Iosco County will be the site of a mass polio immunization September 13. A campaign to give oral vaccine to an estimated 7,000 residents was revealed last Wednesday night at Tawas Hospital.

Dr. Harvey H. Brinkman, hospital chief of staff, announced that the program was being sponsored here by the local medical association. It will be held the same day as programs in Bay and Huron Counties.

Heading a committee to coordinate efforts in four communities of this county is Dr. L. A. Lambert of East Tawas, a retired physician.

Assistance with the program is now being sought from registered nurses, retired physicians, teachers, pharmacists and other residents. Complete cooperation in the program has been assured by Sister Rose Helene, administrator of Tawas Hospital.

An attempt is being made to have every person in the county immunized. This includes infants six months of age or older on up through adulthood. This is the first time a mass immunization program has been tried in Iosco County and will be a "first" for any county north of Bay City.

Clinics are to be set up at Tawas Area High School, Oscoda High School, Whittemore-Prescott Area High School and Hale Area High School.

## Terms of New Tenure Program for Teachers Explained by Supt. Tracy

Public school teachers of Iosco County will come under the teacher tenure act after August 28. This law, passed at the last session of the state legislature, outlines how teachers may achieve permanent status in a school system and how they can lose such status.

The Michigan Teacher Tenure Act has two main parts: First, to keep new teachers in a probationary stage until they have proven they can do the job; and secondly, when a teacher has proven himself as a teacher, to protect him in his teaching position.

"For the first two years, a new teacher is on probation," states County School Supt. William Tracy. "If the teacher's work is satisfactory, he goes on tenure if offered a contract for the third year. If his work is not satisfactory, 60 days prior to the end of the school year, the board of edu-

cation must give him written notice stating in what way he was not acceptable and no contract will be issued for the third year."

The second part of the act has to do with the right of a teacher to hold his teaching position, or tenure. In simple terms, this means that as long as a teacher does a satisfactory teaching job, the board of education can not release him. However, if the teaching staff has to be cut down for some reason a teacher can be released. But if the board of education starts rehiring, the released teacher has first claim to a teaching position. The act also provides for machinery to settle differences between teachers and boards of education over tenure matters.

Procedure for discharging or demotion of a teacher is outlined in the tenure act. Boiled down it is this: The board of education must file a written statement of charges with the teacher giving specific details of why action is being taken. The teacher can have a hearing with the board of education. At the teacher's discretion, this hearing can be either public or private.

If neither the teacher nor the board of education is satisfied with the result of such a hearing, they can appeal to the state tenure commission which is established to decide such appeals.

Each person will receive a two cc dose of the vaccine, approximately one-half a teaspoonful, served in a small paper cup. Medical society officials said that a 50-cent per person donation is to be made by those able to pay, but if persons are unable to pay, they will not be refused the vaccine.

The September 13 immunization is not a "one shot" situation. One additional clinic is scheduled for November 8 and is a "must" to give permanent immunization from polio.

The Sabin oral vaccine is the brightest hope for full conquest of polio—once a dread disease. Since development of the Salk vaccine, polio has become less threatening. However, Salk vaccine must be injected with a needle and some have possibly by-passed vaccination for this reason. Salk also required booster shots at regular intervals.

The Sabin oral vaccine gives protection against polio lasting from 10 years to a lifetime. Doctors and nurses at each clinic will handle the dispensing of the sweet-tasting solution.

Dr. Brinkman stressed that persons of all ages should receive the vaccine in an effort to completely stamp out the disease, which may even be carried in the systems of older persons and transmitted to others.

# Many Contests Spice Primary Next Tues.

Voters going to the polls next Tuesday in the first primary election under Michigan's new constitution will receive a handful of ballots and decide numerous state and local races.

In addition to the election, townships are to hold party caucuses on Saturday and Monday.

RACES for county and state legislative posts are proving most interesting in Iosco, where there has not been too much competition in recent years.

On the Republican side of the ballot, county races include those for sheriff, coroner, road commissioner. There also is a race for non-partisan judge of probate.

Incumbent Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell, who has served Iosco since January 1949, is being opposed by

Robert N. Rollin, Tawas City businessman. A three-way race for coroner finds Edward D. Jacques of Tawas City and E. John Moffatt of East Tawas, both incumbents, being joined in the bid for one of two positions by Warren Bennett of Oscoda.

Incumbent Road Commissioner Clarence Curry of Tawas Township is being opposed by Elwood L. Bronson of Oscoda.

THREE PERSONS seek the probate court bench vacated by the retirement of H. Read Smith at the end of 1963. They are Paul Harvey, William McCready and Alf C. Watson. McCready presently serves as prosecuting attorney. Harvey is a former Iosco prosecutor and Watson serves as city attorney of Tawas City.

There is no candidate listed on the ballot for prosecuting attorney. County officers unopposed on the Republican ballot are County Clerk George Prescott, Register of Deeds Albert H. Buch, Treasurer Grace L. Miller, Drain Commissioner E. H. Stickney.

Two Democrats are listed for county offices. Michael Dolak of Oscoda seeks the nomination for sheriff and Roy Bergeron of Tawas City seeks the nomination for road commissioner.

ANOTHER important non-partisan race finds Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller of East Tawas vying for one of three seats to be filled in the Third District Court of Appeals. Other candidates are Robert G. Howlett, John W. Fitzgerald, Carlton H. Morris, Robert E. Burns, Philip H. Mitchell, Austin J. Doyle, Donald E. Holbrook, Maurice Black and Andrew H. Wiest.

Voters will also receive a ballot to name delegates to county party conventions.

Of principal interest in the legislative race is for Republican representative in the state legislature from the 102nd district and state senator for the 35th district. James P. Mielock of Whittemore, who presently serves as representative from the Alpena District (Alpena, Alpena and Iosco), is being opposed for nomination to the re-districted post by Willis D. Andrews, Marshall Hier and Henry B. Smith.

ON THE DEMOCRATIC ballot, Robert W. Pember of Hale seeks nomination as 102nd district representative. He is opposed by Sanford E. Charron.

In the Republican race for the new 35th district state senator, Walter G. Nakkula of Gladwin, presently serving as state representative, is opposed by Lester O. Begick, David E. Reppuhn Jr. and Robert L. Richardson Jr.

Seeking the Democratic nomination for state senator from the 35th district is John R. Ireland.

Other state and congressional offices listed on the Republican ballot are for governor, where In-

Incumbent George Romney is opposed by George N. Higgins; United States senator, sought by Edward A. Meany Jr., Elly M. Peterson and James F. O'Neil; Elford A. Cederberg is unopposed for renomination as 10th district representative in congress.

On the Democratic side, Neil Staebler is candidate for governor; Phillip A. Hart is unopposed for United States senator and Hubert C. Evans seeks the 10th district representative nomination.

## Little Presides Over District Supervisors

Lloyd Little, Grant Township supervisor, conducted his first meeting Thursday as president of the Fourth District of the Michigan Association of Supervisors, which met for its summer convention at West Branch.

There were 112 supervisors from the nine counties present, along with representatives of the state tax commission and auditor general's department.

The main question discussed was setting up of county equalization departments under the new state constitution and Senate Bill 1248.

Establishment of the new equalization department could prove costly, but Little believes that Iosco County could hold this expense to a nominal figure by using local experienced help.

He also said that with the present changes recommended in Senate Bill 1248, taxes may be paid in June and July instead of December.

## New East Tawas Elementary Unit Passes Inspection; Behind Schedule

Preliminary inspection by the fire marshal's division of Michigan State Police has given tentative approval to the new addition at East Tawas Elementary Unit.

Supt. Reynolds Mick told the board of education Monday night that the first inspection was usually the toughest and that apparently everything met with the fire marshal's approval.

A letter from Harry J. Skiba, owner of Thunder Bay Construction Company, contractor for the new building, stated that exterior grading and clean-up would be completed by August 31. The building will not be ready for occupancy, however, until after school opens.

Skiba said he was behind schedule because of strikes and material delays. Painting and decoration was to start Monday. Kitchen equipment is to be received September 15. Lunches will not be served until at least October 1.

In other business Monday night, the low bid of Blublitz Oil Company for furnishing fuel oil was accepted. The bid was 0878 for No. five fuel and 0793 for No. six. Barbier Oil Company's low bid of 13 cents per gallon was accepted for furnishing gasoline.

Contracts are to be awarded at a special meeting next Monday night for furnishing baked goods

to the hot lunch program. Contract for furnishing furniture for the new school office is also to be let at that time.

The August 31 meeting is called for the purpose of allowing residents to review the school budget for the coming year.

Principal Ernest W. Jordan announced the list of bus drivers for the coming school year. He said a shortage existed of stand-by drivers and applications were open.

Drivers on regular routes are Harry Pierson, Clarence King, Mrs. Goyle Killey, John Fisher, Charles Schalm, Mrs. Harry Wellna, Mrs. Larry Leslie, Mrs. Norma Worsham, Edwin Peterson, Carl Eckman, Edgar Jenkins, Harold Ellsworth and Henry Gage.

Conversion of the oil furnace at Tawas City unit to natural gas was tabled by the board. Cost was estimated at \$700 when proposed several weeks ago, but a bid from J. M. Day Company, Saginaw, was \$1,848. The board approved installation of a three-inch gas line at the high school at a cost of approximately \$1,600.

## Two East Tawas Boys Dead; Two Hurt in Crash

Two 15-year-old East Tawas boys are dead and two teen-aged rural Tawas City boys are hospitalized with serious injuries following a one-car crash last Wednesday night on Plank Road, about 2 1/2 miles west of the M-55 intersection.

Killed in the crash was David K. Gibson, son of Mrs. Mary Coyro, 306 Locke Street. Gregory H. Hodge, son of Mr. and Mrs. Orrie Hodge, 207 East Bay Street, died Thursday afternoon at Mercy Hospital, Bay City.

Injured were Harry R. Wojahn, 18, son of George Wojahn, 464

West M-55, and Larry Goedecke, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Goedecke, 1381 Klenow Road.

Both of the injured are at Mercy Hospital. Wojahn sustained two fractured legs, chest injuries and deep facial lacerations. Goedecke suffered a skull fracture, face lacerations and deep cuts on the left knee.

The accident occurred at 11:30 p. m. on Plank Road near the residence of Mrs. Louis Binder.

State police said the car, headed east, left the roadway and traveled along the left shoulder of the road before hitting a culvert at the Binder residence. The car turned end-for-end, knocked some limbs out of an apple tree and crashed into the ditch.

The crash was heard by neighboring families along Plank Road. Thomas Horning, who resides about one-half mile from the scene, told police that he awoke when he heard the sound of grinding metal. He and his two sons went to assist the injured.

First to reach the scene were the Rev. and Mrs. Ernest MacDonal of Battle Creek, who were visiting at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Donald MacDonal. They heard the crash and were guided to the scene by the sounding of the car's horn. "The only thing that identified the pile as a car was a little trickle of steam above the motor," said Mrs. MacDonal.

Gibson and Hodge, riding in the back seat, had been thrown from the auto. Gibson was apparently killed instantly and Hodge was found in the ditch. His left ear was nearly amputated, he had a depressed skull fracture and internal injuries.

Wojahn and Goedecke were both trapped in the wreckage. It took state police and volunteers about 30 minutes to free them.

The three injured were first taken to Tawas Hospital and later transferred to Bay City Mercy Hospital.

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## New State Laws Take Effect Thurs.

A good share of the state's 290 new and revised laws take effect Thursday, 90 days after adjournment of the legislative session in which they were passed.

Measures like aid to dependent children of the unemployed, the new state court of appeals establishment and appropriations won immediate approval.

Included in laws taking effect Thursday are congressional districting, a revision of the chemical test law for suspected drunk drivers, the "long truck" law and making it harder for drug addicts to buy paregoric.

Basically, the only change in the drunk driving law is allowing tests of urine, breath and "other bodily substances" in addition to the blood test already being used.

Police officers still have to inform the driver of his right to refuse the test.

Trucks that haul automobiles will be five feet longer—60 instead of 55 feet—after a victory for the haulway industry during the session.

Paregoric becomes harder to purchase under an act that law enforcement officials claim will curb a good deal of illegal narcotics use.

The drug, camphorated opium tincture, will be sold by pharmacists only through a written or telephoned prescription from a doctor.

The new act provides statutory brackets for collection of the state four percent sales tax. Starting Thursday, one cent will be charged on 12 to 31-cent purchases; two cents up to 54 cents; three cents to 81 cents; four cents to \$1.08; five cents to \$1.35 and six cents to \$1.62. Another penny is tacked on for each additional quarter in cost.

## Fear Flood of Ct. Appeals Would Tax Iosco Finances

Alarmed over the increased financial burden to counties caused through a July 8 amendment to rules of the state supreme court, Iosco Board of Supervisors at its August session last Wednesday went on record as supporting a resolution which would "deter frivolous civil and criminal appeals."

The state supreme court ruling is expected to open the floodgate on many appeals of circuit court sentences and decisions. The amendment provides that a county would furnish legal counsel and transcripts free of charge to those appealing.

The board of supervisors has supported a resolution submitted by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller which asked that the various boards of supervisors throughout Michigan meet with the state supreme court and legislature with a view to "conferring authority upon the new court of appeals so that sentences might be either increased or decreased, as is the case in appeals from justice to circuit court."

Low bid of Barbier Gas and Oil was accepted on furnishing fuel for resale at the airport. The bid was 34.92 cents for 80-octane gasoline and 37.92 cents per gallon for 100-octane gasoline. Nelkie reported that approximately 10,000 gallons of gasoline had been pumped there from January through July.

The board authorized Airport Manager Wilbur C. Roach to at-

tempt the meeting September 16-18 at Iron Mountain of the Michigan Association of Airport Managers.

Representatives of three business machine companies have been invited to demonstrate tax billing equipment at the September session.

Drain Commissioner E. H. Stickney was authorized to make an offer for property purchase prior to the start of condemnation procedures for construction of the Tawas Lake dam.

Supervisor Charles Smith of Oscoda asked the prosecuting attorney to give an opinion on the possible abolishing of the Van Ertan Lake Association and turning control of the dam over to Oscoda Township.

The board authorized withholding \$1,000 as final payment on construction of its new quarters at the county building. It was stated that the building had not been satisfactorily completed as yet.

The clerk was instructed to write a letter to the Iosco-Arenac Regional Library to see what progress had been made as yet in obtaining a new library director.

### Announce Mailing of Wheat Allotment Notices in Iosco

Grant Bessey, chairman of the Iosco ASC County Committee, recently announced that the 1965 wheat allotment notices were mailed August 18. These notices included payment rates per acre for the 1965 Voluntary Wheat Program. Signup began August 24 and runs through October 2, at the local ASC Office, Federal Building, East Tawas.

The program for 1965 is about the same as the 1964 program. Principal changes, compared with the 1964 program provisions, are:

1. Domestic certificates will be worth 75 cents per bushel (were 70 cents) and export certificates 30 cents per bushel (were 25 cents).


2. Price support national average loan rate will be \$1.25 per bushel (was \$1.30).

3. Participants can qualify for domestic certificates on 45 percent and export certificates on 35 percent of the normal production from their allotment (were 45 percent each).

The 1965 program for wheat is entirely voluntary. As in 1964, there will be no further marketing quotas or marketing quota penalties for 1965 crop. Further, those overplanting their acreage allotment in 1965 will not lose wheat acreage history for future years.

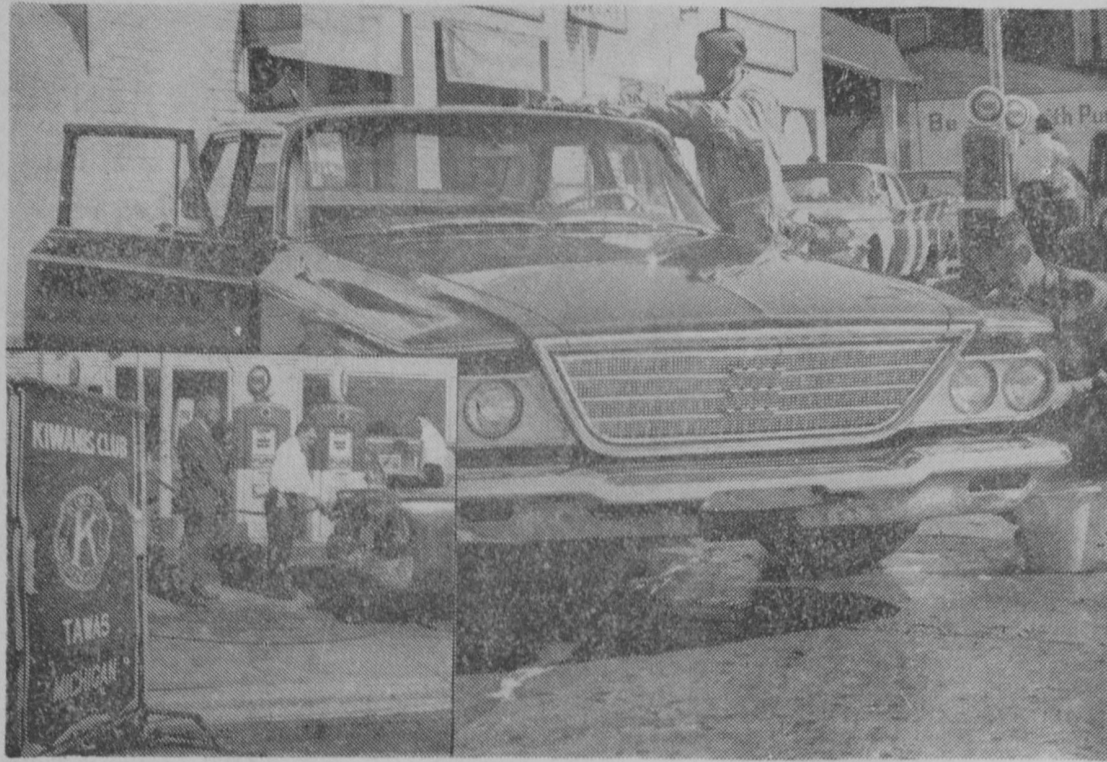

My friends in Iosco County:

I want to take this method of passing along to you folks my sincerest appreciation for permitting me to run unopposed this year for an office of public trust after having served you since 1951. This election is for a four year term so I must believe that I have kept faith in my pledge to serve all courteously, efficiently and to the best of my ability.

There are trends in government today that are frightening and I earnestly ask that you think about them as you prepare to vote this year—and vote you must!

The power of states to check encroachments by central government has broken down under confiscatory taxation by our national government using its unlimited power to tax. It is imperative to the survival of our system of government that some sort of limitation be placed upon this awesome power which began with the passage of the 16th amendment to our United States constitution.

Federal power gained momentum from the passage of this bill in 1913 until today it has attained a staggering pinnacle and federal immensity of interests is confounding. Our states have been made to look to Washington as a benevolent Santa Claus. It is hard today to believe that our country was founded partly to avoid taxes. The virtues of thrift, enterprise and individualism have lost their glamour.

The dangerous illusion today is that the states are "broke" and the federal government wealthy. There is no wealth to tax except that wealth contained within the boundaries of our 50 states. States will be left hollow shells if we do not rise in just wrath and put an end to unlimited taxation.

Another encroachment we must resent and change is the entry of our judicial branch of government into the legislative branch. Justices today are legislating when political expediency demands so, instead of adjudicating. Courts should never pass upon what the law ought to be, only upon what the law is.

We appear to be completely helpless before decisions of our federal supreme court for those seated have lifetime appointments. We also appear helpless before state supreme court decisions but here there comes a time when those members must stand on their records and ask us to put them back in office.

The indifference and inertia of the American public has been something to behold but it looks as if we have finally come alive. It is vital that our new interest be sustained. We are the law givers and must stay interested enough to watch for abuse of power by public officers and others who connive with them. Government has risen higher than the people and it is because we relaxed our vigilance.

It is interesting to note that battle is taking place throughout Michigan this year from the grass roots level to the top brass. The change that will take place in our state legislature will be terrific. A host of candidates filed, and some will be elected, who were attracted only by the new salary scale of \$12,500 per year. Previous government experience and spending of taxpayers money? None! Our new legislature will be the happy hunting grounds for all special interest groups.

At the local level we have county and township contests, a healthy sign. The aspirants must be motivated by a genuine desire to render public service and serve the people of Iosco County. Certainly these candidates are not attracted by the pay scale of county officers or supervisors.

Iosco county is again in the lowest one tenth of the 83 counties of Michigan for operating millage spread. Your supervisors have a reputation around the state as a tough group from which to pry an extra dollar. Yet today, there is a sizable group in Michigan who would abolish Boards of Supervisors.

The latest encroachment on counties foisted upon them by our supreme court in the new judicature act is the right for all those persons in prison now, or sentenced there from here on, to have new trials with court appointed attorneys and free transcripts, all provided at county taxpayers expense. The cost will be substantial and we must be suspect of the motives which brought about enactment of the law. Certainly the votes of those who are in prison or about to break our laws in the future are not being solicited.

If we don't do another single thing on September 1 and again November 3 we should go to the polls and vote. It is time the public began throwing its weight around. All others are throwing theirs—against us!

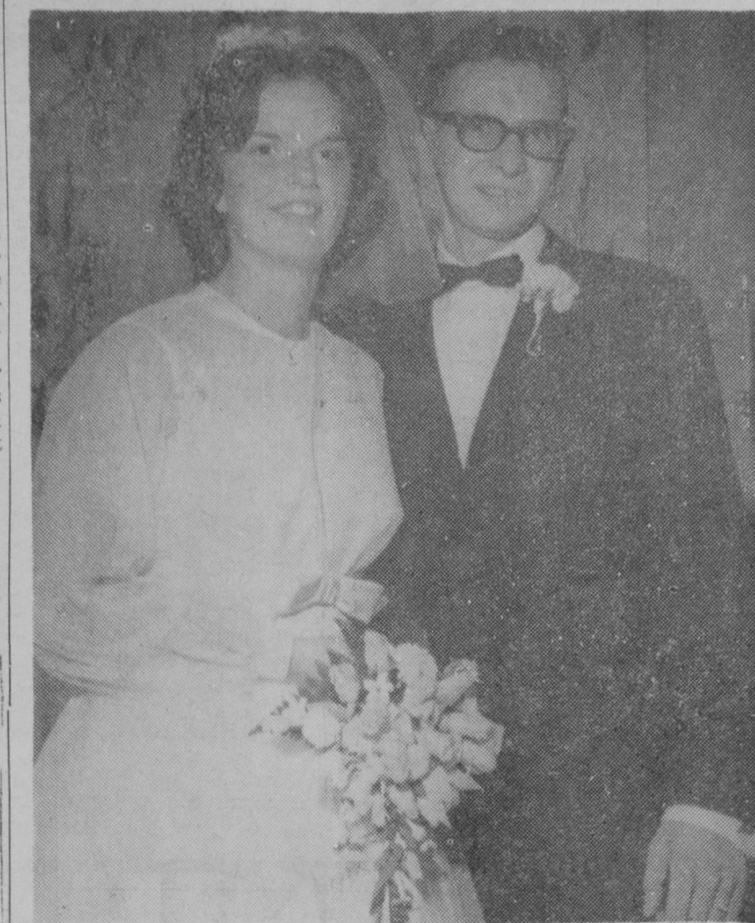



This is instantaneous? What if it is a very serious emergency message and the telephone is busy? The State Police do their part and more, but our Sheriff Department has totally ignored the real reason for an emergency radio, YOU.

The radio is for your safety, your need and your protection. With a radio system, you can actually double the efficiency of a County Patrol Car. We can give our very fine Fire Departments a 24 hour Fire Dispatcher Control Office, thereby relieving them of the responsibility and cost of buying a base radio transmitter and receiver and personnel to operate it. And most of all, it will give you, the resident, 24 hour emergency radio service. For Police, Fire and Emergency equipment dispatch. Something we have badly needed for some time, but which has been completely ignored by the present Sheriff Department Administration.

Now, regarding cost of purchasing the radio transmitter and personnel to operate it: Just what is wrong in our County that a base radio station cannot be made available




