

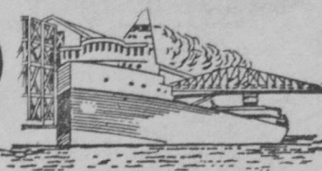

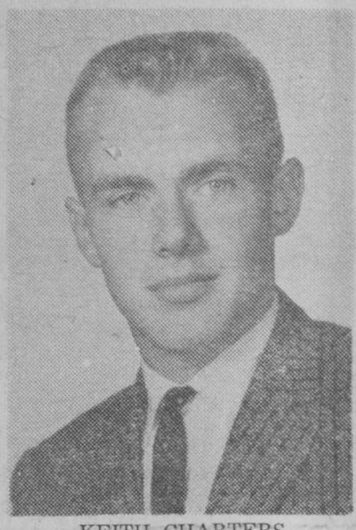
182 4-H Members Participate in Fair

Tawas City Council OKs New Fire Phone System

Installation of a new 10-telephone alerting system for the volunteer fire department was authorized Monday night by Tawas City Council.

Representatives of Michigan Bell Telephone Company appeared before the council and a film was shown concerning the new system. Preliminary discussion between Fire Chief James Lansky, Supt. of Public Works Reginald Blubitz and telephone company representatives had been held last September.

This system is being used by many communities throughout the state and a similar one is used at East Tawas. Eight special red telephones would be installed in the homes of eight key firemen, along with a phone at city hall and one at the fire chief's place of business.

When the fire alarm number of 362-2323 is dialed, each of the 10 phones would be alerted by a distinctive ring. The first person to lift the receiver would take information from the caller and press a button to start the fire siren. Others on the line would be able to listen in on the conversation and go directly to the fire or to city hall.

Monthly cost of the 10-phone system would be \$79.05. An initial installation charge of \$102.50 would be assessed by the company. At present, fire calls are taken at the county jail. The city pays a monthly fee of \$16.55 for this phone service and a special channel back to city hall which operates the fire siren.

The city is to ask Michigan Bell to rearrange its listing of fire phones in the telephone directory. At present, call numbers for East Tawas, Oscoda and Tawas City are under one heading—Fire. Many alarms are misdirected, resulting in loss of valuable time to firemen.

1878 Ticket Gained Entrance to Iosco Fair

A complimentary ticket to the fourth annual Iosco County Fair, issued in 1878, was honored by the gatekeeper last week when presented by Miss Edna Otis of East Tawas.

The ticket bore the names of T. F. Thompson, president; H. E. Hoard, secretary, and W. C. Stevens, treasurer.

These men were prominent in Iosco County history in the 1870s. Thompson was a lumberman, owning extensive pine holdings in the northwestern part of the county; Hoard was editor of the old Iosco County Gazette at Tawas City, and Stevens was a lawyer at East Tawas, later becoming auditor general of the State of Michigan.

Recreation Program in Final Week Here

Final week in the summer recreation program for the Tawas area will be completed by Friday with make-up games in the Knolthe League and Pony League on tap.

The over-all program involved approximately 500 boys and girls. The girls' program, under the direction of Mrs. Charles Lemon, presented a month-long program for approximately 60 girls. Bulk of the boys' program, under Director Ben Witte and his assistant, Darrell Welch, is connected with baseball and 440 boys took part in the eight-week program.

General objectives of the program included health, wise selection and use of time, development of citizenship, social contacts, development of interest and skills, pleasure in playing.

"A program of this nature is impossible without the support of the community and its citizens," stated Witte.

He gave special recognition to Tawas Area Schools, East Tawas, Tawas City and the Townships of Baldwin, Alabaster and Tawas for financial support.

New Zoning Ordinance to be Discussed Aug. 17

A joint meeting to discuss Tawas City's proposed new zoning ordinance will be held August 17 by the city council and planning commission. Representatives of the city's planning consultants, Villan-Leman and Associates, are to be in attendance.

Mayor George Tuttle recommended at Monday night's council meeting that each member study the proposed ordinance and mark any provisions in question.

"I think we owe it to everyone to make a thorough study of the ordinance," said City Attorney Alf C. Watson.

City Received \$75 to Cover Damage

City of Tawas City has received \$75 to repair damages at the river mouth caused July 16 when a Conneaut, Ohio, commercial fishing boat grounded in the shallow water and tried to dislodge itself through propeller action.

A check was received Monday from the M. J. Grow Fish Company to pay damages caused by its "Ethel S" fish tug. The tug was removed with the aid of the coast guard's utility boat.

Supt. of Public Works Reginald Blubitz said the money would cover cost of removing two sand bars in the river mouth caused by eroding action of the boat's propeller.

Tawas Hosts 2nd Annual Bike Race

Tawas Chamber of Commerce plays host to the second annual Tawas Area Bike Races Friday and Saturday, August 7-8. Plenty of thrills will be provided one and all with 75 racers capable of attaining speeds up to 40 miles per hour.

Friday night's program starts at 8 o'clock with novice riders and expert sprinters racing around a one-half mile course which has its starting point at the corner of West State and Newman Streets in East Tawas. Tricycle and stock bike races are scheduled for 8:00 p. m. with many ribbons and medals to be awarded winners.

The expert racers are to compete in high-speed sprints starting at 9 o'clock. Saturday morning at 10 o'clock will find from 50 to 75 racers warming up for the annual Lumbermen's Monument 50-mile tour. Starting and finishing point will be at the same corners of West State and Newman Streets.

This 50-mile event will wind its way out to the famous Lumbermen's Monument and, at that point, turn right to Oscoda and then return to the starting point in East Tawas via old US-23. The race will take from two to 2½ hours to run.

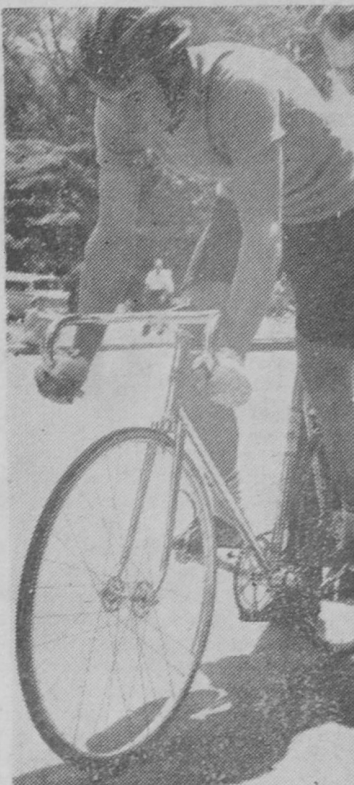
After averaging about 25 miles per hour over this grueling course,

spectators will thrill to see the riders sprinting up to 40 miles per hour for the finish.

The chamber of commerce has been informed that the Tawas race has an excellent opportunity to become sanctioned by the American Bicycle League which would qualify riders for Olympic competition.

The Tawas has also been advised that it is possible for this area to be the location of a national bike race. "With these possibilities in mind, the chamber of commerce has gone all out to make this year's race as successful as possible," states Leonard Calabrese, chairman.

This year's race will draw top riders from the entire Midwest and Canada, featuring such names as Vince Muzzin, Sam McCall and Bill Freund. These riders have all qualified for the 1964 Olympic trials in New York.

Participation Urged in Novice Bike Races

All local residents and tourists are invited to participate in novice bike races to be held Friday. This event is part of week-end bike racing program and is to start at 8:00 p. m.

Exact classes of races have not been set up because it is not known who will want to ride in this event. Novice races held in other towns have had the following schedule:

Tricycle race—six years and under; junior race—16 years and under; senior race—17 years and over. All ages may enter.

Many medals and ribbons will be awarded to winners. These awards have been donated by the Arnold Schwinn Company.

Tourist Festival Receives Support

Michigan Tourist Festival Committee reports it is receiving tremendous support from local businessmen. A group of five men is now in the process of contacting all businessmen from the entire Tawas area.

Donald Mooney and Joseph Branham have been approaching the businessmen on Newman Street at East Tawas and report they have the support of over 30 individuals. Leonard Calabrese, who has been canvassing US-23 at East Tawas and outlying businesses, reports that more than 20 establishments have participated.

Also very successful are James DeWise and Clarence King, who have been talking to all businessmen in Tawas City. They report that more than 40 have supported the festival. This means that about 100 businesses have backed the festival up to date with many more to be contacted before the festival week of August 17.

Each of these businesses are asked to contribute \$10 to help support the financial obligations of the festival committee. Participating establishments are noted by display of festival signs and posters. Tickets are available at these locations for the resort lot to be awarded during the festival. These merchants also have discount tickets which may be presented at the carnival entitling the bearer to pay 15 cents for each ride instead of 25 cents.

Official festival dates are August 20-23, although activities are to begin Monday, August 17.

Attorneys Filed Suit in Wrong County

Iosco County Clerk George A. Prescott reported Thursday that a \$50,000 damage claim had been filed in error last week against the Iosco County Road Commission.

Attorneys for Wayne D. Utterback had named this county instead of Alcona County as defendant in the lawsuit. Papers served at the county clerk's office were withdrawn and new ones prepared naming the Alcona County Road Commission as defendant.

Utterback, an airman at Wurtsmith, claims that the Alcona Road Commission's negligence resulted in his being involved in a car-train accident June 19.

He claims that the crossing and signs on the Greenbush to Mikado Road were obscured by weeds, brush or vegetation "illegally allowed to grow upon railroad right-of-way and upon highway right-of-way."

Last Rites Held for East Tawas Insurance Man

Funeral services were held Saturday morning for Robert W. Elliott Sr., East Tawas businessman, who died July 29 at University Hospital, Ann Arbor. He had been in the hospital since suffering a heart attack July 17.

Born August 7, 1891, at Harrisville, Mr. Elliott had been connected with the insurance business for more than 40 years. He had been employed by the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company for many years and operated an insurance business at the same time.

In 1936, Mr. Elliott purchased the Tawas Bay Agency from the Richards estate. He was joined in the business in 1947 by his son, John C. Elliott, and in 1953 by his son, Robert W. Elliott Jr.

He was married November 11, 1919, to Kathryn Sands in East Tawas.

Mr. Elliott was a fourth degree member of the Knights of Columbus, a member of St. Joseph Church and the Holy Name Society.

Surviving are his wife; two sons; a daughter, Mrs. Kharla Rae Weaver of Saginaw; 10 grandchildren; a brother, Roy of Harrisville; a sister, Miss Blanche Elliott of Wyandotte.

The Rev. Fr. Arthur Mulka officiated at funeral services from St. Joseph Church. Burial was in the church cemetery. A Rosary service was held Friday evening at Jaques Funeral Home.

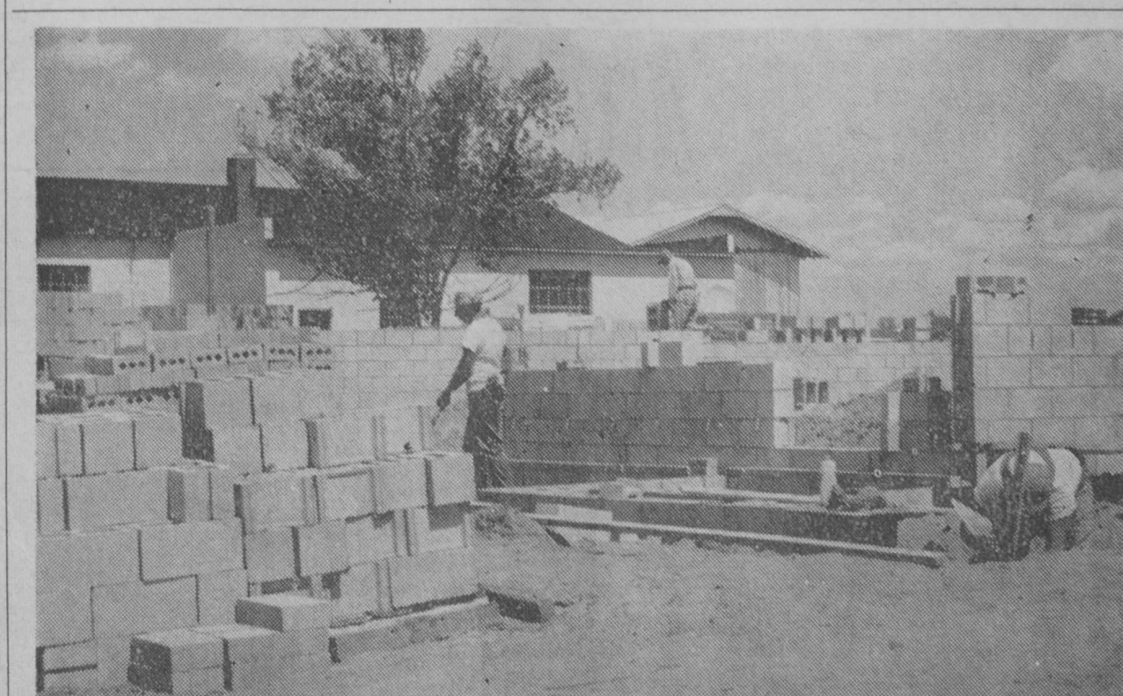

\$101,000 Suit Filed Against Tawas Teacher

A November 7 auto collision south of Tawas City which sent two Tawas men to the hospital has resulted in the filing of a \$101,000 damage suit Monday in Iosco Circuit Court.

Seeking \$75,000 damages for injuries received in the crash is J. Berkeley Smith, formerly of East Tawas, now editor of the Oscoda Press. His wife, Emily C. Smith, in separate cause of action, asks a \$26,000 judgment.

Named as defendant in the suit was Miss Burnetta Miller of East Tawas, teacher at Tawas Area School, driver of the second car involved.

Smith, accompanied by Kenneth Conn, East Tawas insurance agent, was returning from an afternoon of hunting when Smith's car rammed into the rear of the Miller vehicle at the National Gypsum Company overpass on US-23. Miss Miller had pulled out of a private drive, traveled to a point near the overpass and was struck from the rear by Smith's vehicle.

The plaintiff claims that the other driver operated in a careless and negligent manner. A jury trial has been requested.

Smith was hospitalized from November 7 to December 13 with serious internal injuries.

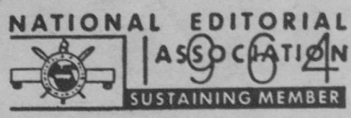

Sunday's game was another thriller, Hale scoring one run in the second and two in the eighth, while Comins scored one in the sixth and one in the ninth.

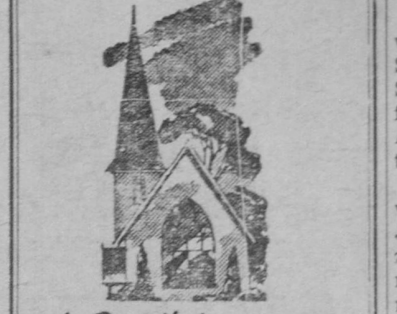
