Trespassing Complaints High; Deer Season Ends

Area lawmen are happy that the 15-day deer hunting season came to a close Monday.

While the number of arrests for carrying loaded guns in cars and other conservation violations were about the same as in previous years, trespassing complaints in this area were the highest in history.

The Iosco Sheriff's Department reported Friday that 10 or more warrants had been issued in this county against hunters who violated the Horton Trespass Act. Five cases have been handled through justice court and at least five more await disposition.

Harvest Low, Hear Protests on Doe Season

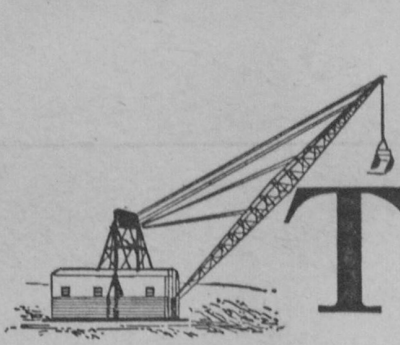
In spite of bad shooting weather over the final week-end, Michigan deer hunters apparently racked up a firearm kill of 115,000-125,000 whitetails during the 1964 season.

The figure falls short of the conservation department's prediction that hunters would take more than 130,000 deer if they had ideal shooting conditions. Generally, those conditions have been good but left much to be desired on the November 15 opener when rains washed out an afternoon of action in many parts of the state.

Locally, Conservation Officer A. G. Leitz said Tuesday that the deer kill was high during the first week, but the second week of hunting found fewer hunters and a lighter take. He said that judging from his travels throughout the county since November 15, the over-all harvest was lower than last season.

Complaints have already been heard here concerning the antlerless deer season. Many veteran hunters, who never have subscribed to the conservation department's theory that this area was over-browed by the deer herd, say that the "doe season" tends to bring in a large number of irresponsible hunters—"who shoot at everything in sight and trespass at will."

Long a subject of controversy in Michigan, antlerless deer hunting will probably come under fire during the winter months ahead.



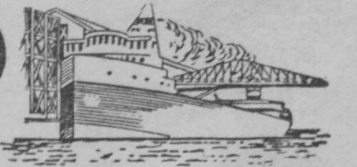

Zoning Hearing Held Monday Night by TC

Two changes in Tawas City's new zoning ordinance were taken under advisement by the city council at a special hearing Monday night. While tentative approval is expected at next Monday night's regular meeting, formal adoption will not come until next month.

Members of the planning commission and city council were on hand at the hearing to hear arguments for and against the proposed zoning code, the end result of an over-all study carried on during the past two years by the planning commission and the city's professional planning consultants, Vilican-Leman and Associates, Incorporated.

Only three residents had ques-

tions concerning the new document designed to serve as a future guideline for orderly growth of the community. Two questions were heard concerning industrial zones.

Frank Wilkuski, property owner at the southwest corner of First Avenue and First Street, asked how the new ordinance would affect his property. This is the former site of Huron Rustic mill. A concrete block building on the property is occupied by Michigan Consolidated Gas Company.

According to Planner Charles Leman, the property had been rezoned to residential A, but present nonconforming use would be allowed. The property can be sold and its present use would still be legal.

Shot Through Legs in Gun Accident

A former Hale man, Richard E. Eno of Clawson, is reported in serious condition at Mercy Hospital, Bay City, after being shot through both legs early Tuesday morning last week.

Investigating officers from West Branch were informed by Roger Thayer of Lupton and Donald Yost of Hale that Eno had been shot when Yost reached for a gun in the back seat of a car in which the three had been riding.

The accident occurred near Sage Lake west of the Iosco-Ogemaw line at 12:45 a. m.

Eno, who was driving, was hit in the right leg just above the knee. The slug went through that leg and also hit the left leg below the knee, the bullet passing through the flesh behind the bone of the left leg.

Eno suffered a compound fracture of the right leg where the slug hit his leg.

He also suffered the loss of a large amount of blood before he was taken to Tolfree Hospital, West Branch. He was later transferred to Bay City.

The trio denied to investigating officers that they were hunting at the time of the accident, but Ogemaw officials are still investigating fresh blood found in the trunk of the car.

Eno is the grandson of Seymour Bortle of Hale.

Mikado Man Killed Saturday While Hunting

A 27-year-old Mikado man, Ebert D. Smith, was shot and killed Saturday morning southwest of Mikado on the last week-end of deer hunting season.

The shooter, Richard E. Perkins, 22, Glennie, told Alcona Sheriff Mertin Gehres and state police from East Tawas that he saw three deer crossing a fire line about 150 yards distant.

Perkins noticed another hunter, dressed in a yellow raincoat, about 300 yards down the trail and waited until the deer were clear of him. He fired and the rifle slug hit Smith on the left side of his head.

The victim had been sitting or standing on the edge of the fire trail about 200 yards from the shooter. He had not been seen by Perkins or the other hunter, who were driving deer.

Elmer J. Burrell, who developed North Park Acres Subdivision, was interested in a row of lots fronting M-55 from the Tawas River Bridge to Fifth Avenue. In October 1951, when M-55 was rerouted to its present location, both sides of the highway were rezoned commercial to a depth of 200 feet.

Mr. Burrell was concerned with the rezoning of his property, under the new ordinance to residential. He said that there was a possibility that the old mill site at the corner of M-55 and Fifth Avenue could be developed as commercial.

During a lengthy discussion, Leman was of the opinion that strip zoning for commercial use would be improper along M-55. One of his reasons was that under the new ordinance, each new business place must provide adequate parking and there was not enough room within the 200-foot strip for this use. The property also lacked a service alley.

It was stated, however, that the old mill site along Fifth Avenue could be developed for commercial purposes. It was stated that the owner could request a zoning change if and when it was needed.

Planning Commission Chairman Hugo Keiser pointed out that residents of North Park Acres Subdivision had complained of commercial development in that area. In one instance, complaints had been heard concerning commercial use outside the city limits, over which the city had no control.

Mr. Burrell was of the opinion that the property along M-55 had been zoned commercial when he purchased it and that it should remain the same.

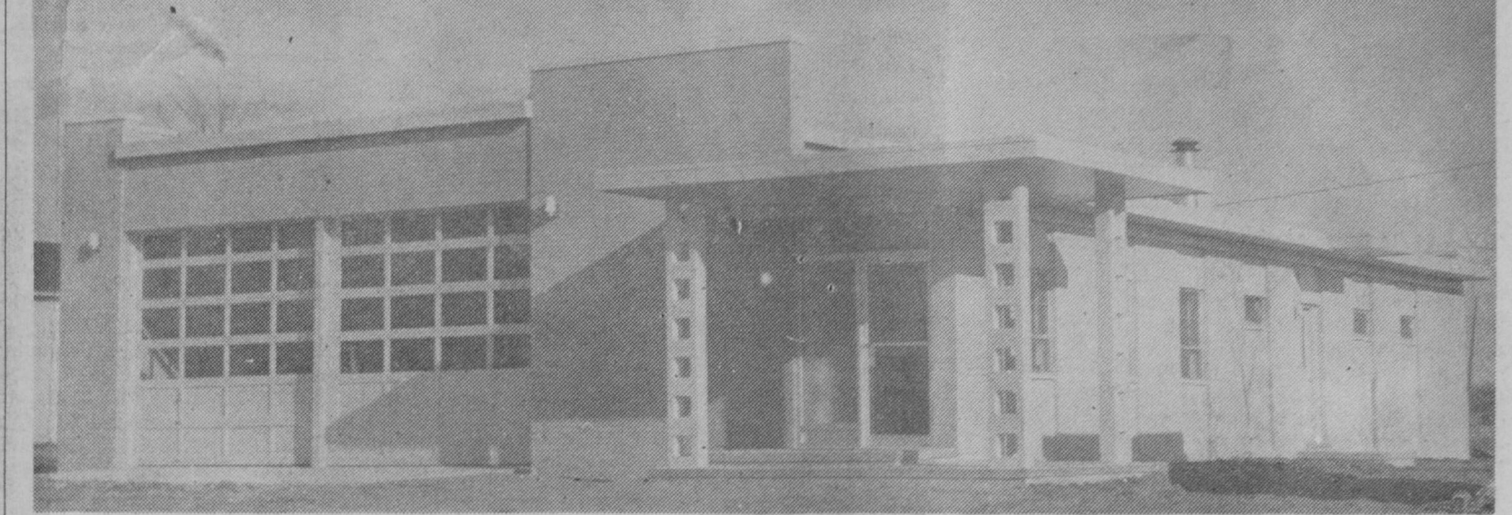
J. Atlee Mark was present and requested information as to the status of his summer cottage on US-23. Under the new code, he would be allowed to winterize the cabin as a year around residence.

Plainfield's New Fire Hall Set for Dedication Sunday

Plainfield Township Fire Department will dedicate its new \$25,000 fire hall and \$20,000 fire truck at an open house to be held Sunday, December 6, from 1:00 to 5:00 p. m.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony will be held with Fire Chief James Mann and Supervisor George Webb officiating. Mrs. Barbara Malcho, township treasurer, will be the speaker.

Modernization of the township

fire department has been achieved in the short span of 1 1/2 years. Following original discussions and investigation by the fire department's building committee, a \$45,000 general obligation bond issue was placed before voters in October 1963. The proposition was approved by a two to one majority.

The sparkling new tan brick front building, located adjacent to the township hall, has a 66 by 38-foot garage section and two offices measuring 18 by 22 feet.

The garage section provides storage area for the department's new John Bean fire truck plus a tanker. Space is provided in the rear of the building for the department's emergency water rescue equipment.

A radio room is provided in the front office, along with space for department meetings. The rear room is to be used as the Hale Health Council's loan closet.

A number of alterations had to be made to original plans for the building in order to keep the cost within \$25,000. Many organizations donated money for a resuscitator and, when a new one was provided with the truck, this money was used to purchase paint. The building has been painted by volunteer labor from firemen.

Fire Chief Mann states that the new hall may be site of next August's annual barbecue. This event is usually held at Rollways Camp grounds, but has grown to such popularity that it may be held at the new fire hall, which adjoins the county fairgrounds.

Chief Mann and his 30-member department extend an invitation

to all residents to inspect the new building and truck on Sunday. Coffee and doughnuts are to be served.

The building was designed by Scott Engineering of Alpena. Eckstein and Staebler Construction Company was general contractor. Electrical work was by St. James Electric.

Following field inspection by URA to give tentative approval of the proposed project, an additional \$500 in local funds would be required for preparation of a formal survey and planning application for federal funds to carry on detailed studies.

If the preliminary survey indicates a project cost beyond means of the city, or if the resultant visit by ARA planners discourages further activity, it would not be necessary to take the final step costing \$500.

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A number of local people are patrons of the Tawas Community Chorus to underwrite its financial support and proceeds from concerts are used to provide music scholarships for local students.

For the first time, members of the chorus will present a complete work as one part of the program, which is a short Christmas cantata, "For Us a Child is Born," by J. S. Bach. Music will include three of the choruses, "O Thou That Tellest Good Tidings," "For Unto Us a Child Is Born" and "Glory To God," all from G. F. Handel's, "The Messiah." Tawas Area High School Choir will participate with the community chorus to form an eight-part double choir to perform the final selection on the Christmas program, "Ye Shall Have a Song," from American Composer Randall Thompson's "The Peaceable Kingdom." Several other Christmas carols and songs will also be included on the program.

Soloists for the concert will be Marion Toska, Lois Freel, Irving Johnson and the Rev. William Lindholm; director is Mr. Johnson of Whittemore-Prescott Area High School music department, and Miss Judith Gillies of Tawas Area faculty is accompanist.

Presiding over the meeting will be L. S. Little, Grant Township supervisor, who is district president.

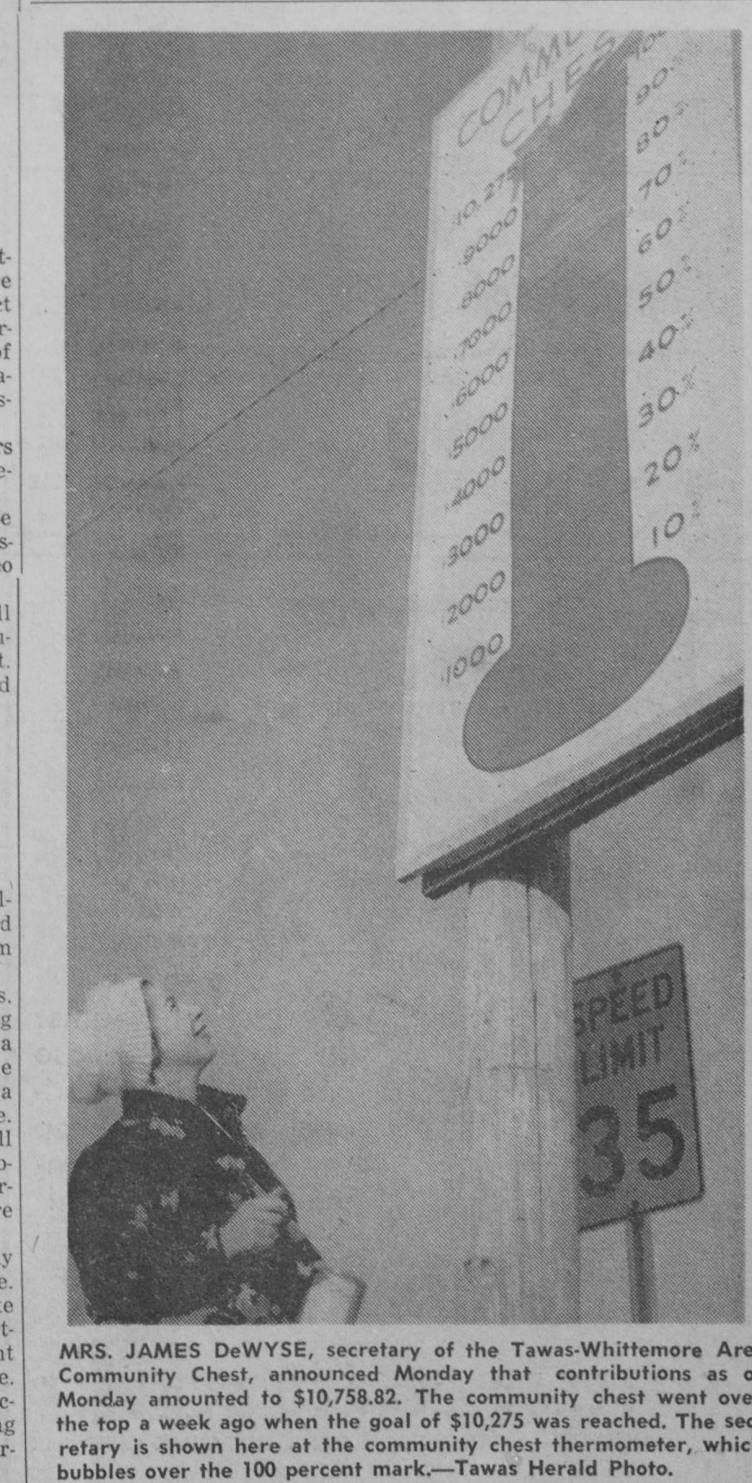

Chamber Mails New Dues Schedules to 400 Businesses

Shown on page 3 of this week's Herald is the new Tawas Area Chamber of Commerce dues schedule. This fair share minimum dues schedule will be received this week through the mail by more than 400 Tawas City-East Tawas businessmen and organizations.

At the bottom of the schedule is a perforated post card which the chamber of commerce asks to be returned to its office by December 15.

Information requested on this post card is a classification to be fixed by the businessman himself. This classification will determine what the minimum membership dues shall be for that individual or his business.

After this card is returned to the chamber, the information is to be filed and the member billed quarterly, or as he requests.

"The most important point of this dues schedule," states Leonard Calabrese, budget and finance chairman, "is the basic plan of

'fair share.' With this schedule in operation, each business' dues would follow economic trends."

"As the business grows, then so shall the dues and if business should decrease due to economic effect, then so shall the dues decrease. Also important is the fact that smaller businesses would be paying a smaller amount as compared to a larger similar business," said Calabrese.

By observing the schedule, one can see that a large industrial firm employing 150 would pay annual dues of \$100 plus 50 cents for each employee or a total of \$175. A smaller industry employing 50 would pay \$100 using the same reasoning.

Motels are divided into two groups: Year around and seasonal (less than six months operation). Retailers are divided into three classes: Large, medium and small, according to number of employees.

"With this method of assessing memberships, each business will

be financially supporting the chamber only to the degree that its business benefits from the area," states Ralph Western, president. "All businesses and organizations must benefit from an active and well operating chamber, but the chamber must have financial support of these businesses."

It is the feeling of the board of directors that the chamber of commerce is offering a fair and realistic dues schedule to all concerned. The group asks that each person analyze the schedule, classify themselves and return the requested information to the chamber office.

In the past three years, the chamber has little doubt that its efforts benefit the area, but the chamber needs more support.

"Only you and the people your business serves benefit from the chamber, which means that all will benefit from a successful chamber of commerce," states Western.

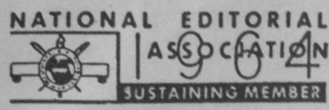

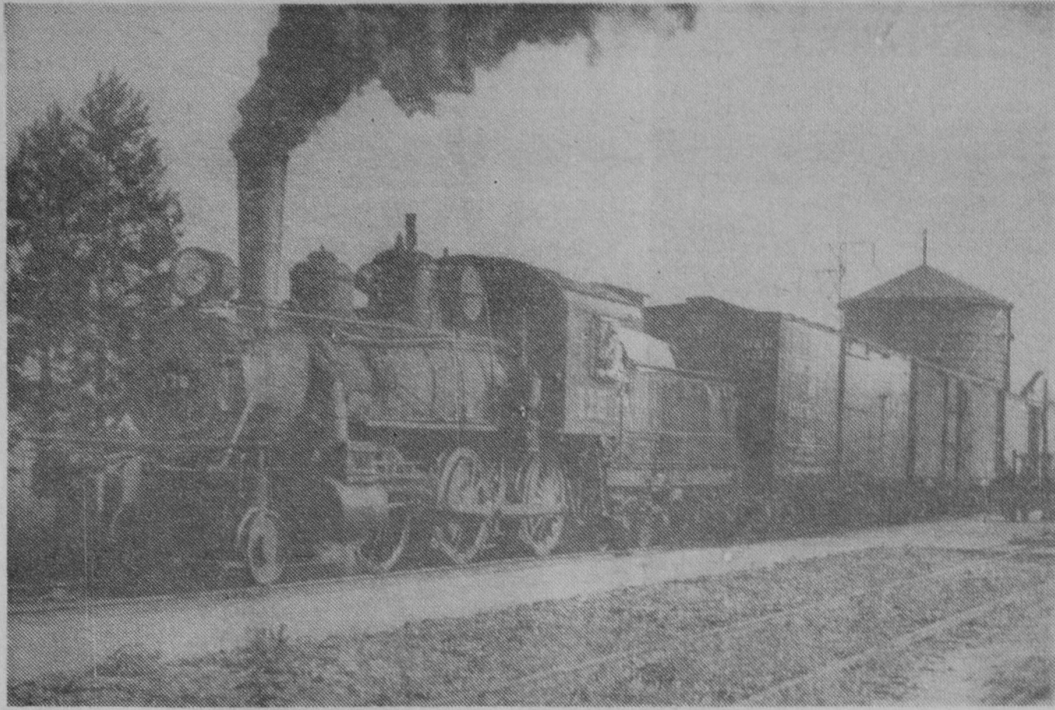

38 Police Troopers Graduate; Dept. Strength Highest

Thirty-eight Michigan State Police recruits were graduated as probationary troopers Wednesday afternoon at East Lansing headquarters to bring the department's enlisted strength to 1,238, the highest it has ever been but still 21 below the present authorized complement of 1,259.

Among the new recruits is Trooper Wayne J. Kramer, Menominee, who has been assigned to the East Tawas Post.

Commissioner Joseph A. Childs was principal speaker at the brief exercises, concluding nine weeks of training which began September 28. He administered the oath of office to the new officers and presented them with their badges.

This was the fourth recruit school to be completed this year. There were 39 officers graduated in January, 33 in May and 42 in July. Another recruit school is tentatively scheduled to start in late February. Advanced trooper training for members of several previous recruit schools is planned for January.

Other new troopers coming from the Northeastern Michigan area include Marion R. Bagent, West Branch; Arthur L. Deller, Mikado; LeRoy J. Schram, Lincoln.

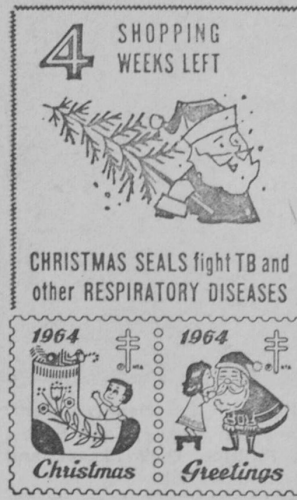

In recreation use last year, this forest ranked as the nation's third most heavily used with three and one-third million visits. The Tawas district is part of this forest.

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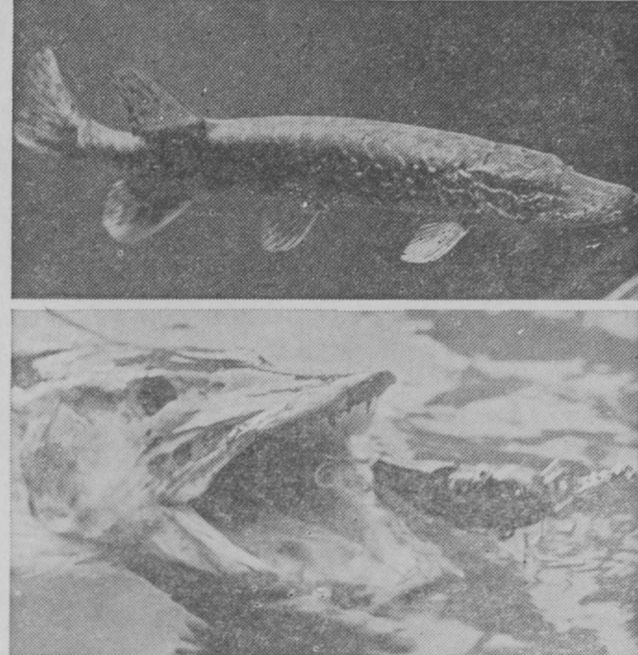

They Need Help — — — Now



These two prized fish—the northern pike (top) and muskellunge—are having population problems in Michigan as a result of increased angling pressure and shortcomings in their reproduction. That's why the Conservation Department is recommending a longer closed season on muskies and pike, spanning the spring season when they spawn in concentrations where they can be easily over-fished. Department plans are also aimed at giving muskies better protection by raising the minimum 30-inch size limit on these fish, and by introducing a catch quota of two per day. Department fisheries men have gotten together with Ontario conservation personnel to work out more uniform regulations for these and other species which are caught in waters fished by Michigan and Canadian anglers. Their joint efforts will be reflected in proposed fishing changes which come before the Conservation Commission during its Oct. 15-16 meeting in East Tawas.—Mich. Dept. of Conservation

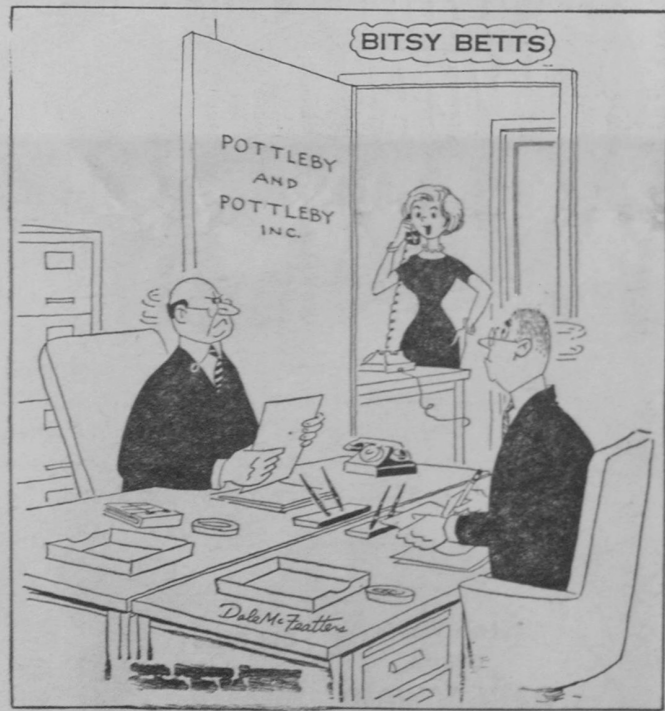
HA Eagles Open '64-'65 Basketball Season at Posen

COOKIES FOR Christmas

How about some delicious Swedish cookies for the Christmas season? These delicate flavored cookies remain tender and crisp when stored. You can make them in various shapes by using different patterns in a cookie press. For more variety, sprinkle them with colored sugar, frost or decorate with citron or candied cherries. The following recipe makes about 10 dozen or more cookies, depending on the size.

- SWEDISH COOKIES**
- 3 cups butter
 - 1½ cups sugar
 - 2 eggs beaten
 - 1 cup almonds
 - 8 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- Cream butter and sugar together. Add eggs, nuts and flour. Mix well. Run through a cookie press. Place on an ungreased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) for about 5-8 minutes or until delicate brown.

- TREE SAFETY TIPS**
- Because Christmas trees are potential fire hazards, here are a few tips that will help prevent a fire in your home:
1. Keep your tree outdoors until you are ready to put it up.
 2. Wait until just before Christmas to put up your tree.
 3. Place tree so it does not block doorways.
 4. Place tree away from radiators and heaters, and certainly away from fireplaces.
 5. Stand tree in water to retard drying.
 6. Use fireproof decorations of glass and metal.
 7. Carefully check your Christmas lights and discard sets with frayed wiring. Don't use lighted candles.
 8. Don't leave tree lights burning when away from home.
 9. Inspect tree often to see if lights are drying out needles. If they have, change the position of the lights.

Early Tawas History Revealed in News Files

By Edna Otis

How did the people of the Tawas area live and move and have their being 91 years ago? By a stroke of rare good fortune the files for three years of the old Iosco County Gazette (published in Tawas City at the time) have been returned to Iosco County. Thinking your readers might be interested in an answer to the question asked, we submit the following for your perusal:

November 6, 1873
On October 30, Tawas City was visited by a disastrous fire. It swept from about where the present city hall is located, west to Mathews Street. Damage was estimated at about \$25,000, with \$12,000 insurance. Originating at a billiard parlor, the newspaper reported that "the fire seemed to blaze as if kerosene had been thrown upon the side of the building." These businessmen were the losers: Tawas City Hotel, S. R. Lyons Store, J. W. King Drug Store, Simmons House, Rhodes and Brookhauser, Campbell Barber Shop and Curry Brothers. Flying cinders endangered the Methodist Church, then being built, but faithful watchers saved it. Plenty of liquor was stolen and one drunk nearly burned to death, but was saved. The only means of fire protection was a hand brigade, which led the editor to comment that twice before fire had visited the town and there was not even a hand engine to fight it.

A bad storm during the week had sent 28 vessels into the harbor for refuge.

O. Grise advertised his interest

in the blacksmithing and wagon-making business of D. Grise and Brother, for sale.

Four murder trials had been listed on the calendar for the October term of court.

James Hamilton and Anna Miner were married by the Rev. T. G. Potter during the week.

A Methodist Church was being constructed in Tawas City, at a cost of \$4,000.

A roving reporter visited the "shore towns" and reported thusly about the area: 100 new buildings had gone up in East Tawas during the year, among them the Catholic Church. Three saw mills were running: Tawas Mill Company, Adams, Jolley and Company, Adams, Jolley and Company, and William Grant and Son. The most extensive operations were credited to the latter. They cut 10,600,000 feet of lumber during the season, worked a salt block, making 80 barrels daily, and had made 10,000 barrels to date. Tawas Mill Company had cut nine million feet of lumber and operated an extensive store. The Adams Company had cut 5,235,000 feet of lumber and their mill ran night and day during the season.

The Cameron Mill, located about where the Barkman Outfitting Company Store stands, cut six million feet of lumber. They had started a camp on the AuSable with 30 men and planned another on the AuGres. Staats and Quackenbush manufactured sash, doors and blinds here and the East Tawas Iron Works had more repair work than it could do and would build a foundry next season. John

for Consumers Power Company, requested that wording concerning the industrial zone be clarified. Provisions of the industrial zone are to be rewritten to allow substations, pole yards and other uses by utilities.

Paul Beyer requested information concerning industrial zones. There is one general category for industrial zones allowing all types of manufacturing. This is similar to the old ordinance.

During a discussion on strip zoning for commercial use, Keiser said that Tawas City's present business district was a "living example of what to stay away from" because it is stretched out over a great distance and with little provision for off-street parking.

Leman pointed out that over half of the business land along US-23 today was taken up by residential use.

Following adjournment of the hearing, Robert Shattuck, another member of the planning consultant firm, explained the future use plan which is to be presented to the council next month.

Lending Institutions Receive Hike on Crop Interest Rates

The United States Department of Agriculture announced November 12 that the rate of interest payable on certificates of interest issued to banks and other lending institutions participating in the financing of 1964 crop price support loans will be increased from 3.7 to 3.875 percent per annum, effective November 15.

The increase in lending institutions is in line with recent trends and is being made to encourage continued participation by private lenders in the financing of Commodity Credit Corporation loan programs, USDA officials said.

This increase will not be retroactive. Therefore, lending institutions which have invested funds in 1964 crop price support loans will earn interest on their investments at 3.70 percent per annum from the date of investment through November 14, and 3.875 percent thereafter. Notice of this increase will be published in the Federal Register.

Reprints of the Federal Register notice on certificates of interest for grain and related commodities will be distributed to financing institutions by county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASCS) offices.

State police are investigating damage to four windows in the park entrance collection booth at the new Tawas Point State Park. The booth had recently been moved from the old park at East Tawas. Gerald Russell, ranger, said that the windows had been struck by rifle fire.
