

Pugh Appointed as Tawas City JP

Vernon Pugh, owner-operator of Huron Loan Company, has been named to fill a vacancy as justice of the peace in Tawas City. Appointed Monday night by

Mayor George Tuttle, with unanimous approval of the city council, Pugh succeeds C. L. McLean, whose appointment to fill a vacancy expired last June.

Mayor Tuttle announced that three other persons had sought the appointment. Two of those were Matthew Hoag and Roy Bergeron. The third was not named.

Pugh's appointment is to be effective until the spring election in April. The successful candidate for justice of the peace in that election would probably receive an interim appointment in order to act until actually taking office July 1.

Inasmuch as an appointment may be effective only until the next regular election, Pugh would be a candidate in the February primary election. Hoag has already announced his candidacy by filing his petition for justice of the peace on the Republican ticket.

Robert N. Rollin is Tawas City's second justice of the peace. Rollin was elected to a four-year term in 1963.

Solve Rash of TC Break-Ins

Three teen-aged Tawas City boys admitted breaking into five local churches and three schools within the past two weeks. Age 15 and under, the three were turned over to probate court authorities.

Investigation by City Police Chief Frank Roti, with cooperation from Michigan State Police and Isosco Sheriff's Department, discloses that the boys were responsible for break-ins at Immaculate Heart of Mary Church, Emanuel Lutheran Church, First Baptist Church, Latter Day Saint Church and Zion Lutheran Church. They also entered the two Lutheran schools and Tawas City Elementary Unit.

Police recovered \$28 in cash which had been stolen from the two parochial schools. Three checks totaling \$12.50 had been destroyed. A set of keys for the Tawas City Elementary Unit was turned over to school authorities.

Funeral Held for Retired D&M Employee

A retired Detroit and Mackinac Railway crane operator, Milo B. Bolen of East Tawas died Wednesday, December 16, at Tawas Hospital following an illness of several months.

He was born September 30, 1892, at East Tawas. He and the former Eda Lutzke of Bay City were married July 28, 1924, at Bay City. He was a member of St. Joseph Catholic Church and Tawas Council No. 2709, Knights of Columbus.

Surviving are his wife; one daughter, Christine Gribble of Bloomfield Hills; four grandchildren; three brothers, John and Mervin of East Tawas and Harry of Albaster; two sisters, Miss Clara Bolen of East Tawas and Mrs. Ruth LaBerge of Alpena.

Funeral services were conducted Saturday at St. Joseph Catholic Church with the Rev. Fr. Arthur Mulka officiating. Burial was in St. Joseph Cemetery.

Supt. of Public Works Paul Roper was authorized to receive bids on gas and fuel oil for the coming year.

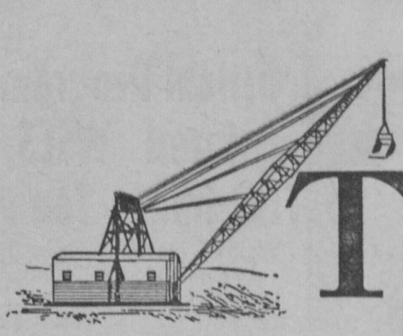
A Christmas tree pick-up will be made by the DPW on January 4 and 5, with a follow-up on January 11.

Concrete Block Plant Moving to D&M Yards

Among building applications approved Monday night by the Tawas City Council was one for a structure in the Detroit and Mackinac Railway yards to house equipment for a new concrete block manufacturing operation.

The application calls for constructing a 51 by 90-foot concrete block building which will be used as a kiln in the curing process for manufacturing concrete blocks. It includes a boiler room and five 13 by 50-foot curing rooms, all heated by steam.

This building is to be located near the present 60 by 40-foot woodworking shop, also of concrete block construction. This building is to house block manufacturing equipment.

A Besser Vibra Paek machine owned by Straits Aggregate Company and located at Millersburg (Big Cut) is to be disassembled and moved to Tawas City. It will probably mean additional employment for at least four or five persons locally.

The kiln building is to have a capacity of approximately 7,000 concrete blocks a day.

The Besser Manufacturing Company of Alpena designed the operation. Footings have been poured and bids are now being taken on construction.

The other permit read Monday night was for Vernon Pugh, 1125 Bay Drive, remodel basement, new light fixtures, new floor and ceiling, \$700.

In other council matters Monday Consumers Power Company and Zion Lutheran Church sent letters of appreciation to the department of public works for prompt service in snow removal.

City Attorney Alf C. Watson announced that plans for Tawas City's first primary election had been launched and that nominating petitions and instructions were available at the city hall.

On motion of Alderman Howard Hutton, a letter is to be sent to Michigan Consolidated Gas Company recommending that firm locate its proposed pay station in a business such as Keiser's Drug Store. Hutton was of the opinion that such location would be convenient as the store is open from 8:30 a. m. to 9:00 p. m.

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Big 1965 Construction Year Ahead at Tawas Point Park

Final result of last Thursday's bid opening on projects at the new Tawas Point State Park will probably not be known until later this week, according to Park Manager Ray Prosch.

"Parks division officials are now studying bids to determine if enough money is available to complete all projects advertised in the 1964 program," stated Prosch.

Bids were opened for constructing 200 new campsites, water system, lagoon type sewage system and electrical system.

The general contract calls for completion by July 1 of next year and it is expected that the successful bidder will start work immediately on grubbing out underbrush.

The park as it is to be developed in 1965 includes the area between the coast guard's boat house road southwest to the lighthouse. A parking lot has been constructed near the lighthouse and the remainder of the property may be reached by foot.

Development of a picnic area and beach is included under the 1965 contract, to be located on the Lake Huron side near the parking lot.

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December 28 Deadline for Primary Filing

City Clerk Walter Nelson reminds prospective city candidates that the deadline for filing nominating petitions in Tawas City's first primary election next year is December 28.

"A number of persons have asked for petitions so it appears that there will be some races in the February 15 primary election," states Clerk Nelson.

Among those new candidates already filing are Eugene Wegner, First Ward alderman on the Democratic ticket, Matthew Hoag, Republican candidate for justice of the peace.

Although names of candidates who have secured petitions and not filed as yet have not been announced, petitions have been circulated for Clerk Nelson, Treasurer Ruth Albertson and First Ward Supervisor Clement Stephan.

Securing the necessary signatures should be no problem for anyone who wants to run for city office. Only four persons need sign petitions for mayor, clerk, treasurer or justice of the peace. Only two signatures are required to run for supervisor or alderman.

The number of signatures required is based on a percentage of the vote given the secretary of state in the last election in each ward.

Annual election of city officers is to be held in April.

December 28 is also the filing deadline for primary candidates at East Tawas and Baldwin Township, along with several other townships which have elected to dispense with the caucus type of nominating.

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New Skating Rink Now in Operation

Tawas City's new ice skating rink north of the athletic field on First Avenue went into operation for the first time last week-end.

Constructed by the Department of Public Works, the new rink has a clay base and is approximately 150-foot square.

"It was used extensively last week and we expect that it will prove very popular during the winter months," states City Supt. Reginald Bublitz.

Bublitz said the rink had been flooded three times and snow was removed this week. It is hoped that weather will turn cold enough to allow flooding again later in the week.

A well which was drilled several years ago for the municipal water system, but never used, furnished water for this project. Bublitz reports the rink area could be expanded at a future date and flood lights added.

Possible location of rinks in other sections of the city is under consideration. Any suggested sites are welcomed by Bublitz.

Brown City has a Class C school and is located 32 miles northwest of Port Huron in the Thumb. He will also serve as athletic director.

Administration at Tawas Area High School is now seeking a replacement for Wiltse.

Tawas Chamber of Commerce has had a very active program during the tenure of retiring president, Ralph Western, who held this post for the past two years.

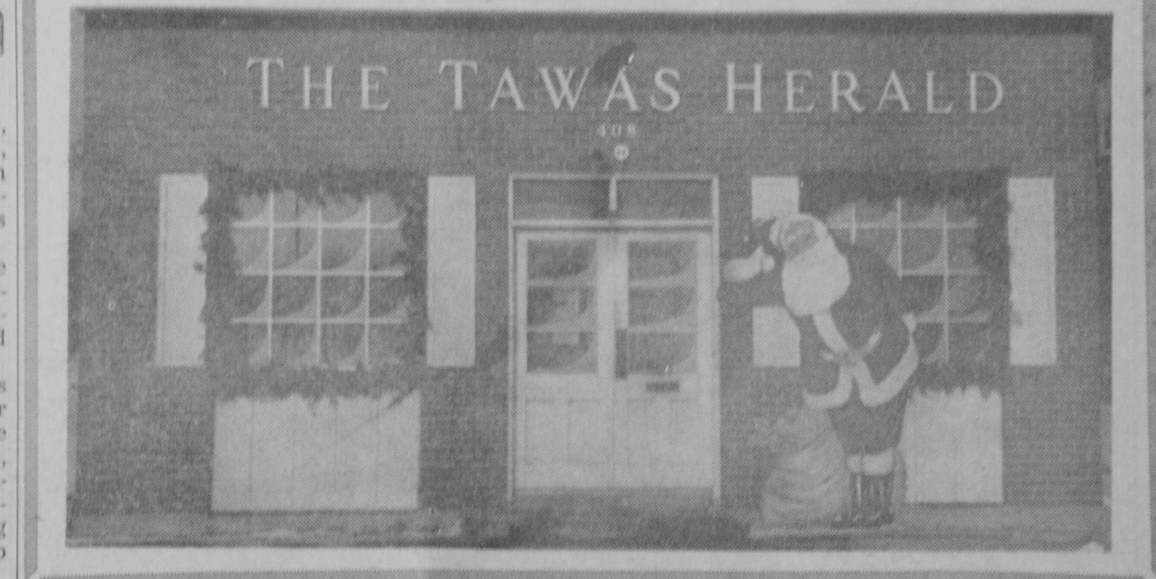

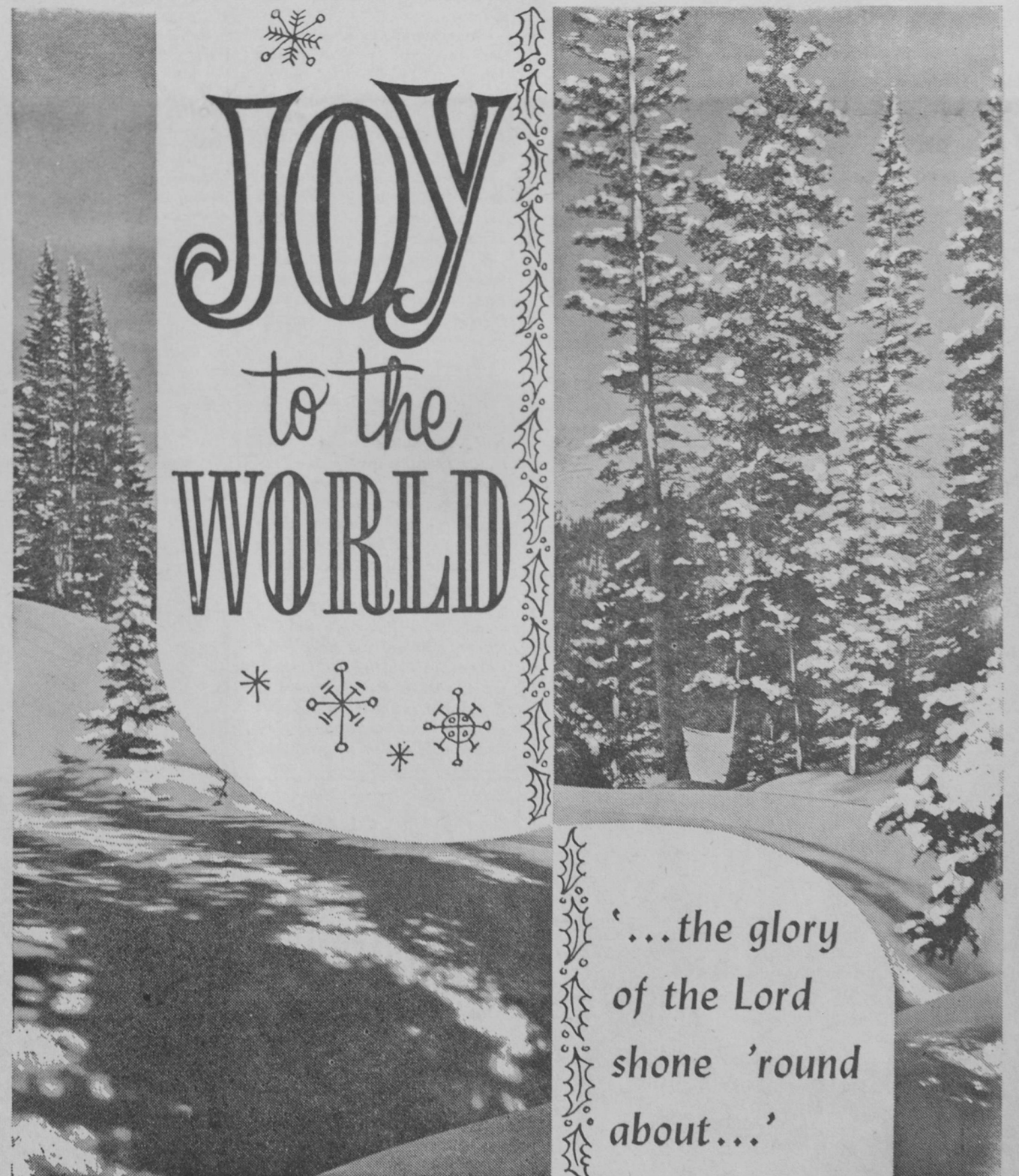

Bees Were First Carolers According To Old Legend

An early English legend suggests that bees were the first Christmas carolers, gathering on Christmas Eve to hum carols of praise to the Holy Infant.

It is certain that carol popularity was greatly promoted by the English custom of "wassailing" or "gooding" expeditions. Children went from house to house, singing songs and receiving treats.

Traditional songs gave way to new Christmas carols, which themselves became traditional. About the year 1521 Wynkn de Word, an apprentice printer, issued the first book of Christmas carols. Later, carols were so popular that people learned them from printed copies which sold for pennies.

You can get a Christmas bonus by pruning evergreens in December. The bonus: Yule greens.

Foundation plantings around the house or by the garden fence will yield a surprising amount of decorative greens. And the shrubs and trees will be better for the pruning if it is done judiciously.

Start with a snap-like shears or sharp knife. Wear gloves and use foil to wrap the resin ends of branches.

Snip and cut, never ruthlessly hack. Cut a branch at a slant to a bud, twig or leaf. Never cut beyond green needles. Always make the cuts conform to the symmetry of shrub or tree.

Holly, hemlock and pine, especially white and Austrian pine, can withstand rather heavy pruning. Removal of every second or third branch of hemlock, spruce or pine will promote better growth if these trees have not been pruned for some time. But be moderate in pruning a fir.

It is best to gather Yule greens from home grounds, a few days before you start decorating the hearth, the mantel, newel post or the door wreath. If possible, prune when the temperature is above 40 degrees F. Severe cold makes twigs brittle.

St. Peter's Is Christendom's Largest Church

Twelve years ago, at Christmas, 1950, the late Pope Pius XII announced that excavators had found the tomb of the Apostle Peter precisely where Roman Catholics had believed it to be beneath the papal altar of the church which bears his name.

St. Peter's, the largest church in Christendom, was built in Rome 336 years ago over the tomb of the Galilean fisherman. A masterpiece of the Italian Renaissance, the church represents the composite skills of some of Italy's greatest artists, including Michelangelo, Raphael, Bramante, and Bernini.

Many Visitors
The church attracts visitors of many faiths because it is not merely a Roman Catholic shrine but an archive of history recorded in hundreds of monuments, sarcophagi, inscriptions, statues, and mosaic murals. Three queens are buried there—Christina of Sweden, Charlotte of Cyprus, and Clementina, the mother of Bonnie Prince Charlie.

The church's massive foundations dig into the soil which was a place of soothing (vaticina) in pagan times.

Nero built his Circus at the foot of Vatican Hill. Christians were tortured there and burned alive. Tradition says the Apostle Peter was crucified head down in the arena.

Renovation
In recent months, St. Peter's has undertaken a program of interior renovation: metal stands to replace the cumbersome old wooden structures put up for audiences of more than 70,000; indirect lighting; a new electrical system controlling the bells; a new organ and a new elevator.

Consumers Power Company has asked the Michigan Public Service Commission to approve changes reducing the rates for residential users of fast recovery electric water heaters. The company also

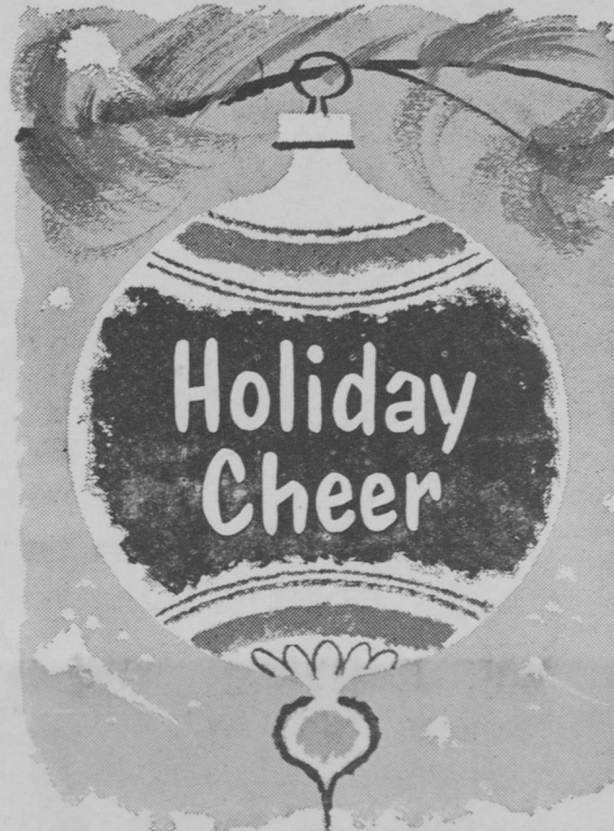

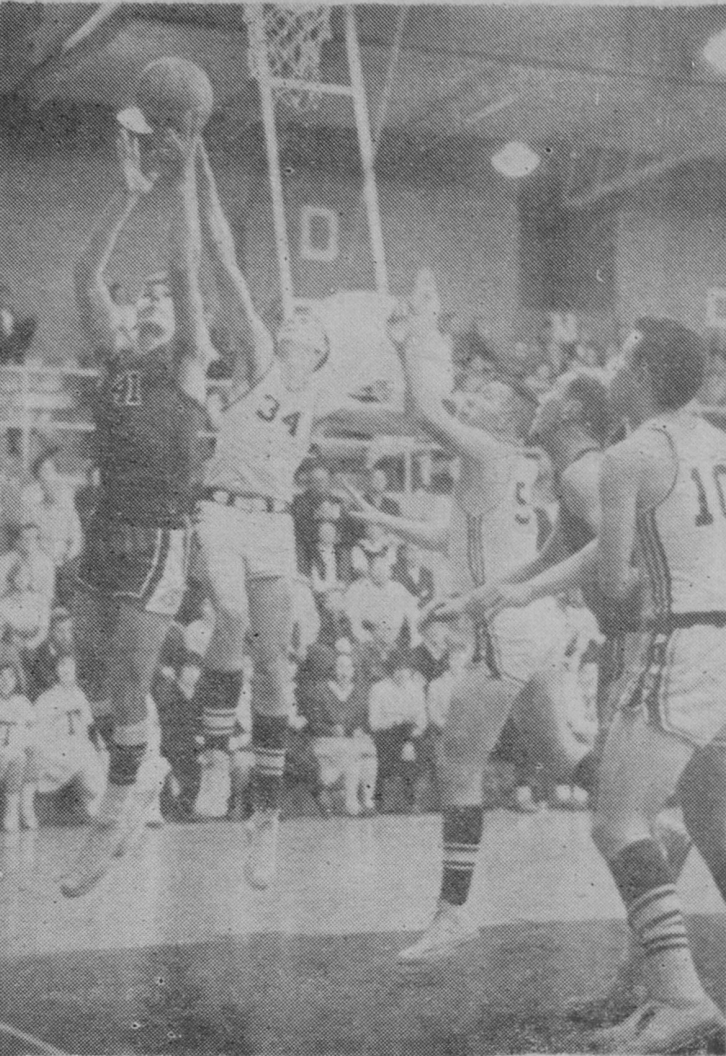

Braves Sneak Past Pinny; Remain in Tie With Orioles at Holiday Break

Tawas Area Braves chalked up victory number three in NBC competition Friday night, but again found out that there are no "pat-sties" in this conference.

The Braves won a 57-42 decision over the Pinconning Spartans and will have a two-week breather before going into action again when they play host to Gladwin on January 8.

The Spartans caused Coach Bill McIntosh and his charges no end of trouble during most of the game. The Pinconning green and white of Coach Al Fennell came up with an unexpected man-for-man defense which the Braves never completely solved.

Added to this were numerous infractions which saw Tawas lose the ball on steps, double-dribbles or bad passes.

Tawas relied on the outside shooting of Center Herbert Humphrey, who had his highest scoring night of the year with 31 points on 12 field goals and seven charity tosses.

The game was low-scoring from the start as Pinconning played a deliberately slow offense. Tawas

held a 15-10 margin at the end of the first quarter and Pinconning cut this by one point at the half, 25-21.

Action speeded up in the third quarter and Tawas moved away at the end of the third quarter with an 18-13 edge and then outscored the losers in the fourth quarter, 14-8.

Guards Darrell Welch and Dennis Lorenz again turned in steady performances, the former collecting nine points and the latter adding six. Jim Reitler came off the bench late in the game to score four points.

The Braves had a shooting average of 40 percent with 22 out of 55 completions. Pinconning had a 33 percent completion average with 18 out of 54. Tawas had 38 rebounds as compared to 29 for the losers.

The Junior Braves lost an exciting 50-47 decision to Pinconning's junior varsity in the preliminary. Pinconning jumped off to a 13-3 first quarter edge, but Tawas came back with 16 points to 10 for Pinny in the second stanza to hold a 24-23 edge at intermission.

The lead changed hands several times in the second half and Pinny held a 35-33 margin at the end of the first quarter. Tawas led, 41-40, with about two minutes to go but the winners completed 11 out of 17 foul shots in the final quarter to win by three points.

Inglis topped Tawas scorers with 13 points, followed by nine for Rollin and seven for Phillips. Fairfield meshed five points, Gourn-eau contributed four, Thunberg had three, while Cholger and Powers each had one field goal.

Gov. Classes Are Studying Operation of Mich. Legislature

First, second and sixth hour United States Government classes at Tawas Area High School, under Robert H. Erickson, are receiving practical instruction in the operation of Michigan's legislature.

Since December 10, each class has been divided into groups representing both houses of the legislature. Each group has elected its own officers, including chairman, secretary, clerk and sergeant-at-arms. Majority and minority leaders have also been named for the house of representatives and senate.

Each student in class is involved in matters concerning the legislature, either serving as a member of one of four committees or as an official. Committees include finance, welfare and education, conservation and a special committee which handles bills not pertaining to the first three.

All bills submitted to the legislature hopper go through regular channels of both houses.

Erickson reports that there has been lively debate in classes, just as in the case of most legislation. Laws enacted have included one bill which would set the legal voting age in Michigan at 18 years. The bill stipulated that "there must be evidence of a high school diploma or a written statement from the principal of the high school that he or she will obtain a diploma within the year."

Officers include: Barbara Edwards, Donna Katterman and John Wetzel, house speakers; Marcella Gawel, Janet Thompson and Linda Cross, senate presidents.

The study of state government continues through December 23.

State Police Are Investigating Two Area Break-ins

Two break-ins are under investigation by state police.

Breaking and entering of Camp Iroquois, operated by Bay City YMCA at Sand Lake, was discovered Saturday by carpenters who were constructing a new shower building. Seven cabinets were found to have been entered along with the dining hall.

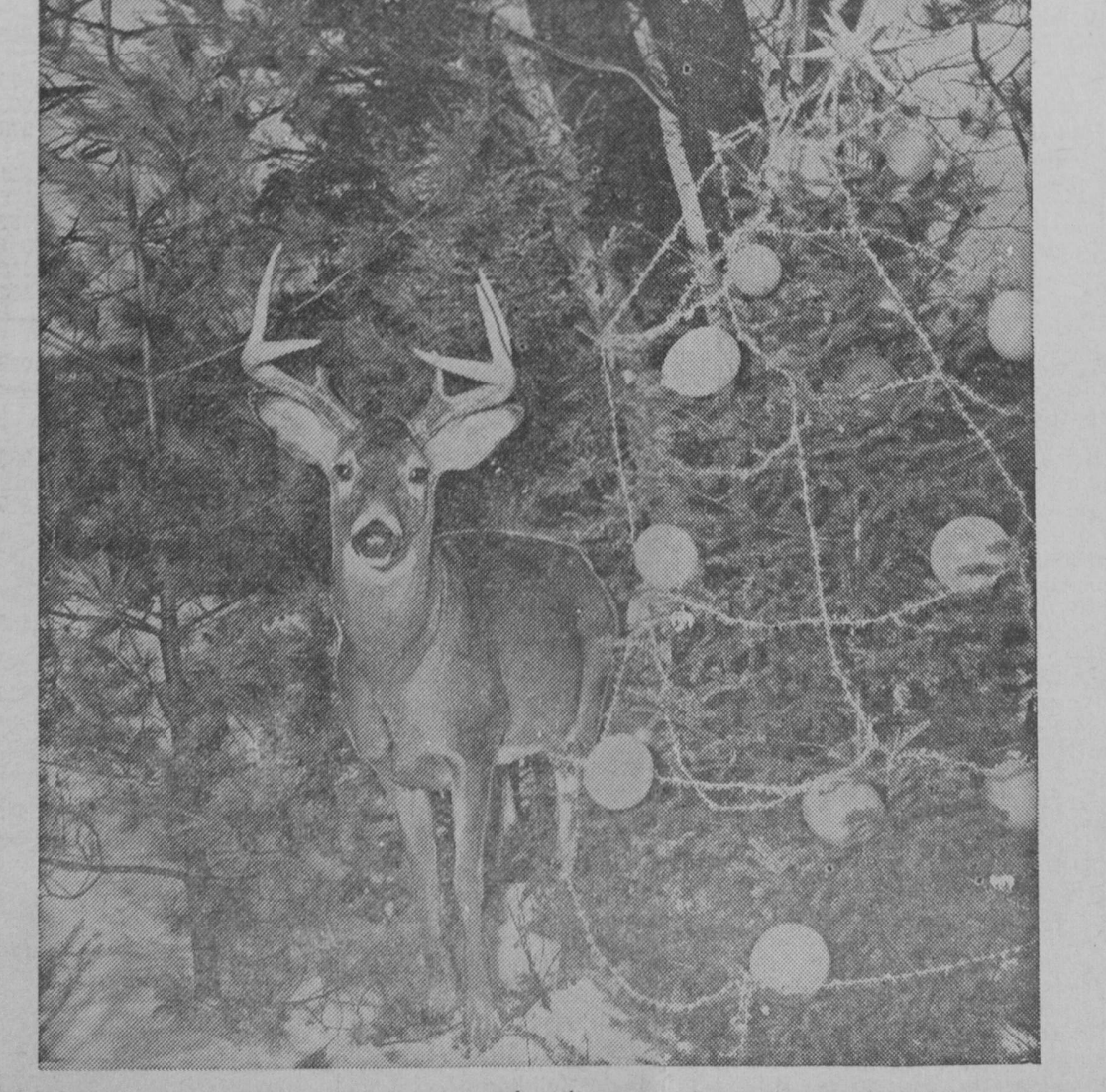
