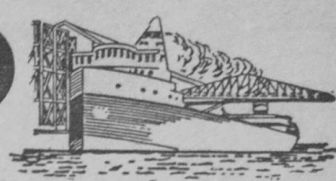

Ten Good Citizens to be DAR Guests

Ten area Good Citizens, chosen from girl seniors in as many high schools, will be guests of John Alden Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, at Midland January 8. Mrs. John Riecker will host the event for the girls and their mothers.

The chapter sponsors representatives of the schools every year when they attend DAR's state convention and compete for a college scholarship, which is awarded to the national winner.

Basis for annual choices in the contest, sponsored by the National DAR organization, are dependability, courtesy, consideration of others, leadership, personality, responsibility and patriotism. The senior classes of the participating schools choose three girls and a faculty committee makes the final selection.

Contests Set for First Primary in Tawas City

Tawas City will be the only municipality in Iosco County holding a primary election February 15. Democratic incumbents at Whittemore are unopposed and the non-partisan slate of East Tawas will have a run-off for only one office in the April election.

Two races are listed in Tawas City's first partisan primary election in history, one for a council seat and the other for justice of the peace. Deadline for filing was December 28.

Second Ward Alderman Earl B. Davis is opposed on the Republican Ticket by Russell A. Rollin Sr., retired county superintendent of schools.

Two Republicans and one Democrat have filed for the justice of the peace vacancy. Included are Vernon Pugh, who was appointed to the office last week, and Matthew Hoag, both on the Republican Ticket. Roy Bergeron is unopposed on the Democratic side of the ballot.

One other race is assured for next spring. That is in the First Ward where Clark Tanner, Republican incumbent alderman, will be opposed by Eugene Wegner, Democrat.

Among those participating were Probate Judge William McCready and Prosecuting Attorney J. Richard Ernst, who were elected in the November general election.

McCready has held public office since January 1961, when he was sworn in as prosecuting attorney. He had been elected the previous November after practicing law here since 1959. McCready had also served as Tawas City justice of the peace in 1959-1960.

After four years in the prosecutor's office, McCready was elected last November to the probate court bench vacated a year ago by the retirement of Judge H. Read Smith. During the interim, the office had been filled by Judge Kenneth E. Ralph of Standish.

Ernst, 28, who had been a member of a Detroit law firm since January, was a sticker candidate for prosecuting attorney in the November election. No candidate had filed for that office in the September primary election.

A 1963 graduate of the University of Michigan Law School, he received his BA degree in economics from Yale. He is a nephew of Edward Burgeson of Baldwin Township.

Other officers sworn in for four-year terms were County Clerk George Prescott, Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell, Register of Deeds Albert H. Buch, Treasurer Grace L. Miller, Drain Commissioner E. H. Stickney, Road Commissioner Clarence Curry, Coroners E. John Moffatt and E. D. Jacques.

Bublitz to Attend Gull Lake School

Attendance at a five-day school for waste water treatment plant operators was authorized for Supt. Reginald Bublitz at the Monday night meeting of Tawas City Water Board.

This school, conducted by Michigan State University, is to be held during February at the Kellogg Biological Station at Gull Lake. Some 80 operators are to be in attendance.

Laboratory procedures and methods of maintaining records are to be studied. Total cost of the course is \$65.

In other business Monday night, Bublitz reported that a four-inch water main on Seventh Avenue between First and Second Streets was repaired Sunday. He said that the cast iron line had originally been constructed on hard clay with no cushion of sand and a shock wave caused by frost split a valve.

Commenting that chamber meetings had never failed to have a quorum during the past two years, Western said that service on the board of directors was an interesting job which required much teamwork.

"Progress of the new dues program shows that the area is definitely interested in the work of the chamber," said Western. "With this increase in funds, the chamber must show that it can do the job for which money has been allocated and the board of directors must exercise good judgment in expenditure of money. This required good public relations," he said.

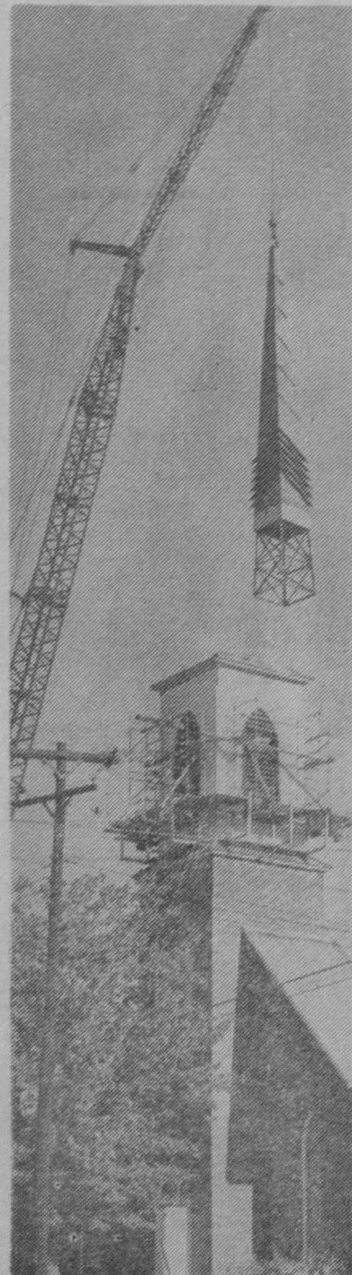
Iosco County is in Michigan Week Region Six, together with Presque Isle, Alpena, Montmorency, Alcona and Oscoda Counties.

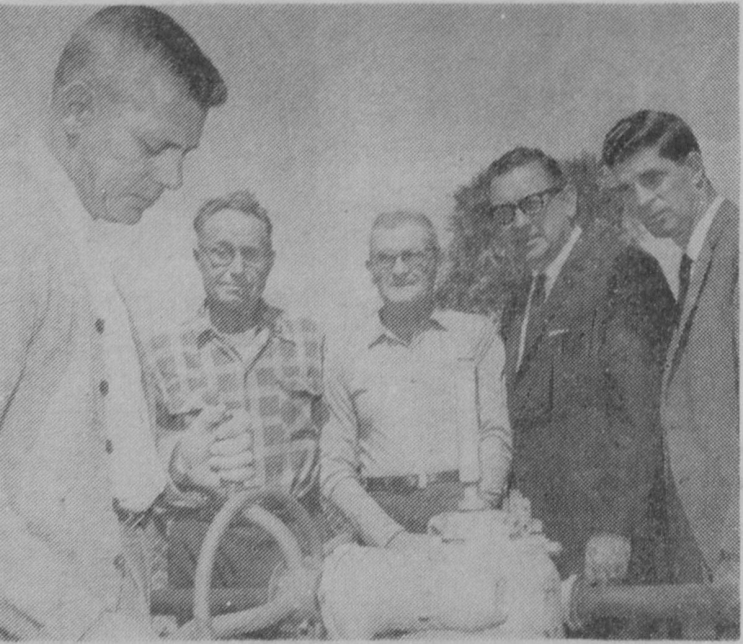

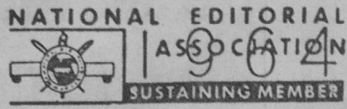

Scientists Work to Stop Corn Disease at Michigan Borders

A new disease which can completely destroy corn crops may soon be heading into Michigan. Scientists are working earnestly to bar the door against it.

Called "Maize Dwarf Mosaic," the disease is caused by a virus and transmitted by corn leaf aphids. It has already ruined corn crops in Kentucky, Illinois, Indiana, Arkansas, Missouri, Tennessee, Ohio and other central and southern states.

"To get an idea just how fast the disease is moving, you need only look at the Ohio situation," reports E. C. Rossman, Michigan State University crop scientist. "Two years ago, the disease was reported in only two fields in all of Ohio. This year, disease symptoms have been found in all but six counties.

"We have not identified the disease in Michigan as yet, but we know that it is mighty close—probably just across the border. We also know that there is no fence yet built that can keep it out of the Wolverine State."

But there is one "fence" that could be "constructed" to protect Michigan corn growers. It is called "disease resistance."

Rossman has already begun a search for Michigan-adapted varieties that are not susceptible to the disease. He notes that some resistant varieties have been found but most of these are too late in maturity in Michigan.

"There is an outside chance that some of the varieties we are now using may carry at least some resistance," contends Rossman. "Some of our experimental in-breeds and hybrids were developed from prolific Tennessee lines which carry some resistance to the disease."

This winter Rossman will start some breeding research in Florida. Next spring and summer, the breeding research and evaluation will be conducted in cooperation

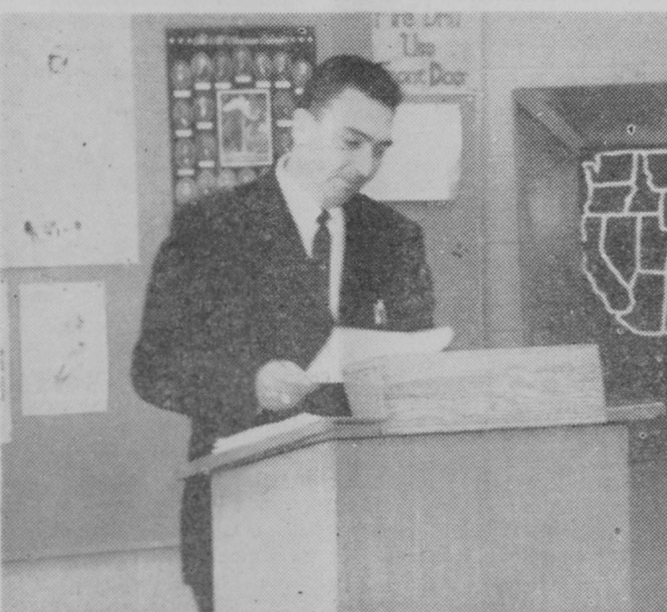

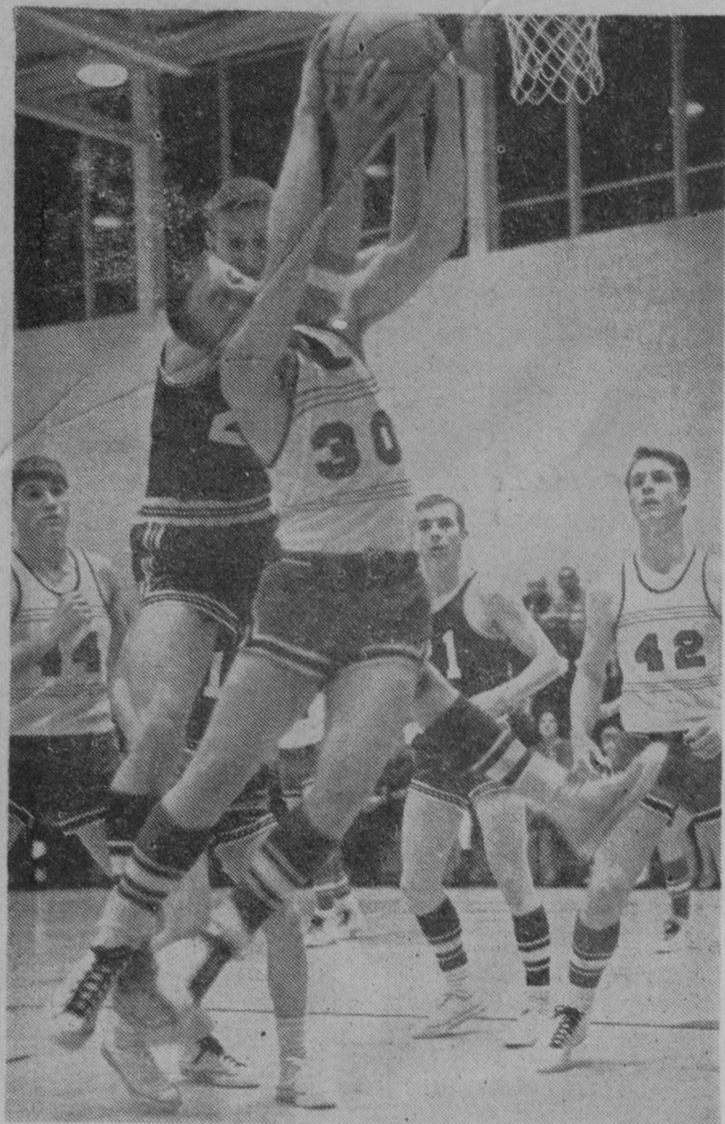

Cards Drop 4th Straight Game to Houghton Lake

The Whittemore-Prescott Cards played host to Houghton Lake Wednesday night with the varsity being the perfect host, dropping its fourth straight game, 72-62. It was the first win this season for the Bobcats. The Card JV squad did not show the same Christmas spirit as it came from behind to win, 59-47, to even the season record at two and two.

Larry Pickett and Dale Bronson started the Cards off in the lead with a fielder apiece, but the Lakers soon took over the lead and the Cards trailed at the quarter mark by three points.

The Cards took over the lead early in the second quarter as they more than doubled the Bobcats' efforts to hold a good eight-point lead at half.
