Tawas City Starts 4th Step in Urban-Renewal

Expenditures of \$200 to continue investigation into possible participation in the Urban-Renewal Program was authorized at Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council.

The allocation would finance the fourth step in the proceedings, which includes a preliminary survey, preparation of a map and cost estimate of the potential project.

Work would be done by Vilcan Leman and Associates, Incorporated, the city's planning consultant. The first three steps have been completed, including a preliminary inspection by URA officials. Upon completion of the fourth step, URA officials would make a field inspection to give tentative approval of the proposed project. A formal survey and planning application for federal funds to carry on detailed studies would then be made.

Project under consideration is relocation of the city's business district.

In other business, City Treasurer Ruth Albertson asked that the deadline for paying city taxes be extended five days, from September 10 to September 15, to bring it in line with other taxing units in the area. After investigation by City Attorney Alf Watson, it was learned that September 15 was the proper date, according to state statute. The change is to be made effective next year.

Councilmen were invited to attend a first aid course on mouth-to-mouth resuscitation to be presented at a meeting of the city fire department January 12 by Michigan State Police.

Council OKs \$600 Pay Hike for Roti

A \$600 annual salary increase was granted Monday night to Police Chief Frank Roti by the Tawas City Council. The increase was made retroactive to December 1.

Roti, former commander of the state police post at East Tawas who took over this position last spring upon the retirement of Chief George Ruth, had asked for a raise at the last meeting.

The increase brings his annual salary to \$4,800. He had asked that his salary be brought in line with those received by other police chiefs in the area, ranging from \$5,100 to \$5,220.

Minutes of the water board read during the meeting indicated that three other salaried employees received pay increases effective November 16.

City Foreman Arthur Wegner's annual salary was increased \$260 per year, Office Secretary Mary Bergeron received a \$5 per month pay hike and City Superintendent Reginald Bublitz's salary was increased \$40 per month.

The sewer department is to purchase Christmas turkeys for city employees this year.

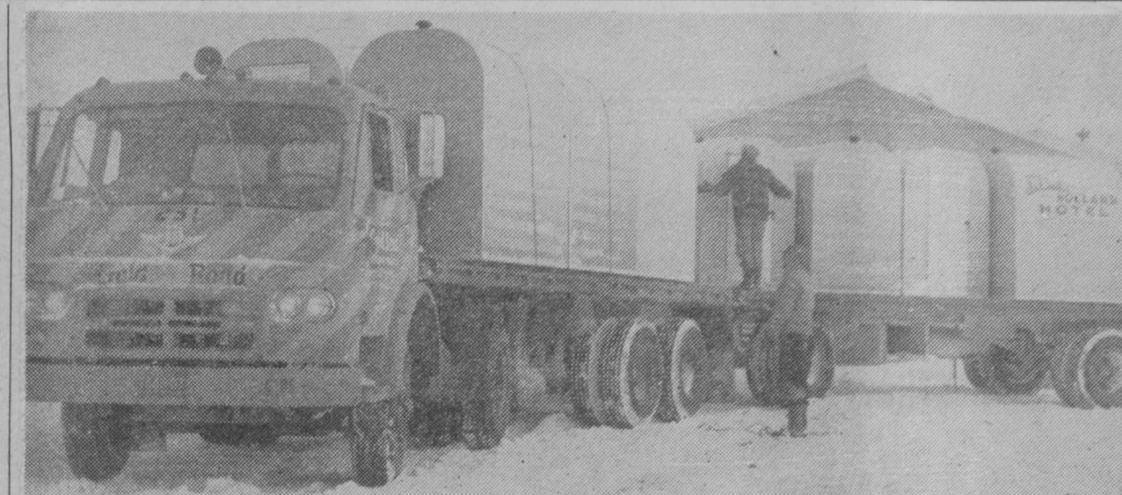

Winter Sports Season Opened Last Saturday

Saturday marked the official opening of winter sports season in this area.

A parade of fish shanties was held in the morning from the Detroit and Mackinac Railway yards down US-23 through the Tawas City business section and then back to East Tawas and along Newman Street.

Trucks carrying shanties then turned east on US-23 and proceeded to Tawas Point where shanties were unloaded.

In charge of the parade was James DeWyse. Semitruck-trailer units were furnished by Jefferson Trucking, Schaaf Lumber Company and Schreck Lumber Company. Other shanties were transported by individual owners.

The aluminum shanties, purchased two years ago through co-operation of local businesses with the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, are to be stored on shore until ice is of sufficient thickness. Perchville Mayor Percy Scott expects the fishing village to be ready by the Christmas holidays.

Although Silver Valley did not officially open over the week-end, prospects look excellent for an early start this season. Last week's storm deposited between eight and 10 inches of snow on slopes and this was packed down on ski hills to form a good base for future snow falls.

Area Supervisor Robert Brookbank said this was nearly as much snow as the valley had at any one time last year, although still not enough for good skiing conditions.

Another winter event saw more than 150 persons attending the annual chamber of commerce banquet Saturday night at the Barnes Hotel.

Other snow-time activities which got under way over the week-end were fox and rabbit hunting.

Businesses and Streets Have 'Holiday Look'

Business places and streets of the Tawas have taken on a holiday look with Christmas decorations. Store fronts are decked with cedar branches and colored lights, with Santas of various shapes and sizes welcoming customers. Tawas City DPW has set up a Christmas lighting display and Nativity scene in the city park.

ET Council OKs Bond Issue for New City Park

Legal machinery has been set in motion at East Tawas to finance improvements to the former state park through a \$35,000 revenue bond issue. The city acquires this property effective January 1.

This action, recommended by the new park commission two weeks ago, was approved officially Monday night by the city council. Attorneys are now at work drafting the legal papers.

Park Chairman Merton Killey outlined improvements to be covered by the five-year revenue bond issue. He said that \$12,000 would be expended on repairs to the community building and rest rooms, there would be an operational budget of \$10,000, purchase of a truck at \$4,000, purchase of lawn mower and beach equipment at \$5,000 and park development of \$4,000.

Improvements to the community building would include removal of the stage, balcony and front offices, repairs to the floor, install a new suspended ceiling, replace windows and doors, paint side-walls.

"We are going to 'feel our way' along in this park operation for the first year," said Killey. "We have a lot of plans, but we do not know if we can accomplish all of them."

Some of the plans include purchase of beach umbrellas and surfboards. A disposal station is to be located at the park for travel trailers.

The city is now advertising for

a full-time park manager. One other full-time person is to be hired and there will be four seasonal employees.

State park operations have been transferred to the new park on Tawas Point. A crew from Roscommon was to have been at East Tawas Tuesday to pick up one-half of the picnic tables at the old state park. The remainder is to become city property.

Authorization has been given the Michigan Waterways Commission to remove 1,600 yards of sand from the lake bottom and deposit it on city property east of the new parking lot.

Services Held for TC Insurance Man

The Rev. Walter Pieper officiated at funeral services for Ray H. Cooper of Tawas City Monday at Jacques Funeral Home, Tawas City. Burial services were held at Bankers Cemetery, Hillsdale, Tuesday. Mr. Cooper died suddenly December 5 at his home.

He was born October 7, 1884, at Jackson and moved to this area in 1935 from Sturgis. He was sexton at Tawas City Cemetery since 1945, insurance salesman for State Mutual Fire Insurance of Flint and monument salesman.

He is survived by a brother, Glenn of Kalamazoo, and three nieces.

Hire Besancon as Secretary of E. Tawas DPW

On recommendation of the board of public works, East Tawas Council authorized hiring Lewis F. Besancon as the board's secretary effective upon his January 1 retirement as city hall office manager.

Mayor C. L. McKenzie told councilmen Monday night that Besancon's new duties would be to maintain records on three revenue bond issues and take minutes of water board meetings.

Responsibility for bond issues would include those for the filtration plant, the recently sold water meter issue and the new city park revenue bonds.

Wages paid would be \$100 per month plus Blue Cross insurance payments for working four hours a day, three days a week.

Approval was given to a request from the Cooperative Extension Service to use the city hall for senior citizens meetings once or twice a month.

Expenditure of funds was authorized to purchase Christmas turkeys for city employees.

Announcement was made that Michigan Consolidated Gas Company was to install two outdoor lights on its building adjacent to the city hall parking lot. This is to be an experiment to determine if the city would be interested in lighting its parking lot behind Dimmick's with the same equipment.

Supt. Paul Ropert reported he had been considering the possibility of purchasing a snow blower to speed up removal on Newman Street. He said it would also be an improvement over the present method of clearing snow from the approach to US-23 and the equipment could be used for clearing drifts from roads in the Tawas Lake area. The blower would cost \$3,500 and could be attached to present equipment.

City Attorney Michael Freel was directed to write a letter to Dr. Russell Klenow concerning removal of an old building at 111 East State Street.

Annual audit of Yeo and Yeo Certified Public Accountants was reviewed and is to be considered for adoption at the next meeting.

Authorization was given to loan steel curb forms to the Silver Valley Committee for use on toboggan slides.

The council authorized expenditure of \$4,074 as the city's share in preparing a master plan for East Tawas and Baldwin Township through federal participation. Baldwin's share is \$1,141.

Building permits approved included George Machulis, 613 Main, remodel with aluminum siding, \$2,000; Arthur Goddard, 24 by 32-foot cement block addition at 228 Newman Street.

Goodfellows Sell Papers Saturday

Tawas Kiwanis Club will hold its 19th annual Goodfellow newspaper sale this Saturday. Proceeds from sales on streets of the Tawas are to be used to assist needy children during the year.

Walter Champion, chairman of this year's Goodfellow drive, said that as was the policy last year, businesses will not be solicited for advertising funds. Instead, each will be asked to purchase a Goodfellow paper.

Other members of the committee are Ernest W. Jordan and Dr. James Jacques.

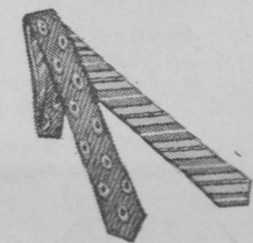

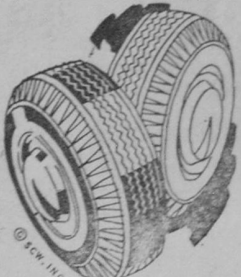

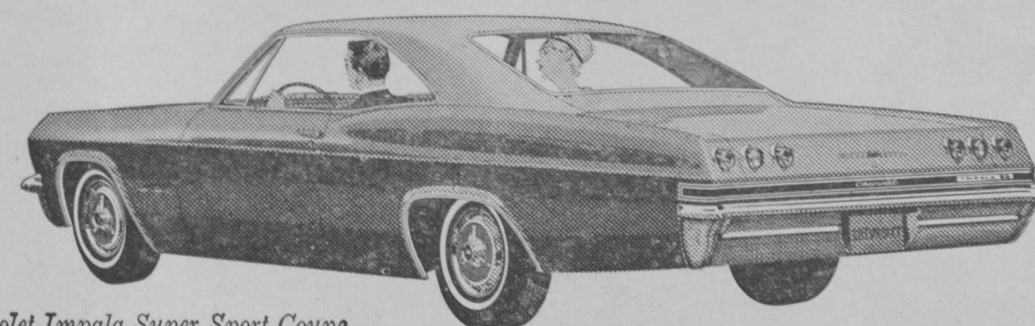

Conclude Trial in Gypsum Lawsuit

After 45 days of hearings spread over a seven-month period, attorneys for plaintiffs and defense rested their cases in the more than one-half million dollar lawsuit against National Gypsum Company.

Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller, in adjourning the case Thursday noon, said the trial had lasted even longer than the Catsman-Bateson lawsuit of two years ago.

Briefs are to be filed by attorneys for both sides by January 15 and replies to briefs are to be filed simultaneously on January 25.

Judge Miller said that he would render his opinion shortly thereafter.

Attorneys for plaintiffs entered 136 exhibits in the case while National Gypsum Company offered 341 exhibits in its defense. There was a total of 81 witnesses heard in the trial.

Six attorneys were involved representing some 30 plaintiffs, who claim losses amounting to an alleged \$625,000.

New Changes Explained—

Supervisors See Big Work Load in Tax Program

Some members of the board of supervisors are asking themselves this question: "Is the job worth the headaches involved?"

New changes in methods to be used by supervisors and assessors in tax matters were the main topics of the discussion at last Thursday's meeting of District Four, Michigan Supervisors Association. It was the consensus of those present that the changes will require a great deal more of each individual supervisor in fulfilling his position. It will also mean greater expense to the county and individual taxing units.

For instance, every property description on tax rolls, whether real or personal, is to receive a new classification next year. Four classifications involving both real and personal are: Residential, commercial, agricultural and industrial. Real will also have a "cut-over" classification for wild land and personal will have a utility classification.

This means that more time will be required to prepare tax rolls. In addition, the 1964 tax roll must be reclassified as a comparison for next year. The increase or decrease in each category must be totaled for a report to the state.

Everyone owning commercial, farm and industrial personal property will be required to fill out and have notarized a statement showing the amount of such property owned. This is to be furnished to the assessing supervisor in order that records may be prepared.

This is only the "beginning" of the increased work load for supervisors. By 1966, all assessments

are to be made 100 percent of the state equalized valuation. A card file is to be prepared showing each property description, along with information concerning classification of buildings, complete description and measurements of construction.

"I could not complete this work in a year in my ward, even if I had a helper," stated Third Ward Supervisor C. S. Everett of Tawas City.

He said each individual tax unit needs to study the problem and come up with a solution—and before 1966.

Kusey Named Park Director of Western UP

William Kusey, a 10-year veteran of the Michigan Department of Conservation and former park manager at East Tawas, has been promoted to supervisor of park operations in the western half of the Upper Peninsula, according to Glenn C. Gregg, regional manager for the UP.

Kusey had served the past year as manager of Muskegon State Park, after his promotion and transfer, he will now be stationed at Baraga.

He is a former resident of Omer and worked at one time for United States Gypsum Company.

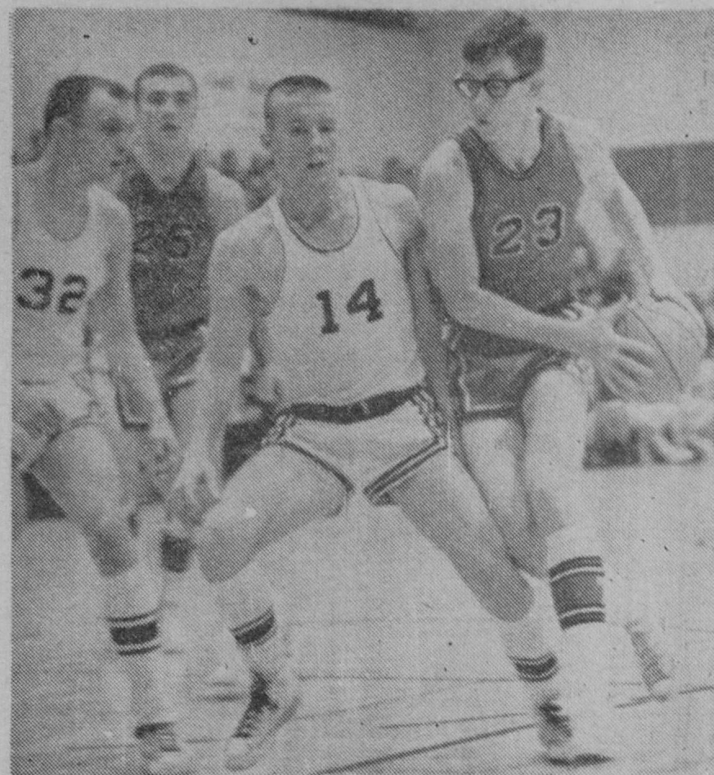

Tawas Braves Rally in Second Half Friday to Down Oscoda Owls, 76-63

Tawas Area Braves rolled to a big win over the Oscoda Owls, 76-63, in NBC competition last Friday night. It was the second straight victory for the Braves, while the Owls' record now stands at two and one.

Paced by three field goals of Center Herb Humphrey, the Braves collected another 17 points in the second quarter and Oscoda fell behind at the half, 34-29.

The Braves spurred to a 54-46 lead at the end of the third quarter, paced by the sharpshooting of Forward Dennis Radford with seven points on three and one.

Oscoda's big six-foot, seven-inch center, Clarence Giffin, came to life in the second half with a 20-point effort. The Braves had their best scoring quarter in the final with 22 points, as compared to Oscoda's 17.

Tawas had four players in double scoring figure and that meant the difference as Oscoda had but two. Humphrey led the Braves with 24, followed by Blata's 19, 17 points for Radford and 10 for Welch. Sophomore Guard Dick Grebe turned in six. Giffin was high for the night with 26 points and Jim Richards had 10.

Tawas made good on 30 of 51 shots from the floor for a 58.8

percent shooting average. The Braves also completed 16 of 22 free throws. The Owls completed 25 of 81 field goals attempts.

Story of the preliminary game was just the opposite for Tawas. The Little Owls scored a 64-45 victory over the visitors.

Both teams played on equal terms during the first half, the quarter score reading 15-14 in Oscoda's favor and at intermission it was 29-28 in Oscoda's favor. The Tawas offense went on the rocks in the second quarter, being outscored, 20-8, by the Little Owls in the third quarter. The final found Tawas holding a 15-9 edge.

Wayne Fairfield was top scorer for Tawas with 15 points, followed by Ingalls and Gourneau with 10 each. Others scoring were Dan Phillips, five points; Howard Rollin and Baker, two points each; Gary Haglund, one point. Davis had 15 points and Pagles meshed 14 to lead the Oscoda team.

Action this Friday night finds Tawas Area playing host to the Standish-Sterling Panthers.

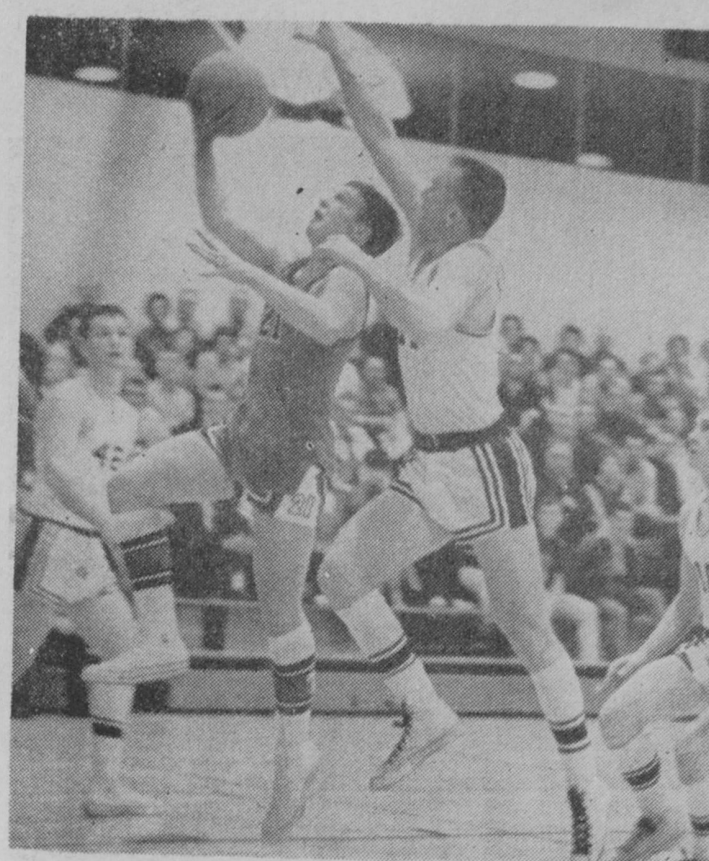
