## Tawas City's Last Caucuses Now History

Republican city officers of Tawas City will have no opposition on the spring election ballot. All incumbents were renominated without opposition at Monday night's Republican caucus and city convention and Democrats will not have a city slate as only three persons showed up for its caucus Saturday night.

All city officers were renominated unanimously at Monday night's city convention, including Mayor George Tuttle, Clerk Walter Nelson and Treasurer Ruth Albert-

About 40 persons attended ward caucuses and the only interruption of any kind came in the First Ward where a determination was to have been made Tuesday on a council appointee.

After naming Clement Stephan as candidate for supervisor, the caucus named Clark Tanner and Daniel Ulrich to succeed themselves as aldermen, the former on a one-year term and the latter for two years.

Ulrich had been appointed to fill out the remaining year of Arthur Wegner's term and Tanner had been named to succeed William G. Murray and a year remains on this term. There was a question as to whether Tanner should fill out the remainder of Murray's term or if his name should be placed on the ballot. The city attorney was to have investigated Tuesday.

John Hosbach was named the Republican candidate for Second Ward supervisor and Clyde Evril was named alderman. Clarence Everett was named candidate for Third Ward supervisor and Howard Hatton received the nomination for alderman.

These were the last caucuses and city convention to be held in Tawas City. Next year, the nominating petition-primary system will be used to name candidates.





### **Grain Price Support Program Voluntary For Eligible Growers** Participation in the 1964 feed

grain program will be entirely voluntary, as in earlier years, according to Grant Bessey, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee chairman. Only those growers who take part in the program, however, will be eligible for price support on the three feed grains, corn, barley and grain sorghum.

Producers on farms which grew any of these grains in either 1959 or 1960, or both years, will have the opportunity to sign up in the program during the period which ends March 27. In the meantime, ASCS office staffs will answer any questions growers may have. A new farm feed grain base may be established under the 19-64 feed grain program for farms which did not produce feed grains in 1959 and-or 1960 that meet' eligibility requirements, Mr. Bessey also announced. For further information, interested producers. who wish to file an application, should contact the ASCS office in the Federal Building, East Tawas.

### **VA Urges Vets to Keep Beneficiary** List Up to Date Veterans who have just mar-

ried-do not forget to change your insurance beneficiary. New wives of veterans, see that your husband makes that change. Otherwise, as in the case of one veteran, his bride of a year got nothing. His wealthy sister got \$10,000.

R. M. FitzGerald, the Veterans Administration regional office manager for Michigan, warned newly-married veterans today that VA can pay insurance claims only to the beneficiary named by the veteran. Each year, a number of cases are developed in which the widow, some with children, must see their husband's insurance go to beneficiaries he had named years ago and had forgotten to change.

The most common reasons for obsolete listings of beneficiaries include marriages, remarriages divorces and deaths, Mr. FitzGer ald explained.

If the veteran has forgottten his old beneficiary listing, the VA will help by sending him a micro film copy of the old listing as well as a new beneficiary designation to be filled in with up-to-date information. All the veteran has to do is write the VA office to which he sends his insurance payments being careful to give his full name and policy number. If he wishes to change beneficiaries, he should list both the old and new.
