On reading and filing the complaint of the Auditor General of the State of Michigan praying for a judgment in favor of the State of Michigan, against each parcel of land therein described, for the amounts therein specified, claimed to be due for taxes, interest and charges on such parcels of land, and that such parcels of land be sold for the amounts so claimed by the State of Michigan.

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That Schedule A annexed hereto is the tax record against the delinquent and contains the description of all lands in the aforesaid county upon which taxes were assessed for the years mentioned therein, have remained unpaid for more than one year after the date of the assessment of the taxes, and the description of all lands in said county heretofore bid off in the name of the State and then held and upon which taxes were assessed subsequent to the date for which the taxes were assessed, and the description of all lands in said county which are delinquent for any installment of taxes under the provisions of the act last above mentioned.

That this court may determine and adjudge that the aforesaid taxes, interest and charges are valid and constitute a valid lien upon each of the said several parcels of land described in said schedule as therein and against which the several amounts of taxes, interest, collection fees and expenses, as computed and set forth in said schedule, are due in default of the payment so ordered of the said several sums computed and extended against said lands in said schedule, the said several parcels of land, or such interest therein, may be necessary to satisfy the amount adjudged against the same, said several parcels being sold as the same; and that the plaintiff may have such other and further relief in the premises as to this court may seem just and equitable.

And your plaintiff will ever pray, etc.



The Iosco Coin Club met at the Pack House Inn Monday evening, February 10, to plan the second annual coin show slated for August 15 at Oscoda.

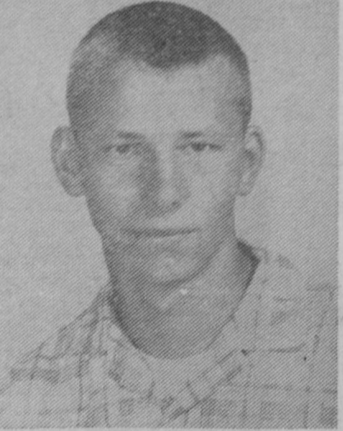

Irene Rebekah Lodge Installation Postponed

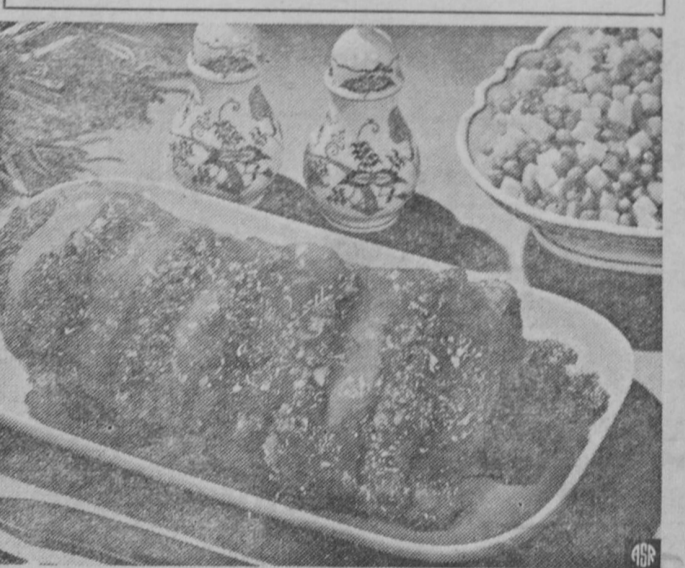

| 1 tablespoon minced onion | 2 teaspoons dry mustard |
| ½ teaspoon salt | 2 teaspoons lemon juice |
- Have butcher separate meat from backbone and slice roast partially through into 6 chops. Pull bread into small pieces. Add celery, onion, salt, pepper, sage and evaporated milk and mix lightly but thoroughly. Spoon stuffing between the individual chops. Using heavy thread or string, tie the roast together. Place in baking pan with fat side up. Bake in preheated slow oven (325° F.) for 1½ hours. Mix apricot preserves, mustard and lemon juice in a small bowl. Remove roast from oven and spoon glaze evenly over top. Return to oven and continue to roast until meat is done, approximately 20 to 25 minutes longer. Serves 6.
