Members of Miss Welch's court include Linda Wyatt and Dianne Beader, Hale Area seniors; Suzie Briggs and Candie Thornton, Whittemore-Prescott Area Juniors; Mary Beth Busch, senior, and Holly Defibaugh, junior, Tawas Area; Sandy Pagels, the other Oscoda area representative, will be Sunday and unable to attend the coronation.

Seek New Interest in Silver Valley

Efforts are to be made in the near future to encourage greater participation by local residents and businessmen in promotion of winter sports at Silver Valley.

A slashing attack on "community lethargy" was delivered Friday night by Ron Gamble of Greenbush, president of the East Michigan Tourist Association. Gamble spoke at the annual winter sports stag fish dinner.

He told those attending the kickoff, about 100 in number, that year after year he had seen local enthusiasm dying at Silver Valley and, as a consequence, attendance continues to go downhill.

"Unless Silver Valley becomes a project of the area and everyone starts pushing together and putting out effort, this carnival will continue to die off," said Gamble.

A meeting was held Sunday morning at the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office attended by members of the winter sports committee, civic leaders, businessmen and visitors who were here to take part in the carnival.

As a result of that meeting, plans were made to commence a complete investigation into the possibility of upgrading next season's winter sports program.

"We plan to start a grassroots campaign sometime in April to see what each organization in the area can suggest for improving Silver Valley," said Winter Sports Committee Chairman James Campbell.

"In past recent years, we have had only a few people interested in the winter sports committee and activities at Silver Valley. In order to progress, we need the thinking, participation and active support of everyone in the community," he said.

Cost of Fluoridation Explained to Council

BASED on a study prepared for the East Tawas Council, fluoridation of the community's water supply would cost approximately 19 cents per person annually. This report compiled by Harold French, operator of the East Tawas filtration plant, was read at Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council by Supt. of Public Works Paul Ropert.

Cost of installing meters and testing equipment for fluoridation of the water supply would be \$1,600. Approximately 8,000 pounds of fluoridation compound would be required to treat the annual water requirement of 198,000,000 gallons for East Tawas. Cost of this treatment would be approximately \$3 per one million gallons, said the plant operator's report.

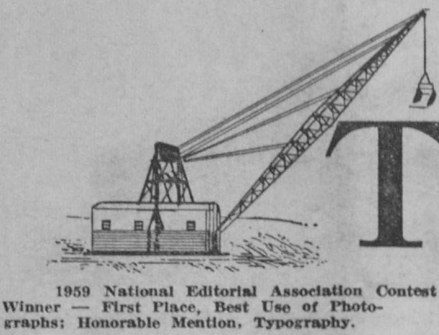
T. City Council Favors Treatment

A resolution adopted by the East Tawas voters to approve fluoridation of the municipal water supply.

"It is perfectly OK to ask the people to vote on fluoridation, but it is not necessary," said Dr. Hasty. He said it was not a "political question" and that 14 Michigan communities had fluoridated water during 1961-1962 and none had requested permission from the people.

The Tawas City Council felt that no vote on fluoridation was necessary here inasmuch as this community purchases its water supply from East Tawas and would have no actual control over such a matter.

"For many years, the drinking water of Tawas City has, without ill-effect of any kind so far as is known to us, contained a higher percentage of fluoride than that presently under consideration in East Tawas," stated the council's resolution endorsing the project. (See RESOLUTION, page 8.)

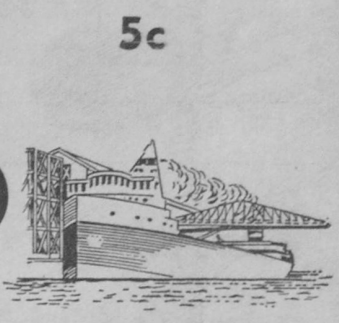

E. Tawas Council Seeks Return of State Park

Formal application is to be made soon for return of the East Tawas State Park to the City of East Tawas. The property was acquired and developed in the early 1920s by the Michigan Department of Conservation.

This action was taken following discussion at Monday night's council meeting. Because of recent developments whereby the state's bond issue may be transferred to the new Tawas Point Park, Mayor Clarence McKenzie expressed confidence that the conservation department would approve such action.

Carl Babcock, chairman of the Tawas Harbor Committee, told the need of a 100-car parking lot to the east of the Michigan waterways Commission Dock. He pointed out that considerable parking would be lost when the highway department widens US-23. At present, there is a minimum of parking spaces on either side of Newman Street in the park and parking is to be eliminated in two lots on the north side of US-23, one in front of the Holland Hotel and the other east of the Newman Street intersection.

Improvements to the dock are expected sometime in the near future and Babcock announced Monday night that owners of the fishing cruise boat which was destroyed by fire last summer are

replacing it with a new \$80,000 craft.

The city would also like to turn the old community building into a recreational center and install a much-needed public boat launching ramp near the dock.

A committee composed of Babcock, John Pinter, Chamber of Commerce President Ralph Western and Councilman James Campbell are to contact the Michigan Waterways Commission and department of conservation.

While the above committee would seek space near the community building for a parking lot, the city council is to write a letter to the conservation department asking for return of the entire park to the city.

Work is now going ahead on the new Tawas Point State Park and the city wants the old park for future recreational development.

East Tawas Decides to Pass Participation in Mayor's Exchange

East Tawas will not participate in mayor's exchange day during the May 1964 observance of Michigan Week.

At Monday night's council meeting, it was reported that East Tawas had drawn Pontiac as its exchange city. It was felt that such an exchange would not be beneficial to either city because of the difference in population.

In other business, Ronald Korthals, announced that he intends to resign as the city's electrical inspector. His formal resignation will be submitted at the next meeting.

The council denied a building application requested by White Oil Company for permission to install tanks at its service station on US-23 due to nonconformance with a city ordinance. An application from J. L. Smith for repairs to a dwelling was approved.

Junior class of Tawas Area High School was authorized to sponsor Saturday night dances next summer at the community building. The Silver Valley Ski Patrol and Ski Aides were given permission to sponsor dances there during the next three Saturday nights.

Russell Small was appointed on the cemetery board to replace Arthur Dillon, who retired recently. The council approved a three-year contract with Harold French for operation of the water filtration plant.

Authorization was given to purchase a tractor and back hoe from Charles Nash at a cost of \$3,000. The board of public works is to pay 50 percent of the cost.

Last Caucuses for Tawas City

Republican and Democratic ward caucuses and city conventions to be held later this month will probably be the last in Tawas City's history, according to City Attorney Alf Watson.

"In view of the new election laws coming down from Lansing and according to interpretation thereof, I have reason to believe that this year's caucuses will be the last in Tawas City," Watson told the city council Monday night.

Starting next year, Tawas City will utilize the nominating petition-primary system in naming city officials.

Democrats are to caucus Saturday, February 15, 8:00 p. m., at the city hall, while Republicans will caucus Monday, February 17, 8:00 p. m., at the same location.

Because of conflicting dates, the Monday, February 17, council meeting has been postponed to the following evening.

County's Continued Growth Shown in Clerk's Report

Figures released this week by George A. Prescott, Iosco County clerk, on the vital statistics of the county for 1963 reflect the continued growth and expansion of the county.

"This office recorded 798 births, 160 deaths and 175 marriages during the past year," Prescott reported.

"Wurtsmith Air Force Base continues to furnish us with more statistics on births and marriages than our three incorporated cities combined," Prescott said.

"The death rate which is nine tenths of one percent of our population proves that Iosco County is a good, healthful county in which to live," the clerk continued. "It is interesting to note that our sheriff's annual report shows 13 violent deaths of the 160 recorded — two drownings, nine traffic fatalities, one suicide and one death from fire."

Prescott reported that the case load of Iosco Circuit Court also reflects greatly increased statistics.

"On January 1, 1963, Judge Allan C. Miller had 128 pending cases in his court here, including five criminal, 16 auto negligence, 46 divorce and 61 other civil cases," Prescott said. "During the year, 205 cases were commenced in this court, including 52 criminal, 17 auto negligence, 70 divorce and 66 other civil cases. This presented Judge Miller with a total of 333 cases to hear in Iosco."

A recap of the year's activity shows 221 cases heard and disposed of during 1963. This included 51 criminal dispositions, 23 auto negligence, 69 divorces and 78 other civil cases. This left 112 cases pending as of January 1, 1964, four down from the preceding year's carry-over.

"Judge Miller was pleased to note," Prescott said, "that of the 69 divorce cases heard, in only 37 were judgments of divorce ordered, just a little over 50 percent. The remaining 32 cases were disposed of through reconciliations or denials of judgment."

Prescott reported that court was in session 106 days during 1963.

Supervisor Everett Says—

City Faces Big Job in Re-Assessing

Problems faced in reassessing the entire city, according to provisions of the new state constitution, were outlined to the Tawas City Council Monday night by Third Ward Supervisor C. S. Everett.

Under the new tax plan, which takes effect state-wide in two years, all property must be assessed at 50 percent of the actual cash value. In addition, each tax assessing officer must be able to pass a written examination on his assessing ability.

Everett said this would mean that every building and lot in the city would have to be reappraised according to state specifications. This would entail measuring outside dimensions of a building, estimating the value of the structure and then subtracting obsolescence or other factors which might detract from the property to arrive at its actual cash value.

"Given a crew of two men to work with me, it would take a solid year to accomplish such a job in the Third Ward," said Everett. "The average supervisor is not going to do it."

Everett has suggested hiring a professional appraisal firm to accomplish the work. The city has already obtained names of six firms and information concerning this city has been mailed to several in order to obtain estimated costs of such a project.

"It would be a lot smarter for us to have this project completed ahead of time rather than to have the state come in and force us to reappraise the entire city," said Everett.

When completed, each property description would be listed on individual cards containing complete information as to structures located on a parcel of land.

Curtis Retires After 32 Years Serving State

Robert J. Curtis of Whittemore retired January 31 after 32 years of service with the State of Michigan. He began his career with the state in 1932 when he became an employee of the state highway department.

Curtis' subsequent state employment included work as an aide to former Gov. Wilbur M. Brucker and with the Michigan Department of Revenue, which he joined in 1935 and served until 1948 as warrant officer in Detroit.

During the past few years, primarily because of his past training and abilities, Curtis has been serving as tax warrant supervisor. In this position, in which he worked closely with the state police, his work area was the entire state outside of the Detroit metropolitan area.

Friends and fellow employees, including several from the Lansing office of the Michigan Department of Revenue, gathered at Shoppenagon's Inn, Grayling, on January 24 to honor Curtis for his many years of dedicated service. He also received a congratulatory letter from Gov. George Romney, commending him for the service he has given the state.

Curtis and his wife were presented with several pieces of luggage which will be handy for an upcoming trip to Alaska this summer to visit their son's family. He also intends to get in some long-delayed fishing.

In between travels, Mr. and Mrs. Curtis will maintain their home at Whittemore where both grew up and attended school.

Ron Gamble Named 'King of Perchville'

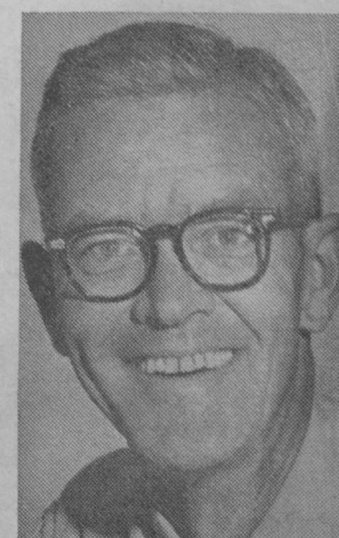

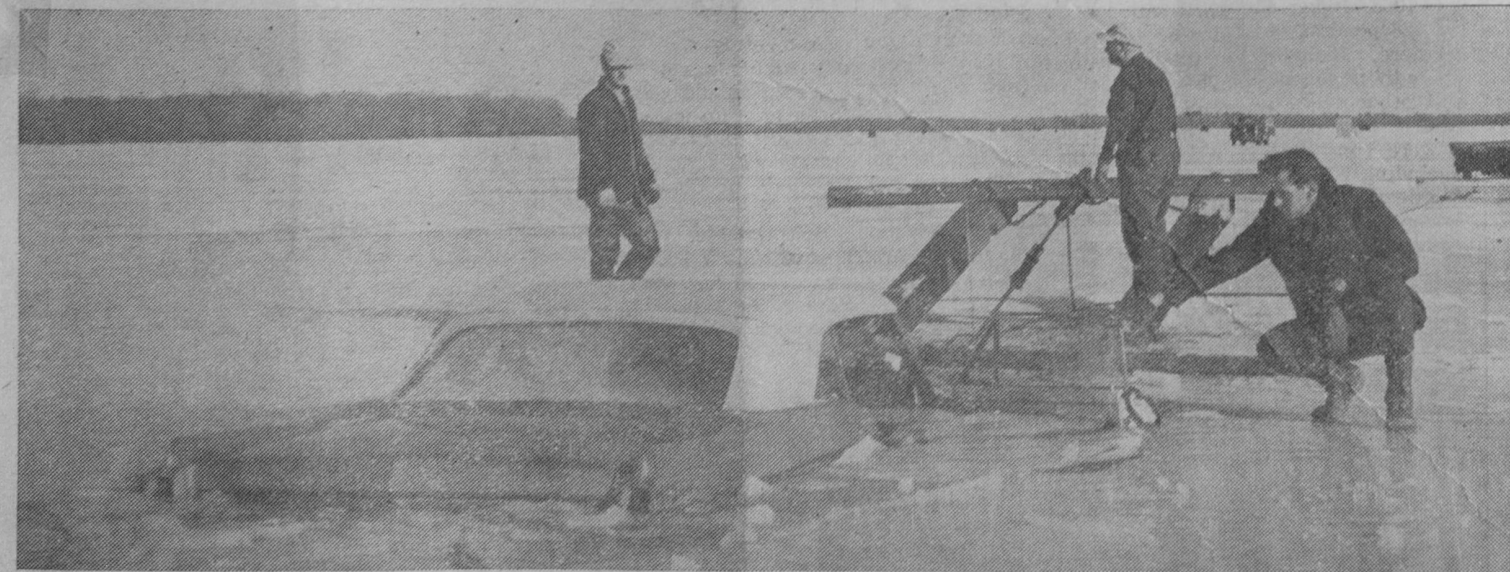
There will be many contests during the three days, all taking place on the ice. Prizes are to be offered.

Tawas Braves strengthened their grip on NBC leadership Friday night by sinking the upset-minded Oscoda Owls, 68-58, on the losers' home floor.

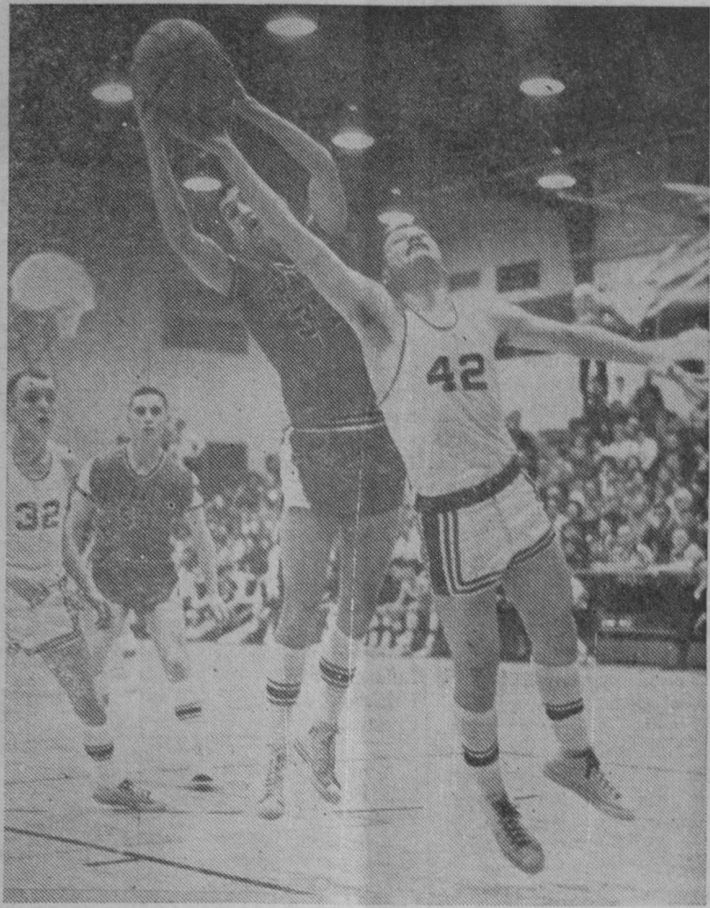
The Braves now have only three conference games remaining on their schedule, two at home and one away. Coming here this Friday night will be the Standish-Sterling Panthers.

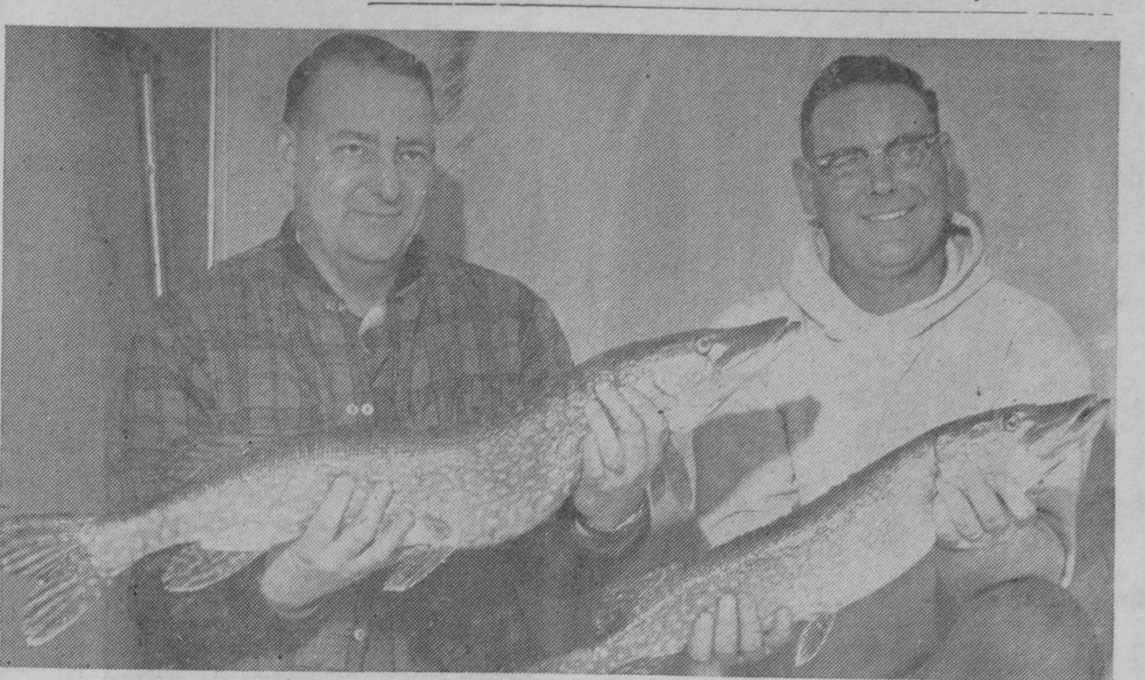

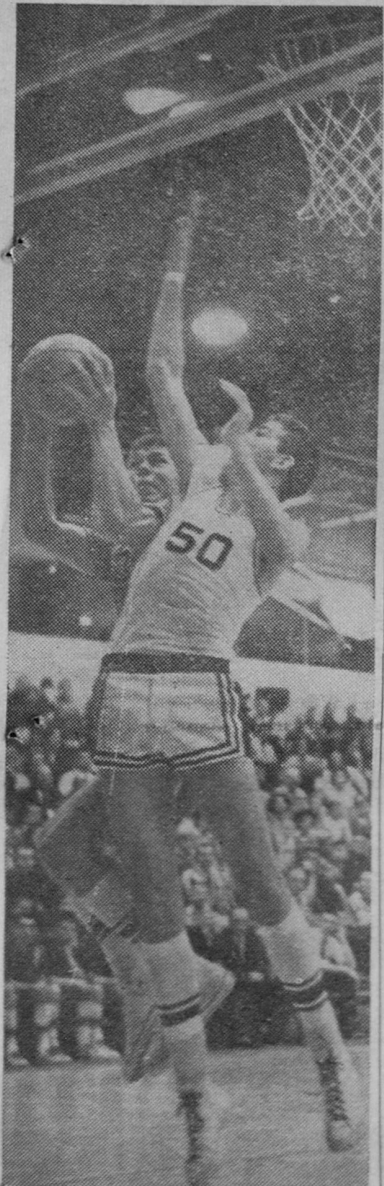

Has Fine Gun Collection ...

An East Tawas man, who has been interested in firearms since his youth, possesses today one of Northern Michigan's finest private gun collections.

Starting with a 22 caliber single shot rifle which was given to him when he was 12 years old, Dale Fisher has assembled a collection of more than 130 firearms—both hand and long guns—not to mention an impressive array of edged weapons.

Fisher's latest acquisition of note is a beautiful Henry rifle, the rarest and most cherished item of early Winchester collectors. This weapon, chambered for the 44 caliber rim fire cartridge, was carried during the American Civil War by a member of Company C, 58th Indiana Volunteers, whose name is engraved on the brass frame.

This is only one of many outstanding pieces in Fisher's collection. His collection of 50 Colt hand guns is topped by an engraved London Navy cased model. Oldest weapon in his collection is a matchlock from India which was used around the year 1600.

One of the interesting aspects of Fisher's collection is that he has obtained most of the items from the Iosco County area. Until starting work as a teller at Peoples State Bank about six months ago, he had been employed at Huron Hardware, Oscoda. There, he was able to make the acquaintance of a number of people who were willing to part with antique firearms and edged weapons.

Also working closely with Fisher in obtaining several different items has been Esmond Smith, East Tawas gunsmith, who is a recognized expert in the antique firearms field.

The 41-year-old Fisher served as an United States Marine in the

South Pacific Theater during World War II and is interested in

firearms and military accoutrements of that era.

Although he had obtained a few items before entering service, it was not until after the war that he began collecting in earnest. Today, the basement of the Fisher home at 455 West Lincoln Street is a storehouse of history, enjoyed by the entire family.

Because of the fact that Colt hand guns are becoming scarce and prices are generally out of reach of the small collector, Fisher has turned his attention to a general collection. Since obtaining the Henry, he plans to start building up his array of Winchesters.

Fisher does not limit his interest in firearms to merely collecting them, as he is also interested in hunting.

Correct SS Reports Are Important to You and Your Family

Mr. Ellifritz stated that each worker should make certain that every cent he earns goes on his social security earnings record before death, disability or retirement occurs. He advised every worker to keep his social security card handy and show it to his employer when he goes to a new job. Many workers try to give their numbers to their employers from memory. The manager said this is not a good practice and increases the chances of the number being reported incorrectly.

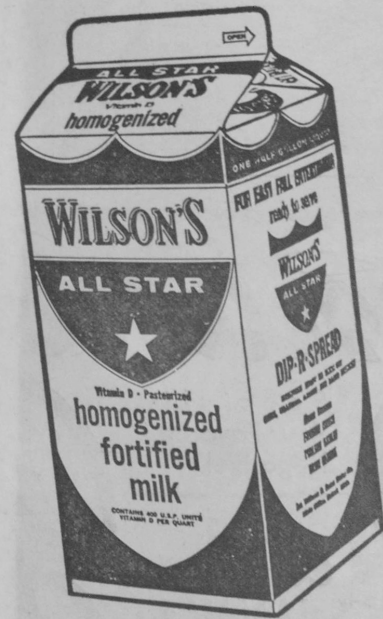
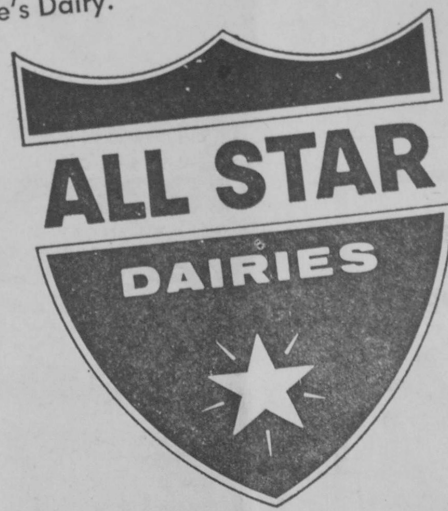

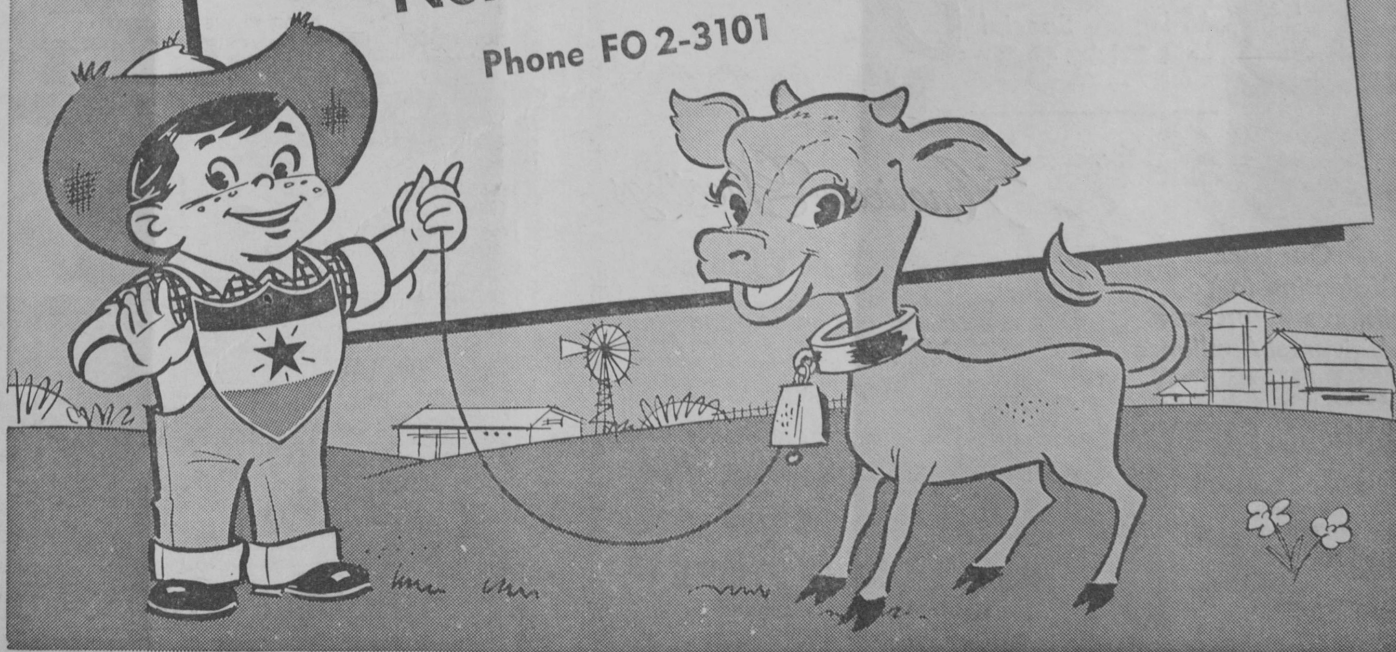

Mayor George Tuttle said that when Tawas City obtained its water supply from deep wells, the state health department reported a high concentration of fluorides in the supply. "Up until the time we started buying our water supply, it came to a point where we had too much natural fluorides in our well water," said the mayor.

Stating that he definitely approved of the water treatment program, Hasty said it was "a shame" that children of the Tawas area were not already benefiting from fluoridated water. Only one part of fluoride per million parts of water, he said, would benefit the teeth of children being born today and even those unborn.

Dr. Hasty said that detractors of the fluoridation issue have never proven where such treatment of water had hurt anyone physically. "It is a scientific fact that water fluoridation is beneficial to the teeth of children," said Hasty, "and this is a fine thing for you people to do for your community."

County Clerk Tells About Nationwide Reapportionment

"Newspaper headlines now banner across the nation the reapportionment problems boiling in nearly two-thirds of our states. Reason for the headlines is the entry of our judicial branch of government into the legislative domain," states County Clerk George Prescott in another of his articles on the new constitution.

"Our Michigan Supreme Court broke long established precedent last week when it handed down an opinion in regard to the establishment of the Court of Appeals in Michigan which was left to our legislature to formulate under our new constitution. Our eight supreme court justices evidently believed our legislature might have trouble following the guide lines set down in Section 8 of Article VI of the new document calling for nine judges to be nominated and elected from districts drawn on county lines as nearly as possible of equal proportion.

"Here is a flagrant invasion of one branch of government by another. The opinion was circulated but apparently caused no considerable concern to either the people of Michigan or our legislators," Prescott said.

"In our new constitution under Article III under general government Section 8 states 'Either house of the legislature or the governor may request the opinion of the supreme court on important questions of law upon solemn occasions as to the constitutionality of legislation after it has been enacted into law but before its effective date.'

"This calls to mind the historic decision handed down by our United States Supreme Court in March 1962 in the famous Tennessee case where long precedent was reversed in a 6-2 decision setting forth that federal courts may consider whether the apportionment of legislative seats by states denies groups of citizens their constitutional rights.

"Justice Frankfurter in his powerful dissenting opinion called the decision 'a massive repudiation of the experience of our whole past in asserting destructively novel judicial power,'" Prescott pointed out.

"Separation of powers, the very basis of our theory of government checks and balances is presently in for a rough time. The executive branch has always had the privilege of recommending legislation, but today, congressional bills are drafted by White House advisors and departments and the same thing occurs in our state capitols.

"We have new roles today for our judicial and executive branches of government with the legislative branch being cast in the role of the opposition," he concluded.
