

Judge Ralph of Standish Fills Isosco Probate Bench

Probate Judge Kenneth E. Ralph of Standish has been appointed to fill the Isosco County Probate Court bench vacated by Judge H. Read Smith, whose retirement was effective Tuesday, December 31.

The local court is to proceed temporarily during January with Judge Ralph sitting here on Tuesdays and Isosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller filling out the remainder of the time.

In a letter received here Monday, Robert L. Drake, deputy court administrator for the State of Michigan, said, "at this fog-

bound juncture, the better discretion is to proceed temporarily for a period of perhaps four to six weeks with Judge Ralph handling the call of cases on a one or two-day per week schedule."

Drake suggested that the matter be re-evaluated around February 1. "At such time," he said, "we may be better oriented as to the course to be followed in appointment of a retired judge, or, if a visiting probate judge continued to be the preferred course, to arrange for possible substitution to share part of the burden."

There are a number of unknown factors in the matter of appointment or "authorization" of a judge to act here after the first of the year. Some of the problems, according to Drake, require legislative answers; others by the court as then constituted.

From a legislative standpoint, he said, there are at least three areas of uncertainty: 1. Will compensation be provided for visiting judges, those appointed by the presiding judge or by the court administrator? 2. Will legislation be enacted affecting compensation for retired judges authorized to act by the supreme court? 3. Will machinery be provided for special elections and will it be utilized?

Drake said it was his personal feeling that compensation should be provided, particularly if the probate judge is to serve for a considerable period. He also said it appears doubtful that there will be an adequate reservoir of retired judges to meet vacancies as they occur.

With respect to special elections, Drake said it would seem doubtful that counties would be interested in them unless they become mandatory since, under the present system, they could receive judicial services at greatly reduced costs until such time as a general election is held.

He also indicated that there are a number of questions which arise in construing the appointive power of the supreme court under the 1963 constitution. There would be no action from this body until it names a successor to Leonard W. Carr, retired chief justice.

In any event, Judge Smith vacated his office in the county building on Tuesday. He had served Isosco for 24 years.

12 Persons Met Violent Death in Isosco During 1963

Isosco County Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell reports that 12 persons met violent death in this county during the past 12 months. Included were nine persons who died in auto crashes, two drownings and one person died in a fire.

Of the nine fatal auto accidents, three persons died in a crash on M-55, one person was killed on Tawas Point Road, two died on Sand Lake Road, two persons were killed on River Road at Oscoda and one person was killed on US-23 south of Oscoda.

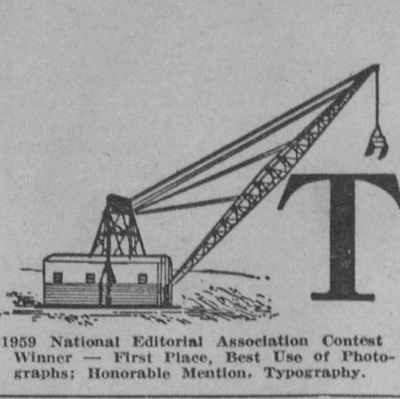

Ferguson had been assigned to the East Tawas post for five years prior to going to Battle Creek.

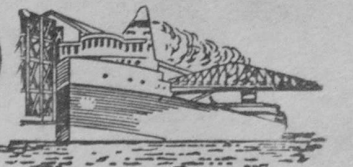

D&M Uncommitted on Service North of Alpena

The Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company has filed no petition to discontinue service north from Alpena to Cheboygan, despite announcements to the contrary by State Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelley.

Kelley, who had been asked to investigate by Gov. George Romney, indicated last Thursday that virtually all railroad service north of Cadillac, Gaylord and Alpena would be halted if petitions from the Pennsylvania, New York Central, Soo Line and Detroit and Mackinac Railway are approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Romney had asked the Public Service Commission to intercede with the Interstate Commerce Commission and the United States Coast Guard to stress the importance of the railroad link which moves about 7,000 cars across the straits each year.

The coast guard had ordered owners to make major repairs on the car ferry and cease operations by December 31. However, they extended that date later to May.

Romney indicated discontinuation of the service would have a negative impact on the economy of the entire Northern Lower Peninsula.

Kelley, in joining the fight, seconded that with "the long range effects of these actions would be to hamper the economic growth of Northern Michigan because of the lack of rail transportation and to cause the economic severance of the eastern end of the Upper Peninsula and the northern half of the Lower Peninsula."

In a formal statement Friday, William J. Pinkerton, executive vice president of the Detroit and Mackinac, said:

"The Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company has not formally applied to the Michigan Public Service Commission nor to the Interstate Commerce Commission, which in this case has jurisdiction, toward abandonment of any part of its rail line between Cheboygan and Bay City."

"The railway company has, however, made its position known with the Public Service Commission in regard to possible action if other carriers, now serving Northern Michigan, should initiate abandonment action with any governmental body as a result of

termination of rail ferry service across the Straits of Mackinac."

He said there were a great many variable factors involved "and at this point, any statement as to our intent to file or not to file such a petition would be pure conjecture."

Pinkerton indicated that a key factor in the situation was the fate of the car ferry operated between St. Ignace and Mackinac City by the Mackinac Transportation Company.

Mackinac Transport is owned by the New York Central, Pennsylvania Railroad and Soo Line. Repairs to the ferry are estimated at \$1,200,000 and a spokesman for that company has said that the decline in rail car ferrying occasioned by operation of the Mackinac Bridge makes the repairs economically unfeasible.

Speaking for the D&M, Pinkerton said, "The situation is strictly a matter of economics. If the car ferry were to continue operating, that would make a different picture. There are several other, as yet, undetermined factors involved. I cannot make a positive statement at this time."

Mayor James Muschell of Cheboygan declared Friday that if the railroads carry out discontinuation of train service to Cheboygan and Mackinaw City, the eco-

MC Gas Company Happy About Public's Acceptance

Michigan Consolidated Gas Company today reported that public acceptance of natural gas service, which will begin here next fall, "has exceeded all expectations."

James C. Preston, general manager of the utility's northern district, said the company has completed its initial survey of potential customers in Tawas City and that 64 percent of those persons contacted have signed applications for gas service. "We expected to be serving about 40 percent of the potential customers by the end of our first year of operation, but this indicates a much higher number will be taking gas as soon as we complete our transmission and distribution system next fall," Preston said.

During the past two months, Michigan Consolidated representatives have been contacting residents and business people in 40 cities, villages and townships in Northeastern and Northcentral

Michigan to which the company plans to extend service in 1964. "We already have signed applications from 6,400 customers which is 20 percent more than the 5,300 we expected to be serving at the end of our first year of operation," Preston said. "This represents about 58 percent of all those contacted and better than 48 percent of the potential customers in the entire area, including those whom we have not been able to contact."

Preston said that residents who were not contacted during the survey and desire gas service should write the New Business Division, Michigan Consolidated Gas Company, One Woodward Avenue, Detroit.

The exact location of gas mains in the various communities to be served will depend on an engineering appraisal of the survey, he explained. "The large investment required to install gas mains will restrict our service to

the more populated areas," he said, "but we propose to provide gas service wherever it is economically possible."

"We were very pleased with the reception Michigan Consolidated representatives received in Tawas area. Apparently the reputation natural gas has for economy, cleanliness and reliability has preceded us here because the vast majority of people to whom we talked either signed applications or asked us to call on them again next summer," Preston said.

Michigan Consolidated will begin construction of its \$13,000,000 project to serve the northeastern half of the Lower Peninsula as soon as the frost is out of the ground next spring. The 40 communities to be served roughly parallel US-27 from Houghton Lake to Grayling and Gaylord, along M-55 from West Branch to Tawas City and East Tawas and north to Alpena.

Arrested last week by the Saginaw Police Department were Edwin B. Strachan, 30; David P. Galonska, 21, and Richard A. Honig, 20.

Galonska and Honig were returned here for arraignment in justice court. Honig waived examination and bond was set at \$1,500. Galonska demanded examination, which has been set for January 3.

Much stolen property has been recovered and on Friday Honig accompanied state police on a tour of the area pointing out cabins that had been burglarized.

The six break-ins on the original case here occurred at summer homes south of Tawas City owned by L. G. Sheaver, W. M. Bradley, D. J. Mertz, Thomas Cumming, W. C. Truesdale and Morris Brown.

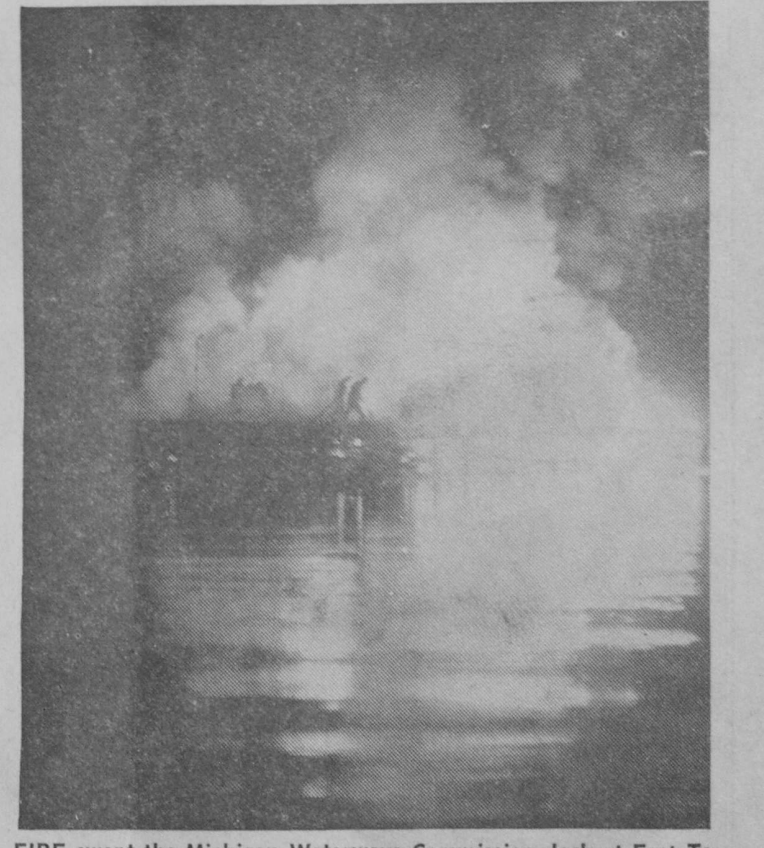

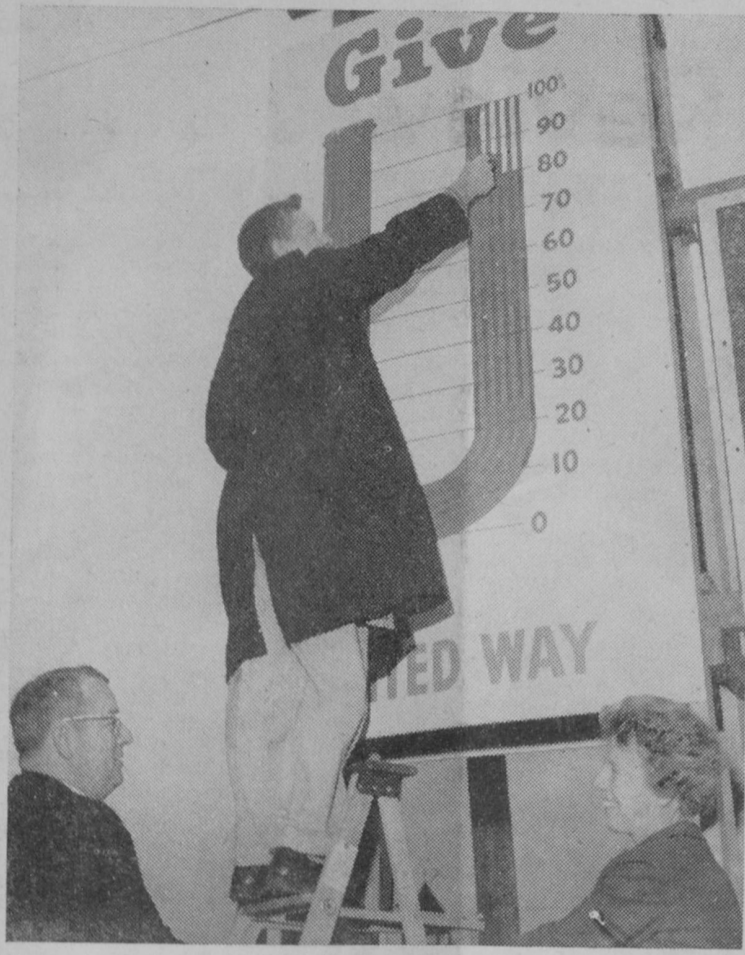

1/2 to 3/4 cup vinegar	1/2 cup whipping cream
1/2 to 1 teaspoon salt	Parsley sprigs
1/2 teaspoon pepper	

Cut olives into wedges. Cook onion in butter until soft but not browned. Add vinegar, salt, pepper and dill weed. Combine with potatoes. Carefully mix in cream and olives. Pack mixture into 5- or 6-cup ring mold; chill. To serve, unmold on serving plate and garnish with parsley. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

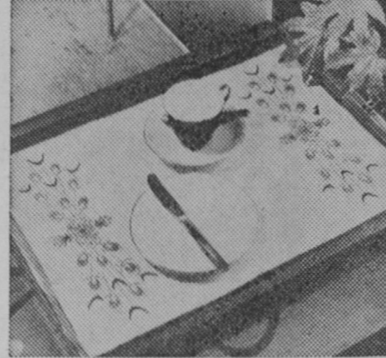

Cheboygan has been the northern terminus of the D&M for nearly 60 years. On Sunday, June 26, 1904, there occurred one of the "railroad battles" which marked the development of railroads everywhere.

The D&M had received permission from Cheboygan authorities to enter the city. To reach its depot site, it had to cross the Michigan Central. Some 3,000 persons gathered at the scene where the MC had shoved some cars over the crossing spot. The cars were dumped over and the crossing cleared. The D&M built its line over the MC right of way without further incident.

1963 CONSERVATION HEADLINERS

The long, dry summer of 1963 transformed Michigan into a veritable tinder box by mid-October, prompting Governor Romney to issue a statewide no-smoking, no-burning edict. A safety-conscious public lived up to the letter of his emergency order to hold fire damage down during the critical fall period.

Firearm deer hunters, turning out in what may have been record numbers, took home more than 100,000 whitetails, a kill figure topped only by two other November gun seasons in Michigan.

Fish, forestry, and game improvement activities gained much-needed impetus to meet outdoor demands, and hundreds of unemployed men found new jobs as a result of a \$1.6 million Accelerated Public Works Program, co-financed by state and federal funds.

Recreation continued to dominate the outdoor scene, as rock-hunters, berry pickers and others flocked to the state's woods, waters and fields by the thousands. State parks played host to some 13.5 million day-use visitors and a record 210,000 camping families. State forests served as popular playgrounds and outdoor headquarters for thousands of other recreationists.
