

# Iosco Has New Probation Officer

Philip Gidley, 28, new probation-parole officer here for the Michigan Department of Corrections, arrived last week to take over the office being vacated by Richard K. Nelson, who, until last Friday, had served the 23rd judicial circuit for the past seven years.

This is Gidley's first assignment after joining the department of corrections. He had been with the Michigan Department of Mental Health for the past 18 months and had served the past seven months as acting director of the social service department at Ionia State Hospital.

## Elmer Werth Attended State GOP Seminar


Elmer Werth, chairman of the Iosco County Republican Committee, attended a Republican state seminar Friday and Saturday at Lansing.

Best record ever compiled at the Alabaster plant was from 1956 to 1958 when there were 615,000 man hours without an accident.


"This is an outstanding record and one which the company and the men here at Alabaster can be proud of," said Maynard VanOrnum, works manager.

Employees enjoyed a coffee and donut break Wednesday afternoon. Safety films were shown by Carl Tenut, plant safety director.





## First Perchville Festival Planned on Tawas Bay

First annual Perchville festival will be held on the ice of Tawas Bay February 28-29 and March 1. Plans for the event were made Monday night by Chairman James DeWyse and his committee at the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office.

During the past two seasons, 25 new aluminum shanties were purchased by local sponsors through efforts of the chamber of commerce. It was felt that some promotion should be made this year to acquaint out-staters with the excellent winter fishing at Perchville.

There will be numerous contests during the three days, all taking place on the ice. Included will be games, foot, tire and bag races for the children, in addition to fishing contests for all ages. There will be divisions for both men and women, along with an ice spudding contest for adults. Many prizes are to be offered and selection of a Perchville "king," who will reign over the three-day event, will be announced next week.

One of the highlights will be a special fishing pond for children up to three years of age.

All restaurants in the area are being requested to feature Tawas Bay perch on their menus over the festival week-end.

Perchville has received considerable publicity in past years, but until a year ago, the number of shanties operated by the chamber of commerce finally had dwindled to a handful. Behind

the leadership of President Ralph Western, Chairman DeWyse and members of the board of directors, the ice fishing village was given a new lease on life with purchase of new shanties last season.

The fish shanties were placed on ice in the bight of Tawas Bay two weeks ago. Heated shanties are available to visitors at a rental charge of \$2.50 per day. Percy Scott has charge of the ice fishing village.

Many large pike have been taken through the ice during the past two weeks, both on hook and line and by spearing.

## Hale Fire Dept. Had 34 Calls During 1963

Fire Chief James Mann reported this week that Plainfield Township Fire Department had a total of 34 fire calls during the past year.

Included in the total were 14 house fires, nine grass fires, four forest fires, three dump fires, one lost person and two mutual aid calls.

At an average of two hours per fire, there were 952 hours that the men spent fighting fires and readying equipment.

During 1963, there was a total of 635 men at weekly fire meetings. An average of two hours per meeting gives a total of 1,370 man-hours of practice and maintenance of equipment.

Being that this is a volunteer fire department, Chief Mann said he is very proud of the total of 2,322 man-hours given by the volunteers and also that there were several more hours that individuals gave of their time for extra work other than at meetings and fires.

## Tawas Board Rejects W-P's Boundary Plan

Tawas Area Board of Education has rejected a proposed plan to straighten out the district's western border with Whittemore-Prescott Area School District in Sherman Township.

Appearing before Monday night's meeting was William Tracy, Iosco County superintendent of schools, who had also attended the board meeting of Whittemore-Prescott earlier that evening.

When the two districts were reorganized, residents of Sherman Township had the choice of being included in one district or the other. As a result, the boundary line has numerous jogs.

For a number of years, both districts have sought to straighten the boundary line in an effort to shorten bus routes and lessen confusion. Each district, however, has rejected the other's recommendations.

Board members felt Monday night that, under the Whittemore-

## Construction Down at E. Tawas in '63

Building permits issued by the East Tawas Department of Public Works show that construction was down last year as compared to the preceding 12 months. A report from Supt. Paul Roper indicates, however, that 1963 construction totaled favorably with that of 1961.

Total construction during 1963 as reflected by building applications was \$149,401. The preceding year's total was \$234,600, while construction amounted to \$167,335.

There were 10 new homes started in 1963 at an estimated cost of \$88,350. This compared to 15 homes in 1962 and 12 in 1961.

According to records, the 1962 total was swelled considerably by a \$20,000 commercial building application and \$34,000 for the city hall. There was no new commercial construction during the past 12-month period.

Other categories listed under the 1963 report included: 10 garages, \$9,525; four commercial building additions and remodeling, \$12,000; 27 home remodeling and additions, \$31,635; 54 home repairs, \$7,891.

A sewer survey is currently being conducted by Spicer Engineering Company of Saginaw to provide information for location of future lift stations and modern treatment facilities.

## Tawas Would Lose \$\$ Under Aid Proposal

Tawas Area Board of Education is to voice its objection to a state aid proposal of Charles Brake, former Wayne County superintendent of schools. The bill is presently in a committee of the state legislature.

Supt. Reynold Mick said that the bill, if enacted, would result in a total loss to Tawas Area of between \$37,000 and \$43,000 in aid for the 1964-1965 school year.

The proposal would eliminate \$34,000 of transportation money now received by the local school district and from \$3,000 to \$9,000 less state aid money.

Mick said he expected to see the proposal altered, but thought the board should express its opinion soon on the matter.

In other business, Mick reported he believed an excessive amount of fuel oil was being used at the high school. He said that a representative of Bay Refinery, which provides the fuel through its local agent, Barber Gas and Oil, had been requested to check the furnace.

This year, the board wished to change refineries and because of pre-heating problems switched from burning No. 6 fuel oil to No. 5. Mick said Monday night that as much fuel oil had been consumed through Christmas vacation at the high school as had been used during the entire 1962-1963 heating year. He asked if Leonard No. 6 fuel should be tried at the high school.

During discussion, Trustee Leonard Sarki was of the opinion that a load of Leonard No. 6 fuel oil should be tried as an experiment. Trustee Walter Champion said that Blublitz Oil Company had been low bidder and felt that the board should abide by bids received. It was pointed out by other members that the board reserves the right to accept or reject any or all bids.

No action was taken, although the board directed that the Bay Refining Company representative be called to inspect the high school furnace.

The board authorized expenditures of \$520 in National Defense Education funds for purchase of blackout curtains for five class rooms and the agricultural room at the high school.

Miss Clara Bolen elementary principal, reported on the December 13 mathematics conference which she and four other Tawas Area teachers attended at Higgins Lake. John Forsten and Robert Blood of the high school faculty, along with four elementary teachers, are to attend a conference concerning mathematics instruction February 1.

The board authorized purchase of 15 American flags for classrooms in the high school. All rooms in elementary grades have flags. Inquiry is also to be made as to the cost of a state flag for possible display in the auditorium.

## Burdge Ashton Resigns AuSable Supervisor Seat

Burdge Ashton, AuSable Township supervisor since 1959, resigned that position effective last Wednesday. His seat on the Iosco Board of Supervisors, which is in session today, will be filled by William G. Savage for the unexpired term which runs until April 1965.

Ashton, who operates a furniture store and trailer court at AuSable, listed the press of personal business as the reason for his resignation. He is active in the Masonic Lodge and many other community activities.

The appointee, 34 years of age, has been a resident of the AuSable area since 1949. A chiropractor, he is president of the Oscoda-AuSable industrial development committee.

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### Know Your Social Security Status if Applying Soon

Paul M. Ellifritz, district manager of social security in Bay City, asks: "Are you planning to retire soon? Do you keep putting off inquiring about your social security status? If so, do you know what documents will be needed when you apply? Do not depend on your neighbor's recollection of what he was asked for—his situation may not apply to you."

Resolve today to prepare for your eventual retirement and inquire before you retire. Generally, you will need the following:

1. Proof of your age.
2. Evidence of earnings—if you work for wages, your Form W-2, withholding tax statement, for the year before you apply; if you have your own business, a copy of your complete federal income tax return for the past year and the canceled check showing your payment of social security tax will be needed.
3. If your wife is applying at the same time, she will need proof of her age.

# TA Braves Blitzed Pinny 73-29 Friday

Tawas Area Braves continued to roll Friday night by blitzing Pinconning's Spartans, 73-29. The victory was the third in four conference starts for the Braves, whose only loss was to the West Branch Orioles. Tawas also has two nonconference wins.

The Braves of Coach Bill McIntosh now go against the Gladwin Flying Gs this Friday night on the latter's home court. This conference tilt will precede the year's big game here January 24 when the Orioles play a return engagement.

In last Friday night's impressive win, Tawas Area again displayed a brilliant passing attack led by Guards Darrell Welch and Don Lear. Although the Spartans were definitely not cut from the same cloth as Pinconning teams of former years, the Braves made mincemeat of the Northern Bay County team's press defense.

The big difference, however, came on Tawas' ability to hit from the floor. The Braves completed 33 out of 82 field goals for a 40 percent shooting average. The Spartans, on the other hand, made only 11 out of 76 attempts.

Center Herb Humphrey and Forward Dennis Blata tallied 27 and 17 points, respectively, for the winners, who, with Welch's 10 points, had three players hitting in double figures.


Humphrey's shooting average was 13 completions out of 23 shots and his passing meant much to the Tawas offense. Blata, probably the most improved player on the squad, made good on eight out of 13 attempts.

McIntosh defended the Spartans according to his scouting reports—that is, let Pinconning shoot from the front court and then take the rebounds. The Braves did just that, although it would have to be admitted that the ball was taking a "Tawas bounce" in this game.

Controlling the board for the Braves was Forward Chuck Anschuetz, who snapped off 15 rebounds. Humphrey and Blata were each credited with 13 rebounds.

During a fast and furious first quarter, which saw both teams missing some shots each during two racehorse exchanges, Tawas finally wound up with a 19-5 scoring bulge.

The Braves put the game far out of reach in the second stanza when they did not miss a single shot from the key to give them a completion average of 19 out of







Water and sewer expense was \$500 at East Tawas, \$1,585.36 at the high school, \$40 for a fire hydrant at the football field, \$402.50 at Tawas City.

Total cost of fuel and utilities during 1962-1963 was \$26,293.88, as compared to \$25,316.51 during 1961-1962.



### QUESTION:

"I have heard a little about feeding haylage to sows. I am very interested as I have a lot of sows to feed. Could you give me some information on this? Would it save me money?"

### ANSWER:

As yet, there has not been a great deal of research work reported by the experiment stations regarding this question. Recent work at Purdue showed that haylage supplemented with 1.9 lbs. shelled corn and 1.02 lbs. of a 38% protein supplement, held promise as a good swine gestation ration. The gilts used in this experiment consumed 8.8 lbs. of haylage daily.

Basing my observations on work conducted with alfalfa silage for brood sows and gilts, I would suggest that slightly more shelled corn would be advisable, especially if the sows were very big. The main purpose of haylage, silage, or any other roughage in sow rations is merely to serve as bulk and thus dilute the energy content of the ration, and yet still let the sows eat what they wish. Some feel a ration of this type offers less problems than limit-feeding of sows with regard to managing them, and makes them less mean and hard to handle, especially when feeding many sows in a group. As you know, reducing the energy content of the gestation ration goes a long way toward increasing live litter size at farrowing and thus increasing your profits.

### QUESTION:

"Last June 1, I cut four rounds in my alfalfa field and baled it. Then on June 15 I cut the rest. The first part failed to come up—just grass. The rest made a good second cutting. Why?"

### ANSWER:

When he cut four rounds in the field for baling on June 1, he probably got quick recovery growth. However, such recovery growth was consumed by leaf hoppers which moved in quickly from the part of the field he cut on June 15. Leaf hoppers cause "alfalfa yellows" which although not a disease in the ordinary sense is very serious in the eastern half of the U.S. Leaf hoppers through their

sucking of the plant juices, cause a severe yellowing of the foliage, loss in carotene, loss of leaves and feeding value. While such losses are usually not severe enough to kill the stand the odds were in favor of loss of stand in competition with grass considering, too, that the possibly heavy leaf hopper population had only 4 rounds of alfalfa to feed on as they moved from the harvesting operation in the larger area of the field cut on June 15 onto the small area (4 rounds) just recovering from the June 1 harvest.

Some further comments on alfalfa management may be helpful. In the latitude of Elgin, Illinois, it is probably advisable to take three cuttings per year for good hay management. I would suggest June 1, July 15, and September 1 as approximate dates. One cutting (preferably the first) per year may be taken at a pre-bloom stage without unduly hurting the alfalfa. Such pre-bloom cutting should not be the last one since this would deny proper recovery growth for root reserve build-up for proper overwintering. Since the first cutting is usually the coarse and/or tall one, it is best to cut it at the pre-bloom or very early bloom stage. Thus the first cutting might


be adjusted to the May 22 to 30 period or so. When the entire field is cut at one time, leaf hoppers are usually destroyed in the haying operation. Therefore, it is desirable to cut the entire field unless supplemental insecticidal spraying is practiced on the early cut part. Such spraying is not desirable since the hay must eventually be consumed by livestock.

Alfalfa cut continuously at an immature stage, for example, pre-bud or bud stage, not only will produce less hay but the stand is prematurely killed.

Such kill is the result of a continuous reduction of root food reserves. Alfalfa with low root reserves is very susceptible to winterkill. It should be remembered, however, that alfalfa cut at an immature stage has a higher protein content and a higher feeding value than when cut at later stages. The farmer must therefore strive for a balance. He strives to cut a high tonnage of high quality hay. This is why we would say that Mr. Owen Calhoon should be cutting 3 times a year, the first cutting preferably or the second (but not the third) at an early bloom stage and third cutting and one other at the full bloom stage.

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# Corn IN JANUARY

Inexpensive food is not necessarily the poorest buy. Wise homemakers know that large production means savings. Last summer was a golden one for corn.

Prices are right! And family tastes will be pleased when you select canned corn. 

## FISH AND CORN CHOWDER

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### SAVORY CORN

- 3 slices bacon
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1 1/2 cups cooked corn or canned whole kernel corn, drained
- 1/2 lb. pkg. American cheese, diced
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- Salt
- Pepper
- 6 Bread baskets

Fry bacon in heavy skillet until golden brown. Remove bacon from skillet. Add green pepper and onion. Cook in remaining bacon fat until tender. Chop bacon in small pieces. 

### TOMATO-CORN CHOWDER

- 2 slices bacon, diced
- 1/4 cup grated onion
- 2 cups cubed raw potatoes
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 cup water
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1 cup drained whole kernel corn
- 2 cups tomato juice
- 4 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 cup milk

Cook bacon and onion until bacon is crisp. Add potatoes, water and seasonings. Cover and simmer about 30 minutes or until potatoes are tender. Add corn, tomato juice and flour which has been dissolved in milk. Cook over low heat, stirring occasionally until thickened. 6 servings.

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**Cream Puffs**

(A Robin Hood Pre-sifted Flour recipe)

1 cup ROBIN HOOD All-Purpose Flour

4 eggs
