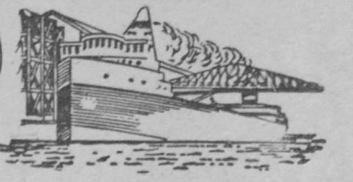

Silver Valley Carnival Starts Friday

Winter Sports Officials Seek Weatherman's Aid

Local winter sports committees have their fingers crossed in hope that the area will be blessed with good weather conditions for the 26th annual Silver Valley Carnival this week-end.

As of Monday, Hubert Benson, park supervisor, said that one toboggan slide was in operation and the second slide will be ready about mid-week. The ice skating rink will be ready for this week-end but skiing is still in question.

Following last week's thaw, which saw most of the "silver" melt at the winter sports park in Huron National Forest, the five-man crew worked long hours to have at least one toboggan slide usable for the week-end. There was no skiing as the slopes were covered with ice.

"Now, barring any unforeseen development in the weather, Silver Valley should be in fairly good condition for the big event of the winter," states James Campbell, Tawas winter sports chairman.

The carnival week-end starts Friday night, 6:30 o'clock, with the annual stag party at the Holland Hotel. This is the traditional reception for visiting sports writers, radio and television broadcasters and the many old and new friends of Northern Michigan.

The WJR news sports cast will precede the party with Bob Reynolds broadcasting "live" from the Tawas.

Saturday will be fun fest day at the valley and Saturday night will find contestants honored at a queen's banquet to be held at the Barnes Hotel, Tawas City, at 7:30 o'clock. Candidates are to be judged that evening.

O. E. Ostrander, chairman of the queen's committee, reports that contestants include Cheryl Welch and Sandy Pagels of Oscoda, Mary Beth Busch and Holly Defibaugh of Tawas, Linda Wyatt and Diane Beader of Hale, Candie Thornton and Suzie Briggs from Whittemore.

For the younger set, a disc jockey dance is scheduled at the East Tawas Community Building Saturday night. This will be informal and those attending will dress in ski attire.

Contestants for the queen's title will attend the dance following the banquet. There will be prizes and refreshments. This is sponsored by the ski patrol under direction of Tom Merschel and ski aides, co-chaired by Nancy Laidlaw and Maureen Campbell.

Selection of "Miss Silver Valley" will be announced Sunday at the valley. Coronation of the winter sports queen will take place at 2:00 p. m. with Reynolds officiating.

This year, the queen will retain the crown which will be donated by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce. A picture of the queen will be placed in the chamber office and one will also be included with gifts to be presented to the queen.

William A. Smith Named Local Mgr. for Gas Company

Michigan Consolidated Gas Company today announced the appointment of William A. Smith, Detroit, as manager of its operations in this area, effective February 1.

The area office is located at 106 West Westover Street, East Tawas, and will be open for business the first week in February, according to an announcement by James C. Preston, general manager of the utility's northern district.

Other communities included in the Tawas area, which will receive natural gas next September, are West Branch, Whittemore, Tawas City, Oscoda, AuSable, Milledge, Lincoln, Harrisville and the townships which lie along the route of the new pipeline as far north as the Alpena County line.

Smith, a graduate chemical engineer, joined Michigan Consolidated in 1950 as a cadet engineer, later moving to technical and administrative assistant and section foreman. In 1961, he was appointed district foreman, the post he held prior to his new appointment.

Smith, 39, was born in Detroit, graduated from West Branch High School in 1942 and for the next three years served in Europe with General Patton's third army. In 1946, he entered Wayne State University where he graduated in 1950 with a bachelor of science degree in chemistry.

He is married and has three children.

Harwood New Cashier at Peoples State Bank

After 37 years under direction of G. N. Shattuck, operational reins of Peoples State Bank of East Tawas have been turned over to a new cashier.

At the annual organizational meeting last Tuesday night, Richard L. Harwood was elected to the board of directors by a vote of shareholders and then elevated to the position of vice president and cashier.

The cashier's title, chief operational officer of any bank, had been Shattuck's since 1927 when the bank was first organized here by L. G. McKay, long-time Isosco banker and presently chairman of the board.

"A lot of responsibility goes with the title of cashier," said Mr. Shattuck. "I have been in the banking business in this county for 53 years and, while sitting at this desk, one cannot relax a minute."

Mr. Shattuck has never missed an annual meeting of Peoples State Bank and no one, other than the retiring cashier, has ever made out the bank's payroll or signed the annual financial statement.

"I am going to start working bankers' hours and relax a little," said Mr. Shattuck, who was re-elected as president of the board. He said he was not planning any vacation trip and would still maintain an office in the bank.

The new cashier, a native of East Tawas, started with Peoples State Bank on September 15, 1950, working as a bookkeeper in the old bank building. He was promoted to vice president two years ago.

He and his wife, Louise, are the parents of six children. They reside at 406 East Lincoln Street.

Other officers named were John Hoesbach, vice president and branch manager at Tawas City; Miss Esther Look and Wayne Polard, assistant cashiers.

Trustee Walter Niles was appointed to represent the board at a meeting of reorganized school districts Wednesday at Arenac Eastern.

Under provisions of the new constitution, the board is to accept application for appointing four persons as election canvassers. Application forms are now available at the school office. Two Republicans and two Democrats are to be named.

The superintendent reported that the school has about 106 students eligible under the first count of federally-connected students. This would give Tawas an average daily attendance of 100 federal students and about \$10,700 in federal funds instead of the budgeted \$5,000.

There still is some question about 16 of the children and the second count may reduce the amount of federal money to be received.

New Tawas Group Would Seek Industry

Final plans are to be made Thursday noon to organize a new industrial development corporation for the Tawas Area. A board of directors and officers are to be named at that time.

Organization of such a group has been fostered by the Tawas City Businessmen's Association, and, at a special meeting last Thursday night, it was decided to invite East Tawas businessmen and residents to participate. Twenty-seven persons attended the meeting.

Purpose of such an organization, said Delano Myles, president of the businessmen's association, is to promote the location of industry in this area.

Money obtained under capitalization would go into a revolving fund to aid potential industry in purchasing local building sites. The money would then be returned to the revolving fund over a period of years allowing industry to use its own capital for equipment purchase and other expenses.

Kenneth Houck, field representative for the Michigan Department of Economic Development, pointed out that there were more than 140 such organizations in the state. He said that other communities had found a legally organized corporation of this type the best method of interesting new industry to locate in the area.

A charter membership of at least 25 persons is to be sought in the nonprofit corporation, although only a minimum of three is required.

Houck said that similar groups had been organized at Oscoda-AuSable and at Hale. All would work in close cooperation with the Isosco County Planning Commission.

Considerable work toward obtaining necessary information concerning the Tawas area has already been accomplished by the chamber of commerce industrial committee. Chairman John Hoesbach reported that about 85 percent of the work had been completed on this portfolio.

This week's meeting will be included in business transacted during the noon meeting at the businessmen's association.

Announce Change in Dairies; Nelkie is Local Distributor

Announcement is made this week of the sale of Valley Lea Dairy to Wilson's Dairy Products of Detroit. Only the name has been changed to All Star Dairies. Nelkie's Dairy of Tawas City will continue as the local distributor, after an association of 13 years with Valley Lea.

Edward Nelkie, owner, recalled this week that there were 12 licensed milk processing plants in the Tawas area alone when he started in the business 30 years ago. Today, Nelkie's Dairy is the only processing plant remaining in the entire county.

The local firm was the first to bring pasteurization and homogenization in dairy products to Isosco County.

Gov. Romney Appoints Mrs. G. Rose as Isosco Co's. New Juvenile Officer

Mrs. George Rose of East Tawas has been appointed by Michigan Gov. George Romney to succeed Mrs. Charles Kurtzrock as Isosco County juvenile officer.

Although her appointment was effective January 7, Mrs. Rose did not begin her duties until yesterday (Tuesday). She will be working under Probate Judge Kenneth E. Ralph, who was appointed temporarily to fill Judge H. Read Smith's vacancy.

This is her first experience in the juvenile court field. She has been active in civic work and has taken part in many activities for youth.

She studied two years at Wayne State University and served 15 years as a buyer for the J. L. Hudson Company at Detroit.

She and her husband have resided at East Tawas since 1954.

Former National Gypsum President Died Last Week

Lewis R. Sanderson, retired president of National Gypsum Company and former resident of this community, died Tuesday, January 21, at his home in Buffalo, New York, following a long illness.

Born March 24, 1891, at Des Moines, Iowa, his life typified the American ideal of advancement by hard work and devotion to duty.

Sanderson had served as president of National Gypsum Company from 1951 until April 30, 1956. Prior to this, he had been associated with United States Gypsum Company and Atlantic Gypsum Company.

During his service with USG, "Sandy" came to Tawas in 1914, a young man with a minor position at Alabaster. His college sheepskin won at Iowa State College did not impress his boss at first as he filled caliche kettles and oiled machinery for four years. During his 14 years at Alabaster, he made rapid advancement and finally became superintendent.

He married Miss Edith Richards of East Tawas in 1915.

In February 1928, while still at Alabaster, he resigned to join Atlantic Gypsum Products Company. He rose through the ranks and was manager of that corporation's New York City plant when it was purchased by National Gypsum in 1936. He continued in that position with National.

During World War II, he headed up the giant Bluebonnet, Texas, Ordnance Plant which NG built and operated for the government. Under his direction, the plant and its 6,000 employees won the highest production rating of any ordnance plant in the country.

In 1945, Sanderson transferred to the home office of the company at Buffalo and named director of construction. In that post, he directed National Gypsum's \$78,000,000 expansion and modernization program.

In 1947, he was promoted to vice president in charge of operations and was later named to the position of vice president and director. He was elected executive vice president in 1950.

Sanderson had made an annual visit to Tawas to greet old friends of former days. In 1955, he received his life membership in Tawas City Lodge No. 302, F&AM.

A memorial service was held Friday at Forest Lawn Chapel, Buffalo, New York. In a tribute to Mr. Sanderson, Fred A. Manske, president of National Gypsum Company, said, "he will be missed by his many friends and business associates throughout our company."

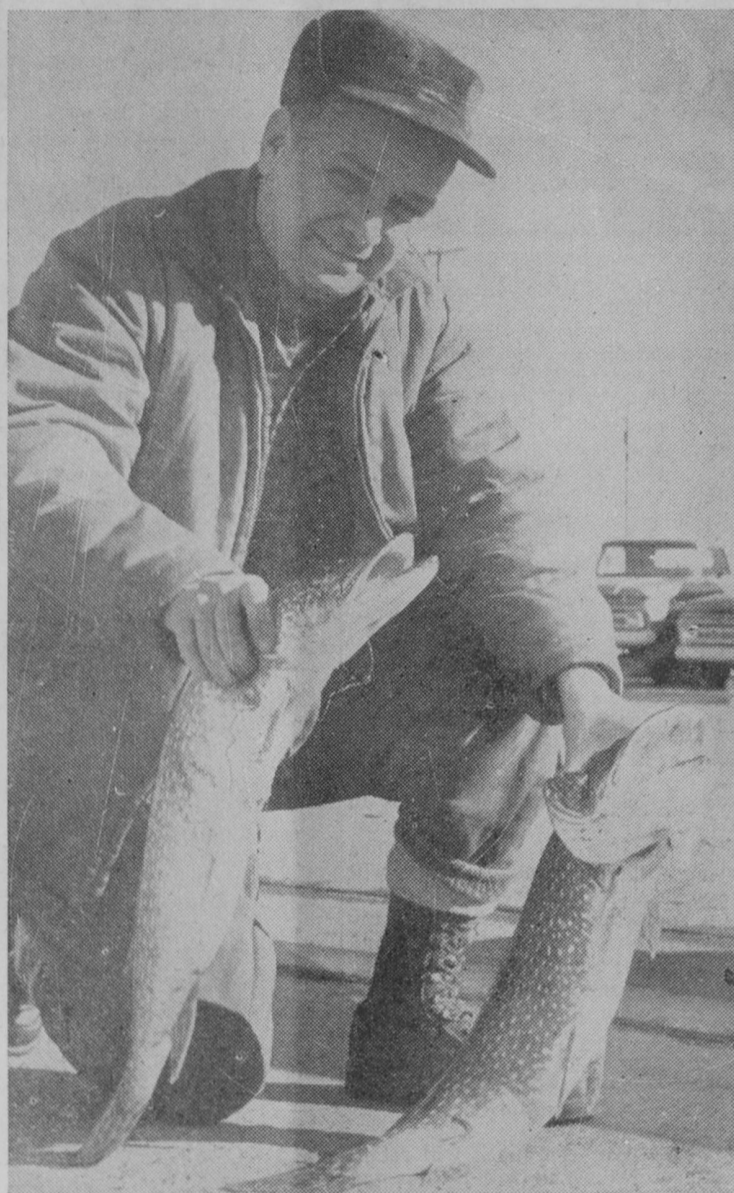

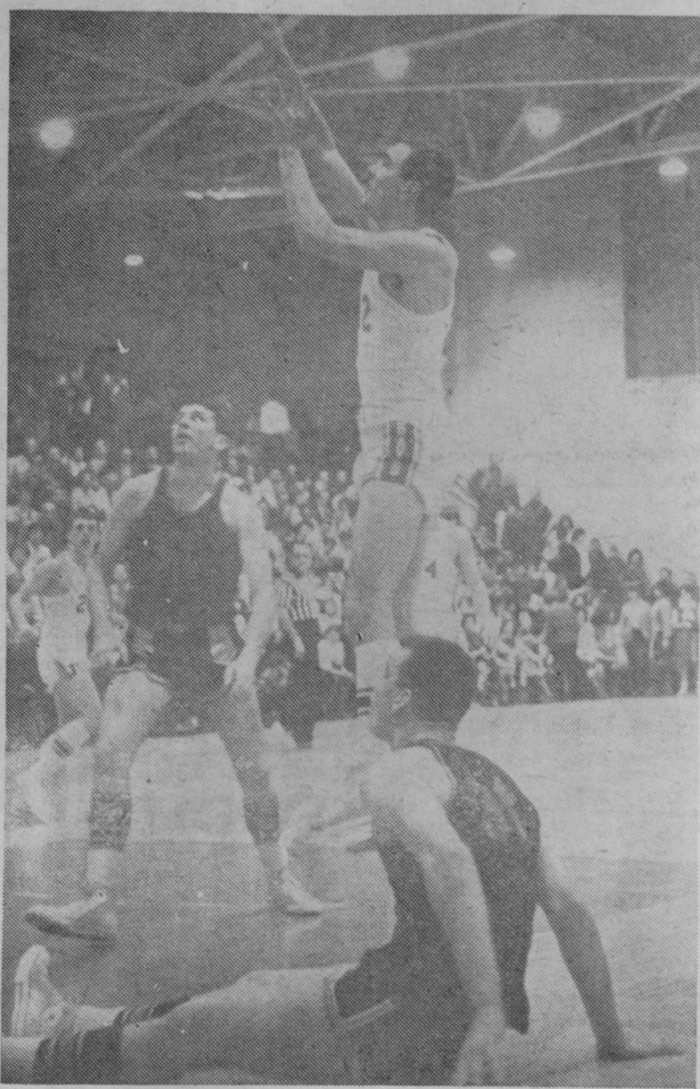

Braves Climb to First Place

Tawas Area Braves climbed in sole possession of first place in the Northern B Conference Friday night by defeating the West Branch Orioles, 63-50, in a hard-fought game.

For Coach Bill McIntosh and his Braves, it was a tasty win as West Branch is the only team which holds a victory over Tawas this season. Until Friday night's finish, the two teams had identical four and one records in conference play.

The Braves will have little time to savor their win over the Orioles, however, as they get ready to travel to Oscoda this Friday night for another conference tilt. Although the Owls of Coach Ben Somers have had their troubles this season, this is one of these traditional games between arch rival schools and Oscoda is always tough on its home floor when it plays Tawas.

Last Friday night's game was another one of those cliff-hangers for the Braves, a contest like those played against Standish, Sterling and the Gladwin Flying Gs only a week ago. It was a thriller from the opening whistle for a capacity crowd.

Final outcome of the game was actually decided on the foul line with Tawas converting 17 out of 23 free throws and West Branch making good on eight out of 12. Six of Tawas' charity tosses came in the final two minutes of play under the one-and-one bonus rule.

At times, both teams were not quite as sharp as fans might expect in a battle between conference leaders. Tawas' passing game was definitely off during the first half, but a lot of credit for this has to go to the Orioles of Coach John Janisch, who made numerous interceptions.

West Branch players seemed to

lose their eye on several occasions and Tawas took over the rebounding with Center Herb Humphrey and Forwards Chuck Anschuetz and Dennis Blata leading the way. The Braves cleared the backboards 59 times and compared to 36 rebounds for the Branchers.

Both teams showed spurts of good passing and deadly accuracy on the hoops. The opening quarter was a good example when the two teams traded basket-for-basket and Humphrey's shot from the corner tied the game at 12-all at the quarter whistle.

The two teams played on even terms throughout the second quarter and Tawas held a 28-27 lead with seconds to go before intermission. Turner of the Orioles drove in for a brilliant two-pointer at the whistle to give his team a 29-28 edge.

Both teams had their big scoring in the third quarter. Tawas meshing 22 points and West Branch close behind with 18. A pass from Guard Jim Sass, who played in his first game this season, to Guard Darrell Welch made the score 50-47 at the end of the third quarter.

West Branch's Brian Delbridge picked up two points at the start of the final quarter, but Anschuetz flipped in a foul shot to retain the lead, 51-49. A drive by Turner knotted the score to 51-51, but Tawas took the lead when Humphrey converted two foul shots. Bartlett scored a field goal for Tawas and Humphrey came back with a fielder to make it 55-52. Bartlett's two set shots gave West Branch the lead with four minutes and 14 seconds remaining in the game. Johnson came back with another set shot which missed the hoop. The basket counted, however, when Humphrey's hand touched the net and

the visitors held a 58-55 lead.

With three minutes and 17 seconds to go, Anschuetz hooped a two pointer. Bartlett fouled out with two minutes and 40 seconds to go and Anschuetz converted both charity tosses in a one-and-one situation to give Tawas a lead the Braves never relinquished. Sass completed two foul shots with 21 seconds to go and Johnson of West Branch made the score 61-60 on his fielder. Only one second remained on the clock when Johnson fouled Welch, which officials ruled as intentional and good for two shots. Welch walked to the foul line and meshed both to give Tawas the three-point margin.

Both teams had three players in double figures, Blata and Humphrey tied for leadership with 17 points each. Anschuetz and Welch were tied with 13 points each.

Heading West Branch's scoring parade was Turner, who had 20 points. Johnson's 17 points was second high.

Tawas Area Junior Braves took it on the chin from the West Branch JV, 46-36. Although the visitors had a height advantage,

Tawas had plenty of scoring opportunities to turn the game into a complete rout. The Junior Braves just could not find the range and the Orioles, led by John Janisch Jr.'s 12 points, rolled to victory. Lapeer was high for Tawas with 12 points. Baker and Grebe each counted six points. Roach was next with four. Sieloff accounted for three. Brugger and Thunberg each had two and McLean had one.

May Take Income Tax Refunds in U. S. Savings Bonds

Federal income taxpayers were reminded yesterday by John E. Hosbach, savings bond chairman for Iosco County, that the treasury is again offering them the option of taking refunds in United States Savings Bonds. The savings option, first introduced last year, is in addition to the two standard options of taking tax refunds in cash or applying them to next year's tax.

"By electing to take his refund in Series E Bonds," Hosbach said, "the taxpayer holds onto his money conveniently, through a secure, risk-free investment which pays interest at a guaranteed rate. He avoids seeing his money absorbed by household expenses, vanishing completely in day-to-day spending. And he learns what millions of other Americans have already discovered—that United States Savings Bonds are one of the finest possible ways to save for a secure future."

"And, of course, every citizen should realize that every dollar he invests in United States Savings Bonds makes our economy stronger and our whole nation more secure."

Taxpayers taking their 1962 refunds in savings bonds swelled the 1963 bond sales by 19.2 million dollars and raised the number of bonds issued by 237,455. This year, Hosbach said, the treasury hopes the plan will further increase the sale of savings bonds and encourages more citizens to develop regular savings habits.

"Nothing could be more convenient than getting your savings bonds through the tax refund plan," Hosbach pointed out. "All it takes is a check mark in the savings bonds block on either tax form 1040 (long) or 1040A (short). The tax instructions give all the information you will need. But the important thing is to make up your mind now that this year you will not let your tax refund slip through your fingers. If you put it in savings bonds you will not only hold onto it, but you will see it grow."

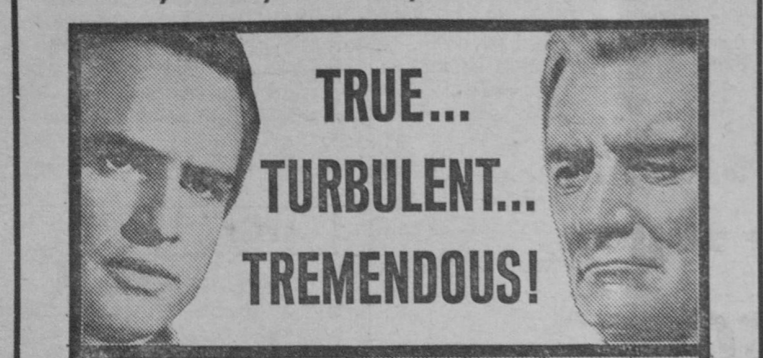

ernor which left this appeal group quite lopsided.

"In 1962, Public Act 194 amended the old act of 1911 and provided that four members of the State Board of Equalization be appointed by the governor with advice and consent of the senate. One member to represent rural interests, one urban, one industrial and commercial and the fourth a person with knowledge and experience in local government.

"This now gives us a State Board of Equalization consisting of seven members to which a county may appeal. The language of the statute is interesting in this respect. It states that four members of this board constitutes a quorum, provided, however, that not more than two members

of said quorum shall be members of the State Tax Commission.

"A local example of what state equalization does here in upsetting the 15-mill limitation and rendering it meaningless would be Grant Township. On a \$1,000 valuation set by the assessing officer of that township, the rate paid last year was about 27 mills. The state board believes that the assessing officer of that township is only assessing the property at about 55 percent of its true value. Here the taxpayer, aware of the township 15-mill limitation protection, expects a tax bill for county, school and township operation in the amount of \$15. His statement calls for \$27.

"This is hard to explain to many taxpayers for the tax was computed in nearly a \$2,000 valuation because the state board had said Grant Township was only assessed at about 55 percent of its true value. If the ruling had been 50 percent, then the supervisor's valuation of \$1,000 would be exactly doubled to \$2,000 for taxing purposes.

"Oscoda Township, for example, has many instances where the county, school and township tax rates total nearly 33 mills, over double the 15-mill limitation. The reason here being that the state board says Oscoda is only assessed at about 45 percent of its true value. The same \$1,000 assessment in Oscoda would call for a tax bill of \$33 where one for \$15 was expected.

"The remainder of the taxes we pay we consented to by vote to raise the 15-mill limitation and these we do not question."
