
Waterfront Art Show to Expand Program







Social Security **Compensates Loss** of Earning Power

In two previous articles, it was explained the belief that the social security trust funds are in the red and that more are constantly paid out than comes in are both false notions, based on faulty information.

A third misconception is the payment of full benefits to people who have worked under social security only a short time is financially dangerous. Here, the critics fail to understand the basic concept of social legislation.

Social security was born during the depression of the 1930s. A pri mary concern at that time was to get purchasing power into the hands of the older people who were the first thrown out of work and would be the last rehired, Over the long pull, social security was intended to compensate for loss of earning power due to oldage, death or disability.

Congress adopted the same po icy for social security that many employers use by adopting the theory of "prior service credits." This means that the older peo-

ple were given credit for having
