## School Board Hikes Pay of Office Help-Janitors

Salary increases to school office personnel and custodians were approved by Tawas Area Board of Education at a meeting held last Thursday night.

Mrs. Ruth Minard, office bookkeeper, received a salary hike of \$166. Her employment was increased from 200 days per year to 234 days at a salary of \$3,900.

Hikes of \$100 were authorized for two office secretaries, Miss Barbara Durant and Mrs. Eunice Higgins, who now receive \$2,850 and \$2,750, respectively. Both are employed for a total of 234 days per year.

The board of education authorized a \$150 salary increase for each member of the custodial staff.

In other business, the board approved hiring of Mrs. Janice West-

phal as a fifth grade teacher.

The board authorized converting from oil heat to gas at the Tawas City Elementary Unit on an experimental basis. Cost of the conversion would be \$700. Operation of the furnace is to be studied during the next heating season with a view toward possible conversion of furnaces in the district's other two buildings.

An executive session of the board is to be held in the near future for discussion of teachers to come under provisions of the new tenure act.

High School Principal Ernest W. Jordan announced that the class schedule had been arranged next fall so as to teach physics during the first two periods each day. Objections were heard at the last meeting concerning the present policy of starting the two-hour physics course at 8:00 a. m. Some parents were of the opinion that this was a hardship due to problems in transporting students.

The board authorized offering the job of spray painting the Tawas City Elementary Unit gymnasium to George Binder.

Plans for converting the former coal bin and boiler room at the gymnasium into shower rooms are now being made by Brysselbout, Starke and Hacker, Bay City architects.

The board authorized Athletic Director Ronald Wiltse and Coach Robert McDonald to prepare plans and obtain costs for a new track.

The administration was authorized to inspect white pine trees in front of the high school and select those to be removed.

## Lumberjack Rowing Boat to World's Fair

Tony Calery, Sault Ste. Marie lumberjack, is a little worried about his reaching Detroit by Independence Day. Since leaving the Soo in his rowing canoe June 13, he has averaged only 25-40 miles per day.

"I ran into rough weather on Lake Huron and lost five days—otherwise, I could have made it easily," said Calery.

This port was one of the stops for Calery on his 2,300-mile trip down the Great Lakes to the New York World's Fair. He expects to make the trip, which will take him over the Erie Canal and Hudson River, in 80 rowing days.

After resting here last night, Calery set out in his rowboat early this morning on his way to Port

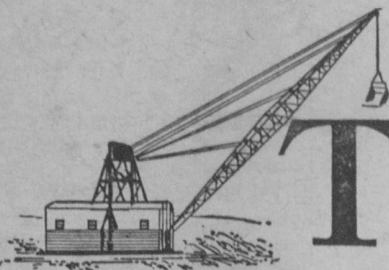
To be held at the Tawas City Park and Iosco County Building, this year's program has been expanded to two days, Saturday and Sunday, August 1-2.

## Horses Cooled Hooves in Bay After Long Trek

Eastern end of the Michigan riding and hiking trail was dedicated Sunday afternoon at the Tawas City Park.

Some 34 riders and horses, 18 of whom had made the coast-to-coast trip from Empire on Lake Michigan, participated in the program. Eight local horsemen joined the group in a parade through the Tawas.

Trail dedication speaker was Barry McGuire of Bay City, director of publicity for the East Michigan Tourist Association, who filled in during the absence of the scheduled speaker, EMTA President Ron Gamble.

McGuire congratulated the communities promoting the trail, the various chambers of commerce, outfitters and horsemen who played an important role in establishing the trail. He pointed out that credit for the success also should go to the Michigan Department of Conservation and the United States Forest Service.

McGuire predicted that the riding and hiking trail would become one of the outstanding tourist attractions in Michigan.

Riders were welcomed by Clarence King, speaking on behalf of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association. Ralph Western, president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, was master of ceremonies.

Other speakers included Norman Smith of Lansing, representing the conservation department, and James Hardy, owner of the Lost Creek Sky Ranch, Luzerne, who was instrumental in establishing the trail.

Riders started out from Empire on June 20 and completed the 170-mile trip across the Lower Peninsula to Lake Huron in nine days. At various points along the way, the group was joined by other horsemen and 34 mounted riders paraded through the Tawas Sunday afternoon.

Accompanying the group from Trails End Dude Ranch west of the Tawas were Clarence King, Eugene Klenow, Marvin, William and Gary Mallon, Gerald Hayes, Cheryl Hayes and Miss Lucy Toska, office manager of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

Roast beef sandwiches were served to participants at the park by the Tawas City Businessmen's

Association.

As a program feature, Fitch Williams of Traverse City, president of the Michigan Trail Riders Association, acted as a pony express rider. He delivered a personal message from the Traverse City Lions Club to William McCready, retiring district Lions Club president.

Over-all supervision of the trip was handled by William Hickman, Sky Valley Ranch, Kalkaska; Rex Garn, Rex Ranch, Traverse City, and Hardy.

Spectators were entertained at the park by a dance review presented by pupils of Ruth's School of Dance. Also on hand to entertain was Chief Blue Cloud (Whitney Alberts) of Oscoda.

## Water in Short Supply; Limit Use on Lawns

A critical shortage of water still exists in the Tawas this week, although officials point out that pumping facilities can keep up with the demand if city water customers use discretion in sprinkling lawns and other outdoor uses.

Last Saturday's water production at the East Tawas filtration plant reached a peak output of 1,200,000 gallons of treated water. The plant, which serves both communities, has a capacity of 1 1/2 million gallons a day.

Harold French, operator, said that the plant was operating 24 hours a day during the dry weather with an average daily output of one million gallons of treated water.

While sprinkling hours are being enforced on non-metered customers at East Tawas, restrictions have not as yet been placed on Tawas City's all metered customers.

About 45 percent of the total pumpage is purchased by Tawas City customers and about one-half of the latter amount is used by local industries.

Arthur Wegner, foreman of the Tawas City Department of Public Works, said Tuesday that approximately 49 pounds of pressure was being maintained this week on the water mains, although pressure dropped sharply Sunday.

"If people will conserve water and use discretion in lawn sprinkling, there should be an adequate supply for all," he said.

## Clerk Prescott Assails Supreme Ct. Decisions

George A. Prescott, Iosco County clerk, in announcing his candidacy for re-election, bitterly assailed the recent supreme court decision establishing new senatorial and house districts which completely ignored 17 county lines and some townships and city boundaries.

"It is diabolical gerrymandering," Prescott said. "In my 17 years as supervisor and county clerk combined I have seen centralized government proceed from little nibbles to the giant bites into local government they now take."

Prescott said he had no quarrel especially with the equal population districts theory, but that the violation of county lines and utter disregard of area interests was flagrant.

"Our courts have entered a field today," Prescott said, "where it is impossible to set limits to its interference except as should be prescribed in its own discretion. The time is now for all of us interested in the preservation of our system of government to unite in an effort to reaffirm our basic theory of separation of powers, executive, legislative and judicial branches where each should move with equal dignity in their appointed domains."

Prescott said that the authority of these three branches has until now always been coordinate, not superior or inferior. We are today obviously witnessing expressions

of impatience by the judiciary against separation of powers, our very foundation of free government, he said.

"In America," Prescott insisted, "some cases ought to be beyond the reach of judicial cognizance because the questions involved are purely political. The judiciary is the final judge of what the laws are, not the judge of what the laws should be."

Prescott called attention to the unsolicited notice given this spring to the legislature by the supreme court on procedure for establishing the new court of appeals.

"Perhaps it is time," Prescott continued, "that Michigan and other states emulate 17 of our states who have proceeded toward an United States constitutional amendment that will restore our historical balance of power theory."

"Here in Northeastern Michigan," Prescott said, "we depend for survival on tourist business, farming, resort and tavern operations with not much industry. Now under another new deal, we will travel north or south to our big cities to visit with a legislator about our problems. Our new legislators may have little time for us with their pressing problems of population growth, industry, annexation, etc."

Prescott concluded by remarking that free government is found

## Former Tawas Plant 'Booming'

A feature article in the Mariette, Wisconsin, Eagle-Star recently told of a former Michigan industrial arts school teacher who has turned the manufacture of rustic fence into a \$110,000 annual payroll at Stephenson, Upper Peninsula.

He is Harry Westrich, general manager and owner of Rustic Products Corporation. The Stephenson firm operates the year around with an average of 40 employees. Peak employment has been 65 and the lowest 24.

Westrich was a school teacher at East Tawas when he started his rustic business here, being associated with the late Charles Hamilton in the Huron Rustic Furniture Company, Tawas City. The firm made rustic lawn furniture for Sears Roebuck and Company until one day a dealer became interested in rustic fences.

"We showed the dealer some samples of a rustic fence," said Westrich, "and he returned to Chicago and ordered 20 carloads to start. We have been making fences ever since."

Westrich transferred his company from Tawas City to Stephenson in 1952 because of the need to expand and the greater amount of raw materials available in the Upper Peninsula.

Westrich, a native of Bergland, was familiar with the region before he made the move. The Sears contract has provided rustic with the bulk of its business over the years.

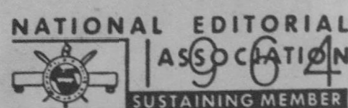
Located at the mouth of the Dime Drain in Arenac County, nine miles south of Tawas City, the new port is owned by George A. and Charles T. Prescott.

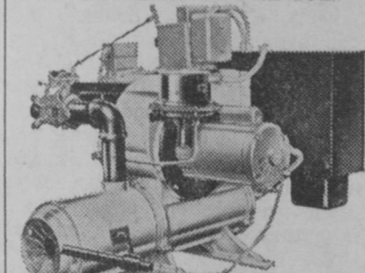

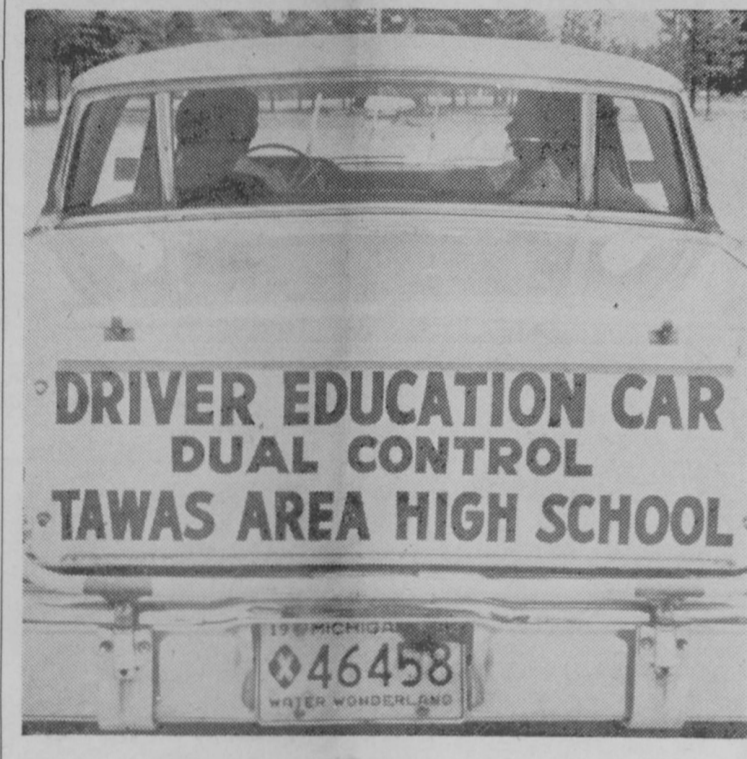

**Social Security Compensates Loss of Earning Power**

In two previous articles, it was explained the belief that the social security trust funds are in the red and that more are constantly paid out than comes in are both false notions, based on faulty information.

A third misconception is the payment of full benefits to people who have worked under social security only a short time is financially dangerous. Here, the critics fail to understand the basic concept of social legislation.

Social security was born during the depression of the 1930s. A primary concern at that time was to get purchasing power into the hands of the older people who were the first thrown out of work and would be the last rehired. Over the long pull, social security was intended to compensate for loss of earning power due to old age, death or disability.

Congress adopted the same policy for social security that many employers use by adopting the theory of "prior service credits."

This means that the older people were given credit for having worked years before social security became law.

Most employers who adopt a private pension plan give their older workers credits for years of service at no cost to the worker.

Furthermore, it should be noted that this policy was transitory, as even at this early date, it was discovered that people who have not had substantial work under social

security were not able to qualify for benefits.

Critics would have difficulty convincing these people that social security is a give away program.

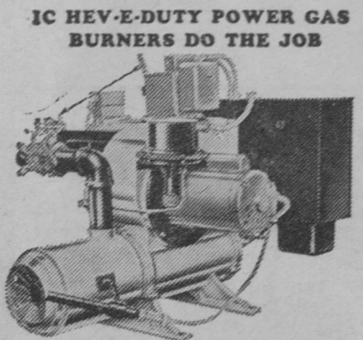

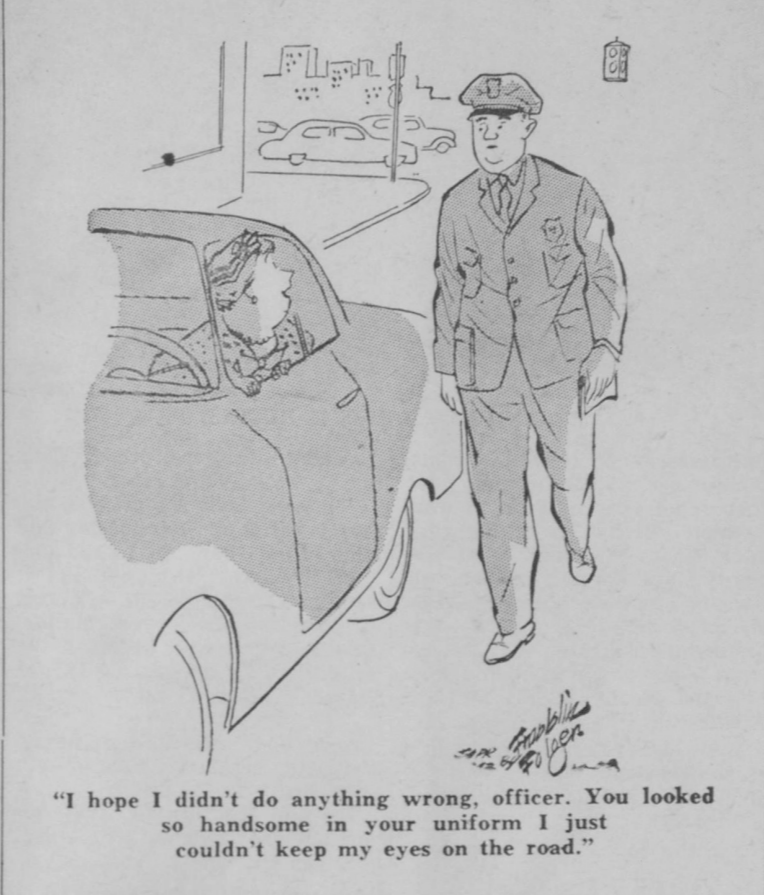

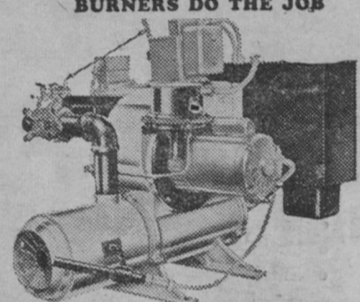
The camp opened June 21 and will end July 4. This year's enrollment of 234 high school musicians necessitated enlarging the staff to 14 from last year's nine.

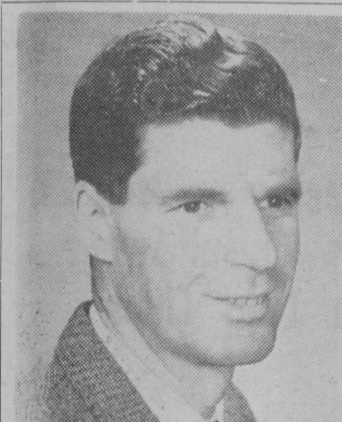

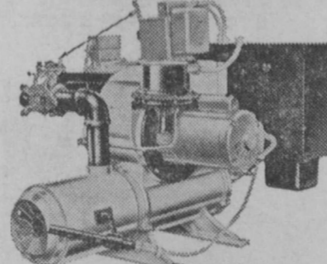

But to find so would make all law uncertain. How could the rule allowing such stop short of permitting a similar inquiry into the motives of those who passed judgment."
