They are available only to residents of Michigan 14 years and older. Full-time Conservation Department employees are not eligible. Each entry must be accompanied by a \$25 check or money order and mailed to the Department's Lansing headquarters. Aug. 10 is the deadline for postmarking applications. A drawing is scheduled later that month to determine who will receive licenses to hunt areas where applications exceed hunter quotas. License fees will be refunded to unsuccessful applicants. - Mich. 


