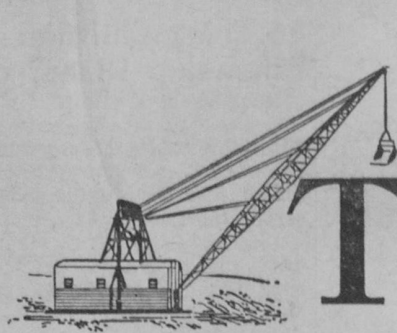

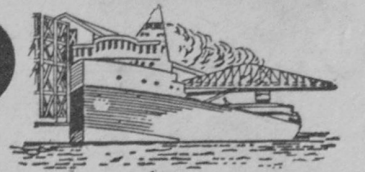

Tawas to Host 3-Day Convention of Registers

Golden anniversary convention of the Michigan Association of Registers of Deeds will be held in the Tawas from July 20, 21 and 22. Sixty registers are expected for this meeting, plus a number of past presidents and guests. About 150 persons will be in attendance. The first annual convention of the association was held at Bay City in 1914. William J. Lambert of Bay City was elected as its first president. Final reports with election and installation of officers will be held Wednesday. Tours have been arranged for the group and a style show will be staged for the ladies.

Two Injured Seriously in Auto Crashes

Two persons were seriously injured and three received minor injuries in three automobile accidents over the past week-end in Iosco County.

Most seriously injured was Peter Lloyd, 21, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, whose car overturned after leaving US-23 south of Oscoda Friday night. He is being treated at the base hospital.

Iosco Sheriff's Department officers said Lloyd was traveling south when he overtook and passed a car. The airman's auto went out of control and rolled three times. Three passengers were not injured.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said a car driven by Elmer E. Mrs. Farrand sustained a broken ankle, a crushed shoulder, crushed chest, cut on chin and cuts on the inside of her mouth.

Plaintiffs Finish Testimony in Suit Against National

Attorneys for 25 plaintiffs in a damage suit against National Gypsum Company have rested their case after six weeks of testimony before Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

National Gypsum Company attorneys opened their case today (Wednesday) for the defendants by presenting several expert witnesses. The case will be recessed during the remainder of July and August and is to resume in September.

Plaintiffs seek approximately \$400,000 in damages over operation of the Port Gypsum facility south of Tawas City. The case has been pending since September 1960.

Bottle on Beach May be Key in Student's Survey

If you find a throw-away beer bottle on the beach it probably is the remains of a beach party. On the other hand, if there is a note inside do not be surprised.

Stephen C. Wilke, Michigan State University student from Port Huron, planted 504 weighted, red-topped 12-ounce beer bottles along steamship lines from Port Huron to the Soo last week and will set 500 to 600 more afloat between Rogers City and Drummond Island in the next three weeks as part of an experiment to chart Lake Huron water currents.

Wilke, 21, and a fellow MSU student, William L. Wood, are conducting the experiment independently in reference to geological studies. He said he entered upon the summer project because of "personal interest." The other fellow will use some of the material for his thesis. We are getting no financial help from the university, but they are cooperating with us."

Last week, Wilke rode aboard a lake freighter and dispersed consecutively numbered bottles at one-half mile intervals for the length of the lake.

The bottles contain post cards to be filled out by their finders and are then to be mailed. There are blanks for the name and address of the finder and the date and place where the bottle was found.

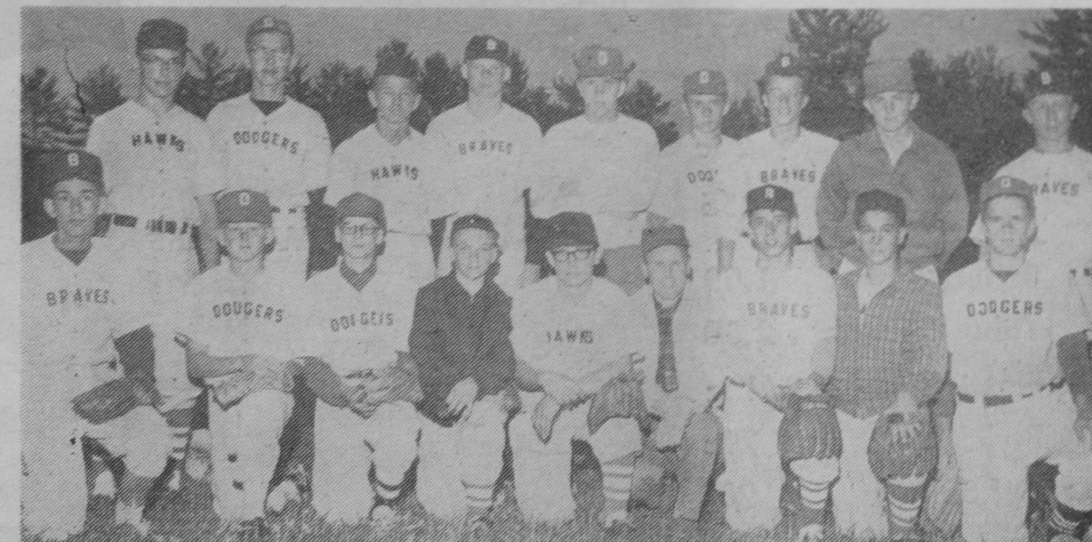

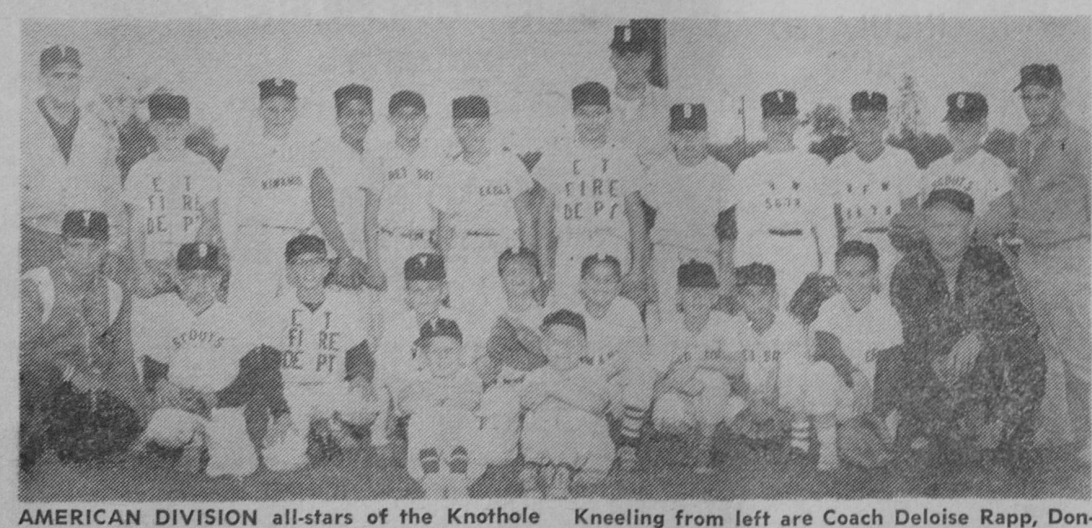

Shoreline Owners Ask Conservation Dept. for Permits

While levels of the Great Lakes and inland waters continue to ebb, conservation department offices are being flooded with requests for help to overcome effects of Michigan's prolonged rainfall shortages.

Much of the department's mail is coming from shoreline owners who seek the go-ahead for dredging channels through exposed bottom lands to give them access to receding waters. Others are planning to fill in previously submerged lands so they will have larger lots when waters return to their normal levels.

By law, permits are required from the department and United States Corps of Engineers before these projects can be undertaken on Great Lakes bottom lands.

In the case of inland waters, however, no agency has blanket authority to approve or disapprove requests. However, where dredging and filling does not pose a threat to public interests, including wildlife values, the department takes action on proposed alterations to the point of not objecting to them.

Although already overloaded with requests, the department is encouraging shoreline owners to get its advice before they start any development work.

This approach could well save them many legal headaches. It could also head off another type of problem facing the department in which waterfront owners are asking — some demanding — that unsightly conditions be cleaned up in areas bordering their shores.

Bared by low waters, these eyesores are the result of poorly-planned fills which have created pockets where debris has collected.

FORMER WHITTEMORE MAN BURIED AT LANSING

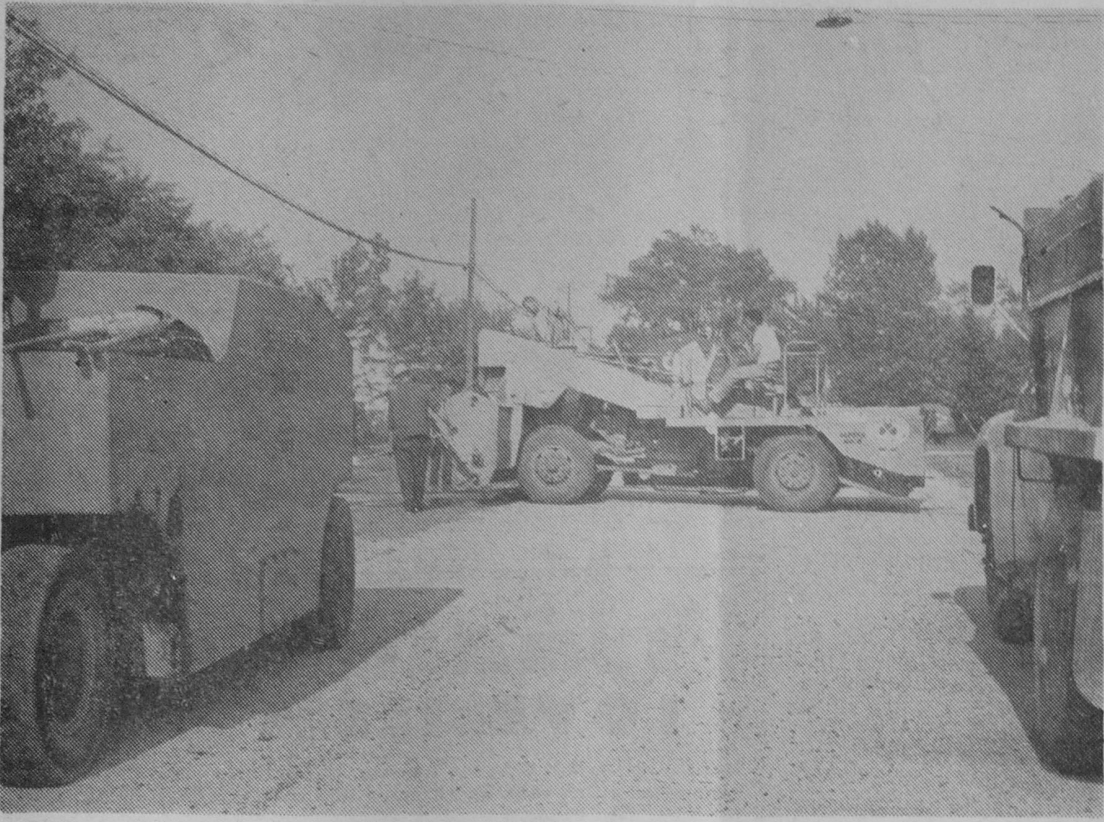

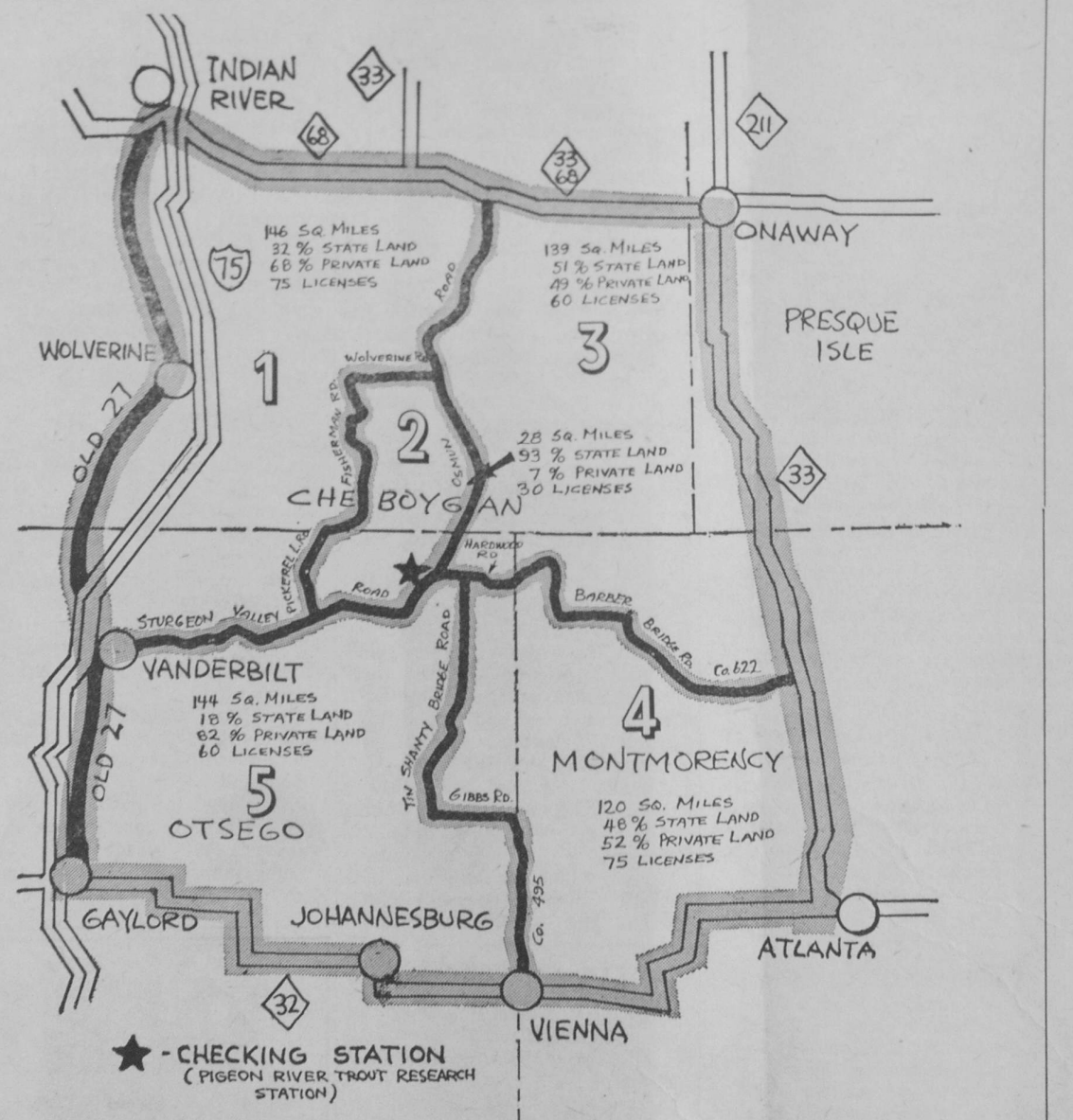

They are available only to residents of Michigan 14 years and older. Full-time Conservation Department employees are not eligible. Each entry must be accompanied by a \$25 check or money order and mailed to the Department's Lansing headquarters, Aug. 10 is the deadline for postmarking applications. A drawing is scheduled later that month to determine who will receive licenses to hunt areas where applications exceed hunter quotas. License fees will be refunded to unsuccessful applicants. — Mich.
