## Iosco to Establish New Equalization Department

Iosco, like other counties of Michigan, faces the big job of establishing a tax equalization department before 1968, according to terms of a new law passed by the recent legislature. This is only part of a far-reaching change in matters of taxation enacted by the state legislature. At last Wednesday's July session, provisions of the new law were explained to the Iosco Board of Supervisors by Fred White of the state tax commission. The major discussion centered

## Zoning Ordinance Goes to City Council

Copies of a comprehensive zoning ordinance were presented to members of the city council Monday night by the Tawas City Planning Commission.

Hugo J. Keiser, planning commission chairman, said that the ordinance was the result of four months of work with the city's planning consultant, Vilcan-Leman and Associates. It represents the commission's final version after correcting three times.

The council is to review the ordinance and discuss its provisions at a joint meeting with the planning commission and consultant on August 17. Preliminary discussion will be held by the council August 3.

Attending the meeting with Keiser were planning commission members, James Dillon and Paul Chevis.

In other business, the council accepted the low bid of Inglis Ford Sales to furnish a new city truck at a cost of \$4,491. Only other bid received was from Ottawa Equipment Company, \$4,790. The council authorized rebuilding an under-body scraper at a cost of \$450. This scraper is presently installed on one of the city's older trucks.

The council authorized installation of "stop" signs at the northwest corner of Court Street and West Street, Court Street and Birch Street and southeast corner of River Street and North Street. Two building permits read at the meeting included: Floyd Ketcherside, 629 Lake Street, eight by 13-foot extension of back porch, \$1,000; John V. Skinner, 124 Wheeler, erect 20 by 30-foot garage, \$700.

### ET Council Acts—

## Revenue Bonds Would Finance Water Meters

Legal machinery was set in motion Monday night authorizing a \$47,000 revenue bond issue to finance cost of installing water meters at East Tawas.

At a meeting of the city council, a resolution and ordinance was adopted calling for the city to make application to the municipal finance commission for issuance of revenue bonds.

The motion was approved by a three to one roll call. Voting in favor were Aldermen James DeRosia, Clifford Wilkinson and Edward Higgins. Robert Bolen cast the dissenting vote. Alderman Edward Lixey was not in attendance and Mayor Pro Tem James Campbell, sitting in for Mayor Clarence McKenzie, who is in California on business, did not vote.

The city presently has 112 metered customers and the revenue bond issue would finance installation of approximately 740 meters for the remaining customers.



Assisting with arrangements for the legal work was Julius Hanslovsky, Lansing financial consultant. In other business, the council adopted an ordinance to regulate the design, construction and installation of natural and artificial gas heating equipment and appliances. It provides for inspection and necessary permits, fees and licenses. Assisting the council with the ordinance was Frank Block, who presented a sample ordinance used at Trenton. City Police Chief Donald Docking requested information concerning a dance permit application from Jeff Regan, owner of a pool hall on Newman Street. Following an inspection of the community building after recent dances, the council adopted a recommendation from Alderman Higgins calling for a list of instructions to be prepared to guide users in regular maintenance of the building after dances and other activities. It was also suggested that users be required to deposit \$10, in addition to the regular fee, in case the service of a janitor is required. If not, the money would be returned after inspection of the building. Building applications approved during the past two weeks include: Fred Look, 10 by 12-foot utility room, \$2,000; William Tracy, new roof, \$150; Mrs. A. F. Cole, remodel, \$650; Armenia Stevens, new roof, \$190; Clarence Wager, chain link fence, \$375; Evans Furniture Company, roof repair, \$100. Two applications did not conform with the zoning ordinance and were sent to the appeal board. Permits denied included Carl Eckman, construction beyond setback line; Leonard Gottleber, construction too close to side lot line.

## All TA Teachers Under Provisions of Tenure Law

All teachers eligible to come under provisions of the new tenure law and who had signed contracts for the next school term have been offered new tenure contracts by the Tawas Area Board of Education.

This action took place following discussion during an executive session of the board Monday night.

The board adopted a contract recommended by the Michigan Association of School Boards and a professional problems committee of the school faculty which had studied the new law for several weeks.

In other business, the school administration was directed to obtain bids on the purchase of oil, gasoline, milk and bakery products. Bids are to be opened at the August 10 meeting.

## County Establishes New AuSable Park

Iosco Board of Supervisors has entered into a use agreement with the Michigan Department of Conservation for operation of a 10-acre picnic and fishing site on the side of the AuSable River mouth in AuSable Township.

To be completed early next spring, the recreational site will be managed by the board's conservation committee of Charles Smith, Edward Lixey, Edward Nelkie and Robert LaVoy.

A boat ramp is to be constructed there this fall and the United States Corps of Engineers is to build a four-foot wide catwalk on the south side of the river. AuSable Township is to seal-coat a road leading to the site.

This will become Iosco's second park in the Oscoda-AuSable area. At present, Iosco operates the highly profitable Old Orchard Park along the bank of the AuSable River northwest of Oscoda.

## Finalize Plans for Iosco Fair; Starts July 29

Preparations are now being finalized for the annual Iosco County Fair which opens at Hale July 29 and runs through August 2.

Gerald Bellen, Whitemore, president of the Iosco County Fair Society, reports this year's program should prove to be entertaining to visitors of all ages.

A large midway with thrilling rides will be featured throughout the four days of activities. There will also be the usual farm and stock exhibits and a light weight pony pulling exhibit on Thursday, July 30, will be a new addition this year. The pony pulling contest will be held at 2:00 p. m. and is open to horses 46 inches high or under. Ten places will share in a \$250 prize.

Plainfield Township Community Building will be the scene of farm produce exhibits, home economics displays and domestic arts. It will also serve as a center for displays from area 4-H Clubs.

Harness racing will be held Friday, Saturday and Sunday with prize money for 1964 totaling \$18,000. Fourteen events are listed on the schedule.

Contests for children and parade will be held Saturday, August 1.

Other features include a dance Saturday night, August 1. The Jerry Boesnecker Band of Saginaw will be present to entertain young and old.

"I can only say that the 1964 fair will have something of interest for everyone," emphasized Robert Ruckle, Hale, secretary-manager. "Everyone in Iosco and surrounding counties is invited and urged to attend."

Area auto and implement dealers wishing free exhibit space in connection with the midway are to make application this week with Mr. Ruckle.

## Detroit Admits B&E at Whitemore Hardware Sunday

A Detroit man, accused by police as the bold burglar who broke into Furst and Charters Hardware at Whitemore Sunday afternoon, was bound over to circuit court on arraignment here Tuesday morning.

Arrested by Detroit authorities on authorization of a warrant from Iosco County was Richard Rybinski. Undersheriff Leon Putname and Deputy Robert Langlois returned him to this county Monday.

Two Whitemore brothers, Roy and Ray Pagel, were driving along M-65 in Whitemore about 5:00 p. m. when they spotted a man carrying several guns leave the hardware. They noted the license number of the man's small foreign automobile and notified the sheriff's department.

On receipt of a registration check at Lansing, Detroit authorities were authorized to apprehend Rybinski as owner of the car. Officers said he fit the description given by the two Whitemore men.

About \$450 in firearms is missing from the hardware, including an expensive big game rifle. None have been recovered.

The 24-year-old Detroitier admitted the break-in and told officers he threw two rifles and a shotgun into the Detroit River. Authorities were to attempt recovery of the weapons.

Officers said that the burglar used a heavy bar to pry open the front door. In the process, the plate glass shattered. The highway was crowded with summer traffic, but the Pagel brothers were apparently the only persons to spot the burglar or notify authorities.

Officers said that as far as can be determined, Rybinski has no previous record of arrest.

This is the third time in the past six months that Furst and Charters has been the victim of a burglary. More than \$2,000 in cash was taken from a safe in the grocery last February and about \$500 was taken from the hardware last April. One other burglary was recorded there in December 1962.

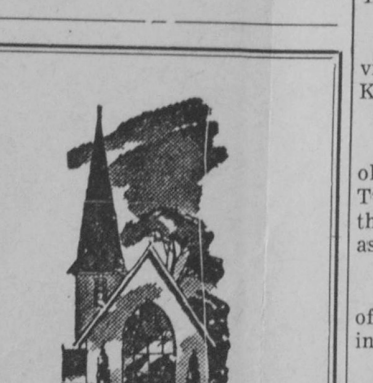

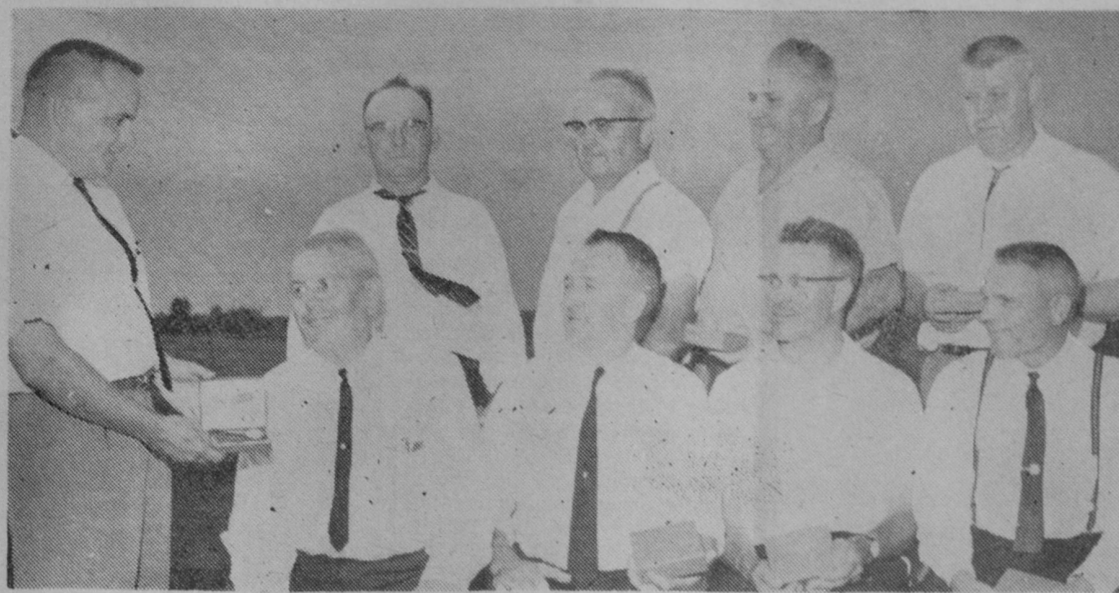

# An Open Letter

TO THE

I have been asked by many people in the last few weeks just WHY I am running for sheriff. I am happy to make my answer public.

**FIRST:** There is a big job to be done for law enforcement in Iosco County. I know from first hand experience. I have been a Justice of the Peace in Tawas City for the past two years, and I have not liked a lot of the things I have seen. Here are some examples.

The sheriff is paid to keep prisoners in jail—not out. On many occasions, I have seen committed inmates on the streets when they were supposed to be in jail.

On many occasions, so-called "trusties" answer the police telephone at the sheriff's office and sit behind the jail desk as if they are officers on duty. In fact, the jail and the inmates in it are frequently left with no one in charge but these "trusties." If they have keys to the cells, this is bad, and if they do not, the Fire Marshal would be interested to know who does have them. This is a bad situation no matter how you look at it.

Perhaps most scandalous of all is the dog-pound. How many of you have seen it? It is filthy and inhumane. It is a disgrace to the County. Dogs, male and female, puppies, cats, and what have you, are all thrown (yes thrown) into a shabby dirty hole, part basement, and part old wooden building, held there a few days, and if still alive, shot with either pistols, rifles or shot-guns like so many fish in a barrel and hauled away to be buried or just thrown on the town dump. Animals must be controlled and occasionally disposed of. It is part of the Sheriff's job, but there is a humane way of doing it.

**SECONDLY:** I can do the job. I am a World War II veteran, I attended the Michigan State Police Training School, a former Tawas City Police Officer, and presently a Justice of the Peace in Tawas City. I know what needs to be done and how to do it.

**THIRD:** As a citizen, I believe the law should be respected, not ridiculed and all too often I have seen some of our local Deputies conducting themselves in a way that encourages little respect for the law, and in fact, often bringing ridicule to it. This can be changed, and now is the time for the change.

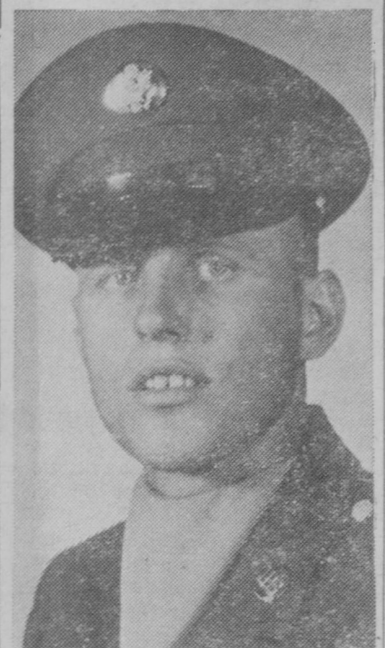
## STEVEN V. POPPE

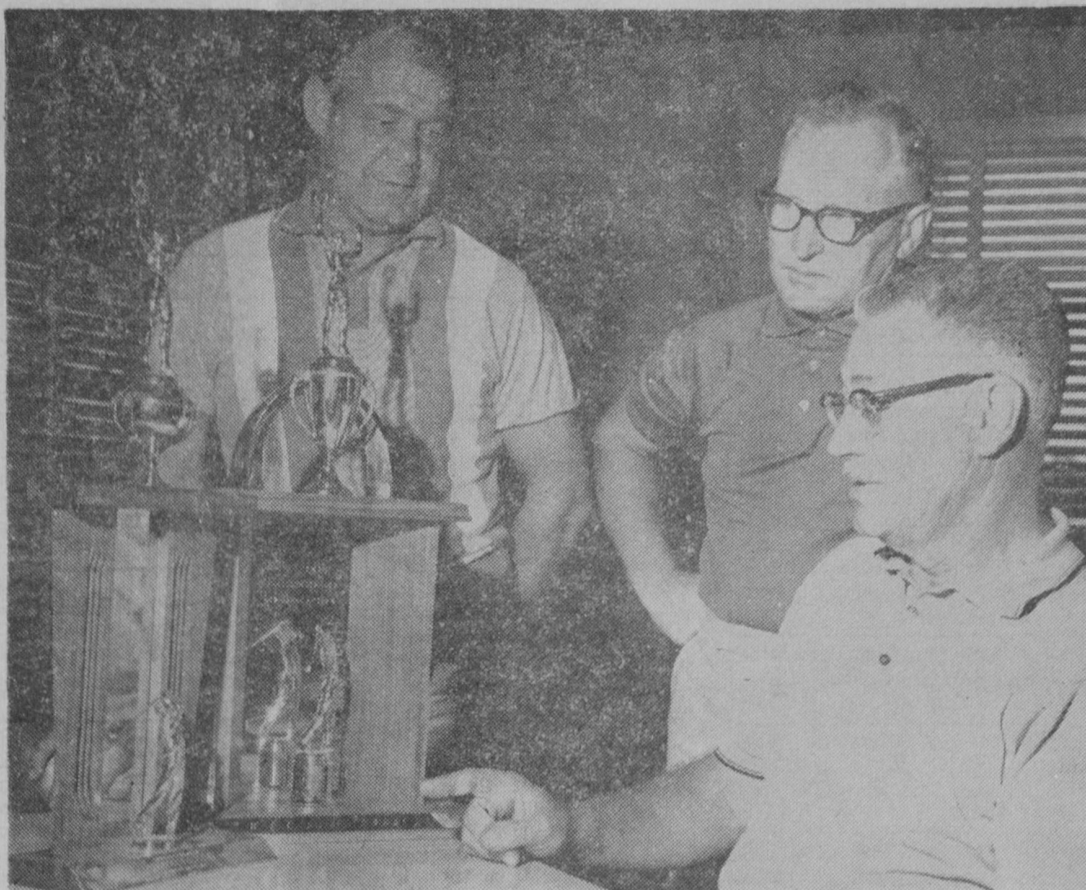
