Complains Dog Was Abandoned

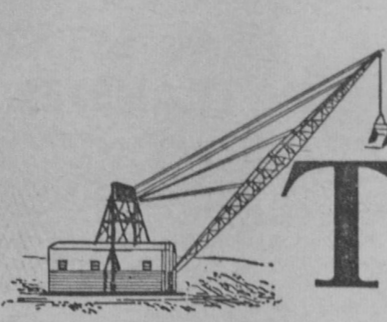

D&M Withdraws Rail Abandonment Petition

Detroit and Mackinac Railway announced last week that it had withdrawn its request to abandon 40 miles of track between Posen and Cheboygan. The announcement followed closely news that the railroad ferry, Chief Wawatam, was again plying the Straits of Mackinac under its own steam.

Other railroads still seeking abandonment are the Pennsylvania, New York Central and Michigan Central. The abandonment petitions filed earlier this year followed a request by the Mackinac Transportation Company to end ferry service as unprofitable after the coast guard ordered the boat repaired or removed from service as unsafe. The Chief Wawatam is owned by the Pennsylvania, New York Central and Soo Line Railroads.

Communities of the northern half of the Lower Peninsula have been waging an all-out fight to block the abandonments, which state economists say would be disastrous. Michigan Attorney General Frank Kelley obtained an injunction to keep the ferry going.

A hearing is to be held today (Wednesday) at Cheboygan on petitions of other railroads. "We sincerely hope that this action of the Detroit and Mackinac Railroad will spark an interest in the other railroads involved in taking similar actions to withdraw their applications," said Kelley.

In its announcement that it was withdrawing its petition, the D&M

spokesman said "after further consideration, and in view of being locally-owned and therefore vitally interested in the northern part of Michigan, it has decided to rely on the future growth of the area." Onaway and Cheboygan business-civic leaders greeted news of the D&M withdrawing its petition with pleasure. It means that the area will be assured of at least one rail link southward.

The railroad plans to continue its application to abandon another stretch of track, however, the 8.1 mile branch line from Omer to Au Gres. A hearing on the Au Gres branch abandonment was held Monday and Tuesday at Bay City.

Good Results in Miller's Signature Campaign

The signature campaign of Judge Allan C. Miller for appeals court now has crossed the halfway point. Judge Miller reports he has 2,905 signatures from 34 counties to date. This includes 540 from Iosco County with many local circulators nearing completion of their petitions. The goal is 4,423 signatures by July 15.

The highest return is from Alpena County with 600 signatures. Petitions have been returned from St. Joseph and Cass on the south to Iron and Menominee in the north.

Leonard Sarki Succeeds Look as Board Chief

Leonard Sarki, who has served the past four years as a trustee on the Tawas Area Board of Education, was named president Monday night at the board's annual re-organizational meeting.

Sarki, a graduate of Alabaster High School and salesman for National Gypsum Company, succeeds William Look as the board of education's top officer. Other officers re-elected were Walter Niles, secretary, and Harold Hammond, treasurer. Presidential appointments were Walter Champion, president pro tem, and Mrs. Helen Payea, secretary pro tem. Waldo Curry and Clyde Sooper are trustees.

During the regular business session, the board adopted a continuing tenure contract recommended by the Michigan Association of School Boards and the professional problems committee of the Tawas Area School faculty. The board is to hold an executive session July 20 to carry through on the formation of a tenure committee and discussion of teachers who are to be tendered new contracts under terms of the tenure program.

In other business, the board named the Peoples State Bank as its official depository. Regular meeting date was set for the second Monday of each month at 8:00 p. m. Regular special meetings are held the fourth Monday of each month.

Would Honor Late 'Cap' Blumer With Student Loan Fund

A student loan fund, dedicated to the memory of the late Casper Blumer, former Alcona and Iosco extension agent, has been started to assist worthy young people to further education.

"In order to provide the necessary money for the Casper Blumer Memorial Fund, we are asking his friends to pledge any amount of money they desire," states Iosco County Extension Director Marvin Davenport. Pledges are due on or before September 30.

Students are to be selected from the three counties which "Cap" served—Iosco, Ogemaw and Alcona. They will become eligible to apply for assistance after demonstrating their ability by satisfactorily completing at least one term or semester at the college or university of their choice.

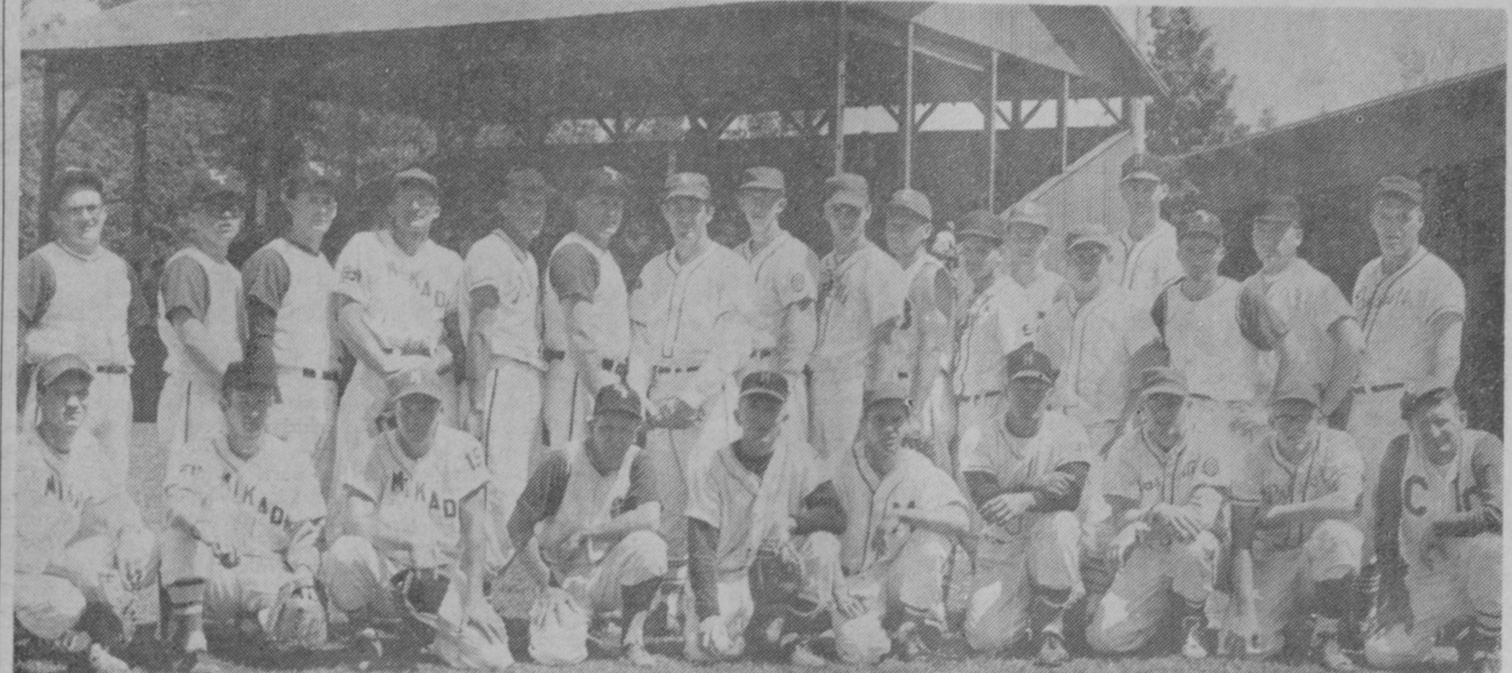

Improper Notice Given; TC Council to Set New Hearing

Rescheduling of a hearing to air objections of a controversial building application has been postponed by the Tawas City Council until such time as city fathers may meet with the planning commission and its professional consultants.

This action was taken at Monday night's council meeting following long discussion concerning a building application recently approved for Joseph Brooks, which allowed an addition to a frame net storage building in the Second Ward.

Although approved June 15 by the council, sitting as a zoning appeal board, the permit was never issued as officials of the planning commission pointed out that legal steps to hold such a hearing were not followed—adjacent property owners had not been notified.

Last year, on recommendation of the planning commission, the council rezoned the property in question from industrial to residential A. It was once the mill yard of Huron Rustic Furniture Company.

Members of the planning commission strongly protested what they called the "complete reversal of policy" councilmen had made when rezoning the property, "showing a complete disregard for the principles of zoning in spite of planning commission recommendations and that of the consulting firm."

Stating that the action had denied residents of this residential A district the protection which zoning should have afforded them, the planning commission letter stated that "many of the problems in the city today would not be problems if previous councils had adhered more closely to the present zoning and not issued special permits or allowed conditions to occur and exist contrary to the zoning laws of the city."

The commission letter said there was some question in the

minds of members as to what the city council sees as the long range use for this area of the city. "This is of particular importance at this time as the planning commission is currently involved in the preparation of a future master plan and a new zoning ordinance. Council action has been most confusing for it must be obvious that, while planning is for future development, it must start in the present," said the letter.

It has been the contention of Mayor George Tuttle and some council members that each case must be decided individually. In this case, it was pointed out, in addition to the building would permit the owner to store nets and other fishing equipment, thus lessening the complaints of neighbors.

"I am not going to argue whether council action was right or wrong," said Mayor Tuttle. "According to the present zoning ordinance, if the general character of a neighborhood is not altered, a permit may be granted. The council did what it is legally entitled to do."

Alderman Earl Davis pointed out that the building was allowed under a non-conforming use and that the property had originally been zoned industrial. He stressed the need for additional storage space in Brooks' commercial fishing operation.

William Borosch, Tawas City reator who sold the property to Brooks, was present and asked the question: "Why the big red hot fire at this time?" Borosch said the owner was only trying to alleviate complaints by storing equipment under one roof.

"It all boils down to one thing," said Alderman Howard Hatton. "When you try to eliminate a non-

conforming use, you cannot allow someone to add new construction to a building, furthering the non-conforming use for 30 to 40 years."

Keiser said the planning commission was to meet soon to outline a complete change of city ordinance, but said there was now a question if such a meeting was needed if planning commission recommendations were not followed.

Mayor Tuttle said that the council probably would disagree with some of the ordinances and that the commission should not expect 100 percent endorsement. "If you do not go along with our thinking, we will have to change them," said Keiser in regard to the proposed new ordinances.

Unanimous action of the council postponed the hearing until after meeting with the planning commission and Vilcan-Leman and Associates, planning consultants. The meeting has been tentatively set for August 17.

Do Not 'Crowd' Fire Trucks, Warns Roti

A minor property damage accident last Tuesday involving a car driven by a Flint girl and a Tawas City fire truck drew a word of warning from Police Chief Frank Roti that motorists should give the right-of-way to emergency vehicles.

Miss Terry LaFlame, 16, and several companions spotted the Tawas City fire truck as it traveled along Monument Road. The girl turned her car onto the Tawas City dump road when the fire truck turned off.

The Flint girl became excited when a second truck pulled in behind and she mired her car in the sand. The left rear fender of her car was nicked by the fire truck.

Motorists are required to maintain a distance of at least 500 feet from a fire truck, said Roti. "It is dangerous to follow fire trucks on narrow roads as the private driver may hinder the operation of the fire department," he warned.

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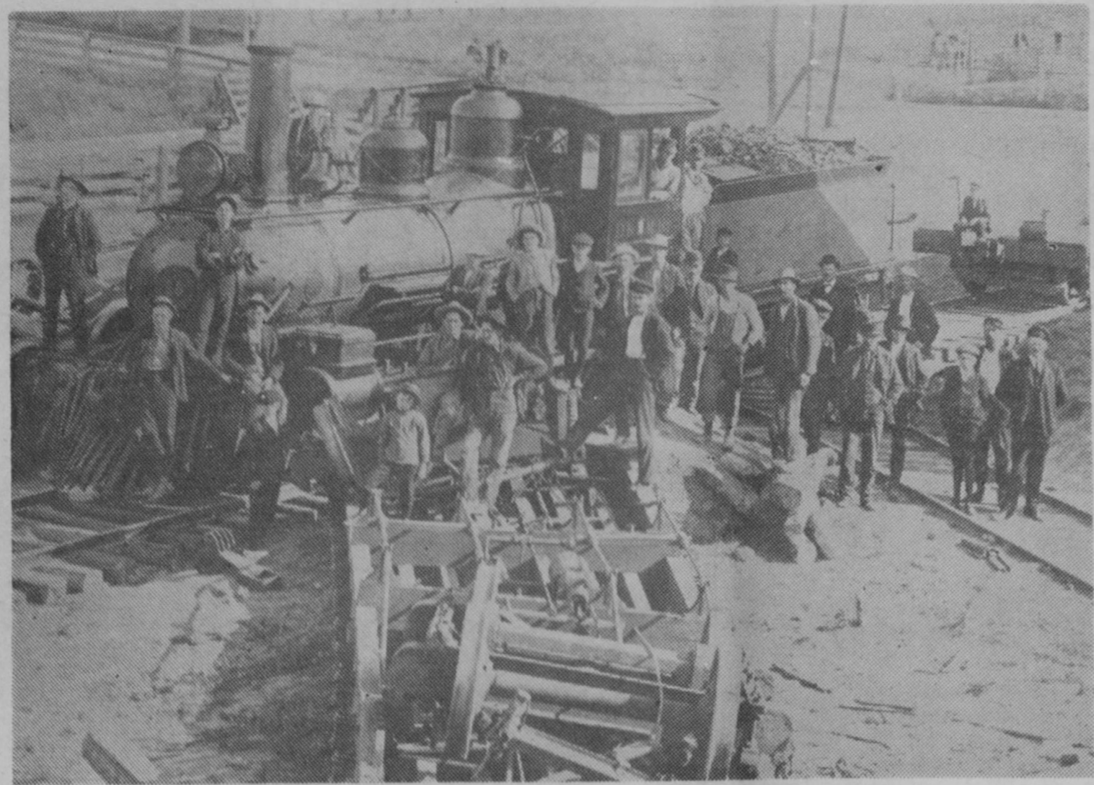
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ANNOUNCEMENT last week that the Detroit and Mackinac Railway had withdrawn its petition to abandon 40 miles of track between Posen and Cheboygan recalls a dramatic incident of 60 years ago. On Sunday, June 25, 1904, there occurred at Cheboygan one of the battles that marked the development of railroads everywhere. The line had received permission from Cheboygan authorities to enter the city, but to reach its depot site it had to cross the Michigan Central. The latter objected strenuously and for a long time successfully fought it off. On June 26, 2,000 persons gathered at the scene of the disputed crossing, where the Michigan Central had shoved some cars over the crossing spot. A large group of D&M employees were on hand to pick up the quarrel. Armed with a court injunction and with Cheboygan citizens assisting, cars were turned over, crossing cleared and the line was built over the MC right-of-way. Central employees took on a menacing attitude, but 24 were jailed. Tension relaxed when the townsfolk backed the D&M and everyone posed for the above picture. Among ex-railroaders here who recall the incident is Joseph Stepanki of Tawas City, who, as a young boy, accompanied the locomotive above which took the special "diamond" crossing to Cheboygan under the cover of darkness. Eugene Hanson of East Tawas helped to fashion the crossing from steel rails at the Tawas shops.—Photo from The Tawas Herald Collection.

Hook, Line and Rod



Since the dawning days of his being, man has been caught up by the haunting challenge of that "special" fish, using many tricks in a bid to outsmart this great tempter which still lies somewhere in the deep. As early as 8000 years ago, man began to make inventions to help his cause, including the gorge and the hook and line which were unique in that they gave the fish some choice of whether he got himself caught or not. Other inventions, such as harpoons and nets, were designed to take fish unaware. The fishing rod was first found on a depiction in Egypt (top left), dated at about 2000 B.C. It was probably much older than this date. About 950 B.C., the first cane pole appeared, apparently made from a plant called Calamus, a member of the reed family. In those times, the fish line was made of braided horsehair or flax; barbed hooks were bronze and other metal. The ancients were quite good at using artificial flies. By about 1500, the age of rules and sportsmanship had come to fishing in England, and long, limber rods of 18 to 22-foot length were used to play fish on light tackle. By 1676, with the invention of the reel, these long rods gave way to rods which compared more closely with present lengths.

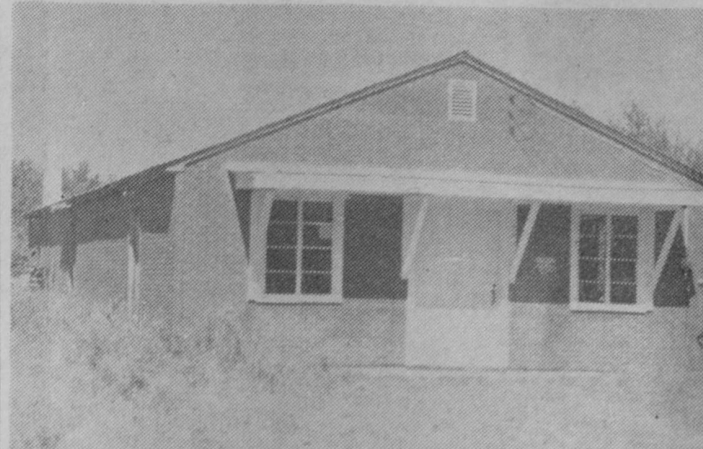

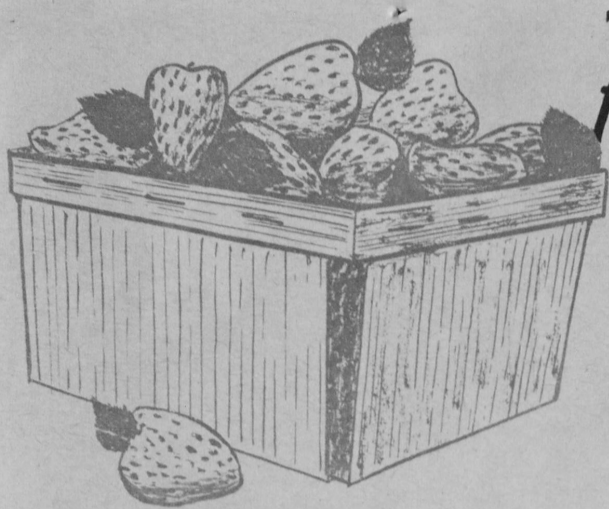

Pick A Peck of Berries

A combination of beautiful colors, strange shapes, and luscious tastes make us think of the berry season. Listed as small fruits, we find the blueberry, strawberry, huckleberry, gooseberry, and currant; as well as the bramble berry, the blackberry, and the raspberry.

Fruit has history that is fascinating. Let's examine the strawberry to see how it has become such a colorful part of our present day menu. This berry thrives best in cool climates and is found all the way from Chili, in South America, northward through the United States. As a wild berry, it was given the scientific name of *Fragaria*. *Fraga* in Latin means fragrance, hence the name of the strawberry.

These fruits were first listed in recipes in England in the 16th century. At this time they had been transferred from their wild state into the domestic gardens. Early settlers brought them to the United States, and they were crossed with the existing wild berries in Virginia. The results are the berries we use on our tables today.

We find them in many recipes throughout our country. Easy to prepare, colorful, and delicious, a favorite such as

SUNSET FARM PLUM RUM JAM

$3\frac{1}{2}$ cups plums, chopped fine $\frac{1}{4}$ bottle pectin
 $\frac{1}{2}$ cup lemon juice $\frac{1}{4}$ cup good dark rum
 $7\frac{1}{2}$ cups sugar

Combine plums, lemon juice, and sugar in a kettle; boil hard for 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Then add pectin and rum; stir at intervals for 5 minutes. Pour into jam jars.



STRAWBERRY CREAM CHEESE PIE

1 baked 9-inch pie shell or cookie crumb crust 1 package (3-oz.) cream cheese
 $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups (15-oz. can) sweetened condensed milk 2 eggs, separated
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup lemon juice 4 tablespoons sugar
 1 cup sliced strawberries, with whole berries for garnish

Put sweetened condensed milk and lemon juice in bowl and stir until mixture thickens. Beat cream cheese, softened to room temperature, until smooth. Add one egg yolk at a time, beating after each addition. Add fruit and mix well. Fold cream cheese mixture into sweetened condensed milk mixture and pour into pastry shell. Garnish with meringue made of egg whites and sugar or with whipped cream. Add strawberries for decoration.

2½ cups milk
½ teaspoon salt
1 envelope (1 tablespoon) gelatin
¼ cup cold water
1 egg, slightly beaten
¼ cup sugar
¼ teaspoon nutmeg
1 tablespoon lemon juice*
1 cup whipping cream
Blueberry Hard Sauce

Combine packaged pre-cooked rice, 1½ cups of the milk, and the salt in a large heavy saucepan. Bring to a full boil, uncovered. Cover; remove from heat. Let stand about 5 minutes, fluffing occasionally with a fork.

Meanwhile soften gelatin in cold water. Combine egg, sugar, nutmeg, remaining 1 cup milk, and the softened gelatin. Add slowly to rice, mixing well. Cook and stir over low heat until mix-

ture coats a dry metal spoon. Remove from heat. Stir in lemon juice. Chill until slightly thickened.

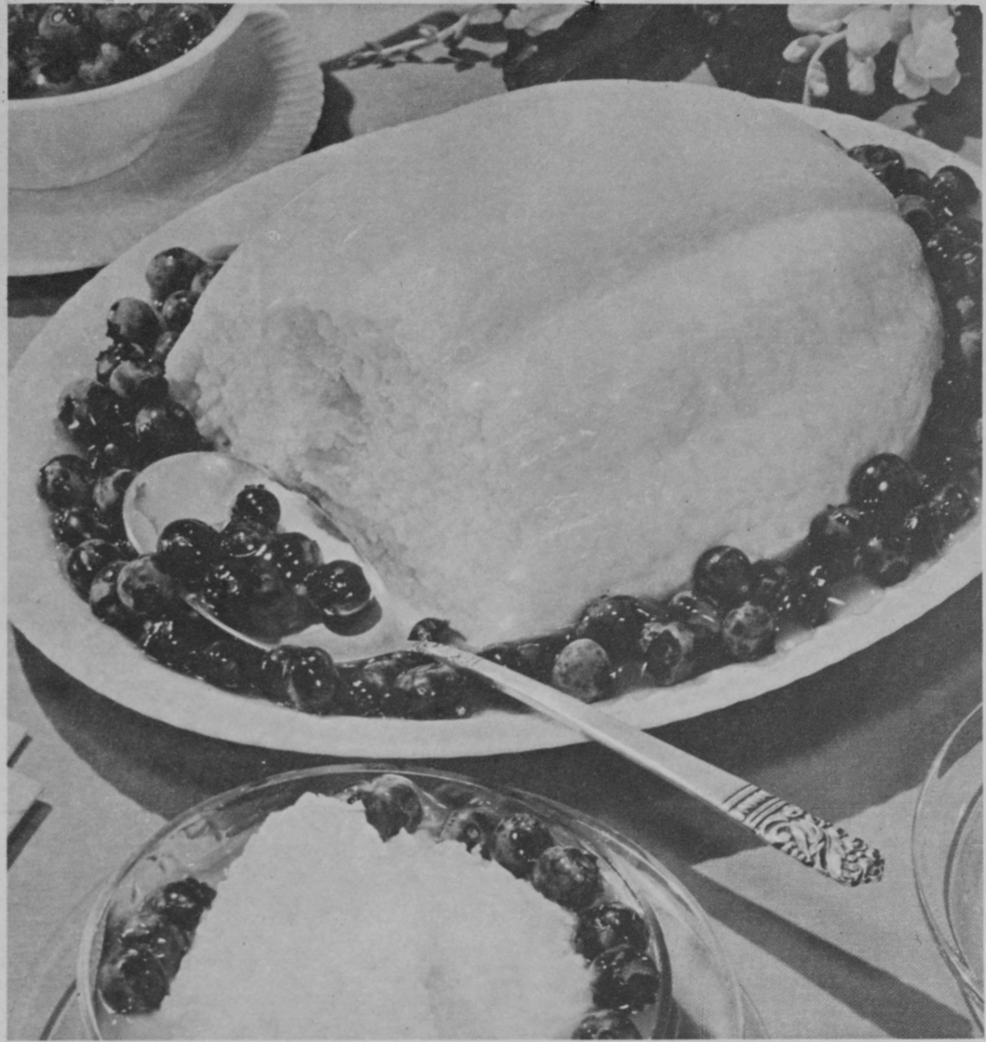
Then whip cream and fold into rice mixture. Spoon into buttered 1½-quart mold. Chill until firm. Unmold and serve with Blueberry Hard Sauce. Serves 8.

*Or use 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Blueberry Hard Sauce

½ cup butter
1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar
¼ teaspoon grated lemon rind
Dash of cloves
½ cup fresh blueberries

Cream butter, add sugar gradually, continuing to cream until light and fluffy. Add lemon rind, cloves and fresh blueberries. Chill before serving. Makes 1½ cups.



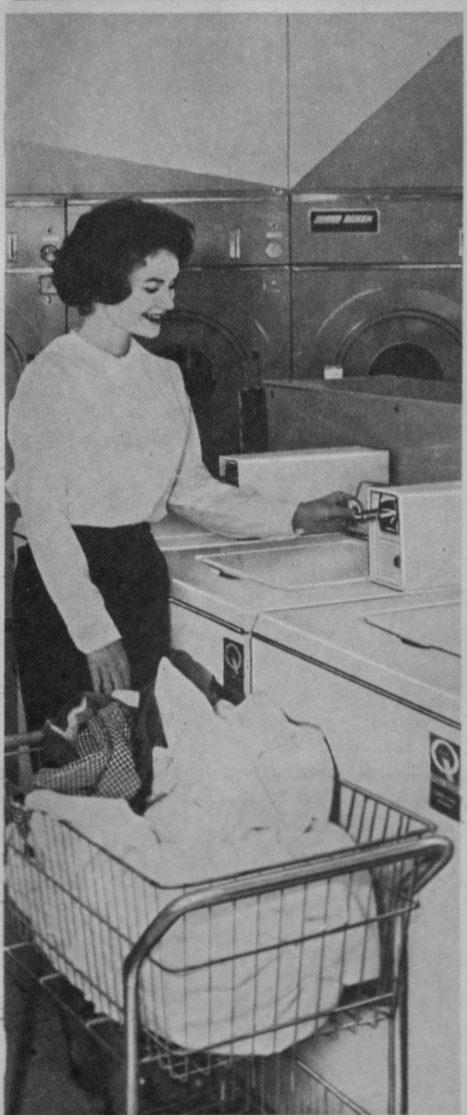
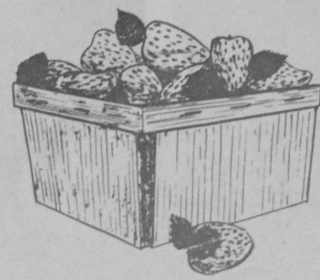
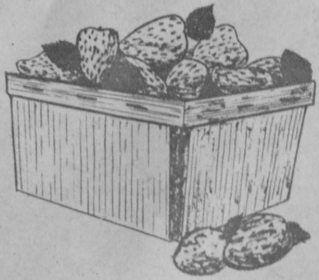

RASPBERRY-RHUBARB CONSERVE

Yield: about 11 medium glasses (5½ lbs. conserve)
4 cups prepared fruit (about 1 lb. red-stalked rhubarb and 1 quart fully ripe red raspberries) ½ cup seedless raisins ½ cup chopped almonds 6 cups sugar ½ bottle liquid fruit pectin

First, prepare the fruit. Slice thin or chop (do not peel) about 1 pound red-stalked rhubarb. Add ¼ cup water and simmer, covered, until rhubarb is soft—about 1 minute. Crush about 1 quart fully ripe red raspberries. Combine fruits and measure 4 cups into a very large saucepan. Add the raisins and chopped almonds to the fruit in the saucepan.

Then make the conserve. Add the sugar to the fruit in the saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil, and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and at once stir in fruit pectin. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glasses. Cover at once with ¼ inch hot paraffin.

MAINE BLUEBERRY GRIDDLE CAKES

2 eggs 1 teaspoon salt
2 cups buttermilk 2 teaspoons sugar
1 teaspoon soda 4 tablespoons melted butter
2 cups flour 1 cup fresh blueberries or frozen blueberries, thawed and drained
2 teaspoons baking powder

Beat eggs and add buttermilk mixed with soda. Sift flour, baking powder, salt, and sugar into this mixture; then pour in melted butter. Fold blueberries into batter and fry on a hot griddle.

HUCKLEBERRY MUFFINS

1 cup huckleberries 4 teaspoons baking powder
2 cups flour 1 cup milk
½ cup shortening 1 egg

Wash and drain huckleberries and sprinkle with ½ teaspoon flour. Sift dry ingredients and cut in shortening. To this add milk and beaten egg. Stir floured berries in quickly; don't mash them. Bake in hot greased muffin pans for 20 minutes in a modern oven. (Blueberries can be substituted.)

STRAWBERRY ALMOND PANCAKES

4 small packages (3oz. each) cream cheese 2 cups sliced and sugared strawberries
¼ cup sugar 1 tablespoon lemon juice
1½ tablespoons grated lemon peel ¼ cup sliced almonds
3 tablespoons lemon juice ¼ teaspoon almond extract
16 French pancakes

Beat softened cream cheese with sugar, lemon peel, and lemon juice until light and fluffy. Put 2 tablespoons of the filling on each pancake and roll. Place, seam side down, in shallow baking pan. Chill until serving time, then heat in a hot oven (400°) just until pancakes are hot.

Combine strawberries, lemon juice, almonds, and almond extract. Heat or not as desired (contrast of hot pancakes and cold strawberries is very pleasant). Spoon over filled pancakes and serve at once.

Summertime is travel time. Where shall it be this year . . . North? South? East? West? If only you could tour the whole country!

Of course, there's one answer. If you can't go, you can at least make these trips with foods.

Add a few sea shells on your table, a bit of net, candles in old bottles and you can almost believe you're in a sleepy, old cafe beside the ocean. What will you order? Fish, of course! How about a big baked fish, stuffed with sour cream and dill? If you haven't tried this combination before, you'll want to. The Scandinavians have done it for years.

If you want to keep the fish tail beautiful, dip a cloth in butter and cover it. This keeps the tail from becoming crisp and brittle.

Overbaking toughens the "catch", so remember, as soon as the fish flakes easily with a fork, it's done.

Like to go South? Yams are favorites here. Why not stop for a breakfast of bacon, eggs, juice, and Yam Nut Muffins?

1 cup crushed pineapple
1/2 cup lemon juice
Boiling water
2 packages lime gelatin
2 tablespoons grated lemon rind
2 cups cottage cheese

1 cup finely diced celery
1 teaspoon prepared horseradish
(can use 2 teaspoons if flavor is desired)
3/4 cup California walnuts, chopped
1/2 teaspoon salt

Drain syrup from pineapple; add lemon juice to syrup and enough boiling water to make three cups liquid. Add gelatin; stir until dissolved. Chill until syrupy. Spoon about 1 1/2 cups syrupy gelatin into bowl and fold in pineapple, walnuts, and lemon rind. Pour into a 1 1/2 quart ring mold rinsed in cold water. Chill until firm. Keep remaining gelatin at room temperature, and when it's firm, beat until fluffy and blend in cottage cheese, celery, horseradish and salt. Spoon over layer in mold. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serve with Banana Walnut Dressing.

Banana Walnut Dressing

1/2 cup mayonnaise
1 banana, mashed
1/2 cup chopped California walnuts

3 tablespoons heavy cream
1 tablespoon lemon juice

Mix thoroughly in small bowl. Makes 1 cup dressing.

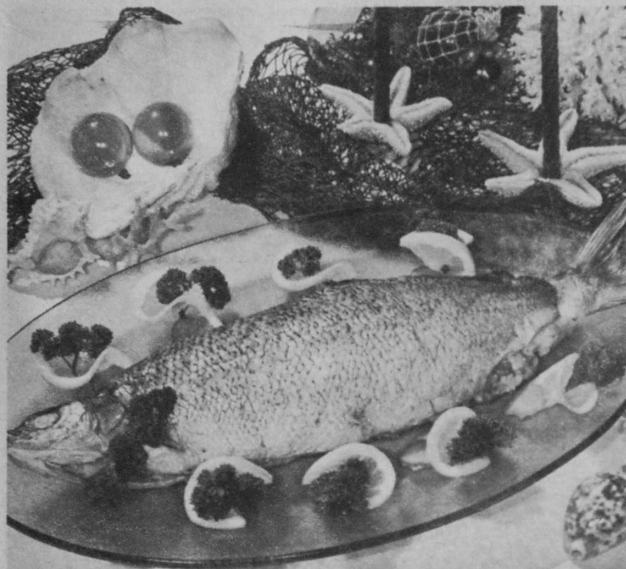

| 2 4½-ounce cans deveined shrimp | 2 cups canned tomatoes |
| 2 slices bacon, chopped | 1 bay leaf |
| ¼ cup shortening | 1 teaspoon thyme |
| 4 cups cut fresh okra or | 1 teaspoon salt |
| 2 boxes frozen cut okra, thawed | ¼ teaspoon cayenne pepper |

Drain and rinse shrimp. Fry bacon until almost crisp. Add shortening and okra. Fry okra until it appears dry. Add onion, garlic, tomatoes, and seasonings. Cover and cook 10 minutes over medium-low heat. Add shrimp; heat. Serve over rice. Makes 6 servings.



BAKED FISH WITH SOUR CREAM STUFFING

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| 1 4-pound pike, perch or white-fish, split and boned | 1 tablespoon chopped dill pickle |
| ½ teaspoon salt | 1 teaspoon paprika |
| 1 2-ounce can sliced mushrooms, drained | ½ teaspoon salt |
| ½ cup diced onion | ¼ teaspoon pepper |
| ¼ cup (½ stick) butter or margarine | 3 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted |
| 2 cups dry bread cubes | Lemon slices |
| 1 cup dairy sour cream | Dill pickle slices |
| | Parsley |

Scale fish and cut off fins; wash and pat dry. Place on shallow baking pan which has been lined with foil and buttered. Sprinkle inside of fish with salt. Sauté mushrooms and onion in butter. Blend with bread cubes. Add sour cream, pickle, paprika, salt and pepper. Pack stuffing lightly in fish. Fasten opening with picks or skewers and lace with string. Brush fish with melted butter. Bake in preheated 350° oven approximately 50 minutes to 1 hour, basting with butter. Remove fish from baking sheet onto platter. Garnish with lemon slices, dill pickle slices and parsley. Serves 6.



LOUISIANA YAM NUT MUFFINS

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|---|----------------------------------|
| 1½ cups flour | 2 eggs, well beaten |
| 1 teaspoon salt | ¾ cup milk |
| 2 tablespoons firmly-packed brown sugar | 1¼ cups mashed cooked yams |
| 3 teaspoons baking powder | ¼ cup melted butter or margarine |
| ½ cup coarsely chopped California walnuts | Cinnamon |
| | Granulated sugar |

Sift flour, salt, brown sugar and baking powder together. Add walnuts and mix well. In a bowl, combine eggs, milk, butter or margarine; mix well. Add yam mixture to dry ingredients all at once and mix only until all ingredients are combined. Fill greased muffin pans two-thirds full. Sprinkle lightly with cinnamon and granulated sugar. Bake in hot oven (450°) 35-40 minutes, or until done. Makes 12, 2-inch muffins.

PLACE..... in lightly greased bowl. Grease top of dough. Cover with waxed paper.

LET RISE... in warm place (80-85°) until doubled (1-1½ hours). Punch down.

DIVIDE..... dough into 24 equal pieces. Shape each piece into a ball.

PLACE..... close together in well-greased 9 x 13-inch pan or on well-greased baking sheet.

LET RISE... in warm place until doubled (30-45 minutes).

BAKE..... at 375° for 15-20 minutes.

YIELD..... 2 dozen rolls.
