

## 11th Annual Canoe Race June 14 on Tawas River

Eleventh annual Tawas River Canoe Race will be held Sunday under sponsorship of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce. Cash awards and trophies will go to the winners.

Two races are to be held with the junior class starting from Grove's Landing at 12 o'clock noon and the senior division at 2:00 p. m.

Race course for the senior division will start at Grove's Landing and proceed northerly up the lake to Cliff's Landing. After rounding a buoy, canoes will proceed, race south on the lake to the Tawas River and to the river bridge at US-23. Finish line is at the Tawas City Park.

Junior contestants will paddle directly from Grove's Landing down the Tawas River and to the US-23 bridge.

Chairman Hugo Wajohn announces that cash prizes of \$75, \$25 and \$15 will be awarded to the first three places, along with trophies for the first 10 places. Trophies will be awarded to the first three places in the midget division.

Assisting Wajohn is Howard Silverthorn, who said that all contestants are to register at the chamber of commerce office before 12 o'clock noon.

## Three Teachers Sign Contracts at Tawas Area

Contracts were signed Monday night by the Tawas Area Board of Education hiring three new teachers. Only one elementary position remains to be filled and an applicant is to be interviewed for that job.

Hired were Robert and Barbara L. Erickson. Mr. Erickson will teach four classes in high school social studies, including United States Government, American History and English. Mrs. Erickson will teach in the fifth and sixth grades.

Last year, Mrs. Erickson taught at Coleman and Mr. Erickson taught at Meridian.

The third teacher hired may cause some confusion of names at the Tawas City Elementary Unit. E. Paul Youngs, who is teaching this year at Hale Area School, joins the Tawas School faculty as a fifth grade teacher. Tawas already has an elementary teacher by that name, Paul R. Youngs.

## Miss Groff Ends Teaching Career

"I haven't given retirement much thought—I have been too busy here at school."

Speaking as Miss Viola Groff, who retires this week after 17 years as a teacher in the Tawas City Elementary Unit.

During her last full day of teaching Tuesday, Miss Groff said that she was going to miss the children and the many people with whom she comes in close contact at school every day.

"It will seem kind of good, though, just to stay home when others are going to school in the winter," she added.

Miss Groff graduated from Tawas City High School, Isosco County Normal and received a bachelor of science degree from Central Michigan University.

She first started teaching in 1947, serving 1½ years at Williamston. She later left teaching and spent 13½ years with the Burroughs Adding Machine Company. She returned to her teaching career here in 1946.

The retiree was honored last Wednesday evening at a dinner party held at Lixey's Restaurant. Members of the Tawas Area School faculty and personnel were in attendance.

Miss Groff and her second grade pupils were preparing to spend Tuesday morning in the classroom. After a "picnic lunch," they were to join other elementary grades for an afternoon of fun on the school grounds.

She will continue to make her home at 628 First Street.

## Mrs. Payea-Soper Win Seats on School Board

Mrs. Helen Payea and Clyde Soper won seats on the Tawas Area Board of Education in Monday's annual school election. About 700 voters went to the polls.

Re-elected with a total of 548 votes in her favor was Mrs. Payea. She received 260 votes at East Tawas, 181 at Tawas City, 67 in Tawas, Grant and Sherman and 40 votes at Alabaster.

Soper and his nearest opponent, Merton Killey, ran neck and neck in their home district of East Tawas. Killey held a four-vote advantage there, 167 to 163. Soper surged ahead as Tawas City voters gave him a margin of 162 to Killey's 58. The new board members continued to build up his lead with a 50-29 advantage in Precinct No. Three and a 36-11 margin at Alabaster. The total vote was 411 for Soper and 265 for Killey.

John Proctor, fourth candidate in the election, garnered 81 votes. He had 24 at East Tawas, 27 in Tawas City, 25 in Tawas Township and five at Alabaster.

Mrs. Payea will now serve her first four-year term on the board of education. She had been appointed to fill out the unexpired

term of Joseph Dimmick earlier this year.

Soper replaces William Look, who chose not to be a candidate this year. He had served 10 years on the board.

The board will hold its annual election of officers on July 6. Mr. Look will remain as board president until that time.

## Board OKs Use of Gymnasium During Summer

Authorization was given Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education for use of physical education equipment and the Tawas City unit gymnasium in the summer recreational program.

Mrs. Charles Lemon, who will have charge of the girls' program, said that use of the gymnasium would be very helpful in the event of rain. She said that about 130 girls would participate.

In urging utilization of the gymnasium during the summer months, Trustee Leonard Sarki said the program was well organized this year under overall direction of Ronald Wiltse.

In addition to \$300 being allocated by each of the three sponsoring units—East Tawas, Tawas City and Tawas Area School—Tawas Township has contributed \$100 to the program and Alabaster, \$50. Sarki said that Baldwin Township was to be contacted, too, because of the large number of youngsters participating from that area.

The board authorized use of school-owned tennis racquets in the program.

The summer recreational program for girls starts next Monday and will be held week days from 9:30 a. m. to 12:30 p. m. Monday and Wednesday programs will be at the Tawas City Elementary Unit and Tuesday, Thursday and Friday programs will be at the East Tawas athletic field.

In other business Monday night, the board accepted the low bid of Inglis Ford Sales for a nine-passenger station wagon, at a cost of \$1,225.

Ottawa Equipment Company was low bidder on furnishing a new school bus. A bid of \$7,306.21 for an International chassis and Wayne body was accepted.

Bids were opened on furnishing 12 new manual typewriters, filing cabinets and folding tables for the East Tawas Elementary Unit. All bids were tabled for action at the next regular meeting.

## Carol Nash's Name Goes on John Philip Sousa Plaque

Carol Nash, senior first chair clarinetist, was named Thursday night as the 1963-1964 recipient of the John Philip Sousa Award sponsored by Tawas Area Music Booster Club.

Presentation of this annual recognition to Tawas Area's most outstanding bandsman came during the annual spring concert.

Making the presentation was Thomas Horning, club president. Miss Nash's name, joining other Sousa winners at Tawas, will be

engraved on a plaque retained in the school trophy case. She received a small trophy and certificate.

Holding first chair in the clarinet section for the past two years, she has won more than 30 medals in solo and ensemble competition. At the state festival this year, she had a score of 97 out of 100 possible for the highest proficiency rating obtainable.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Nash of East Tawas, her plans for the future are indefinite but she hopes to study at either the University of Michigan or Eastern Michigan University.

Carol was featured soloist during the program and accompanied at the piano by her mother.

Miss Janice Guilford, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arnold V. Guilford of Tawas City, was presented with the Chopin award in recognition of her service to the school during the past year as well as for her accomplishments as a pianist.

She has been active in solo and ensemble competition and has been accompanist for seven or eight soloists during the year. She scored 85 out of a possible

100 points in the state festival, highest for any Tawas Area pianist this year.

Thursday night's concert, final performance of the year for Tawas Area Bands, except graduation, will be the last here under the direction of Edward J. Rima, who leaves for his new position at Taylor Center.

William Ezo, speaking for the bands, and Horning, speaking on behalf of the music booster club, paid tribute to Rima for his outstanding contribution to Tawas Area Schools and the entire community during his 12 years as band director.

Climaxing his career here was a first division award won by Tawas Area High School Band at the state band festival earlier this spring.

## Lewis F. Rodman Dead; Former Wilber Township Supervisor

Funeral services were held Sunday for Lewis F. Rodman, 74, former Wilber Township supervisor, who died Thursday at Tawas Hospital.

Son of a pioneer Isosco lumberman, Mr. Rodman operated a saw mill at Rodman's Dam on Silver Creek for many years. He later sold the property to Russell Jamison and it is now a wildlife sanctuary.

Mr. Rodman was a 50-year member of the Masonic Order and a member of the Royal Arch Masons.

He was born March 6, 1890, in Wilber Township where he made his home all of his life.

He is survived by his wife, Lillian.

The Rev. Stephen Meeks officiated at funeral services held Sunday afternoon at Moffatt Funeral Home, East Tawas. Burial was in Tawas City Cemetery.

## Everett Thanks All Who Aided Bond Proposal

Clarence S. Everett, chairman of the board of supervisors' welfare committee, this week paid tribute to a number of organizations which took an active part in promoting a successful vote on last week's medical care facility proposal.

"It was most gratifying to us that many civic-minded groups of the area extended an invitation to hear our story and helped to carry this information to friends and neighbors," said Everett.

He and Mrs. Richard Egli made nearly 50 talks to different groups around the county in explaining the need for such a facility.

Among those who heard presentations on the proposals were county, township and city officials, Tawas and Osceola Kiwanis Clubs, Hale and East Tawas Lions Clubs, Isosco Farm Bureau groups, church groups, senior citizen groups, area minister's association, business men's clubs, the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, Ladies Literary Club, Twentieth Century Club, county extension groups, Knights of Columbus, American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars and others.

"We feel very strongly that the help received from these groups, added to the full cooperation from the board of supervisors, was instrumental in the very successful campaign," said Everett.

Following last week's vote, which saw taxpayers approve the \$300,000 bond issue by a two to one margin, the architectural firm of Spence and Smith of Saginaw started work on preparing plans for the 52-bed nursing home.

"We hope that bids can be let sometime after January 1, 1965," said Everett.

Fifteen of the graduates are members of the local chapter of the National Honor Society.


The program opens with "Pomp and Circumstance" by Tawas Area Band, followed by the invocation to be delivered by William Ezo, president of the National Honor Society.





### Hale Sailor Returns to Base After Anti-Sub Exercise

Donald K. Schulz, aviation machinist's mate third class, United States Navy, son of Leo E. Schulz of Hale, returned to the Naval Air Station, Quonset Point, Rhode Island, May 10 with air anti-submarine squadron 34 aboard the anti-submarine warfare aircraft carrier, USS Essex, after completing refresher training at the Naval Station, Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

Look of East Tawas, is participating aboard the navy tank landing ship, USS Westchester County, in combined sea-assault and airborne combat training exercise called "Ligas" May 12 to June 10 under the direction of the South-East Treaty Organization (SEATO) in the Philippines.

All member nations are participating in the exercise which is part of a SEATO general counter-offensive to be used if an "enemy" should invade South-East Asia and gain control. The exercise will test the effectiveness of the SEATO forces to assault and regain control of areas behind the "enemy" advance.

Ligas, the second training exercise this year and the 27th since 1956, is part of a long-term schedule announced by SEATO headquarters in November 1963 to maintain joint military defense.
