MICHIGAN RIDING & HIKING TRAIL



Ceremonies dedicating the eastern end of the Michigan riding-hiking trail will be held this Sunday afternoon at the Tawas City Park.

A group of about 25 horsemen set out last Saturday on a 170-mile trip from Empire on the coast of Lake Michigan to the Tawas. The group is expected to arrive here at 3:00 p. m. Sunday for the dedication ceremony.

Dedicating the trail will be Ron Gamble, president of the East Michigan Tourist Association, Ralph Western, president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, will be master of ceremonies. Representatives of the conservation department and forestry department will be in attendance.

Tawas City Businessmen's Association will serve roast beef sandwiches to participants. Clarence King is chairman of this committee, which will roast the beef over charcoal.

Final plans for the program are to be outlined at Wednesday

Robert Rollin Seeks GOP Nomination for Isosco Sheriff

Robert Rollin, 42, Tawas City businessman and justice of the peace, today announced his candidacy for sheriff of Isosco County on the Republican ticket.

He will oppose incumbent Sheriff Ivan L. O'Farrell, who has announced that he will seek re-election in the primary election.

Rollin, a lifelong resident of Isosco County, lives with his wife, the former Corrine Fahselt, and seven-year-old son, Robert Wayne, on US-23, Tawas City.

A veteran of World War II, he saw action in the Atlantic, when on three different occasions, the ships on which he was serving were torpedoed and sunk in combat.

Rollin was a star athlete in his high school days and was once good enough as an amateur baseball pitcher to be scouted by the Chicago White Sox.

The candidate attended the Michigan State Police recruit training school and served at one time as a part time Tawas City police officer.

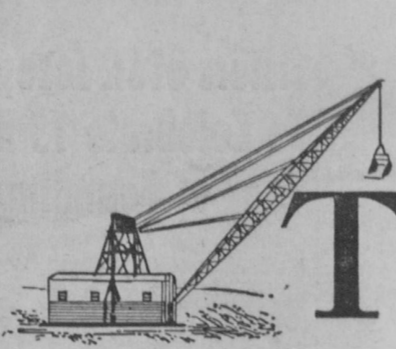

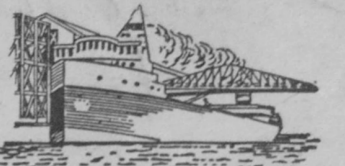

Millage Proposal Goes to Hale School Voters

Hale Area School District will vote on a special operating millage proposal at an election to be held July 20.

District voters are being asked by the board of education to approve levying two mills for a period of three years. If successful, the proposal would raise an additional \$18,000 a year for operation.

"We have been reluctant to ask the people for further oper-

ational money, but have found it a necessity," said Supt. Samuel Gravitt.

The additional money raised by the two mills would be used for building maintenance and equipment. None of the money would be spent for salaries.

"Because of the lack of funds, we have been unable to perform certain maintenance duties and purchase necessary maintenance equipment over the past three years," said Gravitt. "It is something we cannot put off any longer."

The extra millage would provide funds for interior and exterior painting, grounds maintenance equipment, floor scrubber and buffer, lockers, replacement of a furnace purchased in 1941, portable scaffolding and landscaping.

Also provided would be additional teaching equipment and supplies.

Red Cross Swimming Instruction

The American Red Cross swimming program will again be conducted in the Tawas this summer as a six-week instruction period. The program is basically for all those seven years and older, reports Donald Evans.

Regular morning instruction will begin July 6 and end August 21. Classes will be held at the Tawas City park on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday and at the state park in East Tawas on Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Registration for all interested water enthusiasts will be on Monday, June 28, in Tawas City and June 30 at East Tawas. Registration will be taken at the beaches.

Daily schedule for classes is as follows: 9:00 a. m., swimmers and intermediates; 9:30 a. m., beginners; 10:00 a. m., advanced beginners; 6:00 p. m., junior and senior life saving.

Industrial Development Corporation Plans Informational Book

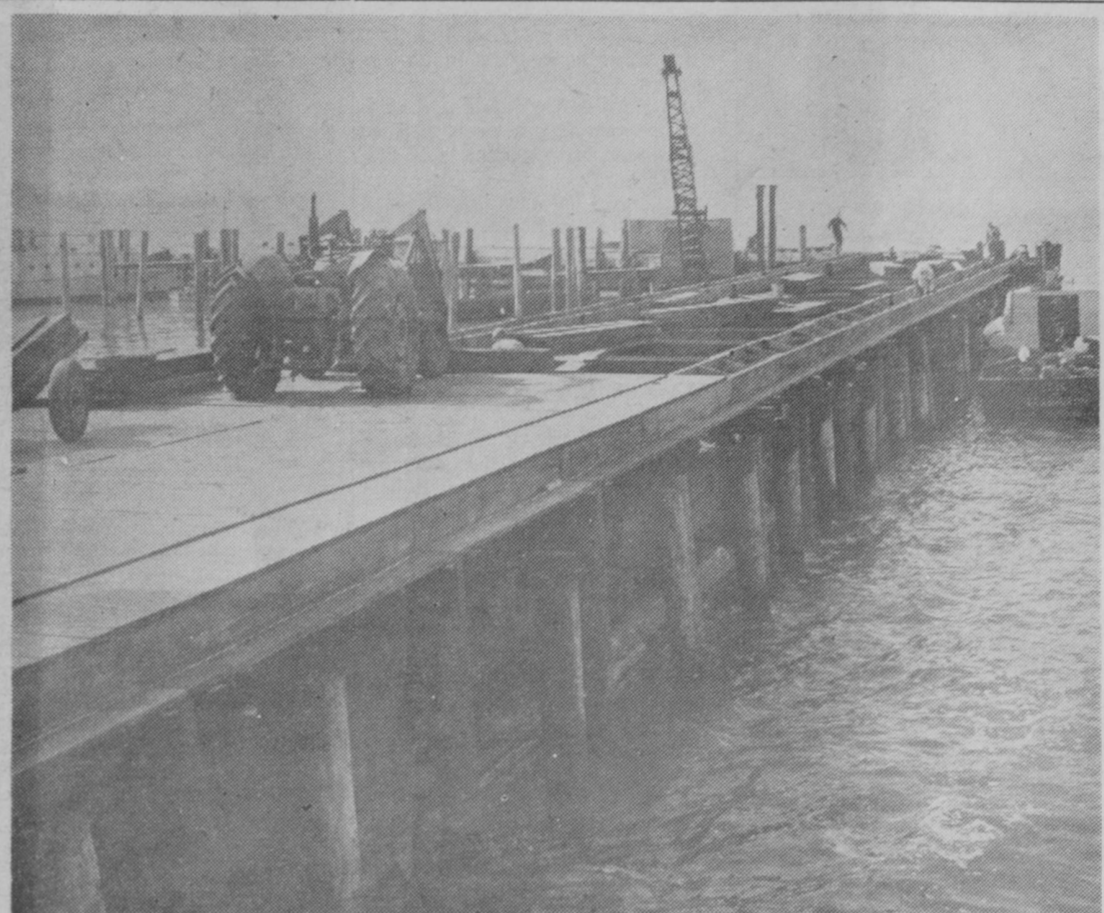

Tawas City Post Office Advanced to First Class

Postmaster Martin Kasischke announced today that the Tawas City post office is to be advanced from second to first class effective July 1. Designations are determined according to yearly gross receipts.

A first class office operates under a different set of regulations than the present designation, reports Kasischke. Some changes are expected in handling of parcel post.



WORK ON REBUILDING the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock at East Tawas is scheduled to be completed about the middle of next month. Contractor for the job is Parker Construction Company of Lexington. A section of the dock was damaged by fire last summer and burned timbers have been replaced with new 12 by 12-inch beams. The dock is being filled with stone which will protect boats anchored

within the harbor from southwesterly winds. More than \$50,000 is being spent on this project by the waterways commission. A new building to house service equipment is to be constructed on the dock, along with enlarged toilet facilities. It is expected that a temporary deck will be placed on the dock to facilitate use of the harbor over the July 4 holiday.—Tawas Herald Photo.

County OK's Expansion of Orchard Park Camps

Expansion of the county-operated Old Orchard Park along the AuSable River west of Oscoda was authorized last Wednesday by the Isosco Board of Supervisors.

An agreement was signed with Consumers Power Company adding approximately 1,500 feet of river frontage to the park. This will provide space for another 100 camp sites.

This popular park, which has been operated by the county for a number of years, has been filled to capacity again this year. The original portion contained more than 150 camp sites.

Old Orchard Park is unique to county government in that it is a profitable operation, having provided funds for several other county projects.

An agreement was also signed last week with the Michigan Department of Conservation establishing a trailer park on the south side of the AuSable River mouth.

In other business conducted during the June session, Drain Commissioner E. H. Stieckney was instructed to arrive at a figure with representatives of the Tawas Lake Property Association as an offer to purchase property from Charles Timreck for the Tawas Lake Dam.

The board adopted a bonding resolution enabling the clerk to prepare forms for submission of the recent bonding election to the Michigan Finance Commission. The board named Osceola State Savings Bank as depository for bonding money.

The other two candidates are William McCready, who chose not to run for another term as prosecuting attorney, and Paul Harvey, former prosecuting attorney.

Miller received his bachelor and master degrees from the University of Michigan. He and his wife and two daughters reside at Essexville. He is the youngest son of Mrs. Grace L. Miller of East Tawas.

Candidates Have Until July 21 to File Petitions

Deadline for filing nominating petitions for county offices in the September 1 primary election is July 21, according to an announcement this week by County Clerk George Prescott.

The clerk pointed out that persons desiring to become candidates for county political conventions must file nominating petitions, according to the new election law, is July 14.

The Republican county committee will double in size this year, according to the new law. In addition to the party nominees, an equal number of county delegates are to be elected.

'Holiday' Opens First Cruise Season

One year ago—July 16—a spectacular early morning fire caused extensive damage to the Michigan Waterways Commission dock at East Tawas. In addition, the Miss East Tawas, a party fishing boat which used the dock as its base of operation, was gutted by fire.

Today, a new all-steel boat has replaced the one destroyed by fire. Called the Holiday, this 57-foot cruiser is the pride of L. D. Murphy and Arthur R. Frost, owners.

Designed by Spartman-Stevens, one of the best known naval architectural firms in the country, the Holiday was constructed at Noland Shipyard, Erie, Pennsylvania, at a cost of \$60,000.

"To my knowledge, there is nothing like it on the lakes," said Frost. "About the only thing it lacks is radar and it will have that some day."

The Holiday went into service last week after its initial shake-down cruise from the shipyard.

The 25-ton boat is powered by two 235-horsepower diesel engines. With 16-foot beam, it is certified for seating 77 passengers and built under strict United

States Coast Guard supervision. It is equipped with a ship-to-shore radio, fathom meter, public address system, upholstered seats, two restrooms and a galley which seats 12 persons. Interior of the cabin is ribbon mahogany.

The boat's four-blade propeller will push it along at a top speed of 15.9 land miles per hour.

The hull contains four watertight compartments which are equipped with a pumping system enabling water to be pumped into or out of any compartment. The boat carries 1,200 gallons of fuel and 80 gallons of fresh water.

Frost, who has been in the fishing party boat business here for the past 14 years, said that in addition to the two regular fishing trips daily for perch, the boat would be used for evening excursion rides on Tawas Bay starting July 1.

"This will be something new to the area and I think it will be quite an attraction this summer," said Frost.

The Holiday will circle Tawas Bay, one of the largest natural harbors on the Great Lakes. A commentary will be given over

the public address system describing points of interest along with historical information.

As soon as the dock is completed, public open house is planned aboard the new cruiser.

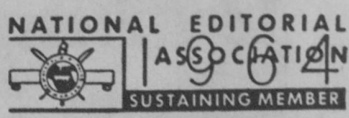
ARTHUR FROST is shown at the wheel of the new party fishing boat, Holiday, anchored at the waterways commission dock.

Completes Marine Recruit Training At San Diego, Calif.

Marine recruits undergo more than 100 hours of physical conditioning, spend more than 80 hours learning how to drill and devote three weeks to rifle and pistol marksmanship in their 11-week training program.

Several hours are devoted to spiritual and character-building courses. Production of good basic marines and responsible patriotic citizens are the two primary objectives of the program.

In the physical fitness training, the recruits run, lift logs, climb ropes, conquer three different obstacle courses, progress through a variety of body-building exercises, swim and participate in organized games. To measure their progress, they take four-strength-measuring tests.

Sisters of St. Joseph To Celebrate 75th Year of Founding

July 6 and 7, Sisters of St. Joseph, who staff Tawas Hospital, are celebrating with the rest of the congregation the 75th anniversary of their foundation in Michigan. To celebrate this event, an open house is planned from 2:00-4:00 p. m. A movie depicting the works of the Sisters of St. Joseph will be shown. Everyone is welcome.

The congregation of Sisters of St. Joseph was founded in LePuy, France, in 1850. In 1879, the revolution brought death and terror to the French people and the community was forced to disband. Some of the sisters met violent death of the guillotine rather than deny God, giving their life's blood to perpetuate the congregation which was destined to spread throughout the world.

In 1807, when peace had been restored, Mother St. John Bonbonne was charged with the task of reorganizing the congregation. Under her capable direction, the community flourished and by 1836 was able to support foreign missions. Sisters were sent to Carondelet near St. Louis, Missouri, and there the first American motherhouse was built; from there, they spread to all parts of the United States. The first Sisters of St. Joseph came to Michigan in 1899 when they took care of the sick poor in Kalamazoo. By 1897, a motherhouse and novitiate were permanently established at Nazareth and today, the community numbers over 900.

"Sisters of St. Joseph have a two-fold aim to come closer to God, herself, and to serve others for love of Him," states Sister M. Olivia, S.S.J., administrator of Tawas Hospital. "This they do in many ways throughout Michigan. Sisters of St. Joseph teach over 34,000 students in 62 elementary schools, 17 high schools and one women's college. They also conduct two homes for orphans and neglected children and six hospitals."

In 1952, Sisters of St. Joseph came to Northern Michigan to staff Tawas Hospital. The hospital opened June 8, 1953, several weeks earlier than planned because a tornado went through the area that evening. On June 14, 1953, the first baby was born and the 5,000th on January 26 of this year. Since its opening, the hospital has taken care of over 25,500 individuals.

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Timberline Zone Sends Convention Delegates

Lutheran women of the Michigan district-Missouri synod are convening at the 10th biennial district convention of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League June 23-25 at North Valley Complex, Western Michigan University, Kalamazoo. Ladies representing this area, the Timberline Zone, are Mrs. Calvin Frysinger, Mrs. Elmer Falkenhagen of Oscoda, Mrs. Fred Wolf of Hale and Mrs. Ralph Taylor of East Tawas. Mrs. Taylor is the zone chairman and a member of the district board.

An auxiliary of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, the league is an international organization which has a membership in Michigan of 274 societies and 15,000 members. Mission inspiration, education and service are its objectives.

The mite box offerings of members for the past two years provided funds in the amount of \$35,000 for student aid for girls, district missions and foreign missions in addition to approximately \$18,000 for international projects. A new goal and projects will be selected at the convention.

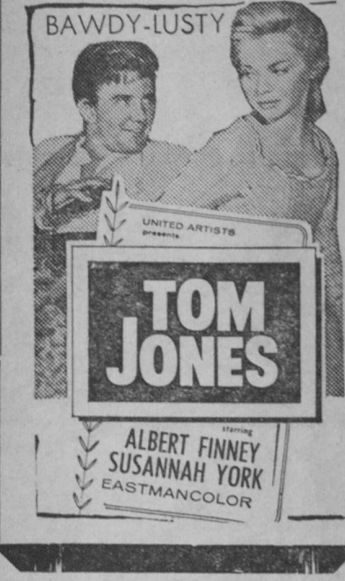

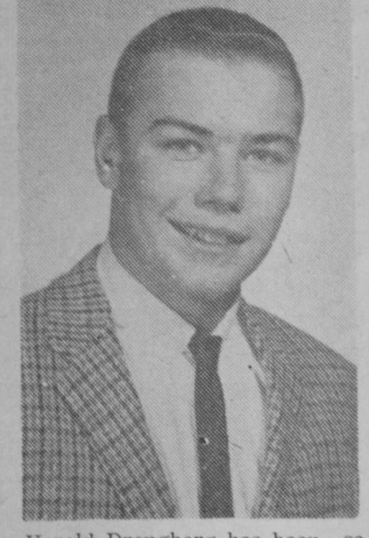

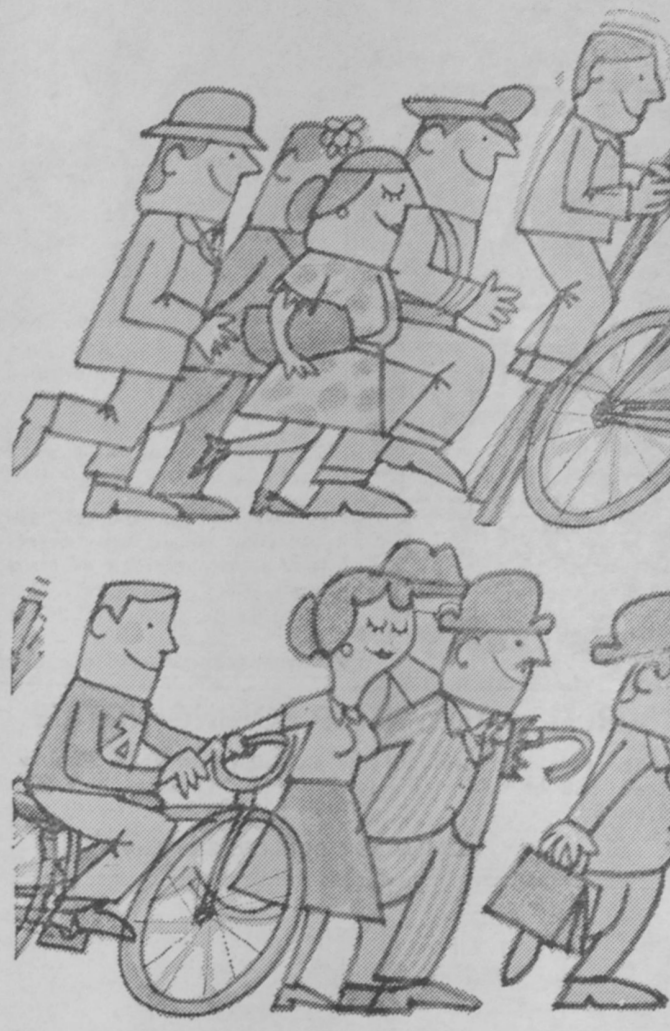
