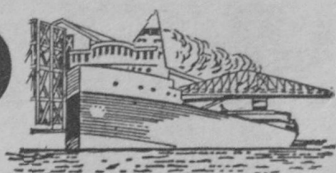

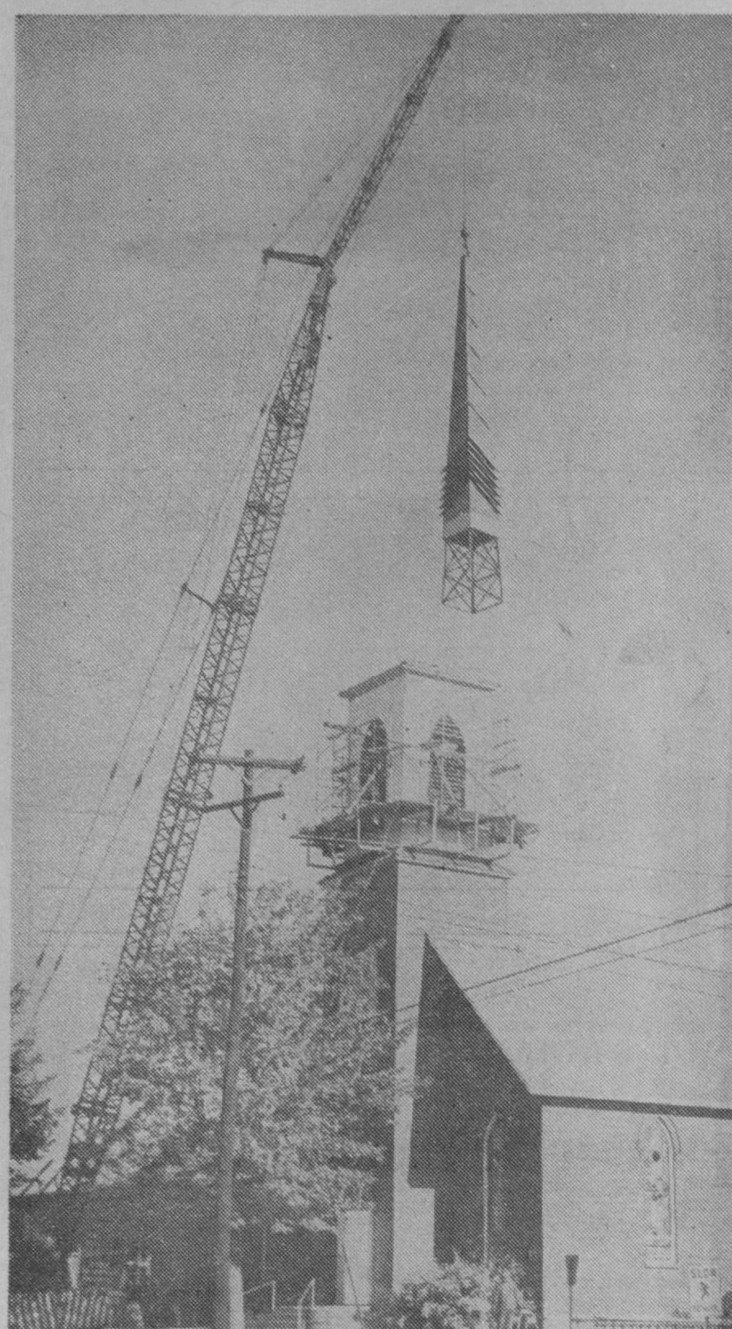

## Iosco Approves Medical Care Facility

### \$300,000 Bond Issue Wins by 2-1 Margin

Iosco County taxpayers gave overwhelming approval Tuesday to Northeastern Michigan's first medical care facility.

Proposed by the board of supervisors, the \$300,000 bond issue asked to finance construction of the county-owned nursing home passed by nearly a three to one margin, 1,554 "yes" to 673 "no" votes.

The bond issue approved by the county will be matched by a \$250,000 federal grant from Hill-Burton funds.

Supervisor C. S. Everett, who has spearheaded the successful campaign for this facility, said that it would take about two years before the facility would be ready for operation.

"Engineering on the site has been completed and it probably will take about three months to sell bonds," said Everett. "The architect will move right in and start making plans. Construction should start in about a year."

Everett was very elated by the splendid vote. He and Mrs. Richard Egli had made nearly 50 talks to service clubs, fraternal organizations and other groups during the

past three months explaining the need for such a facility.

Nearly every taxpayer in the county received a letter from his respective supervisor urging support of the proposal.

### Elwood L. Bronson Filed Tuesday for Road Commission

Elwood L. Bronson of Oscoda filed nominating petitions on the Republican ticket Tuesday morning for a vacancy on the Iosco Road Commission.

He will oppose Clarence Curry, incumbent, who filed for re-election last February.

The primary election has been set for September 1 by the state legislature. All petitions filed prior to final selection of the primary election date will be honored.

### Discuss Parking Lot at Abbreviated Meeting

An abbreviated meeting of East Tawas Council saw only routine business transacted Monday night. Supt. of Public Works Paul R. reported that bids had been received on grading and graveling the proposed parking lot in the state park. Although no final word has been received as yet on this proposal, city officials are certain that the entire state park will become city property after the current season.

The council approved the annual US-23 maintenance contract with the state highway department. One building application approved during the past week was for Ronald Johnson, 409 Smith Street, repairs, \$100.

### E T Business Observes 20th Anniversary

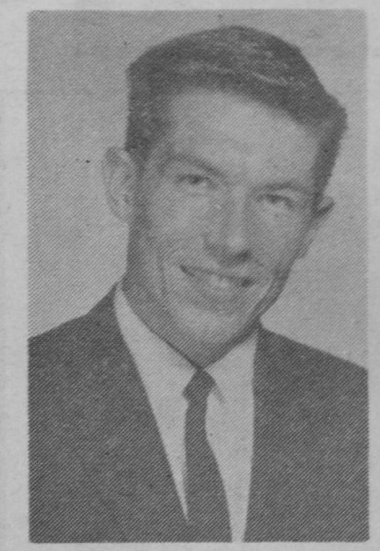
Observing its 20th anniversary of business this week at East Tawas is Sis's Dress Shop, owned and operated by Mrs. Stanley (Marie) Stasik.

### Injured in Two-Car Crash on Townline Rd.

James F. Norris, 18, National City, was treated at Tawas Hospital Monday afternoon for injuries received in a two-car crash on Townline Road, 1.7 miles west of US-23.

Investigating state police officers said that Richard K. Roemer, 67, Lorenz Road, was slowing down for his mailbox when he was struck from the rear by Norris' car. The latter had just passed over a hill when the crash occurred.

Officers said that Norris was traveling at a high rate of speed and was unable to pass due to oncoming traffic. The Norris car skidded 110 yards before hitting Roemer.

Norris was treated for fractured ribs and a collapsed lung. Roemer escaped serious injury.

## Four Candidates Vie for Two Vacancies on School Board

Four candidates are vying for two vacancies on the Tawas Area Board of Education at next Monday's regular school election. Names of three of the candidates will appear on the ballot while the fourth is running on stickers.

All of the candidates are residents of East Tawas. One vacancy was caused by the recent announcement of Board President William Look, who withdrew his name from the election and stated he did not wish to be a candidate in the election.

The incumbent seeking re-election is Mrs. Helen Payea, who, earlier this year, was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of Joseph Dimmick. She is the wife of Dr. Norman Payea.

Other candidates include: John J. Proctor, a resident of the area for the past eight years and a heating contractor. He is a past noble grand of IOOF, charter member of East Tawas Lions Club

and a member of Tawas City Methodist Church.

Clyde L. Soper, operator of a dairy products distributing business. He has been very active in the Tawas Area Parent-Teacher Association and is a past president of that organization.

Merton Killey seeks election on

stickers or as a write-in candidate. He has spent the past 10 years with a large petroleum company in supervisory capacity.

Only registered electors are to vote in the election. Polls are located at Alabaster Township Hall, Tawas Township Hall, Tawas City Hall, East Tawas City Hall.

## Council to Hear Appeal on Building Application

Tawas City Council will act as a zoning board of appeal June 15 when a hearing is held on a building application submitted last month by Joseph Brooks, commercial fisherman.

Brooks seeks permission to construct a 16 by 36-foot addition to a structure presently being used to store fish nets at 211 South First Avenue. The property was once the location of Huron Rustic Furniture Company.

His application had been submitted to the city planning commission for review following determination of the department of public works that it may conflict with the city zoning ordinance.

The planning commission recommended that the application be denied on grounds that expansion of the building would not comply with a nonconforming use.

This building proved to be a topic of controversy last spring when neighbors objected to a fishery operation in a residential zone. It was learned, however, that the property was zoned industrial and was permissible. On recommendation of the planning commission, the property was rezoned residential A, allowing nonconforming use of the structure.

Council members and the city

representative were of the opinion May 4 that an addition could not be made to a nonconforming structure. This opinion was again stated Monday night.

City Attorney Alf C. Watson said that information contained on the building application "was very meager" and asked Mr. Brooks to further clarify his request.

The applicant was present at the meeting and said that the addition was necessary in order to have all of his fishing equipment under one roof. He said he intended to clean his property and fill in a swampy area along Tawas River south of the building for a net repair area.

Brooks said he did not wish to leave his nets outside because of deterioration from the weather. He said the addition would aid storage of nets and equipment and the building would also serve as a headquarters for his operation. He said that while he may ice and pack fish at this location in the future, shipments were made twice a week and fish would be held there only a few hours.

Wilbert I. Treichel, who resides directly to the north of this property, addressed the council and said that the owner had promised to keep the yards clean of fish nets and equipment when permission was originally allowed under a nonconforming use.

It was the unanimous decision of the council to await an inspection of Police Chief Frank Roti.

In other business, the council approved the reappointment of three planning commission members by Mayor George Tuttle. Named to their second three-year terms were Paul Chevis, Nelson Thornton and Arthur Wendt. Other members are Hugo Keiser, John St. James, Delano Myles, Gordon Hatch, Steven Ezo and James Dillon.

Aldermen Cabbie, Earl Davis and Clark Tanner, comprising the council's street committee, are to meet Friday night with Supt. of Public Works, Reginald Bublitz and Mayor Tuttle to discuss plans for seal coat and street construction work during the coming summer.

The council authorized advertising for bids on a new dump truck to replace one which has been in service since 1953. The city has two other trucks in use, 1956 and 1961 models. Bids are to be accepted July 6.

## Gladwin Legislator Files for State Senate

Walter G. Nakkula of Gladwin announced today he will be a candidate for state senator in the new Sixth Senatorial District comprising the Counties of Alcona, Arenac, Crawford, Gladwin, Iosco, Kalkaska, Missaukee, Ogemaw, Oscoda and Roscommon.

Nakkula presently is serving his sixth term as a representative of the Arenac District. During his six terms in office, he has served on many important committees, including conservation, insurance, labor, marine affairs and is now chairman of two committees, rules and resolutions and tourist industry relations.

He is considered a leader and an advocate of legislation affecting the welfare and economy of the state.

Prior to being elected to the legislature, Nakkula was a township clerk, supervisor, chairman of the Gladwin County Board of Supervisors and president of the Gladwin Fair Board.

Married and the father of a son and two daughters, the 56-year-old Nakkula lives on an 80-acre farm in Gladwin County.

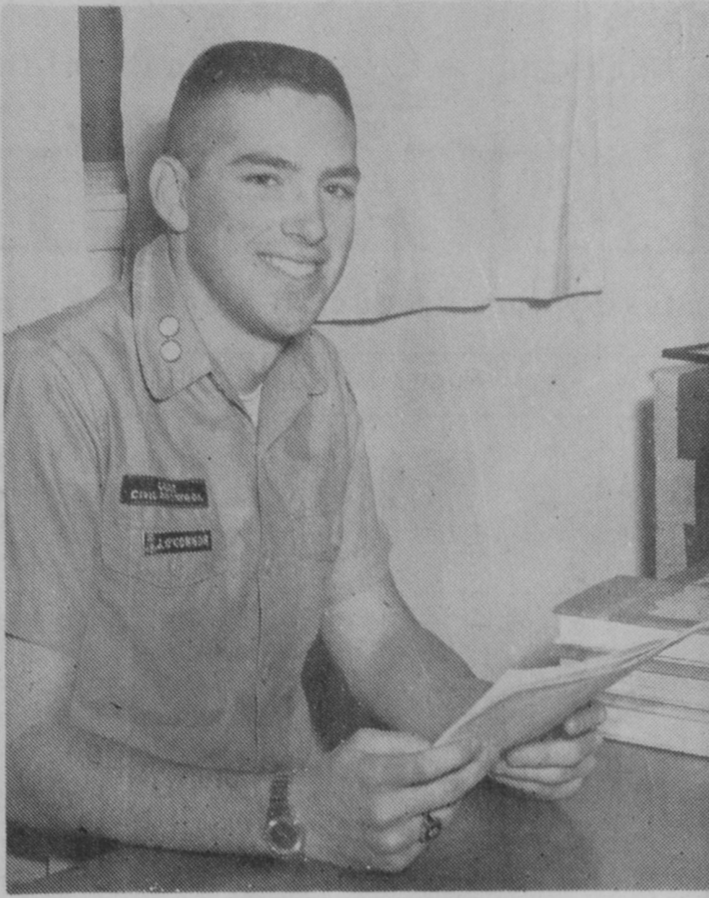

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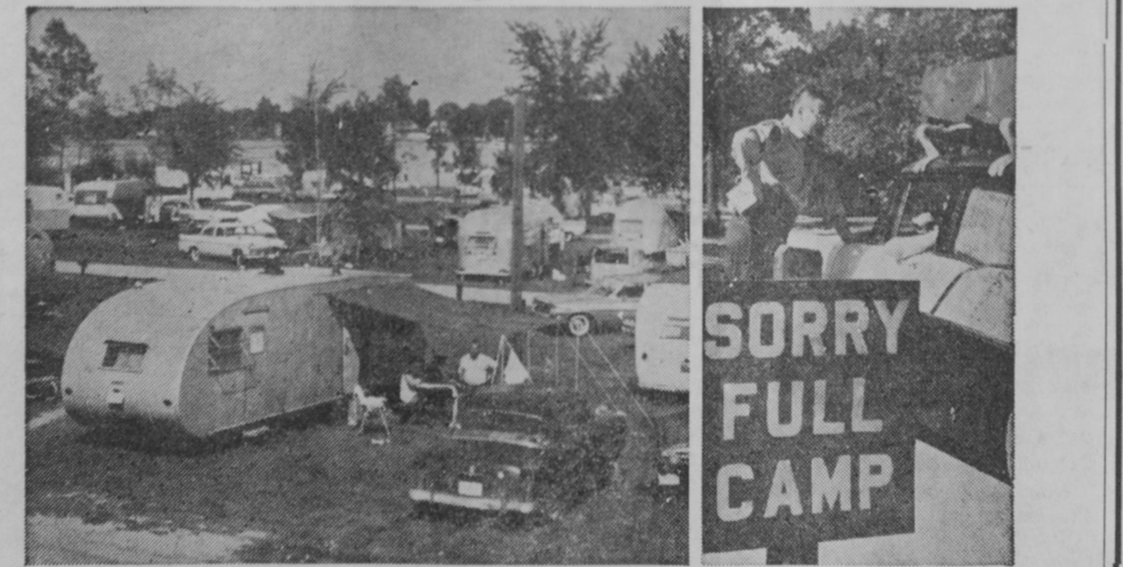
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**Big Challenge in Recreation**

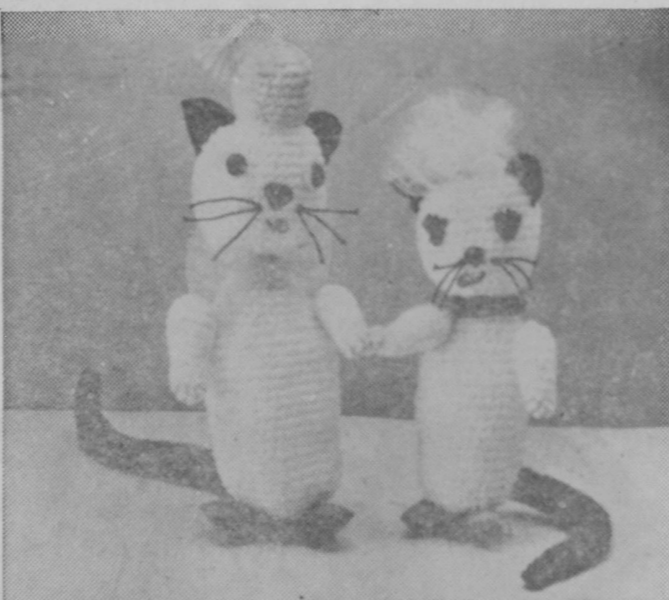

**Soundness of Social Security Financing Told in Articles**

Over the years, three major misconceptions have arisen concerning social security financing. The most common of these is the belief that the social security trust funds are in the red. In the opinion of the believer, the social security program is bankrupt and there will not be enough money to pay off when many of those working today reach retirement age.

These critics base their assertion on the fact that we do not operate on a full reserve basis like private insurance companies do.

However, private insurance must be ready to pay off 100 percent on the dollar if they should cease to operate. No such total reserve is required under the social security program because social security is a compulsory program for coverage of future as well as present generation of workers. The program is guaranteed new entrants year after year.

The next article will deal with the second misconception about social security financing.

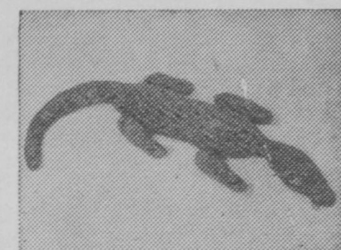
Eckstein and Staebler had been partners in the contracting business here and were low bidders on the fire hall project.

The proposition approved by voters also called for purchase of a new \$20,000 fire truck.

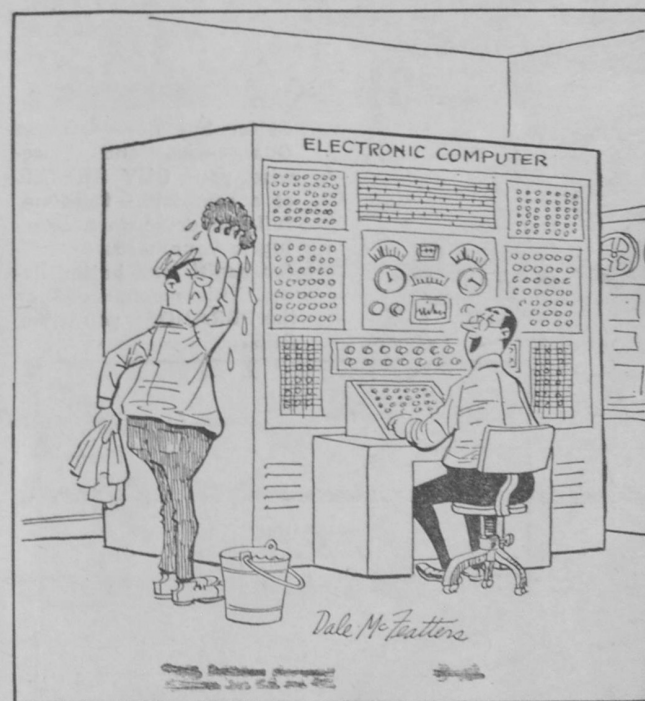

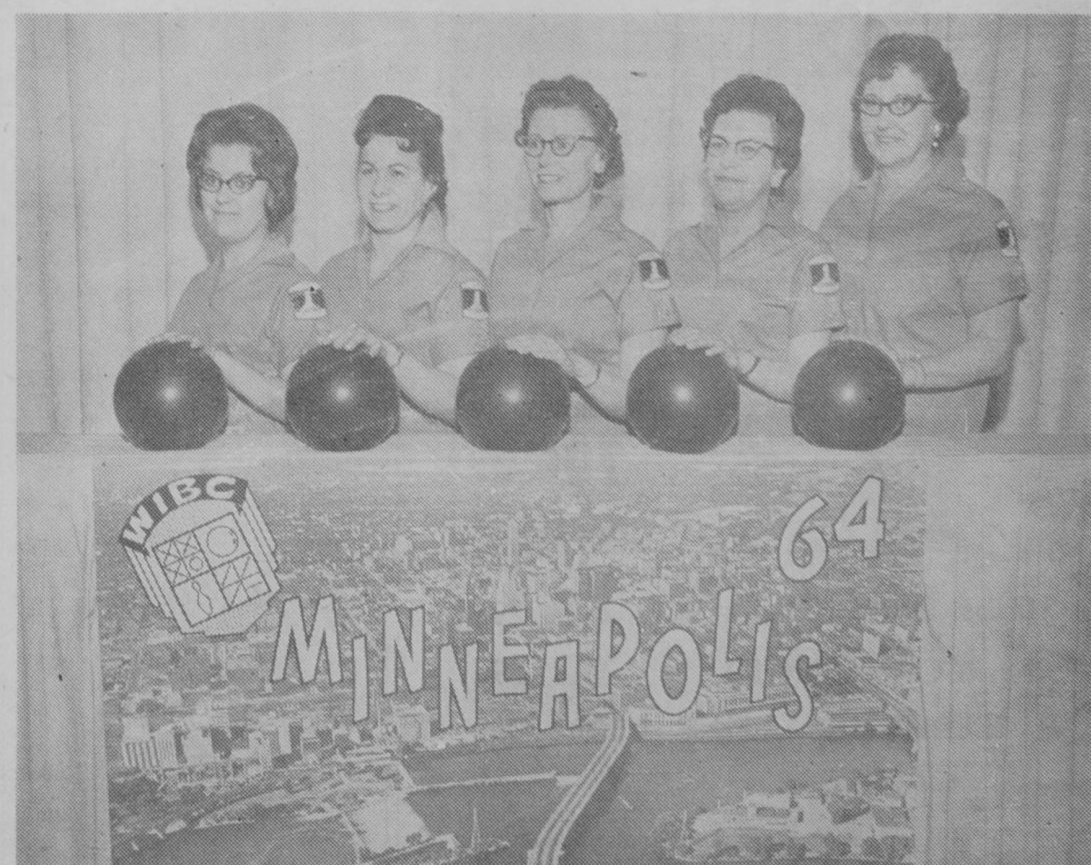

Plate Umpire Orville Armstead of Hale ruled that Bethard could visit the mound only once during an inning, sending Frank to the bench.

game, the manager of the opposing club may visit his pitcher as often as he feels is necessary. Bethard said this was a new rule in professional baseball because of Yogi Berra being a player-manager.

In any event, Pete Bolen took over pitching duties after Frank's departure and walked Cheney intentionally to fill the bases. He then fanned Hewett to end the inning without a run being scored.

The visitors scored their second run in the seventh inning when Chrvia singled and advanced to third base when the ball bounded past Pat Erickson in right field. Shaum grounded out and Bielby fanned, but Romanik slammed one of Bolen's fast balls for a single, scoring Chrvia.

East Tawas scored its lone run in the bottom of the seventh when Pat Erickson singled and reached third on a two-base error by the right fielder. Duane Sanders belted a long drive to center field, Erickson scoring after the catch. 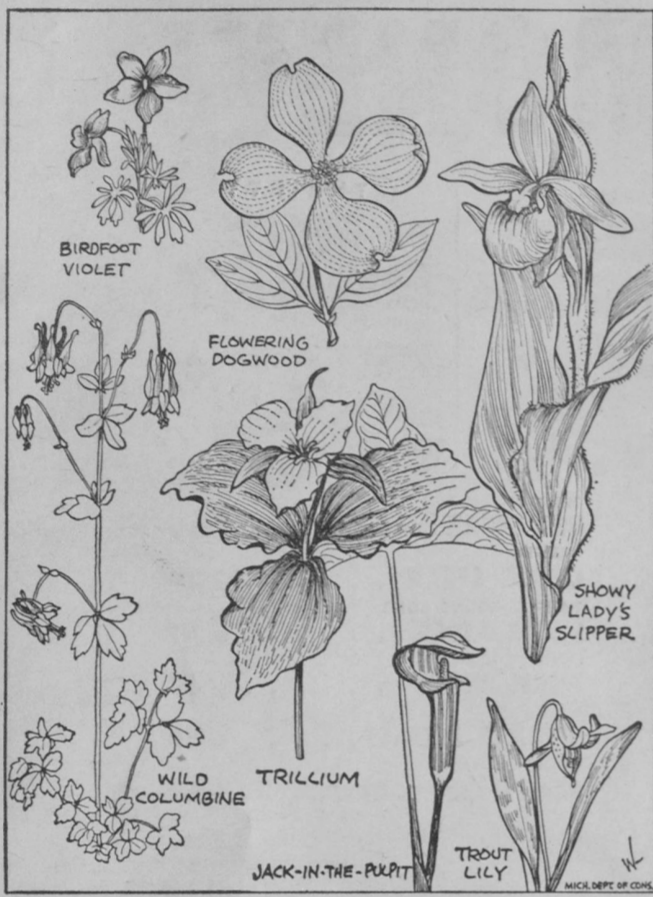

**To Enjoy But Not For Picking**



Every spring and summer, one of nature's most spectacular acts is the unveiling of wildflowers in all their living beauty. Sadly, however, each year also sees some plants losing ground to the pressures of a sprawling population. Among these are the rare species shown here. Protected by law in an effort to keep them from fading completely out of the Michigan picture are the birdfoot violet, flowering dogwood, trillium, and showy lady's slipper. Although there is no regulation against it, the wild columbine, jack-in-the-pulpit, and trout lily should not be picked because of their scarcity in many parts of the state. There are many other wildflowers which are protected and/or in short supply. Strong public support is urged to preserve them and their shrinking habitat. To learn more about plants which need your help, write to the Conservation Department's Publications Room in Lansing for free copies of "Living Beauty." A color movie of the same title may be borrowed without charge from the Department's film loan service in Lansing.

**Smoke-Cooking Made Easy**



Sportsmen and campers, here's a chance to add a flavorful flair to your outdoor eating. Try smoke-cooking meat — caught, bought, or shot — over a campfire, using any type of pot or pan that has a good snug lid. This is how it works: Put the meat on a circular wire rack with cooking foil laid beneath on the pan's bottom to catch drippings. Place sawdust around the edge of the pan, under the edges of the upturned foil. The heat turns the sawdust to smoke, which is trapped under the pan lid to flavor the meat. The time needed for smoke-cooking varies, depending on the thickness and type of meat and the heat of your fire. Use fine-grained sawdust, the kind that comes from sand-papering hardwood—preferably fruit or nut wood.

## Big Blast for Waterfowl



Work by the Conservation Department will literally blast off again this spring to create small nesting and feeding places (lower left) for waterfowl, particularly ducks. Taking a few cues from rock quarry operations, the Department will open up new water areas for these birds by detonating explosive charges in dry marshes of northern Michigan. The charges are made by pouring ammonium nitrate, a common fertilizer, into water-tight plastic bags after it has been treated with fuel oil. A half or full stick of dynamite is placed in each bag; blasting caps and/or explosive-type cords are used to set off charges. Bags are buried at various depths, depending on the soil and the hoped-for size of the pothole. This earth-blasting technique packs an important punch in marshes where complete flooding is impractical, and in areas that cannot be reached by draglines and other heavy equipment.—Mich.

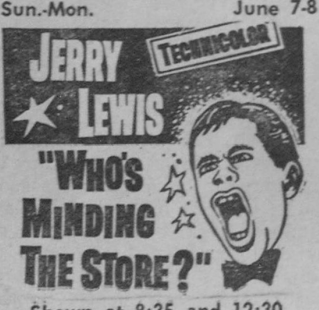
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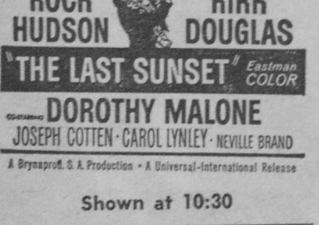

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### Mayor Proclaims—

## Burglary Prevention Week

Chief Frank Roti announced today that Mayor George Tuttle, in cooperation with the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police state-wide program, has proclaimed the week of June 21 through June 27 as Burglary Prevention Week.

According to Roti, "This is not intended to be factitious, nor an indication we are only interested in preventing burglaries one week of the year. Rather, various law enforcement agencies throughout the country have designated this week to emphasize the seriousness of this crime and how the public can help by observing some simple means to keep burglars out of their homes during the vacation months ahead."

Few people realize burglaries account for 44 percent of the total major crimes in the country. They occur at a much greater frequency than any other crime—one every 35 seconds, day and night, throughout the year. During 1963, there were an estimated 900,000 burglaries across the country. The total dollar loss of these burglaries was approximately \$200,000,000.

Big business, yes, but Roti went on to say, "alerting the public to this menace and suggesting to them some of the simple precautions to take, can substantially reduce this menace in our community."

Here are some suggestions the police department recommends you take before leaving your home during the warm months ahead:

1. Use good locks. Do not rely on cheap door locks to protect your home and valuables. Pin tumbler cylinder locks or locks with a dead-bolt mechanism are most effective.
  2. Have one or two lamps burning during the evening hours. This can be easily done by using an automatic timer on lamps or making arrangements with a neighbor to turn them on and off each evening. Lights burning all night or day and night fool no one.
  3. Be sure to discontinue deliveries during your absence. A call to the dairy is safer than a note left for the milkman.
  4. Tell one neighbor you are leaving, ask him if he will look after things for you in your absence—sweeping up, cutting the lawn, picking up circulars, etc.
  5. Use safety latches on all windows. This will allow the windows to be opened far enough for proper ventilation, but not enough for someone to enter.
  6. Notify the police department when you are leaving, where you can be reached in an emergency and when you expect to return.
- An informed public, cooperating wholeheartedly with their local law enforcement agencies, can successfully put Mr. Burglar "out of business" in our area, said Roti.

## Agricultural Leaders to Tour Europe and Russia

John Doneth, project leader of Farm Management Extension, Michigan State University, is serving as tour host and will be accompanied by Mrs. Doneth.

The inclusion of the wives is a special feature offered for the first time with this year's agricultural tour. Enrollment will occur up until the delegation briefing session which will be held in early June, unless membership reaches maximum prior to then. Pre-enrollment indicated many men going alone but also 11 wives accompanying their husbands. The itinerary includes the countries of Belgium, Holland, Russia, Poland, Switzerland and Germany including visits to key cities such as Brussels, Amsterdam, Moscow, Kharkov, Krasnodar, Warsaw, Zurich, Berne and East and West Berlin.

The Wolverine State leaders will depart New York on August 31 and return September 20. Many of the delegates will also take advantage of an optional offering leaving Michigan two days early, August 29, in order to visit the New York World's Fair and the United Nations.

Farmers, credit people serving farmers, machinery and hardware dealers, veterinarians, processing and milling people, and other agricultural leaders are all included to exchange ideas at first hand and extend a personal message of goodwill to those in similar occupations in other lands.

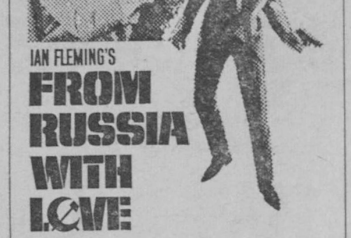

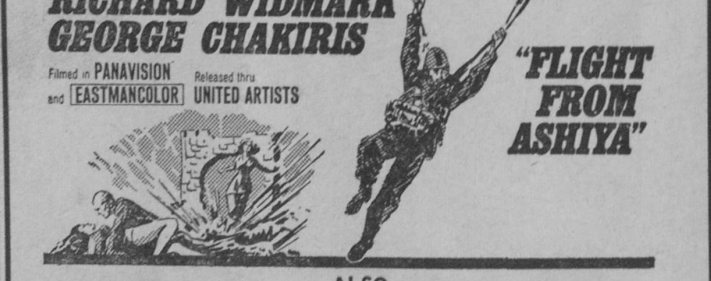
