## City Thoroughfare Plan Submitted for Study

A major thoroughfare plan, fourth in a series of studies leading to eventual development of a master plan, has been presented to the Tawas City Planning Commission by the city's planning consultants, Vilcan-Leman and Associates, Incorporated.

Primary objective of this study is the achievement of a street system that will be convenient, safe and adequate to serve the city's present and future land use pattern.

In developing the thoroughfare plan, existing streets in the city were mapped and analyzed to determine present or potential future problem areas.

One of the major problems cited by the consultants was an excessive amount of land devoted to street rights-of-way. Local residential streets have been platted with rights-of-way ranging from 75 to 90 feet wide. Normally, a width of 60 feet is adequate for this type of street.

"The over-all result of a gridiron pattern and excessive right-of-way width is that more land in the city is used or designated for street purposes than would actually be needed to adequately service abutting land uses," said the report.

The report also cited short dead-end streets without adequate turn-around provisions, many blocks too short, double frontage blocks which create an inefficient use of right-of-way, inadequate right-of-way width for some local streets.

The consultants also found poor cross movement of traffic caused by streets intersecting at considerably less than a 90 degree angle, through traffic entering residential neighborhoods but having no destination there, conflicts between traffic on US-23 and local traffic attempting to enter the highway from local side streets.

The consultants recommended several means by which problems can be overcome or prevented from developing in the future. Included was the recommendation that certain streets be designated to carry traffic from the residential areas of the city to the non-residential centers and the major thoroughfares.

Other recommendations included the future construction of a bridge over the Tawas River at

## Iosco Hires Architect; Set Medi-Care Vote

Iosco County voters will go to the polls June 2 in a special election to decide on the question of financing construction of a \$550,000 medical care facility.

The 50-bed facility to care for Iosco's aged, chronically ill and disabled residents, to be located at the west Tawas City limit on Harris Avenue, would be financed over a 15-year period. The county's share of \$300,000 would be raised by a general obligation bond issue.

Joseph Hominga, director of hospital and medical care division of the Michigan Department of Health, said last week that 45 percent of the construction cost would be paid by Hill-Burton funds.

Explaining the program to the Iosco Board of Supervisors, Hominga said he had made commitment of \$250,000 as the federal and state government's share in the project. This is the same fund used to assist in construction of Tawas Hospital.

Explaining that he had met here three years ago to explain provisions of the medical care facility program, which saw Iosco voters reject the program by a two to one majority, Hominga said that high priority had been given the Iosco project.

Since 1947, Hill-Burton funds of more than \$250,000 have been

used to assist some 210 projects in the state, most of them being general hospitals because of the early emphasis placed on the need for such institutions.

In addition to Tawas Hospital, Hill-Burton grants have been received for constructing the new Standish Hospital, Tolfree Hospital at West Branch and Grayling Hospital.

Hominga said the greatest need today was to provide facilities for the continuing nursing-type care for the aged, chronically ill and disabled persons. This need is being met at present by private nursing homes, medical care facilities and general hospitals. Some 37 counties in the state have provided medical care facilities.

A county medical care facility is authorized by the state welfare commission and would be operated under direction of the county welfare board, which would set policy, control administration and appoint a full or part-time medical director.

An estimated 10.4 percent of Iosco's population is over 65 years of age, which is slightly above the state average. Funds are allocated to a county on the basis of three beds per 1,000 population. In 1960, there were 1,715 persons over age 65 in this county.

At present, some 30 persons are maintained in Iosco nursing homes, partially or totally supported by tax funds. Cost of caring for patients in medical care facilities is approximately \$8 to \$10 per day, but with collections from state and federal funds, the net cost for operation would be approximately \$1 per patient day.

The proposed Iosco facility, which is being planned for 50 beds, can be tripled in size through proper design.

The facility would have approximately 22,000 square feet of floor space which figures out to approximately 425 square feet per bed. However, this would not mean that each bed would have the above amount of floor space as one-third of the total space is involved in corridors, kitchen, dining room and other work areas of the building.

Cost of construction would be approximately \$18.50 a square foot or about \$440,000. Other costs would include \$43,000 for equipment, architect fee of \$26,000, site survey of \$1,000, site supervision of \$10,000 and miscellaneous cost of approximately \$4,000.

The facility would require approximately \$500 per day to operate and \$25,000 would be required in order to get the unit in operation.

Spence and Smith, Saginaw architects, have been hired by the board of supervisors to prepare preliminary plans for the proposed facility. If approved by voters, it would take about a year to develop plans and award a contract.

## Tawas Area High May Have Major Turnover of Faculty in 1964-1965

In a preliminary report on next year's faculty, Jordan said that only one high school teacher, Mrs. Ellen Evans, had returned her signed contract for the 1964-1965 school year. While secondary teachers seldom return contracts here until the day they are due, the principal reported that a number of teachers were "looking very hard for employment in other places."

Some of the most outward reasons for the turnover cited by Jordan were dissatisfaction with contracts offered and advancement professional of individual teachers.

Fifteen elementary teachers have returned signed contracts for the next school year, according to Miss Clara Bolon, principal.

## Multi-Unit Restaurant Completed by Ander-Ett

Early this week saw completion of the first multi-unit mobile restaurant fabricated for Central A&W Enterprises by Ander-Ett, Incorporated, local travel trailer manufacturing company located on US-23 in Baldwin Township. Destination for the completed unit is Lexington, Kentucky, and transportation will be effected by commercial carrier.

Over-all dimension of the restaurant will be 30 by 42 feet, which is obtained by placing three 10-foot-wide units side-by-side on a permanent site foundation at location.

The units are somewhat in deviation from the usual trailer or mobile home construction in that a great amount of steel beams and trusses are welded together to form a rigid unit from frame, through sidewalls and roof superstructure.

All component parts were manufactured or obtained by Ander-Ett, with the exception of exterior sidewall material which was supplied by the purchaser. This is a specially designed interlocking

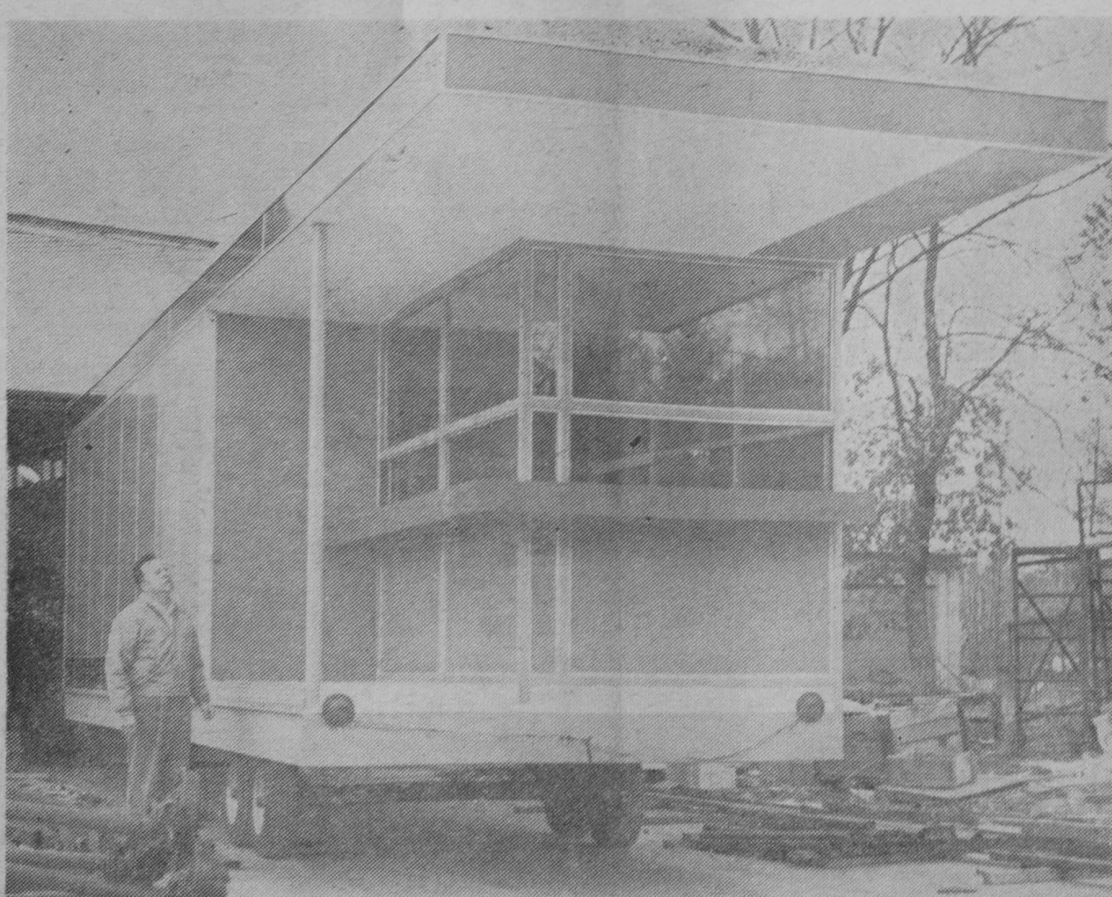
steel and insulated panel having a porcelainized enamel exterior in the traditional orange and black of the A&W chain.

Special plumbing and heating was supplied by Schaaf Heating and Plumbing, quarry tile floor inlay by Wojahn Floor Covering and plate glass installation by Tawas Bay Glass Company.

Special restaurant appliances will be installed on site by the purchaser after placement of the units.

"This undertaking has been quite a challenge to the company and the men on the production line," states Arnold Hosbach, secretary-treasurer of the local firm. "I believe we have accomplished in a quite satisfactory manner what the purchaser desired." However, this would not have been possible without the full cooperation of our employees, who met this unusual challenge with the same integrity and resourcefulness shown daily on the regular production line.

The company has resumed full-scale production on its line of travel trailers.

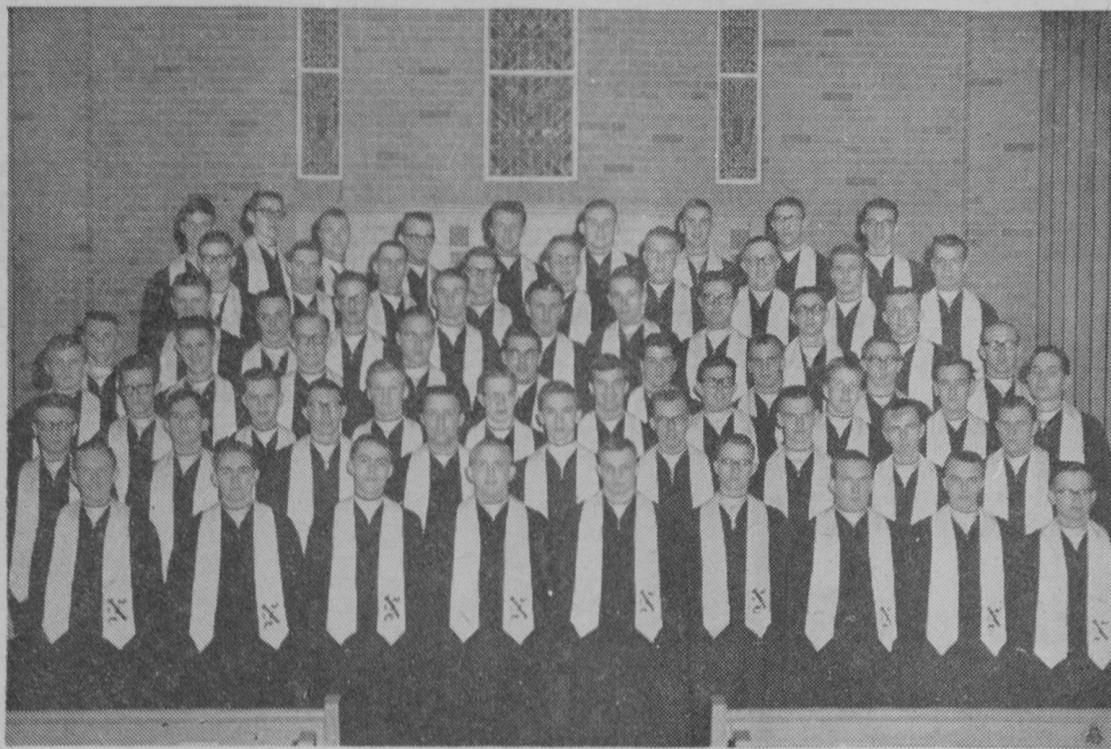

Dear Editor: I hear that the Tawas City Council is considering the possibility of artificially fluoridated city water.

For me, this would mean I would not be able to eat in Tawas if it had artificially fluoridated water as within 24 hours of drinking fluoridated water and eating food cooked in it, I am violently sick. So I now do not visit any cities with artificially fluoridated water and as I enjoy many summer visits to Tawas, I would be very sorry.

There may be other people to whom artificially fluoridated water is an acute poison, but what about the poor folks to whom it is a chronic poison.

Even the Michigan Public Health authorities admit it could cause fluorosis (systemic poisoning) if three pints of water instead of two pints were used in a day. Is this a good scientific way to medicate our children?

We are much concerned with the possibility of fluoridation in the Tawas area, as we have been considering this community with favor as a desirable place in which to live. Our own experience with the use of fluoridated water has caused nothing but trouble, all claims of complete safety by the promoters notwithstanding.

We do not believe the general public realizes the gigantic power structure which is pushing fluoridation.

We notice that Public Health Doctor Earl Hasty, who is promoting artificial fluoridation in the Tawas—without an assist no doubt from dentists and doctors who are probably members of various local groups such as Kiwanis, J.C.s, P.T.A. etc.—has stated that this program is endorsed by Drs. Charles Mayo, Paul Dudley White and Benjamin Spock. This is meant to sound impressive, but this is like saying fluoridation is endorsed by United States Public Health Service (USPHS) and the American Dental Association (ADA).

Of course, it is endorsed by these men who are associated in one way or another with public health work. Without any fluoride research experience themselves, these doctors are merely parroting the endorsements of the very agencies which are the top promoters of fluoridation—United States Public Health Service and American Dental Association.

USPHS, of which Dr. Hasty is a small cog, spends almost \$1,000,000 (one billion) a year of government money in grants, cooperative programs and salary supplementation. Through this means, they have welded the state and county organizations into a completely docile and responsive organization, amenable to the slightest pressure from Washington.

Endorsements by many national organizations are obtained by the same persons who are active simultaneously in all of them. Public health officials endorse fluoridation, then put on another hat and call themselves a state organization, endorsing it all over again. The World Health Organization is financed by United States Public Health Service; naturally, they endorse fluoridation!

This power apparatus is spending hundreds of millions every year in a mad effort to force all

 Col. Bruce B. Knutson, commander at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, addressed the board and gave statistics on air force spending in the area. He encouraged greater participation on the part of local businesses toward receiving a share of the expenditure.  
 A communication was read from the Tawas City Council stating that authorization had been given by the city and joint water board of Tawas City and East Tawas to construct water and sewer facilities to the site of the proposed medical care facility in Tawas Township.  
 It was reported that Isoco's participation in the civil defense program would be canceled unless a new director was appointed. A report is to be made at the April session.  
 On recommendation of the conservation committee, the sheriff's department was authorized to purchase a new Jeep vehicle for use in the water enforcement program this summer.
