In developing the thoroughfare plan, existing streets in the city were mapped and analyzed to determine present or potential future problem areas.

One of the major problems cited by the consultants was an excessive amount of land devoted to street rights-of-way. Local residential streets have been platted with rights-of-way ranging from 75 to 90 feet wide. Normally, width of 60 feet is adequate for

this type of street.
"The over-all result of a gridiron pattern and excessive right-of-way width is that more land in the city is used or designated for street purposes than would actually be needed to adequately service abutting land uses," said the report.

The report also cited short deadend streets without adequate turnaround provisions, many blocks too short, double frontage blocks which create an inefficient use of right-of-way, inadequate right-ofway width for some local streets.
