Visiting Mayor Harvey Darling and party from Ovid were greeted by Tawas Area High School Band, local civic and business officials under perfect weather conditions during this community's observance of Michigan Week on Monday.

Mayor's exchange day, emphasizing the important role played by local government, was about the only official program here marking Michigan Week, May 17-23.

## Tawas Industrial Development Corp. Adopts By-Laws

Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation met Thursday night for the purpose of adopting by-laws for the organization.

First order of business to come before the group was a request from an outside organization for a possible building site in this area. President Henry Oates immediately appointed a three-man committee to meet with representatives of this company to discuss their needs.

The new organization has set aside the third Wednesday of each month for its regularly scheduled meeting.

Ralph Western, president of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, was appointed an ex officio member of the board with full voting power.

A membership committee was appointed by President Oates consisting of Chairman Gordon Huck, John Hosbach, Edward Nelkie and Truman Barbier.

Until further notice, all leads from the public on business or industry which might be attracted to the area should be communicated to any officer or board member. In addition to Oates and Huck, board members are Richard Harwood, Cecil Lamb, Clarence McKenzie, Floyd Schaaf Jr., George Tuttle, Donald Watson, Stuart White and Alf C. Watson.

## Three Sentenced in Circuit Court

Three persons were sentenced Friday by Circuit Court Judge Alan C. Miller.

Edwin B. Strachen, 30, Saginaw was placed on probation for three years on conviction of breaking and entering in the nighttime. He had admitted the theft of two rifles from a cabin owned by Arthur E. Mertz on Douglas Drive.

Allen Steinhurst, 22, was sentenced to serve from seven to 15 years in Southern Michigan Prison, Jackson, on conviction of breaking into Rainbow Service, Tawas City, and Furst and Charters Hardware, Whittemore.

Dennis Sullivan, convicted of breaking and entering, was placed on probation for a period of 1 1/2 years.

## Dredging Project Finished Monday

Dredging project at the Tawas River mouth was completed Monday, according to a report from City Supt. Reginald Bublitz. The project was sponsored jointly by the City of Tawas City and local businessmen.

Bublitz said the channel had been widened to 40 feet and had a depth ranging from 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 feet. The channel was dredged out to water seven feet deep.

"We are going to clean the river of anything blocking navigation up to the boat ramp," said Bublitz. He said the project should greatly improve boating facilities here during the coming summer.

L. J. Trinklein, local boat and marine dealer, headed up the drive to contact businessmen for donations and he collected approximately \$300. The city allocated \$150 for the project.

In other business, City Attorney Alf C. Watson reported that William Tarnosky had been appointed as a special policeman by Mayor George Tuttle. Tarnosky is employed week-ends as an enforcement officer by the Midway Drive-In.

## Good Possibility City May Acquire State Park

Acquisition of the state park by the City of East Tawas at the end of the current season seems a good possibility, according to a report Monday by City Attorney Michael Freel.

The city attorney and a delegation of officials and businessmen met last week at Lansing with Arthur Elmer, parks division chief for the Michigan Department of Conservation, and other state officials.

"They gave us the impression the city would obtain the property at the end of the year," said Freel. He indicated there would be a considerable amount of legal work and negotiations before such a goal was accomplished.

The city must spell out its need for the property and how it will be utilized for the public once it is obtained.

For the past several weeks, discussions have been heard concerning possibility of constructing a parking lot and turn around east of the harbormaster's office on marsh land not being used by the public.

Indications were at Monday night's council meeting that, while investigation will be continued on this project, it probably would not be accomplished until the city is assured that it will receive a deed to the property.

Because of the current widening project of US-23, many parking spaces are being lost along the highway which are normally utilized by state park visitors during the summer months.

Mayor Clarence McKenzie emphasized that the city should main-

tain the park along the same plan as presently administered by the department of conservation.

"I got the idea the department would like to see it remain as a trailer park," said Freel.

Discussion has been tabled on the question of constructing a public boat ramp in the city. It was felt this might be incorporated in the park once property is obtained.

## Escaped Serious Injury in Freak Truck Mishap

A rural Whittemore housewife, Mrs. Flora Kaiser, escaped with minor injuries Tuesday morning when an unattended truck rolled down an incline and pinned her against a concrete block milkhouse.

According to Undersheriff Leon Putnam, who investigated, Eugene Kaiser, husband of the victim, had parked his rack truck near their farm home on Towerline Road. About two hours later, a milk truck drove into the yard to make its regular pickup.

The rack truck suddenly rolled down the driveway, careened off the milk truck and headed toward Mrs. Kaiser and two small neighbor children. She was able to push the children out of danger, but was struck by the rack and pinned against the building.

Mrs. Kaiser was treated at Tollen Hospital, West Branch, for bruises and lacerations to the body.

## Iosco Allocation Board Adopts 'Tax Pie' Split

Iosco County Tax Allocation Board adopted, by a four-two vote, a tentative tax split of 8.55 mills for schools, 5.25 mills for county operation, .20 mill for intermediate school district and one mill for townships filing a request.

This action was taken last Tuesday and hearing of the preliminary

order is to be held May 26, 9:30 a. m., at the Iosco County Building.

Splitting the tax pie required a full day of work by members of the allocation board. Four different proposals were considered before final adoption.

The first, presented by William Wereley of Hale, called for nine mills for schools, 4 1/2 mills for the county, one-quarter mill for the intermediate school district and one mill for townships. This received no support and no vote was taken.

Arden Charters of Whittemore then presented a motion calling for nine mills for the county, 8 1/2 mills for schools, one for townships and one-quarter for the intermediate school district. Supported by Wereley, this lost by a four-two roll call. Voting against the measure were Supervisor Lloyd Little of Grant Township, Gordon Huck of East Tawas, Treasurer Grace L. Miller and County School Supt. William Tracy.

Tracy then moved to give the county 5.05 mills, 8.7 mills for schools, one-quarter mill for intermediate school district and one mill for townships. Supported by Wereley, the measure ended in a tie with Tracy, Wereley and Charters voting yes and Little, Huck and Miller voting no.

The final allocation came on a motion by Huck and supported by Little. Voting against the motion were Wereley and Charters and the measure won with affirmative votes by Little, Tracy, Huck and Miller.

Last year, the tax allocation was as follows: County, 5.15 mills; intermediate school district, 15 mill; Tawas Area School, 8.1 mills; Hale Area, 8.09; Whittemore - Prescott Area, 8.09; Oscoda Area, eight mills.

Baldwin, Sherman and Tawas were the only townships which did not request millage for township operation.

Supt. Reynold Mick of Tawas Area School said earlier this week that the 8.55 millage for schools would give Tawas Area approximately \$10,000 more for operation next year than during the current year, based on a 26 1/2-million dollar valuation for the district.

County School Supt. Tracy reports that, based on last year's valuation, increases would be as follows to other schools: Hale Area, \$4,000; Oscoda Area, \$12,000; Whittemore-Prescott Area, \$5,000. All schools, including Tawas, had requests for more operating money than what was granted.

Effective next year, schools are to be allocated a minimum of nine mills or state aid payments are to be reduced accordingly.

## Tawas Lake Watershed Under Study

An inspection of the Tawas Lake watershed was made last Wednesday and Thursday by local and state officials. Federal and state assistance is being sought in a watershed control project.

Councilman Edward Higgins reported at Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council that the group had made airplane flights over the lake to inspect conditions.

In addition to representatives of the department of conservation, Michigan State University and the state drain office, local officials attending included Drain Commissioner E. H. Stickney, Harry Krueger and Richard Rose of the Iosco Soil Conservation Service, County Extension Agent Marvin Davenport, Forest Ranger Joseph Blake and Supervisors C. S. Everett, Robert LaVoy, Charles Smith, Edward Lixey and Edward Nelkie.

With Higgins as president of the Tawas Lake Property Owners Association were Raymond Dosh and Thomas O'Brien.

# Officials Hear Details of County Medical Facility

Nearly 150 civic officials from all areas of the county attended a dinner meeting last Tuesday night at the Tawas Country Club where details of the proposed Iosco County Medical Care Facility were outlined.

Residents of the county are to go to the polls June 2 to decide on a \$300,000 bonding proposition to finance construction of a facility to care for senior citizens of the county. If approved, the above amount would be added to a federal grant of \$250,000 to aid in construction.

Among the speakers was Clyde Lombard, director of the Oceana County Department of Social Welfare. With a comparable population of 16,000 and a state equalized valuation of 35 million dollars, about 20 million dollars less than Iosco's, Oceana is completing a new 45-55 bed medical care facility costing \$530,000.

Lombard said that Oceana had operated a medical care facility for the past 10 years, having modeled an old county infirmary to the extent that it passed qualifications to receive Medical Aid to the Aged. This guarantees that 90

## Prosch Assigned as Park Ranger

Ray Prosch, former assistant ranger at Mitchell State Park, Cadillac, has been appointed manager of the state park at East Tawas succeeding William Kusey.

A native of LeRoy, Prosch started his career with the Michigan Department of Conservation as a ranger at Glen Arbor. After spending two seasons there, he moved to Muskegon for 1 1/2 years. He served at two different parks in 1959, Silver Lake and Ludington, before moving to Mitchell State Park as assistant ranger.

Married and the father of two sons, Prosch and his family reside in a trailer home at the state park. In his new job, Prosch will have charge of the East Tawas State Park and the new Tawas Point State Park.

Expressing enthusiasm over the latter, which is now in the building stages, Prosch said it was his first chance to work on new park construction.

Contractors are presently engaged in building a new road to serve Tawas Point and a well has been drilled. The master plan calls for 250 campsites in the original project.

Yockey Brothers of Alpena are constructing the road using an asphalt stabilization method. This is the first time a black top road has been constructed in a state park using this method.

Prosch reports that 1963 apparently will be a busy year at East Tawas. Attendance is up more than 500 over last year and total camps used to May 10 were 489 as compared to 367 during the corresponding period last year.

The state park will have a crew of 10 persons including the ranger effective June 15. One new ranger here is M. Ron Fenby of St. Louis, who is in his first year with the department.

## Hearing Held Monday Night on ET Budget

Hearing on the City of East Tawas' operating budget for next year was held Monday night. No complaints were heard or appearances made by taxpayers.

The city will levy 1 1/2 mills on its \$2,765,150 valuation to bring in \$33,920.43 to meet its operating budget. This is \$1,128 higher than the current year's budget.

A breakdown of budget expenditures is as follows:

Contingent fund, \$11,337.11; maintenance of buildings, \$4,147.72; sanitary service, \$5,530.30; street lighting, \$8,157.20; cemetery, \$663.64; recreation, \$829.54; streets, \$10,231.38; fire protection, \$2,350; hydrant rental, \$9,954.54; revolving fund, \$276.52; tree planting, \$442.42.

In other business, Frank Deschamps, Alpena, district engineer for the highway department, reported that the department would extend its storm sewer on property owned by T. S. Dimmick to the water's edge of Tawas Bay. This is being done because of a complaint concerning an unsightly condition caused by the drain.

## Christian Science Lesson-Sermon

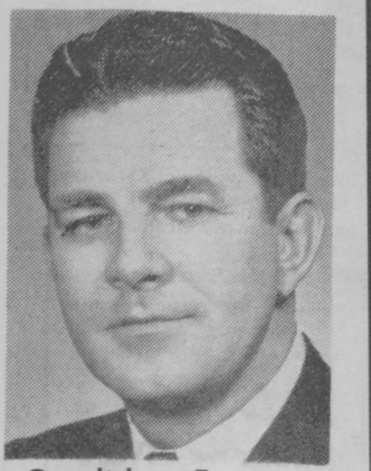

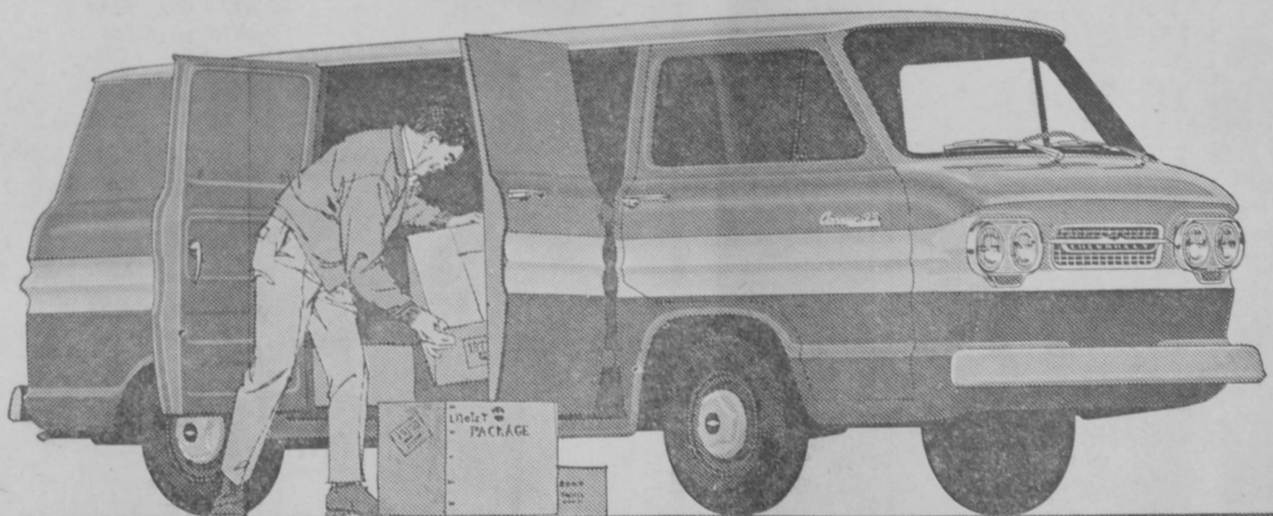

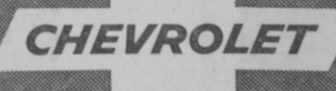
