The Rev. Fr. Arthur Mulka will be principal speaker at Memorial Day services Thursday at Veterans Cemetery, East Tawas.

The program is being held under auspices of Audie Johnson Post No. 214, American Legion. A parade will assemble at the Legion Hall on Newman Street at 10:00 a. m. with scheduled departure at 10:30, states Commander Russell M. Myers. Marching will be the American Legion and auxiliary, Tawas Area High School Band and boy scouts.

The parade will proceed to Michigan Waterways Commission Dock where naval dead will be honored with a tribute and salute from the firing squad. The marchers will then proceed to the Michigan State Police Post where cars are to be boarded for the cemetery.

Commander Meyers is parade sergeant. Chaplain John Mielock will deliver the invocation and benediction.

Placing of a wreath on the veteran's monument and a salute from the firing squad will honor the dead of past wars and those who have since departed.

Supervisors Urge 'Yes' Vote—

Medical Care Facility Goes to Voters

People of Isosco County will vote Tuesday, June 2, on a county medical facility being proposed by the board of supervisors. The county-owned and operated nursing home would provide the facilities necessary to give the type and kind of care and therapy required by older people.

To be located on an 80-acre site west of Tawas City in Tawas Township, the 50-bed facility would cost approximately \$550,000, completely furnished and ready to operate. Construction would be financed by a \$300,000 bond issue and a federal grant of \$250,000.

The bond issue, should it win approval, would cost taxpayers approximately 92 cents per thousand dollars of assessed valuation for 15 years.

"At present, we are caring for many patients at hospital costs who need and would be far better off with good nursing care as provided by a facility such as the one being proposed," states C. S. Everett, chairman of the county welfare committee.

"In 1963, Isosco County spent \$62,350 for hospital care of older

people. This amounted to 1,614 patient days. If one-half of this care could have been given these people in a nursing home where federal medical aid to the aged is provided, which pays 93 percent of this care, the savings to this county would have been \$23,105," said Everett.

County Welfare Director Edward Burgess reports that Isosco has 30 patients who are maintained in nursing homes under direct relief care. Such patients cost the county \$10,166 during 1963. The same patients cared for in a

medical care facility would have cost approximately \$2,421.50, he points out. This savings would have resulted from federal and state funds granted to eligible medical care facilities for operation.

"From these figures, one can readily see that the savings to our county welfare budget will repay the amount of the bond issue over a reasonable period of years," states Mr. Everett.

It is the hope of the board of supervisors that at least 20 beds will be held open for private-pay patients of the county.

Life of the building would be approximately 50 years or more. The site selected overlooks a beautiful grove of white pine at the southwest corner of Harris Avenue and North Street. Water and sewer are available at the site.

"We desperately need good, clean, decent care for our older citizens," states Mr. Everett. "The proposed medical care facility or county-owned nursing home would be the solution to our problem."

"Every year, someone knocks on your door to ask for a donation

to the United Fund, the American Cancer Society and other charities. We give what we can because we know that we, who can take care of ourselves, must help those who cannot. We do not know exactly how the money is used, but we take it on faith that it will be put to good use.

"Now, what if someone came to your door and asked for a donation of \$1 or \$2 to help all the older folks right here in Isosco County who needed nursing care and could not take care of themselves?" (See VOTE, page 10.)

School Seeks to Borrow \$58,000 on 1965 Taxes

A resolution adopted Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education authorized the district to request permission to borrow \$58,000 on anticipated taxes to finance current construction of an addition to the East Tawas Elementary Unit.

Application is to be made with the Municipal Finance Commission seeking approval for issuance of bonds in the above amount. The bonds would be due April 1, 1965, when the district receives approximately \$79,397 in taxes from the special levy approved by voters in 1961.

In addition, the board authorized transference of \$9,895.56 from state aid money to the building and site fund. This represents five percent of the total amount received from state aid and such transfer is permissible.

In other financial matters discussed at the regular meeting, Supt. Reynold Mick reported that the school district was in very fine condition as the year closes. Money was received from several unexpected sources, he said.

Mick was of the opinion that now would be an opportune time to purchase a number of necessary items, along with talks on a cooperative effort in constructing a track, will be heard at the next meeting.

In other business, the board adopted a schedule of paying \$15 daily to substitute teachers for the first 10 consecutive days of filling in for a specific teacher and then paying on the salary schedule after that time.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary supervisor, said that only one substitute teacher was available for elementary grades. The superintendent said that all schools in the county had the problem of obtaining substitute teachers and would welcome any applications.

A sample contract for possible use under the new teacher tenure act was submitted for inspection. A professional problems committee from the school faculty has met with administrators and studied a sample contract provided by the state board of education. Several changes were made and the new form is to be studied

Old Rail Car Readied in Park for Museum

First step in establishment of a railroad museum here was accomplished last Wednesday and Thursday when an old wooden way car or "caboose" was moved from the Detroit and Mackinac Railway yards to the Tawas City Park.

Such a project has been under consideration here for the past two years. When several old cars were being burned for scrap metal in 1962, it was suggested that a way car be saved for possible use as a museum.

Only two wooden "caboose" remained in service on the north end of the line and D&M President C. A. Pinkerton Jr. ordered that one of them be spared from the eventual scrap pile.

Earlier this month, a section of track was constructed in the park. Last Wednesday, the D&M's dragline picked the car off its trucks and placed it on a low trailer. The car was then transported to the park where it was reassembled on the rails.

Donated by the D&M, exterior of the old car is to be scraped and repainted in the traditional red color with the once familiar "turtle" trademark of the D&M painted on each side.

Interior of the car will probably be retained in its present early 1900 form, although freshened up with a new coat of paint and minor repairs.

The car is equipped on the interior with an old-time potbelly coal stove, work desk and seats, along with storage areas. The observation cupola is still intact.

Members of the Tawas City Park Board are to meet soon to make plans for converting the old car into a museum. It will house an exhibit of more than 100 railroad pictures collected by this newspaper over the past 20 years.

Included in the collection are pictures of steam locomotives and trains from the narrow gauge era of the Detroit, Bay City and Alpena Railroad and preceding roads, through the steam and diesel eras of the present-day D&M.

It is also hoped to include a collection of such railroad memorabilia as switch locks, lanterns, oil cans, uniforms, etc.

Assisting the D&M crew in moving the car to its new location were men and equipment of the Tawas City Department of Public Works under supervision of Foreman Arthur Wegner.

School Bus Bids Opened Monday by Board of Education

Bids were opened Monday night on furnishing a school bus and station wagon to Tawas Area School District. Bids are to be reviewed for action at the next board meeting.

Ottawa Equipment Company of Tawas City entered bids on two different International chassis. With a Wayne body, one bid totaled \$6,995.94 and, with the same chassis but a Superior body, the price was \$7,005.94. An alternate bid received was an International chassis with Wayne body, \$7,210.24, and with the same chassis but a Superior body, \$7,220.24.

William Look and Son, East Tawas, entered a bid for GMC chassis and Wayne body of \$7,123, and GMC chassis and Superior body, \$7,137.

Ingils Ford Sales of Tawas City entered a bid of Ford chassis with Wayne body, \$7,020.63, and with a Superior body, \$7,034.63.

Alternates included a minut gas heater and 100-amp alternator. All three firms entered a bid of \$325 on the gas heater. Ottawa's bid on the alternator was \$85.27, Look entered a bid of \$100 and Ingils' bid was \$155.40.

Bids on the station wagon saw Look entering a bid of \$3,782.99 on a Pontiac nine-passenger. Allowing \$2,226.10 on the 1962 wagon owned by the school, the difference would be \$1,556.89.

Ingils entered three different bids, with the difference after trade-in of \$1,200, \$1,400 and \$1,500.

Freighter Disables Alabaster Tramway

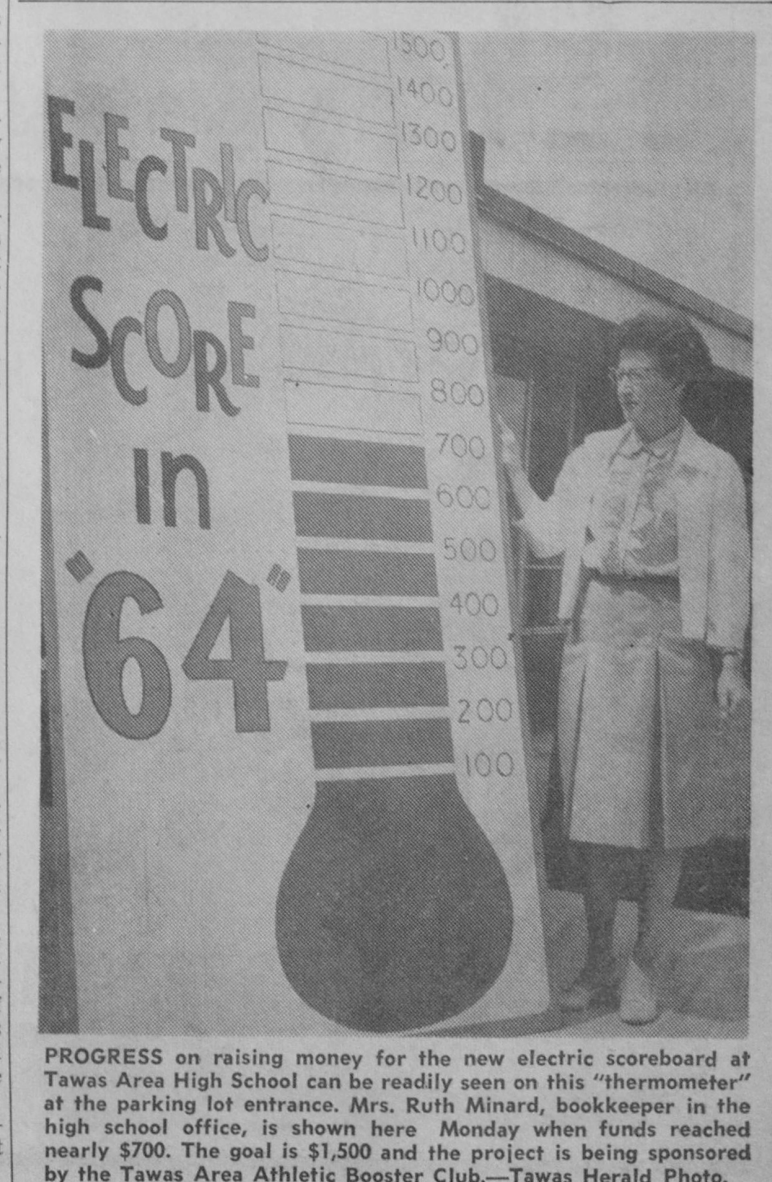
The Fred A. Manske, 10,000-ton lake carrier of the Boland and Cornelius Steamship Company, crashed into the tramline of United States Gypsum Company's Alabaster installation Friday morning and put the shipping operation out of commission for about three days.

The ship, named for the president of the competing gypsum firm, became entangled with a three-quarter-inch cable on the tramline and dumped 10 buckets into 22 feet of water.

Repairs were still being made to the equipment early this week. Each bucket, weighing about two tons each when filled with rock, must be "fished" from the lake.

Maynard VanOrnum, works manager at Alabaster, said that this was the first time a lake carrier had even missed the turn at the lake bin and caused any damage.

The bin is located about 1 1/4 miles off shore. The tramline is used to transport gypsum rock from shore over the water to waiting carriers.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, Michael and William; three daughters, LaVerne, Mignon and Mary, all at home; four brothers, Lyle and Chester of Hale, Charles of Bay City and Stanley of Flint; two sisters, Mrs. Violet Small of East Tawas and Mrs. Iva French of Hale.

TA School Board Continues Policies

Continuation of two different school policies was adopted Monday night by the board of education.

The first deals with the handling of students during a tornado alert. Supt. Reynold Mick reported that the state recommends disbursement of students when an alert is received, the reason being that fewer children would be injured if a tornado should strike.

Mick was of the opinion that in Tawas' case, it would be safer to keep the children in designated areas of the school building, rather than to send them home by bus. He said that in many instances, parents would not be home when children arrived. He also pointed out the danger of falling trees in a storm.

The board is to continue its policy of sending students to certain designated areas of school buildings during a tornado alert.

The second policy concerned prohibiting student-sponsored activities to be held at business places (restaurants or other eating establishments) where alcoholic beverages are sold. One student-sponsored activity was canceled by the administration this spring because of the above rule.

The board of education reaffirmed its policy of requiring all student-sponsored functions of such a nature to be held at the school.

Whittemore Track Opens Race Season

Whittemore Speedway opens its 16th year of operation this Saturday night with a full card of stock and road car events.

Racing will be held each Saturday night through the Labor Day week-end on the one-quarter mile oil embanked track.

President Nelson Ostrander announces that both grandstands have been rebuilt during the past year and the track now has a seating capacity of approximately 1,500 persons.

The parking lot has been improved, along with lighting facilities and restrooms.

Other officers of the association are Stanley Osinski, treasurer; Bruce Goupil, secretary; Donald Armstead, vice president.

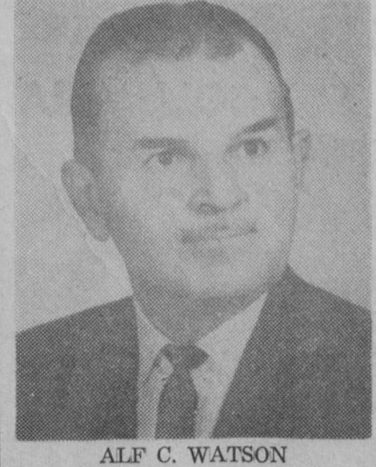
Alf C. Watson Announces Candidacy for Isosco Co. Prosecuting Attorney

Mr. Watson has been city attorney of Tawas City for the past seven months.

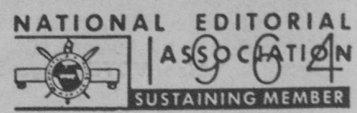

Would we turn them away? I think not. And that is what the board of supervisors is asking us to do... to donate one or two dollars to help our older folks," said Everett.

The problem of finding proper nursing care for older citizens has been studied here for many years and, today, the situation is critical. For years, the one licensed nursing home in this county has been threatened with closure by the state fire marshal.

The board of supervisors has been acutely aware of the need and four years ago started to study the problem. There were three choices:

First, the board tried for two years to find a private party to invest in the building and maintain a private nursing home. No one could be found who had both the desire and the money to do so.

The second choice open was to build and maintain the old type of county poor farm. This would not afford the nursing care that is

needed and would have to be paid for almost entirely by Iosco County taxpayers.

The third possibility was the medical care facility plan as made

available through the Hill-Burton Act and the Kerr-Mills Bill. The Hill-Burton Act has set aside federal funds to pay 45 percent of the cost of construction of such a

county-owned nursing home. The Kerr-Mills Bill would provide 90 percent of the operating cost of the nursing home when it is completed and open for business.
