GENERAL RULES

- Rule 1—Entries close Wednesday, July 29, 1964, 4:00 p. m.
- Rule 2—Any person living in Iosco County, 18 years of age, is eligible to vote at the annual meeting.
- Rule 3—ENTRY FEE: As listed under each Department.
- Rule 4—Premiums are offered and will be awarded on exhibits owned by residents of Iosco, Alcona, Oscoda, Ogemaw and Arenac Counties only.
- Rule 5—Exhibits: Exhibits may be eligible for premiums in more than one class if properly qualified.
- Rule 6—DECLINING ENTRIES: The management reserves the right to refuse to accept an entry, to cancel any entry and to cancel awards of prizes without claim of damages.
- Rule 7—RESPONSIBILITY: The management will not be responsible for any loss, damage, or injury to any animal exhibited, or article destroyed or in any way injured. Each exhibitor will be responsible for an injury that may be occasioned to any person or to the property of any person by any animal owned or exhibited by any exhibitor; and shall indemnify the management against all claims or injury occasioned by any animal owned or exhibited by him, or arising from the acts or negligence of the person in charge of any such exhibit.
- Rule 8—STANDARD EXHIBITS: All exhibitors must comply to standard exhibits, which are as follows:
 - quarts of wheat.
 - quarts of rye.
 - quarts of oats.
 - quarts of barley.
 - quarts of alfalfa, clover or other grass seed.
 - ears of yellow dent corn.
 - ears of white dent corn.
 - ears of any other.
 - potatoes.
 - garden vegetables except cabbage and vine crops.
 - heads of cabbage.
 - squash, pumpkin or other vegetable crops.
 - apples, peaches or pears per plate.
 - bunches of grapes.
 - loaves of bread.
 - jar of jellies, jams or preserves.
 - jar of canned vegetables, fruits or meats.
 - quart of berries.
- Rule 9—In case of only one entry in a class, prizes will be awarded at the discretion of the management.
- Rule 10—In any case where there are fewer entries than prizes offered, prizes will be awarded at the discretion of the management.
- Rule 11—The judge's decision will be final in all cases.
- Rule 12—Each purebred animal

A breeder's young herd shall consist of a boar and three sows from Junior or Senior pig classes and bred by the exhibitor.

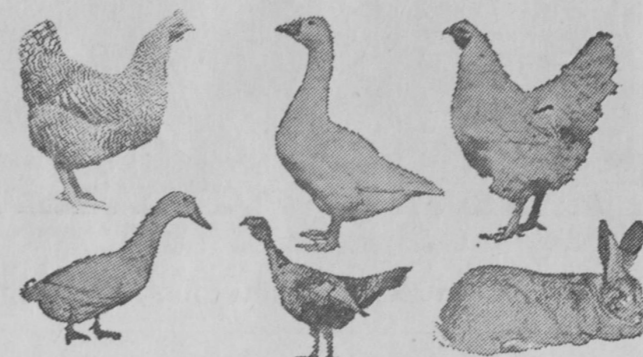

Department of Agriculture Regulation No. 133
Regulation Relating to the Public Exhibition of Poultry

By virtue of the authority provided by Act 181, Public Acts of 1919, as amended, the following rules and regulations are hereby established:

1. Feed and water containers provided for exhibition coops shall be new or properly cleaned.
2. Feed or water containers from which birds have eaten or drunk must be refilled so as not to contaminate the common supply of feed and water. Feed or water containers may not be removed from exhibition coops except for the purpose of cleaning.
3. Exhibition coops must be constructed and placed as to provide adequate light for proper inspection of poultry for evidence of transmissible diseases.
4. Litter for exhibition coops must be of clean material and renewed daily or oftener as needed.
5. Shipping crates used in shipment of birds by common carrier may not be used as exhibition coop. Shipping crates shall be cleaned and disinfected after birds have been removed for exhibition and before being used again.

—Rules—

Exhibitors are requested to read carefully rules and regulations covering exhibition of poultry.

All exhibits shall be (a) purebred (b) cross bred from purebred parents.

All birds showing any general disqualifications according to the Standard of Perfection shall receive no award.

Provided the birds are typical of the breeds which they represent, the placing of awards shall depend upon the following:

- A. Pulletts:
 1. Rapidity of growth.
 2. Depth of pigment.
 3. Uniformity of shape and size.
 4. Promise of egg production.
 5. Absence of defects and disqualifications.
- B. Mature Birds (Hens):
 1. Degree of bleaching.
 2. Condition of abdomen (spread and pliability).
 3. Absence of new primary wing feathers.
 4. Alertness of head and eyes.
 5. Body weight, conformation and fitness.
 6. Absence of defects and disqualifications.

It is suggested, especially for fairs held late in September and October, that all birds exhibited go directly from the Fair to market for slaughter so that none of them will be taken back to the farm. The reason for this precaution is that the birds may take back some disease to the farmer and injure his egg production of his farm flock, if such disease is infectious and of the type which will lower his egg production.

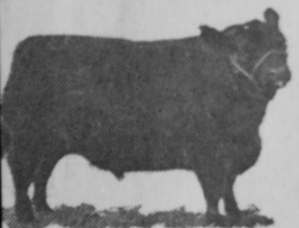
GENERAL

Requirements provided in Michigan Department of Agriculture Regulations No. 116 and 117.

Livestock affected with a communicable disease must not be exhibited at nor brought to fairs.

At least seven days before an exhibition of livestock, the buildings and yards shall be thoroughly cleaned of all manure, litter and unused hay and straw. Following such cleaning, all structures shall be thoroughly sprayed with an approved disinfectant. After cleaning and disinfection, no livestock shall be placed in such pens until admitted for exhibition.

All exhibitors must furnish their own feed bucket, water buckets and other equipment. Common water tanks are not permitted.



CATTLE

Requirements provided in Michigan Department of Regulations No. 117 and 126 and Act. No. 1 of the Public Acts of 1919, as amended.

All cattle for exhibition must be free from infections and contagious disease. (a) Cattle from Michigan:

Tuberculin test not required unless from herd under quarantine tuberculosis.

Passed blood test for Brucella (Bang's disease) from official laboratory as follows:

(b) Male or female cattle over one month of age (except as provided in paragraph 3 below) must be accompanied by official tuberculin test chart showing made within 90 days of exhibition; OR

(c) Evidence of origin from fully tuberculin tested (Bang's disease free) herd; OR

(d) Evidence of origin from herd under process of accreditation which had two clean herd tests within one year.

(e) Vaccinated young stock exempt from blood test requirements one year after vaccinations if the following requirements are met:

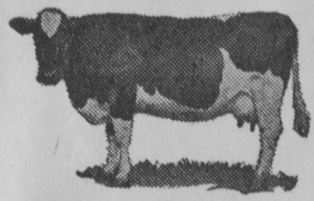

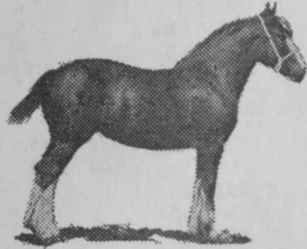

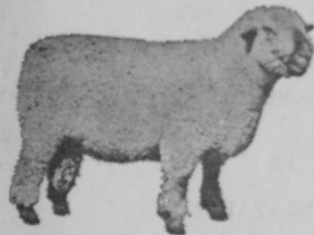

NOTE—No vaccination required on pigs less than six weeks old if nursing a sow vaccinated with serum and virus.

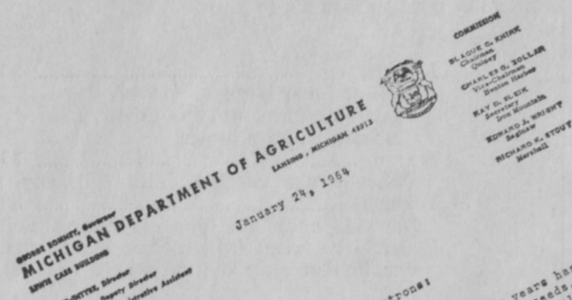

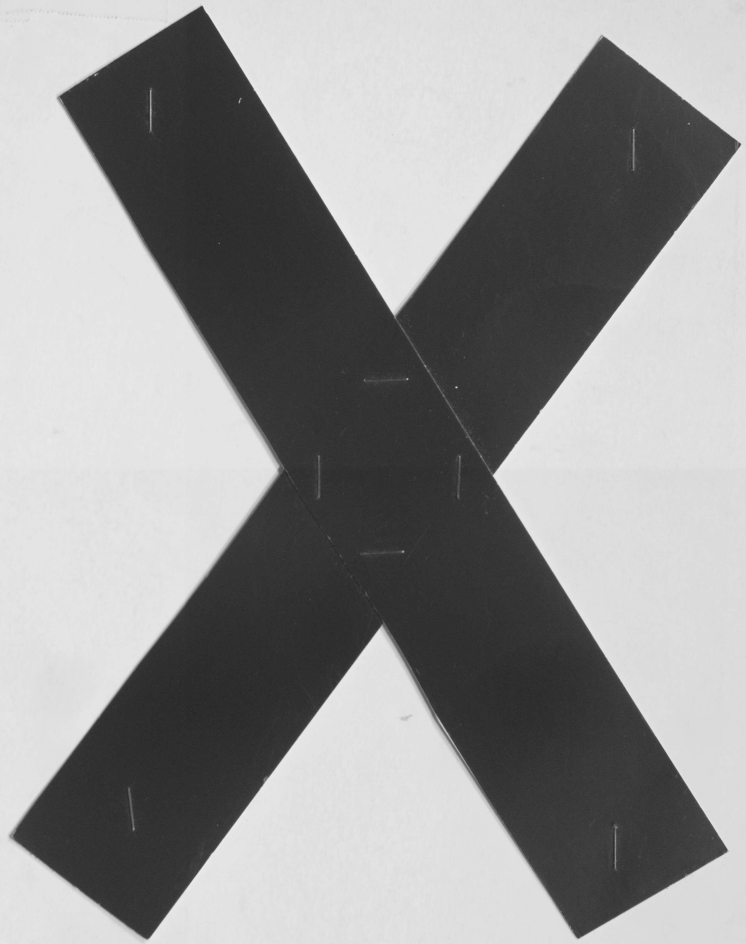
