Third District Appeals Race Still in Doubt

Latest reports in the Third. District Court of Appeals race indicated Monday that the outcome was still in doubt.

According to the Associated Press, reports from 1,931 of 1,-997 precincts show that Judge Allan C. Miller of East Tawas was only 1,318 votes behind Robert E. Burns of Grand Rapids for the judgeship.

There was considerable confusion over the "final" count last week. Unofficial returns from the United Press Thursday night gave Miller an 800-vote nod, while the AP had Miller losing by 3,000 or more votes.

A report in error Friday showed that with only one precinct failing to report, Burns had apparently won the contest, having 299,897 votes to 296,553 for Miller.

Monday's tally showed that 66 precincts-three percent of the total number in the district, had yet to report. Local observers were keeping their fingers crossed in the hope that these missing precincts were located in . the northern half of the Lower Penin-

sula, which would favor Miller. The Third District includes all of Michigan except the southeastern portion of the state and the


