## Chamber Mailing New Fair Share Dues Schedule

According to Leonard Calabrese, chairman of the budget and finance committee of the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, all present and potential members of the chamber will be receiving information concerning a new concept of chamber dues.

The new "fair share minimum dues schedule" of the chamber of commerce is to be mailed to more than 400 businesses or organizations in early December.

Calabrese said that he and his committee felt that a more realistic outlook must be taken regarding the collection of chamber dues. For the past several years, it has been the procedure for the chamber to ask, basically, for the same amount of dues from all potential members.

"This is not realistic," said the chairman. "The new plan will

utilize a fair share basis for collection of membership. For example, retail businesses will now be classified as small, medium and large, the classification basing itself on number of employees. Ten or more employees is a large retail outlet, four to nine a medium and three or less a small retailer."

Yearly dues, he said, will be more for the larger retailer and less for the smaller outlet. This amount will be paid plus \$2 for each employee. Obviously, a larger retailer will be paying more than the smaller establishment. Next week, this newspaper will publish the exact dues schedule to be used in 1965 and the fair share plan will be quite clear to all.

"It is important that the collection of memberships be run in a strict businesslike manner and that is exactly how the new procedure will operate," said Calabrese. "Each member is to be billed quarterly, giving him the convenience of dividing his dues into four separate payments. However, the member has the choice of paying quarterly, semi-annually or annually."

The membership drive is to be held one month after the second billing, which would be during May of each year.

The budget and finance committee stressed that payment of chamber dues is not just another financial obligation, but an investment in the Tawas City-East Tawas area. Payment of many bills is not deductible from income tax, but chamber dues are deductible. This is money spent to earn money.

Literature that many will receive through the mail will contain a letter from Ralph Western, chamber president; a letter from Calabrese, and the new dues schedule. All will be asked to analyze this new schedule, classify themselves and to fill out and return the postcard to the chamber office by December 15.

The first billing is to be sent out early in January of 1965.

"It must be remembered that a strong chamber cannot exist without sound financial support and this can come only from those who benefit," said Calabrese.

"There is no business or organization that does not benefit from the work of the chamber. This dues schedule will follow economic trends which are both realistic and logical."

## Heart Attack Fatal to Oscoda Hunter

A 69-year-old Oscoda man, John P. Behrens, became Iosco County's second fatality of the deer hunting season when he died of a heart attack last Thursday.

The victim and his son-in-law, Leo Cardinal, a lieutenant on the Bay City Police Department, went hunting at 2:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon and were to meet an hour and a half later. Behrens did not show at the appointed place.

Cardinal followed his father-in-law's tracks into the woods and found his body.

Investigating state police and Oscoda Township officers learned that Behrens had a medical history of heart trouble. Assisting in the investigation was Coroner E. John Moffatt of East Tawas.

## Final Phase—

### Board Discusses Plans for Junior High Wing

Now that the new addition to the East Tawas Elementary Unit is completed and in use, Tawas Area Board of Education will soon focus its attention on the final phase of a building program adopted by district voters in 1961.

At Monday night's regular meeting, Supt. Reynold Mick said that approximately \$120,000 would be

available for the project's final phase—construction of classroom facilities for junior high school and construction of a new shop.

Although the district could use these classroom facilities immediately, because of an enrollment bulge in lower grades, actual construction probably will not start until the summer of 1967.

In the two previous phases—the above mentioned elementary addition at East Tawas and the new Tawas City Elementary Unit—both were completed ahead of schedule as set up originally under the pay-as-you-go program. This was accomplished by borrowing against anticipated tax revenue.

Mick reported Monday night that, under terms of the new state constitution, borrowing against the future taxes was probably not permissible. Building ahead of schedule probably has resulted in a \$25,000 saving to the district as construction costs have increased \$3 a foot during the past six months.

## Two Iosco Schools Win Settlement on Bleachers

Two Iosco schools are nearly \$3,000 richer today following an out-of-court settlement with several supply firms involved in a price rigging conspiracy. Upwards of 100 schools in Michigan were also involved, along with schools from at least four other states.

Tawas Area School received \$1,440.77 and Whittemore-Prescott Area School won approximately \$1,200 in a settlement involving collusion among firms supplying bleachers back in 1957.

Supt. Reynold Mick of Tawas Area said that the case concerned joint price fixing by suppliers to decide which firm would win the bid. In Tawas' case, the board of education did not accept the low bid as it preferred a different type of bleacher.

Attorney Herbert Hertzler, who represented both local schools in the litigation, said that proceedings were instituted and burden of work was carried by the state attorney general's office.

It was generally agreed by the Tawas Area Board of Education that its share, after deducting \$200 for legal fees, would go toward construction of restroom facilities at the athletic field.

## Story Proves It's A Small World

"So there stood two people, both grandsons of two sisters," writes Mrs. Schenkel. "Neither of them knew the other existed until I called the Hewsons and asked some questions."

Hewson is the grandson of the late May (Charles) Hewson of East Tawas; Mrs. Schenkel's son is the grandson of Mrs. Nellie (James) Brown of Tawas City.

## Tenure Act Taxes Principal Work Load

A decision is to be made by the December 14 meeting of Tawas Area Board of Education relative to a plan whereby elementary and high school principals would be relieved of some duties so as to perform certain requirements of the new teacher tenure act.

Under the new act, each teacher must be observed in the classroom and evaluated during the school year, using a prescribed formula. This visitation is to be made once each semester for probationary teachers and one year for those teachers already on tenure.

The administration and board is studying the possibility of hiring Mrs. Therna Duquette as a full-time clerical employee, assisting in compilation of guidance information. She presently maintains hot lunch records on a part-time basis. Thomas Pitkowski, guidance counselor, would then become director of transportation, in addition to his regular work. Principal Ernest Jordan handles transportation at present.

Possibility of hiring a building principal at East Tawas to relieve Miss Clara Bolen of some of her duties is also being discussed. Hiring a clerk in her office the year around was also mentioned.

In other business Monday night, the board approved installation of special telephone equipment in an elementary classroom if it meets the approval of administration and teacher and if total expense of installation and service is paid by the parents.

Miss Bolen reported that the parents of an elementary student, who would be bedridden for several months, had requested installation of special telephone equipment in the classroom and the child's bedroom. Through use of the two-way communication system, the child could maintain contact with classroom work.

Miss Bolen said that this installation would be a "first" for this area. Cost of the special telephone service would be \$19.25 a month and \$15 for the installation. She said the program was used successfully in many states.

Possibility of either blacktopping or transplanting sod on the playground at East Tawas Elementary Unit is to be studied.

A request for use of school buses to transport local children to the Shrine Circus at Saginaw was denied by the board. It was pointed out that such transportation for nonschool connected activities was in violation of state law.

## Recent 'Walkathon' Was Not a First

After reading the story concerning two men who walked across the state a week ago, L. H. Braddock of Tawas City recalled that he had been told of a similar feat many years ago.

"This 'walkathon' from Lake Michigan to Lake Huron was not really a first," said Mr. Braddock. "The late Suple Brabon covered this same route more than 75 years ago."

The 93-year-old Tawas Cityan said that Mr. Brabon told him of his trip around 1900. The hike, about 25 years previous to that time, was through uninhabited wilderness.

## District Supervisors Meet Here Dec. 3

Fourth District Supervisors Association will hold its quarterly meeting December 3 at the Iosco County Building.

L. S. Little, district president, said the meeting had been scheduled for the new Roscommon County Courthouse. Supervisors and township officials are to meet at Roscommon in March.

Between 50 and 60 supervisors are expected to attend the meetings here next week.

## Receives Sentence on B&E Conviction

Daniel Koblinski was sentenced to serve 45 days in jail, placed on probation for 2½ years and was ordered to pay restitution on conviction of breaking into several cabins in Oscoda Township last month. He appeared before Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller last Friday.

Koblinski was apprehended through the joint efforts of the Iosco Sheriff's Department and Flint Police Department.

Robert N. Rollin is to continue his service as a Tawas City justice of the peace, it was announced this week. The city council seeks to fill a second JP vacancy.

## Judge Miller Loses Bid for Appeals Ct.

It's official—Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller lost in his bid for the third seat on the state court of appeals.

According to a report from the state board of canvassers Monday, Miller lost by 5,159 votes. Robert E. Burns of Grand Rapids received 306,667 votes to Miller's 301,408.

This ended one of the closest races at the state level in history. The outcome was in doubt for almost three weeks following the election.

Late returns and the long job of counting ballots stalled announcement of a winner for two weeks. Even the "unofficial final" results announced last Saturday by the state election board were in error, but not enough to change the outcome.

With three precincts to count, it appeared as though Miller held a margin over Burns, but he lost Saginaw by 5,000 votes, in Kalamazoo by 811 and in Calhoun by 146.

All in all, Miller made a very impressive running. He carried 40 of the 66 counties in the district. He was third in every county of the 10th Congressional District but Clare and carried over half the counties in the Upper Peninsula.

With 1,928,780 votes being cast in the district, John W. Fitzgerald added 406,090 votes, Donald E. Holbrook received 382,222, Maurice Black received 269,696 and Austin J. Doyle garnered 262,636 votes.

Building ahead of schedule probably has resulted in a \$25,000 saving to the district as construction costs have increased \$3 a foot during the past six months.

In order to inform the three newest board members (Mrs. Helen Payne, Clyde Soper and Donald Deering) of past planning, Mick said that the final construction phase would isolate the junior high grades from the high school. Past planning called for utilization of the present shop area, agricultural room and mathematics room at the high school. To this wing would be added three classrooms and toilet facilities.

Mick said that such a plan would allow utilization of the band room, auditorium, library and cafeteria and it would still achieve isolation of junior high students from the high school.

In addition, a new shop building would be constructed at the southwestern corner of the building.

The school superintendent said that investigation should be made into the possibility of obtaining available federal funds for shop construction purposes. However, he pointed out that federal "red tape" requirements may greatly increase the cost of such a project and it may not be worthwhile for this district's purpose.

Miss Clara Bolen, elementary principal, pointed out that there was presently an enrollment bulge in fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grades, while the three lower grades and kindergarten have less pupils this year than usual.

The enrollment increase is also catching up with high school facilities. Grades are increasing by about 10 students each year. By the time new junior high facilities are completed, the enrollment increase will be solved as the high school will take over present junior high classrooms on the west side of the building.

Mick said that the last school census showed a considerable drop in preschool age children. While some grades are bulging at the seams and extra teachers will soon be needed, the problem may be relieved somewhat by transferring some teachers to higher grades.



Coach Bill McIntosh has begun nightly drills to whip his Tawas Area Braves into shape for the coming basketball season. The Braves open December 1 by playing host to Saginaw Buena Vista in a nonconference game.

While McIntosh is in the enviable position of having four letter-winners returning from last season's NBC championship squad, he is in need of bench strength to round out his team over the long haul.

Seven seniors are numbered on the squad, including last season's all-state class B center, Herb Humphrey, Dennis Blata, Darrell Welch, Dennis Radford, Dennis Lorenz and Jim Herman. The seventh senior is a transfer student, Jim Rietler.

The boys have been undergoing strenuous practice sessions during the past two weeks as McIntosh, a great believer in the running game, has been putting his
