

Record Turnout Seen in Tuesday's Gen. Election

Tuesday's election saw a new record turnout of voters as approximately 7,500 ballots were cast in Isosco County. This compared to 6,800 votes in the 1960 presidential election, according to County Clerk George Prescott.

Two races at the county level saw Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell winning over two opponents, Democrat Michael Dolak and Robert Rollin, a sticker candidate who was an unsuccessful candidate in the Republican September primary election.

In one of the hottest township races in county history, L. S. Little won over James Finley for Grant Township supervisor, 150-146. This was an unofficial tabulation received at the county building and probably will require a recount. Little ran on stickers after losing the nomination to Finley at a Peoples Party Caucus last September by a 21-vote margin.

Republican Clarence Curry was re-elected over Democrat Roy Bergeron for road commissioner. All other Republican incumbents were unopposed.

Returns to the Isosco County clerk's office were the slowest in recent history, probably brought on by the large number of split tickets, as evidenced by the large number of votes for President Johnson and the substantial majority for Republican Gov. George Romney. At 5:00 a. m., only seven of 20 precincts had reported.

Other returns saw Republican incumbent Rep. James P. Mielock of Whittemore losing to Democrat Sanford Charron. Mielock was

down 1,518 votes in the entire district at 6:00 a. m.

J. Richard Ernst, running on stickers, was the lone candidate for prosecuting attorney and had 467 votes in 10 of 20 precincts reporting.

Results of the race for appeals court involving Judge Allan C. Miller will not be known until later Wednesday morning.

Cong. Elford A. Cederberg was re-elected and Republican Robert L. Richardson appeared to be winning over James Ireland in the state senate race.

Voting in most precincts was running at 85 percent of the total number of registered voters. Some 835 persons went to the polls in Tawas City.

Slate Second Polio Dose Sunday at Four Isosco Co. Schools

Second and final mass polio immunization will be held this Sunday in Isosco County. The program is sponsored by the local medical association.

Some 7,111 persons—approximately 75 percent of the county population—visited immunization centers September 13 to receive first dose of trivalent oral polio vaccine. It is hoped that all will return for this second feeding Sunday.

The vaccine is to be administered easily and pleasantly on sugar cubes at immunization centers set up in high schools at Tawas, Oscoda, Whittemore-Prescott and Hale. More than 75 volunteers manned the four clinics.

Dr. Harvey Brinkman, chief of staff of Tawas Hospital, who was one of the early organizers of the program for Isosco, said Monday that hours for the immunization will be the same as the first feeding—1:00 to 5:00 p. m.

"I sincerely hope that everyone will be on hand to receive his second immunization in this program which could be the most precious insurance in the world against polio at the lowest possible price," said Dr. Brinkman.

Start Work on New Tawas Trailer Plant

Construction started last week on a new home for Tawas Trailers, Incorporated, which was hit by fire October 13 and is now operating out of temporary quarters.

A 60 by 216-foot concrete block and steel industrial building is being constructed by Truman Barbier at Tawas Center. This location is south of Schaeff Lumber Company on the north side of US-23.

Barbier, an East Tawas petroleum products distributor, said Monday he expects that the \$45,000 building would be completed in about six weeks.

Ronald Korhals, secretary-treasurer of the trailer firm, said Monday that work was just about completed on repairing five trailers, which were damaged in the fire. Other trailers on hand have been shipped to dealers.

A new production line has been set up in a warehouse adjacent to the building which was destroyed by fire. The firm has resumed operation on a small scale while awaiting the arrival of new tools and equipment to replace that lost in the fire.

Awaits Sentence on Oscoda Cabin Break-Ins

A 20-year-old Flint man, Daniel Koblinski, is being held at Isosco County Jail under \$2,500 bond while awaiting presentence investigation in Isosco Circuit Court.

Koblinski was arrested last week by the Isosco County Sheriff's Department and charged with the breaking and entering of four cabins on Bissonette Road, Oscoda.

He admitted breaking into the cabins and then selling property which was stolen.

Oldsmobile Rocket Sign Destroyed by Vandals

Truman Barbier, Oldsmobile dealer at East Tawas, said Monday he would like to send a few Halloween "pranksters" into orbit.

A large Oldsmobile sign along US-23 in Tawas Center was completely destroyed by fire early Sunday morning. The aluminum and wood sign was fashioned in the shape of a rocket and someone poured gasoline at the base and touched it off.

This was the only serious destruction in the area, according to police.

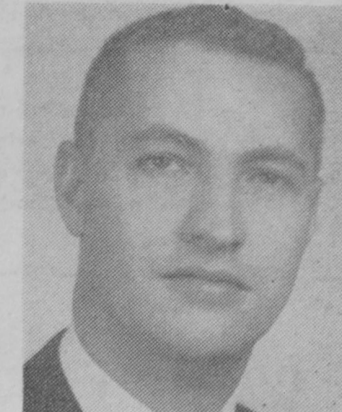

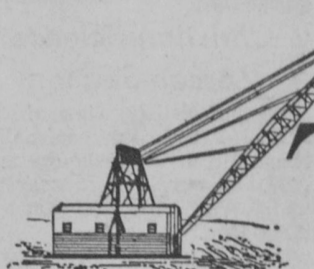

LBJ Wins Presidency; Romney is Re-elected

Pres. Lyndon B. Johnson and his running mate, Hubert Humphrey, won a tremendous landslide victory in Tuesday's general election, defeating Sen. Barry Goldwater and William Miller by a three to two majority.

At 2 o'clock with 80 percent of the votes counted, Johnson held a margin of 13,066,157 votes over the Arizona Republican. At 2:15 o'clock, Johnson had won 43 states and 486 electoral votes as compared to six states and 52 electoral votes for Goldwater. It was the worst Republican defeat since 1936.

Michigan joined the Johnson bandwagon giving the Democratic incumbent a lead of 1,755,715 to Goldwater's 847,409 with 76 percent of the state's 5,213 precincts reporting.

In spite of this near sweep for Johnson, Incumbent Republican Gov. George Romney defeated the Johnson-endorsed candidate for Michigan's top executive post, Neil Staebler, by a 1,183,000 to 1,002,000 margin with 64 percent of the state's votes counted.

Romney showed great strength and state-wide appeal as voters "split" their ballots in his favor over the Democratic nominee. Political observers are predicting that his "national image" has been strengthened to such a point that he may become the national voice of the party.

Tawas Students Gave Majority to Johnson and Gov. Romney

Pres. Lyndon B. Johnson was preferred by nearly a four to one majority over Sen. Barry Goldwater in a mock election held last Friday at Tawas Area High School.

With 380 ballots cast in the election, school students gave the Democratic ticket of Johnson-Humphrey a 287 edge over the 76 votes received by Republicans Goldwater and Miller.

Showing that students were "splitting" their votes, Gov. George Romney was preferred over Democrat Neil Staebler, 231-109. All other Democratic candidates were preferred by students, with the exception that Cong. Alf Cederberg had 179 votes to 175 votes for Hubert C. Evans and State Rep. James P. Mielock had 196 votes as compared to Sanford E. Charron's 151.

Allan C. Miller of East Tawas was top vote getter with 338 votes for appeals court.

Tawas City Employees Get 10-Cent Pay Hike

A 10-cent-an-hour wage increase was granted to all hourly workers Monday night by the Tawas City Council. Some five employees are included in the pay hike, which was effective immediately.

In requesting such action, Supt. Reginald Bublitz said that it had been 14 months since the last pay increase. Salaried workers were not included in the pay increase program.

Wages of laborers were increased from \$1.90 to \$2 an hour; truck drivers, who formerly received \$2 an hour, receive \$2.10; and one heavy equipment operator's pay was increased from \$2.20 to \$2.30 an hour.

Bublitz said the men averaged between 44 and 47 hours per week.

In other business, the council approved a request from McKay Sales Company granting permission to move a temporary building 18 feet toward the rear of its lot on US-23.

The council had allowed the previous owner to construct a frame building within a fire zone under a revokable temporary use permit.

After consulting with Planning Commission Chairman Hugo Keiser, the council approved moving the building. Property on which it is located has been surfaced with asphalt paving and is to be used as a used car sales lot.

Police Chief Frank Roti called attention to the possibility of damage to city streets by persons burning leaves along the edges of blacktop surfaces. Bublitz reported that several people had been cautioned about such practice.

Alderman Cecil Cable suggested that a letter of appreciation be sent to the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company and to William Rapp expressing appreciation for painting the old way car in the

Raise \$411 for Scouts in Hale Area Drive

Fund raising campaign for Boy Scouts of America has ended in the Hale area with \$411 returns. Members of the cub scouts, boy scouts and explorer post in the Hale area and the Paul Bunyan Council express gratitude to Hale citizens for their contributions.

A full round of wage increases was granted to hourly and salaried city employees at Monday night's regular meeting of the East Tawas Council.

A 10-cent-an-hour pay hike to seven hourly workers was made retroactive to October 1 as follows: Mechanic, from \$2.15 to \$2.25; equipment operator, from \$2.10 to \$2.20; truck drivers, \$2 to \$2.10; laborers, from \$1.75 to \$1.85.

Hourly wage paid to the patrolman, hired from May 1 through December 1, was raised from \$1.40 to \$1.50. Salary of the night patrolman was increased from \$370 to \$390 per month and chief of police from \$400 to \$425 per month.

Others receiving pay increases were: City assessor, \$450 to \$475 per year; librarian, \$1.55 to \$1.80 per hour; superintendent of public works, \$525 to \$550 per month; new office clerk (effective January 1), \$250 a month; water filtration plant employees, \$2.30 to \$2.40 an hour.

Police Investigate Robbery-Attack of East Tawas Woman

Investigation continues this week into what was apparently an attempted robbery and attack of an East Tawas woman last Wednesday night.

The victim, who requested that police withhold her name, was found by a passing motorist about 8:30 o'clock lying on the ground at the intersection of US-23 and Church Street.

When treated at Tawas Hospital, it was found that she had sustained numerous superficial wounds on the right leg and upper right arm, believed to have been caused by a knife or other sharp instrument.

The victim told police that, as she was walking along an alley in a parking lot behind stores on the west side of Newman Street, a man accosted her from behind and demanded her pocket book. Finding no money, the man removed a bottle of tranquilizer pills from the victim's pocket book and, she said, slashed her with a knife.

The victim said she was very frightened, that she was unable to see her assailant's face and was unable to give a complete description to police.

Community Chest at 60 Percent Mark; Campaign Extended

Tawas-Whittemore Area Community Chest passed the 60 percent mark Tuesday in its 1964 fund raising campaign, but officials said the drive would have to be extended one week in order to reach the goal of \$10,275.

As of Tuesday noon, \$6,136.80 had been collected during the first two weeks of the campaign, according to Mrs. James DeWysse, campaign secretary. This included 13 businesses and industries with 100 percent pledges.

At the regular Monday morning coffee hour held at the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office, Campaign Chairman William Tracy said that much of the delay in completing this year's campaign had been caused by election day activities. He said the drive would be extended one week in order that all pledge cards may be distributed and then returned.

The drive was to have closed November 7 but has been extended to Saturday, November 14.

Mrs. George Prescott, president of the community chest, announces that a campaign roundup will be held for workers Monday evening, November 9, 6:30 o'clock, at the Barnes Hotel. Progress reports are to be given.

County Sells Medical Care Facility Bonds to First of Michigan Corp.

Low bid of First of Michigan Corporation, Detroit, was accepted by Isosco County Board of Supervisors for the purchase of bonds to finance this county's new medical care facility.

Isosco sold \$300,000 worth of bonds at an interest rate of 3.19151 percent for a period of 15 years. This would amount to \$80,426.25 over that period.

The board had scheduled an interest rate of four percent to finance this project and was pleased that First of Michigan's bid would result in a saving to Isosco.

A second bid was received from the Stranahan - Harris Company and opened at last Thursday's special meeting.

"Both bidders remarked that Isosco had an excellent credit rating and it was for this reason that the interest was below four percent," stated Board Chairman Henry Oates.

Revised schematic plans for the new medical care facility were

presented to the board by Supervisor C. S. Everett, chairman of the welfare committee.

Work on the project is to start next spring with completion before the end of the year.

In other business during the special one-day session, Edward Higgins, East Tawas councilman and president of the Tawas Lake Association, addressed the board concerning the proposed Tawas Lake dam.

This project was side-tracked at the last meeting of the board of supervisors when a vote on condemning property for the proposed dam failed, 10-7.

E. H. Stickney, county drain commissioner, told board members he felt that residents of the special assessment district seeking the dam should meet with owners of the dam site and reach a compromise on the lake level.

There will be no meeting of the board of supervisors during November.

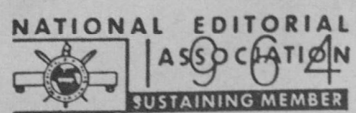

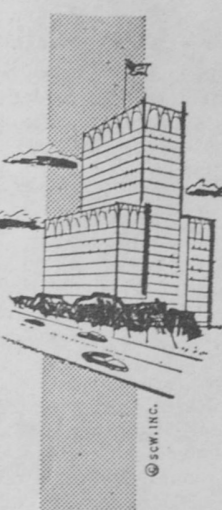

Each year, an annual roundup of cows and ponies is staged. TA Wins Final NBC Tilt; Finish in Third Place

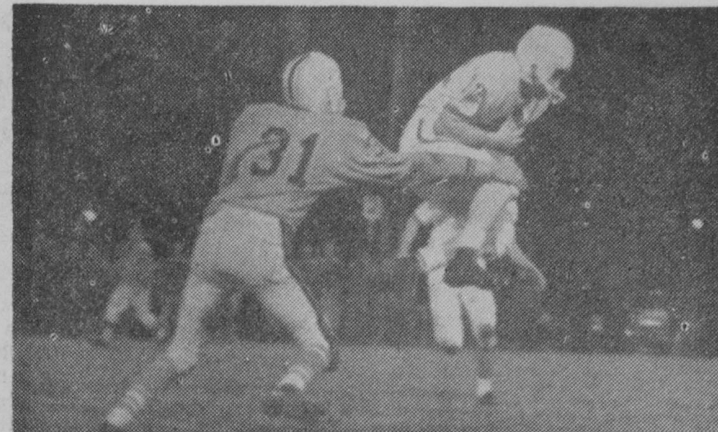
