



## May Reduce **County Budget** by \$25,000

County's 1965 budget is anticipated this week, according to a preliminary report from the board of supervisor's finance committee.

Meeting in October session, the board was told Tuesday morning by Finance Chairman L. S. Little that, despite recent approval of a salary increase to county officers and additional money needed for court of appeals, a canvass of county offices this week indicated that the preliminary budget of last April could be reduced. The budget as brought in last

April was \$327,787 for county operation. With \$30,000 from office fees, the figure to be raised by taxes was \$297,787, highest in county history. The preliminary figure was \$16,833 higher that that adopted in April 1963. Financial matters will concern

most of this week's session, which includes the tax spread for next year. Final county operating budget is to be approved Wednesday or Thursday.

Approval was given Monday to sell general obligation bonds in the amount of \$300,000 to finance construction of a new medical care facility for the county. The bond issue had been approved by a vote of the people last summer and sale of bonds had been authorized by the Municipal Finance

The county is to open bids on the sale of these GO bonds October 29, 11:00 a.m.

The board inspected new hangar facilities Monday afternoon at the county airport and all members were taken for an airplane ride. Supervisor Theodore Bellville of Burleigh Township, senior member of the board, had his first plane ride as did Supervisor Edward Gerard of Sherman Town

Change of Address Notification Slows Up Check Delay

Faulty notification of change of address by social security bene ficiaries can cause considerable delay in receipt of monthly checks, Paul M. Ellifritz, social security district manager in Bay City, pointed out today.

The change of address process is quite simple if the person get ting social security benefits will use the cards given him when an initial claim is filed. These can be obtained from any of the more than 600 social security district offices in the country.

"The person wishing to change his address should give his or her name, the new address and the claim number," Ellifritz said. The latter is always found on the award letter which is furnished every person when his claim for social security benefits is approved.

"In each case, the post office should also be notified," Ellifritz added.

The social security representative for this area will be at the Iosco County Building, Tawas City, Thursday, October 22, from 10:30 a. m. until 2:30 p. m.


