NEM Christian Interfaith Clergy Conference Held

A second Northeastern Michigan Christian interfaith clergy conference was held Monday at St. Bernard's Church, Alpena. Following up the successful meeting at Wurtsmith Air Force Base chapel last February, the conference was planned to take additional steps in understanding and the sharing of matters which will help to open greater avenues of cooperation and cut through ancient prejudices.

The nearly 200 ministers and priests invited to St. Bernard's for the conference, with Fr. Ignatious O'Brien as host pastor, studied the theme of the place of the Scriptures in the church and the World Council of Churches.

Speakers included Fr. Lawrence Dannemiller of St. Francis de Sales Catholic Church, Muskegon; the Rev. Harry Schultz of St. Matthew's Lutheran Church, Heron. They described the place of the Scriptures in each of their traditions.

Following the presentations, a dozen clergymen of the Northeastern Michigan area, representing all faiths, led in discussions around points raised by speakers.

In the afternoon, Bishop Marshall R. Reed spoke on his feelings and convictions for the World Council of Churches, a topic about which some Protestant ministers had questions and in which there is an interest on the part of Catholic priests in understanding.

Morning devotions opening the conference were given by the Rev. Walter C. Pieper of Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church, Tawas City. Closing meditation was given by Fr. Raymond Mulka, St. Mary's Catholic Church, Alpena.

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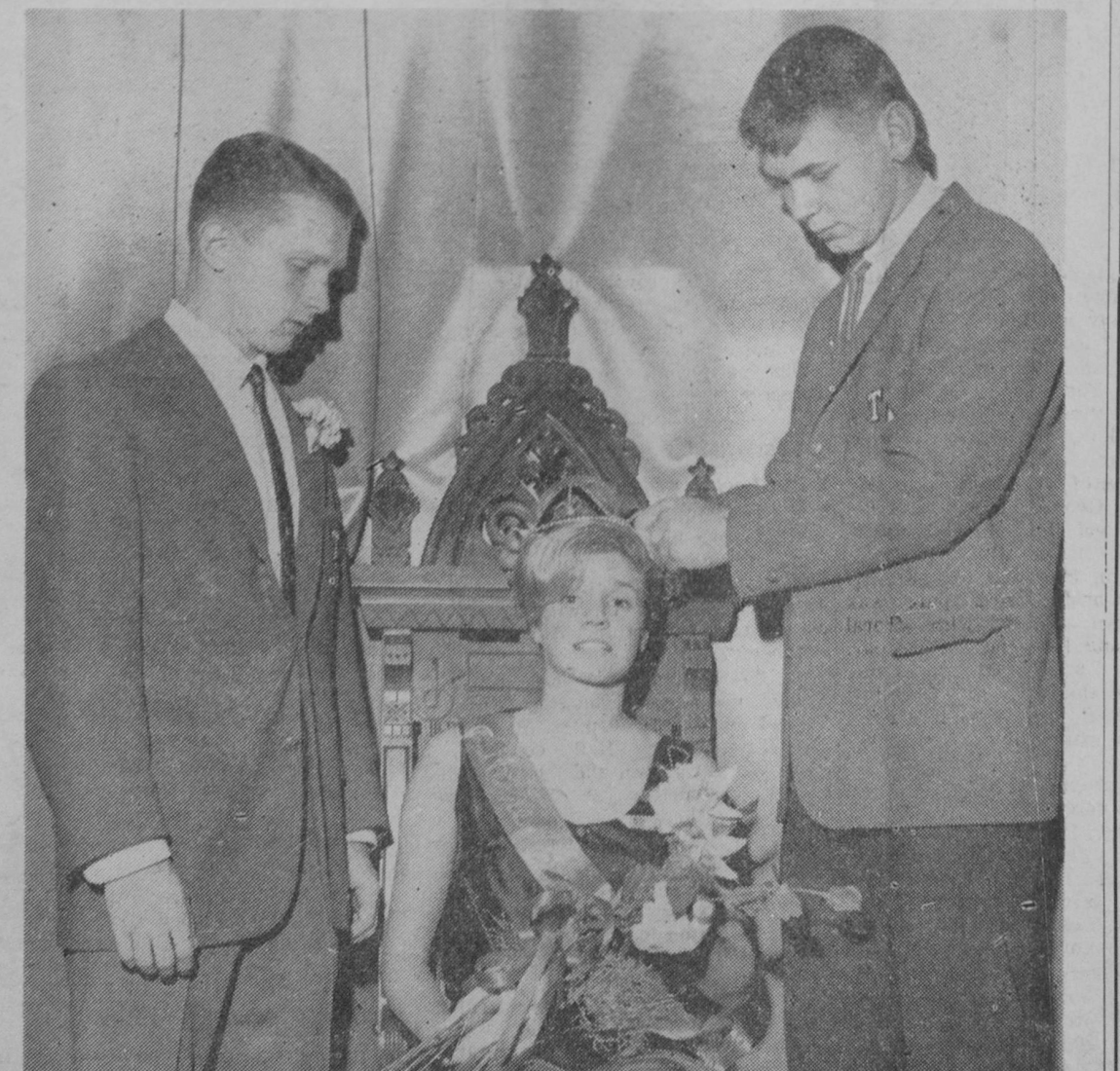


