



APPROVAL was given last week by the Iosco Board of Supervisors for purchase of a tax billing machine at a cost of \$9,000. ## Supervisors Side-Track Tawas Lake Dam Project

Action on the proposed Tawas Lake dam was again side-tracked last week. Iosco Board of Supervisors rejected a motion calling for the start of circuit court condemnation to obtain property for the proposed dam site.

Construction of such a dam has been under consideration since 1959 when former circuit judge, Herman Dehnke, established the lake's legal high level. Since then, an association of lake area property owners have been promoting construction of a dam, which they say, would raise the water level, improve shore frontage and boost recreational value of the lake.

A special assessment district has been established to finance construction and maintenance of the dam and plans have been prepared. Site of the proposed dam is owned by T. S. Dimmick and Charles Timreck. Dimmick accepted an offer of \$50 an acre for his three acres, but Timreck did not accept the \$150 offer.

Last August, the board of supervisors directed the prosecuting attorney and drain commissioner to start condemnation proceedings against Timreck to acquire the property.

A motion from the board's conservation committee calling for adoption of a resolution starting condemnation proceedings was rejected by two roll call votes last Friday.

After the measure failed by a nine to eight roll call, Supervisor Charles Smith of Oscoda, a member of the conservation committee, pointed out that a considerable amount of time, effort and money had been spent over the past four years on the project and that the board had seemed favorable when it directed the drain commissioner, by a 13-3 roll call in August, to start condemnation proceedings.

During discussion, Supervisor Edward Nelkie stated that he was opposed to the dam because he had learned only Friday that it could possibly flood 100 acres of land. Supervisor John Hosbach stated that he did not believe the county should become involved in a lawsuit over condemning property and Supervisor Clement Stephan said that many people owning property along Tawas River had expressed concern as to the effect a dam would have on the river.

"Without a resolution," said Prosecuting Attorney William McCready, "we would not be able to take this matter to circuit court."

Drain Commissioner E. H. Stickey said that an attempt was being made to interest all parties involved in asking for a lower water level. He said that if property owners in the special assessment district realized that they would be liable to pay damages caused

## Ratfish Wins First Retrial

Iosco Circuit Court has granted its first new trial under an August 1 rule change of the state supreme court, which liberalized appeal of court decisions at local expense.

Bernad Ratfish of Bay City, 23, who was serving 18 months for a charge of larceny from a building, was granted a new trial and H. Read Smith was appointed as his attorney.

Since appealing his case, however, Ratfish attempted to escape from the state prison camp at Brighton. He now faces a charge of auto theft.

Judge Allan C. Miller reports that three other appeals are now under investigation here and the court has appointed attorneys for each case.

## City Improvement Plan Aired at Council Meet

A public improvement plan, along with possible means of financing its implementation, as prepared by the city planning commission and its consultant, was presented to the Tawas City Council Monday night.

Some of the major points discussed included revising the city charter from a fourth class city to home rule city, levying taxes on state equalized valuation rather than assessed, methods of payment for capital improvements, proposed public improvements.

This master plan report was the fifth prepared by the planning commission since its organization two years ago. It was developed through assistance of its consultant, Vilican-Leman and Associates, Incorporated, Southfield.

Features of the public improvement phase of the master plan were outlined by Donald Oaks of Grand Rapids, municipal finance consultant to Vilican-Leman. Possible aid from the federal government through urban renewal was outlined by Edward Hustels, head of Vilican-Leman's urban renewal department.

Oaks recommended that serious consideration be given to revising the city charter from a fourth class city to home rule. He said the city would have more clear-cut lines of authority for operation if a home rule charter were adopted because it would be specifically tailored to meet the needs of the city.

In discussing financial facts concerning Tawas City, Oaks noted that property taxes account for only 36.6 percent of the revenue received and expenditures made by the city. At present, Tawas City levies 15 mills for operating and streets on an assessed valuation of \$2,294,500. State statute permits the 15 mills to be levied on the assessed valuation as equalized, which would yield \$70,854.

Oaks pointed out that the city was in very good financial condition. With only \$125,000 on water and sewer general obligation debt which is scheduled for repayment by 1988, the city is permitted to assume a general obligation debt of 10 percent of the 1964-1965 equalized valuation, or a balance available for improvements of \$337,349.

The city council would determine if a capital improvement program is needed and desirable. It would also determine how such a program is to be financed, whether through general obligation, revenue or special assessment bonds, depending if the improvement was of a general benefit to all the city or a service to individuals.

The planning commission has been conducting a series of detailed studies of the various elements of the city leading up to the preparation of a master plan. Proposed public improvement

priorities have included: Immediate (as soon as possible): Enlarge water supply line from East Tawas and additional storage capacity, development of creek side park next to Tawas City Elementary School, develop present area of the city park, Tawas River bridge improvement (US-23), provide parking in business blocks. Short range improvements

## Old Orchard Park Busy; Iosco Profits

Improvements to the county-operated Old Orchard Park on the AuSable River were noted in a report read before Friday's session of the Iosco Board of Supervisors.

Nile Burger and Jess Bolin, park operators, said that 217 trailers were using the park as of last week. There are a total of 410 sites in the park, which includes 135 vacation camp sites for weekend use.

To date, some 26,000 people representing 22 states have used facilities during the past year at Old Orchard Park. Trailer fees totaled \$17,045.07 and \$11,033 was paid out for improvements.

Work during the past year has included construction of 50 new trailer sites last fall and addition of 80 new sites this summer. Installed were 80 new picnic tables, 60 new cooking stoves, five new wells and 900 feet of asphalt driveway. Store facilities have been expanded and the park entrance has been improved with installation of five new mercury vapor lights.

Supervisor Charles Smith of Oscoda, chairman of the conservation committee, said that the park fund has a balance of \$6,014 to start operation next spring. Part of this money is to be used for joint construction with the Michigan Department of Conservation of a new park on the south side of the AuSable River mouth.

Members of the committee serving with Smith are Edward Nelkie, Edward Lixey, Robert LaVoy and George Blust.

## Tawas Trailers Moves Line to Quarters in Warehouse

In spite of last Tuesday morning's fire which wiped out its entire manufacturing operation, Tawas Trailers, Incorporated, expects to be back in production this week-end.

The firm rehired several men Monday and began constructing production line jigs to be set up in a warehouse which escaped damage last week.

"We are going to be cramped here for a while, but at least we have room to continue operation," said President B. J. (Ben) Tarnosky in assuring the company's dealers that production of Tawas Brave travel trailers would be continued.

Pilot models of 1965 travel trailers had been completed and orders received this week are being filled from stock on hand in dealer lots.

An office was set up in one of the trailers immediately following the fire and, after deciding to continue operation last Wednesday, orders were immediately telephoned for new equipment and materials in order to resume production.

Seven Cadillac hearse chassis which were awaiting installation of travel bodies were destroyed in the fire. A new supply of chassis is awaited in order to resume production on this business for an Indiana firm.

The East Tawas plant is also to resume production on coin-operated ice cube machines for a Grand Rapids firm.

"We have received no materials as yet, but should receive a supply later this week," stated Vice President Clyde Montgomery.

"While our loss last week was serious, it would have been much worse had the fire occurred a few

months earlier when the plant was in full production," said Ronald Korthals, secretary-treasurer.

The Tawas Area Development Corporation is now studying the possibility of constructing a new building for the firm. Three committees were appointed at a meeting last Wednesday: Site, James Campbell; finance, Gordon Huck; cost, Floyd Schaaf Jr. Reports are to be made at the regular meeting of this group Wednesday.

A private individual has also offered to construct a new building for the firm north of East Tawas.

County Hires New Dog Warden; OK Location of Pound

Hiring of a new dog warden and construction of a new dog pound was approved Friday by the Iosco Board of Supervisors. The problem had been under study since early last spring.

Hired as dog warden was William Tarnosky, who will serve six months each year in this capacity and six months as water enforcement officer. He is a member of the Iosco Sheriff's Department.

A new 12 by 16-foot portable building is to be constructed on Tarnosky's property located on Meadow Road. The board's building and grounds committee investigated the site Friday and is to make a recommendation as to arrangements for rental of the property.

The old dog pound located behind the county building is to be removed.

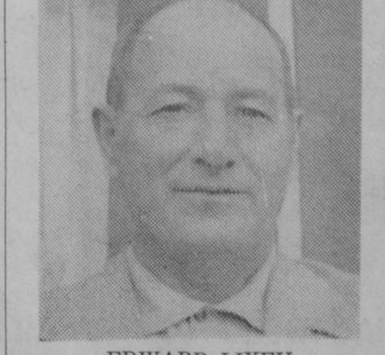

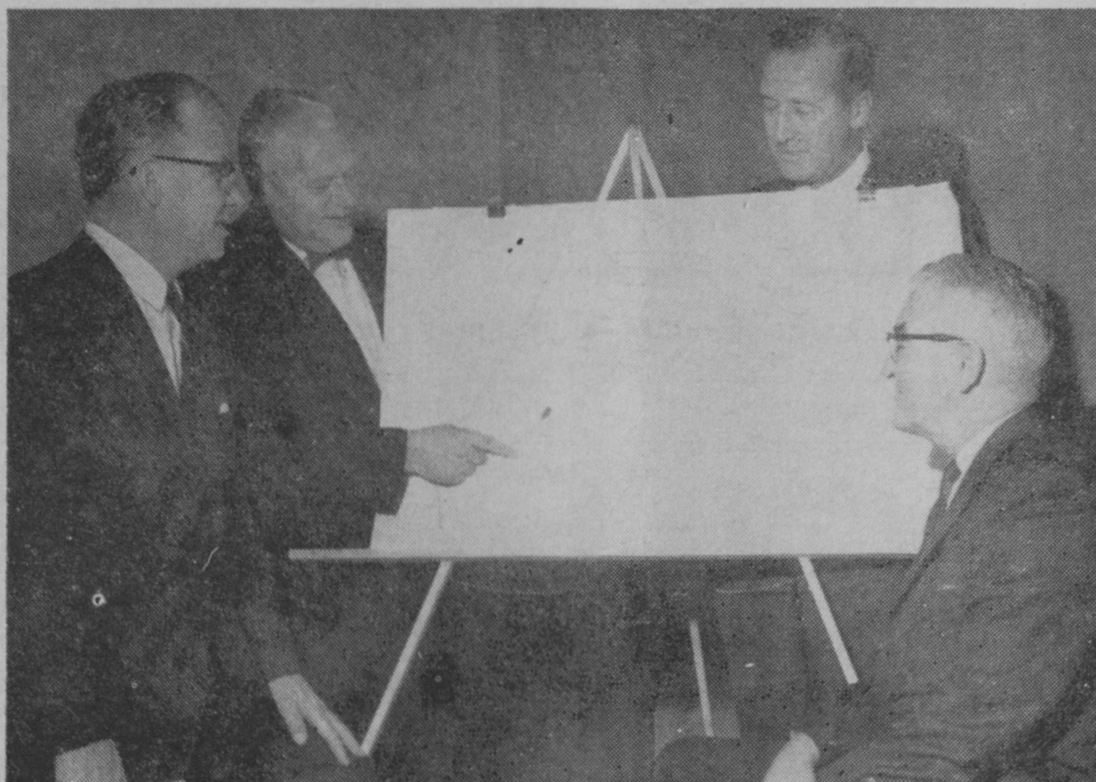

ZONING ORDINANCE RENO TOWNSHIP

AN ORDINANCE to establish Zoning Districts and provisions governing Reno Township, Isco County, Michigan...

ARTICLE ONE-PREAMBLE Section 1.01 Purpose

The primary purpose of this Ordinance shall be: 1. to promote the health, safety, peace, security and general welfare...

Section 1.02 Limitations of Ordinance

1.02.A Existing Use of Lands, Buildings and Structures At the discretion of the property owner...

1.02.B Exemption of Accessory Farm Buildings and Structures The provisions of this Ordinance shall not apply to accessory farm buildings...

ARTICLE TWO-DISTRICTS Section 2.01 Classification of Districts

To achieve the purposes set forth in the PREAMBLE, Reno Township is hereby divided into the following zoning districts: 2.01.A Agricultural - Residential Districts, A-R...

Section 2.02 Interpretation of Boundaries

All questions concerning the exact location of boundary lines shall be determined by the Zoning Board of Appeals consistent with the purposes of this Ordinance.

Section 2.03 Location of Districts

(a) Agricultural and Residential Districts, A-R, shall comprise Sections 1 except the SE 1/4, 2 except a parcel of land in the W 1/2...

(b) Commercial Districts, C-1, shall comprise the property running 500 feet in each direction by 100 feet deep from the intersection of M-55 and M-65...

(c) Recreation and Forestry Districts, R-F, shall comprise the SE 1/4 of Section 1, the SE 1/4 of the NW 1/4 of the NE 1/4 of Section 13, the N 1/2 of the SE 1/4 of Section 21, the S 1/2 of the SE 1/4 of Section 24, Section 25, the SE 1/4 and the S 1/2 of the SW 1/4...

erected shall have side yards on each side not less than ten (10) feet in width. In the event a lot on public record on the effective date of this Ordinance has a width less than required at the building site, each side yard may be reduced to not less than ten (10) percent of the width, but not less than three feet.

ARTICLE THREE - AGRICULTURAL - RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS, A-R

The following provisions shall apply to all Agricultural-Residential Districts, A-R:

Section 3.01 Purpose

The purpose of creating Agricultural-Residential Districts is to promote the use and conservation of the agricultural resources of the Township, and to provide suitable and safe conditions for non-farm residential developments in the District. The Ordinance provides for the location of all dwellings hereafter erected on lots or premises adequate in size to insure safe water supplies and a safe system of sewage and waste disposal...

Section 3.02 Property Uses

The use and occupancy of all lands and premises, and the erection, use and occupancy of all buildings and structures shall hereafter be limited to the following, except as may be subsequently provided by due amendment to the Ordinance:

- 3.02.A Primary Uses 1. Both general and specialized farms, including livestock, truck gardens, tree farming, forestry and nurseries. 2. One-family and two-family dwellings. 3. Home occupations and professional offices as hereinafter defined and limited. (Section 10.05).

Section 3.02.B Uses by Special Approval, as provided by Section 6.07:

- 1. Churches and other buildings of a religious nature, including facilities incidental thereto. 2. Public, parochial and private elementary, intermediate, and high schools offering courses in general education. 3. Publicly-owned and operated libraries, parks and playgrounds. 4. Hospitals, clinics, sanatoria, convalescent homes and similar buildings and structures for human care.

Section 3.03 Size of Premises

Every parcel of land upon which a one-family dwelling is hereafter erected shall contain not less than ten-thousand (10,000) square feet of area, and not less than thirteen-thousand five-hundred (13,500) square feet and such parcel shall not be less than seventy-five (75) feet in width at the building site for one-family dwellings, and not less than one-hundred (100) feet for two-family dwellings.

Section 3.04 Floor Areas

3.04.A Dwellings One-family dwelling hereafter erected shall contain not less than five-hundred-seventy (570) square feet of floor area at the first floor level, and every two-family dwelling not less than 850 square feet for each family. Such areas shall be exclusive of area in any attached garage, open porch or other open attached structure.

Section 3.05 Setback and Yards

3.05.A Setback No building shall hereafter be erected less than forty (40) feet from the front lot line, or high way right-of-way line of the public thoroughfare upon which located.

3.05.B Sideyards Dwellings Every premises upon which a building or structure utilized for human occupancy is hereafter

erected shall have side yards on each side not less than ten (10) feet in width. In the event a lot on public record on the effective date of this Ordinance has a width less than required at the building site, each side yard may be reduced to not less than ten (10) percent of the width, but not less than three feet.

Section 3.05.C Sideyards: Nondwellings

Every premises upon which a nondwelling building or structure is hereafter erected shall have side yards on each side not less than ten (10) feet in width, with an increase of one (1) foot in width on each side for each three (3) feet in overall dimensions along the side yard, and also three (3) feet for every twelve (12) feet in height in excess of twelve (12) feet.

ARTICLE FOUR-COMMERCIAL DISTRICTS, C-1

The following provisions shall apply to all Commercial Districts, C-1:

Section 4.01 Purpose

The primary purpose of Commercial Districts, C-1, is to provide areas suitable for retail and wholesale business activities that are generally compatible, and for personal, professional and other services commonly associated with commercial districts. As in the Agricultural-Residential Districts, provision is also made for other enterprises by Special Approval to fit them into the District in the interest of both such enterprises and commercial developments.

Section 4.02 Property Uses

The use and occupancy of all lands and premises, and the erection, use and occupancy of all buildings and structures shall hereafter be limited to the following, except as may be subsequently provided by due amendment to the Ordinance:

- 4.02.A Primary Uses 1. Retail stores and shops offering chiefly nonmerchandise. 2. Business and personal service shops such as barber shops, beauty parlors, shoe-repairing, dry-cleaning agencies, radio and TV servicing, and similar common commercial businesses. 3. Bakeries, restaurants and food service establishments, but not including drive-ins. 4. Banks, professional offices, real estate and similar businesses. 5. Garages, gasoline stations; and sale service of motor vehicles and farm machinery. 6. Publicly-owned buildings and public utility buildings. 7. Machine and wood-working shops, welding. 8. Storage buildings but not including petroleum or other flammable products. 9. Recreational buildings and structures such as dance halls and amusement enterprises, including playgrounds. 10. Drive-in theater. 11. 4.02.B Uses by Special Approval, as provided by Section 6.07: 1. Used-car lots. 2. Junkyards. 3. Trailer coach parks. 4. Dwellings when demonstrated as a necessity in the operation of any Primary Use, or Use by Special Approval. 5. Manufacturing enterprises. 6. Parking lots. 7. Storage yards. 8. Drive-ins. 9. Wayside stands. 4.02.C Accessory Structures and Uses Accessory buildings, structures and uses customarily incidental to any primary or approved use.

Section 4.03 Setback

No building shall hereafter be erected less than forty (40) feet from the front lot line or any highway right-of-way line abutting the premises. Buildings erected near any intersection of a State or County Highway shall be set back not less than one-hundred-twenty-five (125) feet from the highway right-of-way lines of each public thoroughfare.

Section 4.04 Water Supply and Sewage Disposal Facilities

6.04.A Standards Every building or structure employed in whole or in part for human occupancy or frequency shall be provided with a safe and sanitary water supply, and a method of sewage and waste disposal, each erected and maintained in accordance with the standards of material and installation recommended by the Michigan Department of Health. The use of privies and other outside toilet facilities is prohibited, unless special permission be granted by board.

Section 6.05 Plats and Subdivisions

All future plats and subdivisions shall be in conformity with the provisions of Section 1.01, and be submitted to the Zoning Board through the office of the Township Clerk for approval. All land hereafter platted or subdivided shall be subject to the provisions governing lot size of the District wherein located.

Section 6.06 Grading

No premises shall be filled or graded so as to discharge surface runoff or abutting premises in such a manner as to cause ponding or surface accumulation of such runoff thereon.

Section 6.07 Uses by Special Approval

6.07.A General Requirements Uses by Special Approval, where provided, shall be subject to the provisions of the Zoning District wherein located in addition to the provisions of this Section to prevent conflict with or impairment of the Primary Use thereof. Each use shall be considered as an individual case.

Section 6.07.B Specific Requirements

1. Written application shall be filed with the Zoning Administrator, and shall include the following applicable items: (a) Name of applicant and owner of premises. (b) Legally recorded description of premises. (c) Description of the proposed use, including parking facilities, if required, and any exceptional traffic situation that the use may occasion. (d) A sketch drawn to scale showing size of building or structure, and location on the premises. (e) Description and location of sewage disposal system, and water supply facilities, existent and proposed. (f) The use of premises on adjacent properties. (g) An appraisal by the applicant of the effect of the proposed use on adjacent properties, and the development of the neighborhood. (h) In case of manufacturing enterprises, the following additional statements: The effect of operation on water and air pollution, if any; on emission of smoke, dust, dangerous or obnoxious matter, if any; on noise and glare conditions, if any; and on the proposed treatment of any such condition including industrial waste. 2. Following investigation, the Zoning Administrator shall file his recommendation with the Zoning Board, which may hold a public hearing and shall make a determination thereon. In reaching its determination, the Board shall consider the following: (a) Whether the sewage disposal, water supply, traffic and parking facilities, and the proposed treatment of conditions in the case of a manufacturing enterprise, are safe and adequate. (b) Whether the location, the use and nature of the operation will discourage or hinder the use of adjacent premises, and the appropriate development of the neighborhood. (c) Whether the proposed use is in conflict with purposes of this Ordinance as detailed in Section 1.01.

Section 6.08 Public Utility Buildings and Structures

The erection, alteration and maintenance of public utility buildings and structures, and of power, communication, supply, disposal, distribution and similar public utility facilities, including accessories essential therewith as authorized and regulated by law, shall be permitted in every zoning district, it being the intent hereof to exempt such buildings, structures and systems from the application of this Ordinance when not in conflict with the provisions of Section 1.01. When in conflict, the Board of Appeals shall have the power to determine reasonable conditions under which such facilities may be erected.

Section 6.09 Trailer Coach Occupancies

Except as hereinafter provided by permit, every occupied trailer coach shall be located in a trailer coach park under the jurisdiction of the Michigan Department of Health. Violation of any terms of a permit shall constitute automatic cancellation.

Section 6.10 Trailer Coach Residence

1. Permit No person shall locate or permit the location of any occupied trailer coach on any site, lot, field or tract of land except by written permit, application for which shall be made to the Zoning Administrator. One copy of such permit shall be provided the owner of the premises, and one copy, the trailer owner. Such permit shall be limited to one (1) year from date of issue, but may be renewed upon expiration and payment of the required fee, subject to the provisions of this Ordinance then in effect. Permits not acted upon within sixty (60) days of issue shall expire by limitation. 2. Application The application shall contain the following information, and be accompanied by the required fee which shall be deposited in the Zoning Ordinance fund: 1. The name of applicant and owner of the trailer coach, including date of application. 2. The make, length and number of the trailer coach and its license number. 3. The location of the premises as to house number or legal description of the premises where no house number is available, including name of the owner of the premises. 4. The location of the trailer coach on the premises, which shall conform to all yard and setback requirements of dwellings in the District. 5. Description of all facilities for waste and sewage disposal, and for water supply when not self-contained, which facilities shall comply with all standards recom-

mended by the Michigan Department of Health as to location, materials and methods of installation. The premises shall at all times be maintained in a clean and sanitary condition. 6. The names of all persons, including ages of children to be occupying the trailer coach. 7. The signature of the owner of the premises, accepting his responsibility under the permit. 8. Written approval or disapproval, as the case may be, of (1) all owners of land bordering upon the premises, and (2) all owners of property located within 1320 feet of any boundary of the premises. 6.09.B Home Builder's Exception A temporary permit not exceeding one (1) year, with only one renewal, may be obtained for the location of a house trailer on an owner's premises while erecting his dwelling on the premises, following issuance of a Certificate of Approval for such construction. 6.09.C Visitor's Exception The owner of any property may permit the location of one (1) occupied trailer coach of a guest or visitor on the premises for a period not exceeding sixty (60) days in the case of any one party in any calendar year, but not exceeding a total of more than ten (10) weeks within any calendar year in the case of all visitors.

ARTICLE SEVEN-ADMINISTRATION Section 7.01 Zoning Administrator

The provisions of this Ordinance shall be administered by a Zoning Administrator who shall be appointed by the Township Board for such term and subject to such conditions as the Township Board deems desirable to carry out the terms of this Ordinance. He shall hold the office at the pleasure of the Township Board, and receive such compensation as shall be determined by the Township Board.

Section 7.02 Application and Certificate of Approval and Compliance

7.02.A Application for Certificate of Approval 1. Before proceeding with the erection, moving or use of any building or structure or the use of any premises subject to the provisions of this Ordinance, the owner thereof shall first obtain a Certificate of Approval from the Zoning Administrator. Application shall be made upon forms provided by the Township. It shall be the duty of all contractors and other persons having charge of use, erection or movement to determine that proper Certificate has been issued before undertaking any such work. All persons performing such work in violation shall be deemed guilty of violation in like manner as the owner of the premises. 2. The application shall be filed not less than ten (10) days prior to the intended initiation of work on the premises, and shall be accompanied by a blueprint or pen and ink sketch to scale in duplicate showing the location and dimension of the premises, and kind and location on the premises of the buildings or structure including accessory buildings or structures, and the kind and location of sewage disposal and water supply facilities. 7.02.B Issuance of Certificate of Approval 1. If the Zoning Administrator finds the application conforms to the requirements of this Ordinance and other applicable law, he shall mark all copies approved over his signature and date. One copy shall be retained for filing together with a card signed by the Zoning Administrator stating the terms of the Certificate, which card shall be displayed and remain on the construction during the progress of the work authorized. 2. Any Certificate under which no work is done within six (6) months from date of issue shall expire by limitation; but shall be renewable upon reapplication and payment of the original fee, subject, however, to the provisions of all Ordinances then in effect. 3. The Zoning Administrator shall have the power to revoke or cancel any Certificate in case of failure or neglect to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance, or in the case of false statements or misrepresentation made in the application. The owner shall be notified of such revocation in writing. 7.02.C Certificate of Compliance Within five (5) days after receiving written notification of compliance, the Zoning Administrator shall inspect the premises and issue the owner a Certificate of Compliance if the building, structure or use are in conformity with the Ordinance. 7.02.D Fees Fees for inspection and issuance of certificates or copies thereof required or issued under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be paid to the Zoning Administrator in advance for deposit with the Township Treasurer who shall place the same in a separate fund to be known as the Reno Township Zoning Ordinance Fund to be used solely for the administration of this Ordinance as determined by the Township Board. The amount of such fees shall be established by resolution of the Township Board. No separate fee shall be required for accessory buildings or structures when applied for at the same time as the principal building or structure, nor for a Certificate of Compliance.

ARTICLE EIGHT-BOARD OF APPEALS Section 8.01 Creation

There is hereby created a Zoning Board of Appeals which shall perform its duties and exercise its powers as provided by Act 184 of the Public Act of 1943, as amended, and by the provisions of this Ordinance, and in such a manner that the objectives of this Ordinance are observed, public safety, morals and general welfare secured, and substantial justice done.

Section 8.02 Functions

Functions of the Board of Appeals shall include: 1. Hear and decide upon request the interpretation of the provisions of this Ordinance. 2. Grant variances from the strict application of this Ordinance when, due to exceptional conditions existing at the time of enactment, the strict application would result in undue or exceptional hardship upon the use of such property. Provided, That this provision shall not be construed to permit the Board to amend the Ordinance or change and use of property under guise of variance. 3. Hear and decide petitions for Special Approval. 7.02.E Certificate of Compliance Within five (5) days after receiving written notification of compliance, the Zoning Administrator shall inspect the premises and issue the owner a Certificate of Compliance if the building, structure or use are in conformity with the Ordinance. 7.02.D Fees Fees for inspection and issuance of certificates or copies thereof required or issued under the provisions of this Ordinance shall be paid to the Zoning Administrator in advance for deposit with the Township Treasurer who shall place the same in a separate fund to be known as the Reno Township Zoning Ordinance Fund to be used solely for the administration of this Ordinance as determined by the Township Board. The amount of such fees shall be established by resolution of the Township Board. No separate fee shall be required for accessory buildings or structures when applied for at the same time as the principal building or structure, nor for a Certificate of Compliance.

ARTICLE NINE-VIOLATIONS Section 9.01 Penalties

Any building or structure which is erected, altered, maintained or used and any use of land which is begun, maintained or used and any use of land which is begun, maintained or changed in violation of any provisions of this Ordinance is hereby declared to be a nuisance per se. Any person, firm, corporation or other organization which neglects or refuses to comply with, or resists the enforcement of any provisions, shall be fined upon conviction not less than twenty-five (25) dollars nor more than one-hundred (100) dollars together with the costs of prosecution, or shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than five (5) days nor more than ninety (90) days for each offense, or may be both fined and imprisoned as provided herein in the discretion of the court. Each and every day during which an illegal erection, alteration, maintenance or use continues shall be deemed a separate offense. The imposition of any sentence shall not exempt the offender from compliance with the provisions of this Ordinance. Section 9.02 Actions Any agency of the Township, and any owner of real estate in the Township may institute in junction, mandamus, abatement or any other appropriate action, or proceeding to prevent, enjoin, abate or remove any said unlawful erection, alteration, maintenance or use. The rights and remedies provided herein are cumulative and in addition to all other remedies provided by law. ARTICLE TEN-DEFINITIONS For the purpose of this Ordinance, certain terms used are herewith defined. When not inconsistent with the context, words in the present tense include the future, words in the singular include the plural number, and conversely. The word, "shall," is always mandatory and not merely directory. Section 10.01 Accessory Building or Structure A supplementary building or structure on the same premises as the main building occupied by or devoted exclusively to an accessory use, but not including dwelling, lodging or sleeping purposes. Section 10.02 Dwelling Any building or part thereof occupied as the home, residence or sleeping place of one or more persons either permanently or temporarily, but not including trailer coaches, motels, garage homes, basement homes, tents and similar unconventional dwelling structures. Section 10.03 Erected Includes built, constructed, reconstructed, moved upon or any physical operation on the land required for a building or structure. Excavations, fill drainage and the like shall be considered a part of erection. However, filling, land clearing and general property improvements alone shall not be termed an erection. Section 10.04 Farm All of the unplatted, contiguous, neighboring or associated land operated as a single unit on which bona fide farming is carried on directly by the owner, operator, manager or tenant-farmer by his own labor or with the assistance of members of his household or hired employees. Provided, however, That land to be considered a farm hereunder shall include a contiguous, unplatted parcel of not less than three (3) acres in area, provided further, That orchards, hatcheries and similar specialized agricultural enterprises may be considered as

Section 10.05 Home Occupation

(a) An occupation clearly incidental and secondary to residential use engaged in by residents entirely within their own dwelling, and not in a garage or accessory building, and only by persons residing in the dwelling without assistance of outside employees. Provided, That doctors, dentists and similar practitioners may engage not more than one employee as nurse or secretary. (b) Such dwelling shall have no exterior evidence, other than a sign not exceeding eight (8) square feet in area, indicating use of the building other than as a dwelling. No more than twenty (20) percent of the gross floor area, but not to exceed two hundred (200) square feet may be utilized. Off-street parking space shall be provided for all customers, and no noise or other objectionable characteristic incidental to the occupation shall be discernible beyond the boundaries of the premises. Dancing, musical instrument instruction, restaurants, beauty and barber shops, business and trade shall not be considered home occupations.

Section 10.06 Highway

Any public thoroughfare but not including alleys.

Section 10.07 Junk

Any personal property which is or may be salvaged for reuse, resale, reduction or similar disposition, or which is possessed, transported, owned, accumulated, dismantled or assorted for any of the aforesaid reasons. Without limiting the definition of junk, the term shall include used or salvaged metals and their compounds or combinations, used or salvaged ropes, bags, paper, glass, rubber and similar articles or property, and used motor vehicles which are employed, owned or possessed for the purpose of wrecking or salvaging parts thereof.

Section 10.08 Junkyard

Any place at which a person engages in the business of buying, exchanging, accumulating, receiving, storing or selling any article or articles which may reasonably be defined as junk, except this definition shall not apply to retail merchants who possess their own merchandise sold on a title-retaining contract or chattel-mortgage basis.

Section 10.09 Trailer Coach

Any vehicle or similar portable structure with or without motive power designed for carrying property or persons and so constructed as to permit occupancy as a dwelling place by one or more persons and licensable on the public thoroughfare, whether or not its wheels or facilities for conveyance have been removed.

Section 10.10 Yard

A space open to the sky between a building and the property lines of the lot or premises on which located, unoccupied or unobstructed from the ground up, except for plants, trees, shrubs, fences and driveways. 10.10.A Yard, Front A yard across the full width of a lot or premises extending from the front line of a building to the front line of the lot or premises, or the highway right-of-way line, as the case may be. 10.10.B Yard, Side A yard extending from the front yard to the rear yard between the side line of a lot or premises, or side highway right-of-way line, and the nearest side line of a building including any porch or other structure attached thereto.

ARTICLE ELEVEN-EFFECTIVE DATE

The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be necessary for the welfare, health, peace, safety and morals of the inhabitants of Reno Township, and shall be in effect on and after October 12, 1964. Enacted by the Township Board, Reno Township, Isco County, Michigan on October 12, 1964.

### Spartans Down Braves; Gladwin Here Fri. Night

Friday night belonged to Pinconning. The Spartans celebrated their annual homecoming by downing the Tawas Braves, 13-0, the first time the Braves had been shut out since 1960 when the Spartans turned the trick, 6-0.

Nothing seemed to go right for Tawas. It was a night of frustration with missed blocking assignments, weak tackles and little power in the backfield. Led by Quarterback Ron Blank, the Spartans played basic but not brilliant football and controlled the ball nearly all night. The main difference was that Pinconning wanted to win—the Spartans had been beaten three straight years by the Braves.

Tawas had "fumbleitis" and lost the ball in three key situations. The Spartans also snared three pass interceptions which just about wrecked Tawas' offense.

Tawas coaches now face the big job of getting the Braves "up" for Friday night's game here with Gladwin. Because of illness, practice sessions last week were with a handful of players turning up each night.

The Spartans looked tough right from the start as they picked up two first downs and reached Tawas' 27 before running out of steam in the first series of downs. Tawas began to move but a pass interception gave Pinny the ball on the TA 35.

Taking advantage of this break, the Spartans marched down to the goal in seven plays and Blank cracked over from three yards out. Foco kicked the PAT.

Tawas took the kick and fumbled on the second play from scrimmage. The Spartans again were banging on the door early in the second quarter but ran out of gas on the Tawas 19. Blank missed a field goal attempt and Tawas took over on the 20.

The Braves then had their best sustained drive of the night, picking up five first downs. A pass interception ended this drive and Pinconning had the ball for six plays before the half ended.

Tawas took the opening kick in the second half and fumbled after three plays. Pinconning had the ball for six plays before Halfback Ed Cain intercepted a pass and raced 43 yards to the Pinconning 11. The Braves penetrated as far as the seven but just could not punch over to score, the Spartans finally taking over on fourth down.

Pinconning's second touchdown came when Tawas elected to run the ball on fourth down. The Spartans took over on the Tawas 43 and 13 plays later Blank again cracked over for the TD.

Tawas had the ball for only three plays in the fourth quarter and fumbled on the 50-yard line. The Braves were able to pick up only 105 yards total net rushing during the night. They were penalized 30 yards.

Quarterback Dick Grebe completed four out of eight passes for 35 yards.

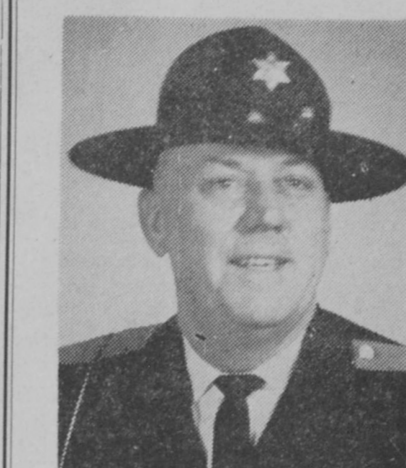

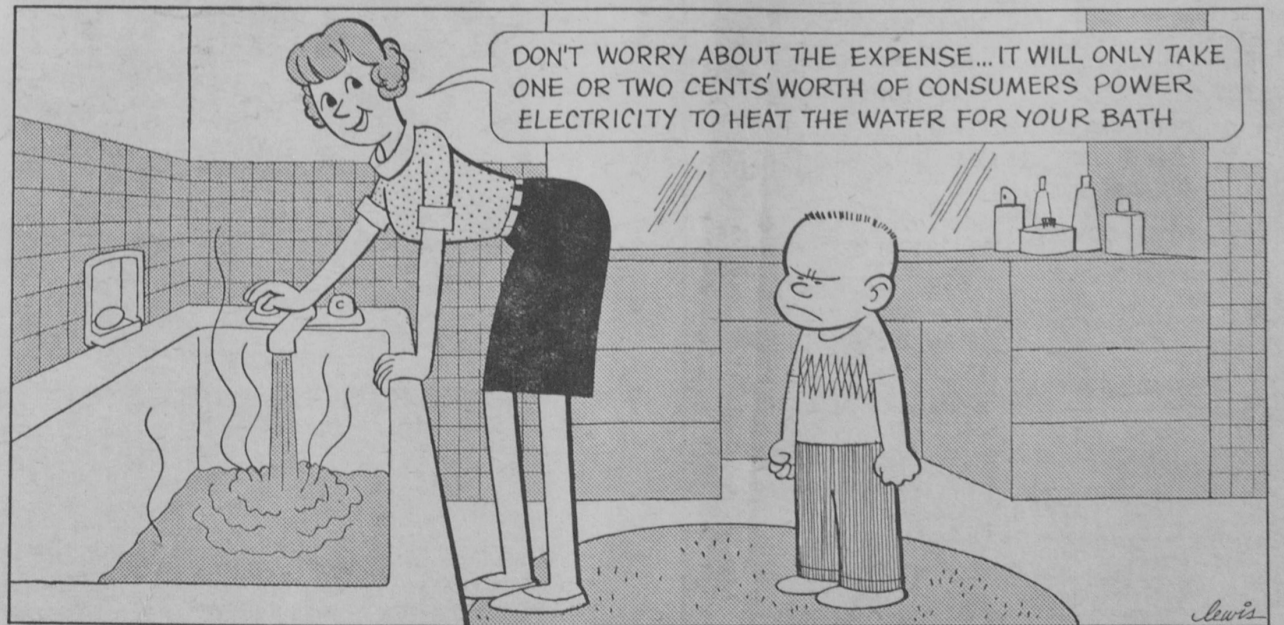

While this \$50,000 allocation brought the county's total 1965 budget to \$371,408, 90 percent of the medical care facility operating expense is to be reimbursed by the state.

Actual amount of money to be raised by taxation for county operation in 1965 is \$291,607.28. This is a net reduction of \$6,720 from the preliminary budget approved in April and will require a levy of 5.21 mills instead of 5.33 mills as anticipated six months ago.

Jail and county building bond reserve accounts were closed out and a balance of \$5,805 was transferred to the general fund.

Other airport matters saw the county going out of the retail gasoline business. Flying H Air Service will now sell gasoline for air planes and Isoco is to receive two cents for each gallon sold.

The county is to enter a bid for purchase of the site of a dam on the East Branch of the AuGres River owned by More Trout, Incorporated.

The county's old Addressograph machine was sold to Oscoda Township at a cost of \$50. It was stipulated that the machine would remain on a stand-by basis for county use.

The board recessed until October 29 at which time bids are to be opened for the sale of bonds financing construction of the new medical care facility.
