



"School functions and school property are for the use of everyone," said Sarki. "If someone wants to campaign, fine, but he can stay off school property."

Supt. Reynold Mick reported that, during recent months, he had removed numerous political signs which had been tacked to trees and utility poles on school property. Action in prohibiting future distribution of such literature on school property met unanimous approval of the board.
