



# **East Tawas**

East Tawas Council, in compliance with a request some months ago from the state highway department, Monday night approved passage of an ordinance prohibiting parking on US-23 within the city limits.

Following completion on construction of straight curbs and resurfacing the highway with asphalt, the state highway department installed no parking signs on both sides of US-23 from the east to west city limits of East Tawas.

Acting on a request of St. Joseph's Church to close Ogemaw Street between Washington and Lincoln Streets, the council discovered this section of Ogemaw had been officially closed in 1930 and no further action was needed. The property will be used for an addition to the school playground.

Emil Sass, the city's new gas inspector, reported that he had inspected and approved gas heating installations in 40 homes. Permits had been denied to 17 applicants and the council ordered that provisions of the ordinance be met before permits are issued.

No fires were reported in East Tawas or Baldwin Township during the month of September, according to a report from the volunteer fire department.

### GRADUATE TO SUEDE

Suede, of course, is an animal pelt and has few characteristics common to fabrics. It has a nap but no grain to consider, and comes in oddly shaped pieces. Markings must be made lightly on the wrong side with chalk and pattern pieces are held down with weights rather than pins. Light pressure on the machine is necessary with medium length stitches (10 to 12 per inch). Seams are trimmed as in any other fabric, but facing edges are better glued to the garment rather than sewn. You can edge stitch hems or finish them with a clear cut edge. If you're not quite up to suede, try using cotton suede. The effect of this fabric in a deep lovely color gives an expensive plush appearance . . . and since it's water repellent, you might keep it in mind for jackets, too.


