7,111 Iosco People Get First 'Stop Polio' Dose

Response to Sunday's mass polio immunization program in Iosco County proved a tremendous success. Plans had been made to administer oral vaccine to 7,000 residents—approximately 75 percent of the county population—and the actual count at four feeding stations was 7,111.

The program was sponsored by the local medical association in cooperation with a county-wide committee of interested citizens.

Doses of trivalent oral polio vaccine were administered as follows: Tawas, 3,750; Hale, 968; Whittemore, 982; Oscoda, 1,384. Wurt-smith Air Force Base carries on a continuing program of administering oral polio vaccine and was not included.

The vaccine was administered easily and pleasantly on sugar cubes. All who received registration slips are asked to fill in the information blanks and bring them to the second feeding on November 8.

"We are very happy with the response to this program, first mass immunization ever to be held in Iosco County," said Dr. Harvey Brinkman, chief of staff of Tawas Hospital, who was instrumental in its early organization.

In view of the heavy turnout Sunday, Dr. L. A. Lambert, who headed a committee in charge of the program, predicts that the same number and more could be expected on the second and final feeding November 8.

The program of administering the oral vaccine—two drops of cherry-colored liquid on a sugar cube—started promptly at 1:00 p. m. at Tawas Area High School. Several hundred persons had lined up in the parking lot before doors opened and 1,000 persons received individual doses during the first one-half hour of operation.

"Because of the lack of previous experience, the line moved slowly at first," said Dr. Brinkman. "The long line soon disappeared and the Tawas clinic worked at a steady pace throughout the afternoon."

It was learned today that enough polio vaccine is available to immunize approximately 50 persons. It may be secured at Tawas Hospital until Saturday or until the supply is depleted and is set up on a first come, first served basis.

Because of the large turnout at Whittemore, workers there twice reordered a new supply of the vaccine from Tawas. As a result, some persons who did not receive vaccine Sunday had the opportunity to receive their dose Monday at Tawas Hospital.

More than 75 volunteers manned four clinics in the county. Special thanks for participation in the program goes to members of parent-teacher associations, boy scouts, members of the nursing profession, pharmacists, members of the Hale Health Council, administration of Tawas Hospital and school administrators.

The East Tawas Lions Club donated sugar cubes and cups were donated by Dr. James Jacques, Dr. Larry Kelly, Dr. Raymond L. Sutton and Dr. Brinkman.

Cross Complaint Filed in Lawsuit

Attorneys for a Tawas Area School teacher have answered a \$101,000 damage suit filed recently in Iosco County Circuit Court and, at the same time, filed a cross complaint asking \$27,050 damages.

In answer to a complaint entered July 31 by James B. Smith and wife of Oscoda, Miss Burnetta Miller denies that she caused a collision November 7 south of Tawas City which resulted in serious injuries to Smith.

Her attorneys deny that she was careless or negligent in operation of her vehicle and ask a verdict of no cause of action.

In her cross complaint, Miss Miller claims that Smith operated his vehicle at a high rate of speed and was "careless, negligent, grossly negligent and wanton in operating, overtaking and striking the rear of cross-plaintiff's vehicle; speed so great as to make it impossible to stop within the assured, clear distance ahead; failure to have motor vehicle properly equipped with brakes and in failing to use them; failure to observe and see cross plaintiff's vehicle, legally upon highway; failure to regard the rights and safety of others lawfully using the highway."

In addition to damage to her auto amounting to \$2,050, she claims injuries of \$25,000.

The accident occurred on US-23 at the National Gypsum Company loading installation south of Tawas City. Smith, accompanied by Kenneth Conn of East Tawas, was returning from an afternoon of hunting when Smith's car rammed into the rear of Miss Miller's vehicle. Smith was hospitalized from November 7 to December 13.

Both Smith and Miss Miller have asked for jury trials.

Alternates selected were Herbert Cunningham, Oscoda; Grace Miller, East Tawas; James Reynolds, Oscoda; Lyle Mooney, East Tawas.

A new executive committee named Saturday night is to meet 30 days after the November election to organize the county committee for the next two years.

Members of the committee are Cunningham, Gary Mielock, Werth, Myles, Clarence Everett, M. H. VanOrnum, Dennis Chrivia, Mary Coulon, George Myles and Harold Gould.

Also acting on this executive committee, according to terms of the new state law, are the eight nominees for county offices, plus representative and senator.

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

Tawas Area Schools had an enrollment of 1,626 students as of last Thursday noon. According to Supt. Reynold Mick, there were 861 pupils in grades kindergarten through sixth, 228 in seventh and eighth grades and 537 students in ninth through 12th grades.

School Trustee Abstains; Legal Opinion Sought

Tawas Area Board of Education has asked the state attorney general's office for a ruling on a recent board action in which a member abstained from voting.

This situation arose following a discussion and vote on hiring a prospective bus driver at the last meeting. Three members, Walter Niles, Waldo Curry and Mrs. Norman Payea, voted in favor of hiring Richard Wunderle as a driver. Voting no were President Leonard Sarki, Walter Champion and Harold Hammond.

Seventh member of the board, Clyde Soper, who is last on the alphabetical list of board members, abstained from voting.

At Monday night's regular board meeting, Niles stated he had requested information from the county superintendent's office and learned that an elected board member has a duty to vote on all questions and, if he abstains, it would be regarded as acquiescing rather than opposing and his vote would actually be in favor of the question.

Niles admitted, however, that there was still some question in regard to a tie-breaking vote, such as the case here. He requested that the attorney general be asked for an opinion.

Niles said that abstention from voting in the past had bothered him "more than a little bit" and he felt that a concrete ruling from the state might help in the future. He was of the opinion that, if there was nothing to substantiate his stand by state law, he felt it should be board policy to require members to vote on all questions.

During discussion, Soper said that in the case in question, he did not have all the facts at the time the vote was taken and felt he could not vote intelligently on the question. "If you know the facts, there would be a difference," he said.

County School Supt. William F. Tracy was present at the meeting and said he had talked to several people in the department of public instruction at Lansing and all were of the opinion that an elected trustee has the duty to vote on all questions.

Soper suggested that a committee investigate the matter and (See SCHOOL BOARD, page 5.)

A Flint man, who had a spat with his wife Sunday afternoon, paid a fine of \$50, court cost of \$15 and was sentenced to serve five days in the Iosco County jail.

Arrested for reckless driving was Orley Martin, who, said State Police Cpl. Wilbert Treichel of East Tawas, drove his car at speeds up to 100 miles an hour along US-23.

"In my 16 years with the state police, this is the first time I ever had to chase a speeding automobile to stop a family fight," said Treichel.

The car, headed south, veered from one shoulder of US-23 to the other, reported Treichel. "The driver lost control of the car during a fight with his wife," he said.

Hosbach Wins Award for Savings Bond Work

John E. Hosbach, vice president, Peoples State Bank of East Tawas, has been awarded a colorful certificate and a lapel emblem in recognition of his work as chairman of the Iosco County Savings Bond Committee.

The presentation was made by Delmar V. Cote, state director for the United States Treasury's savings bond division, at Hosbach's office in Tawas City.

Cote commended the local banker for his long service to the bond program. He accepted the county bond committee chairmanship in January 1955. In this volunteer capacity, he counsels savings bond division officials concerning sales plans and promotional campaigns for this county.

According to Cote, Iosco County residents have done their fair share to make Michigan's bond sales record outstanding.

Hosbach reports that Iosco County bond purchases have amounted to \$6,245,641 over the past 23 years. During the first seven months of 1964, investments in E and H bonds have totaled \$221,198, equivalent to 71.4 percent of the treasury-assigned county goal of \$310,000.

Old Telegraph Poles Disappear Along D&M

Removal of telegraph poles and lines along the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company's right-of-way through the Tawasites this week marks the end of an era.

Although telegraphic equipment has not been used by the railroad for years, having been replaced by a modern radio communications system, at one time telegraph operators at each station had the important job of coordinating rail traffic along the route.

The D&M's maintenance of way crew is utilizing the road's big dragline in removal of the poles.

\$625,000 Lawsuit Against National Gypsum Co. Resumes in Circuit Court

The 28-day-old trial involving National Gypsum's dock on Saginaw Bay south of Tawas City resumed last Thursday in Iosco Circuit Court before Judge Allan C. Miller.

Involved are six attorneys representing some 30 plaintiffs who claim loss in value of cottages, loss of beach sand and inferior swimming and boating conditions resulting from the dock and dredging operations amounting to an alleged \$625,000.

The dock extends several hundred feet into the lake, but dredging for nearly a mile was necessary to bring the large ore boats into the loading dock. Loading is performed by a conveyor belt running through a tube from railway facilities, under US-23 and out onto the dock where the ore is dropped into holds of ships.

Plaintiffs are also asking for the court to regulate operation of the loading facilities.

This case has been to the Michigan Supreme Court twice. In 1960, the high court reversed the 1958 decision of former circuit judge, Herman Dehnke, and found the dock to be illegal, but per-

mitted it to remain and instructed Judge Miller to assess damages. When some additional plaintiffs were added to the case, a second appeal was taken and the decision to add plaintiffs was affirmed.

In 1962, by Public Act 84, the state legislature authorized a conveyance of the land rights involved to the company.

In damage hearing that began in May of this year, 62 witnesses have testified to date and 1,920 pages of testimony have been transcribed. Expert witnesses include leading marine engineers from the University of Michigan, Michigan State University and the United States Corps of Engineers.

It is expected that an additional three weeks of testimony will be required to conclude the case. Briefs are to follow and a decision is not expected for several months.

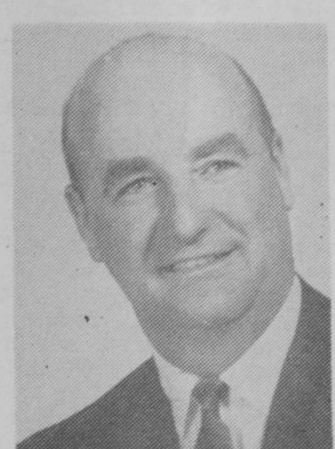

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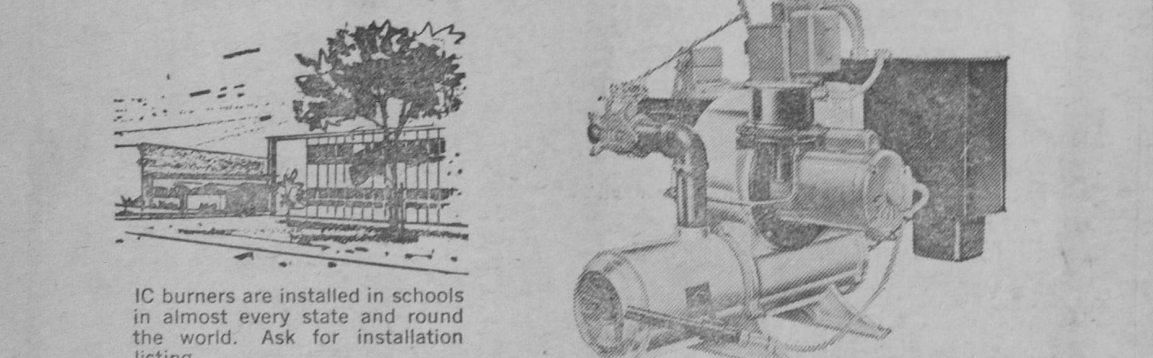

Tawas City scored one run in the sixth and two in the seventh to lead, 9-5, but Melita came back with three runs in the bottom of the seventh.

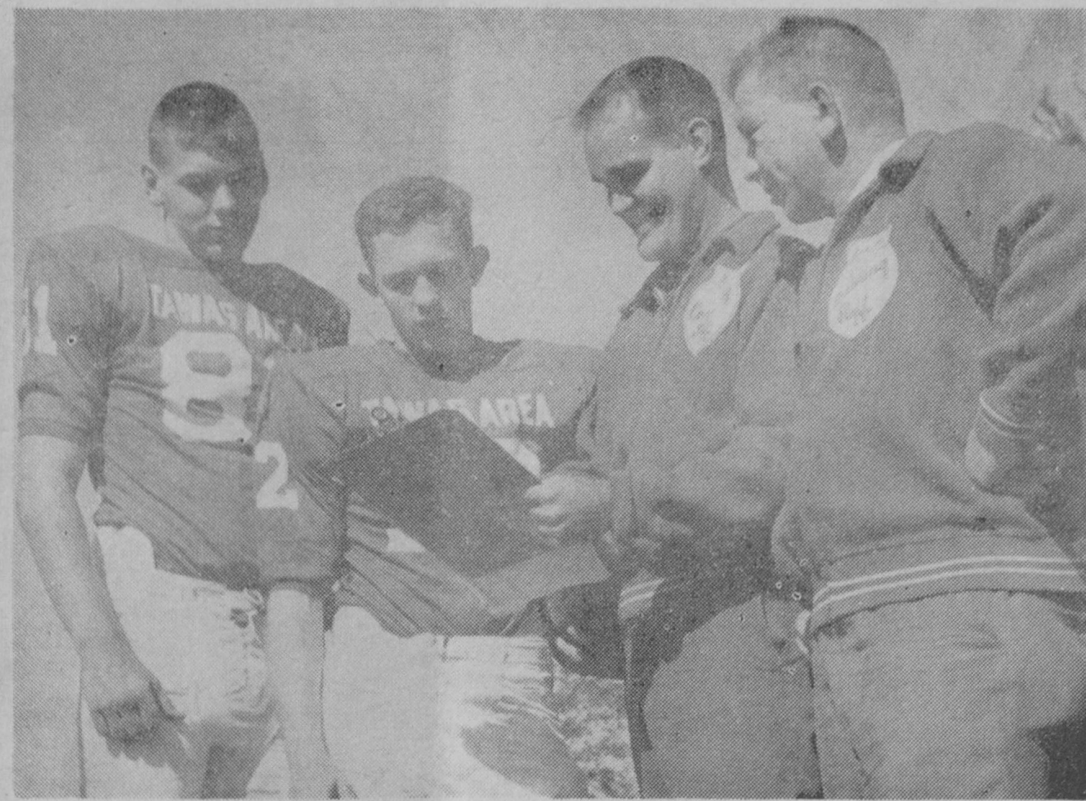

Take Part in Mackinac Bridge 'Walk' Labor Day

Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller of East Tawas, with his three sons, Christopher, Van and Clifford, walked the Mackinac Bridge Monday in the annual Labor Day trek.

"The walk was made to demonstrate that as the northernmost candidate in the race for Third District Court of Appeals, I pledge to bring the court to the Upper Peninsula and northern part of the Lower Peninsula as often as needed," said Miller.

"While this court will be primarily a study and opinion writing court, when arguments on

briefs are required these hearings should be held in the areas involved. This will eliminate the necessity for new court buildings and make the appeal less expensive for the litigant," he said.

For the Tawas area, this should mean several new jobs," said Judge Miller, "because I would be entitled to a law clerk and secretary, as well as library allowance, if elected."

The new court will follow the custom of the Michigan Supreme Court in the sense that the members have offices in their own localities for research and opinion writing.

SS Rep. Says 'Maids and Babysitters Protect Your Rights'

"Maids and babysitters—protect your rights." This advice comes from Paul M. Ellifritz, social security district manager in Bay City.

Mr. Ellifritz says that many housewives and homeowners are unaware that household employees are covered by social security. This and the subsequent failure of employers to make earnings reports have caused many maids and other household employees to lose valuable retirement and disability benefits which were rightfully theirs.

Household employees include maids, babysitters, cooks, gardeners and others who work in or around a private home. Mr. Ellifritz said that each of these persons has a definite responsibility to see that his or her employer makes proper earnings reports. A report is due at the end of any quarter in which the worker is paid as much as \$50 in cash by one employer. The present tax rate is 3% percent from each.

To protect one's rights to social security benefits, Mr. Ellifritz urges individuals to get in touch with his office to make sure their employer is making correct reports.

A social security representative will be in this area at the Iosco County Building, Tawas City, Thursday, September 24, from 10:30 a. m. until 2:30 p. m.

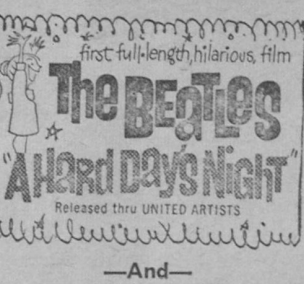

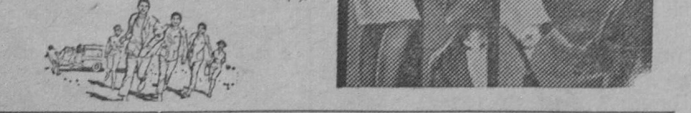
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
