

Supervisor Little Upset by J. Finley in Caucus

One of the biggest upsets in local politics was recorded Monday night in Grant Township when L. S. Little, veteran supervisor, was defeated for the Peoples Party nomination by James Finley.

With 194 voters crowding into the township hall at the corner of Sand Lake Road and M-55, Finley received 100 votes as compared to Little's 78. There were 14 votes cast for the third candidate for supervisor, Gerald Hayes. There were two spoiled ballots.

An 18-year member of the board of supervisors, Little served as chairman of the finance committee. He also serves as president of the Fourth District of the Michigan Association of Supervisors.

Finley, 29, had served as a member of the Isoco County Sheriff's Department until submitting his resignation in August upon announcing his candidacy as supervisor.

Re-elected without opposition were Ann Hayes, clerk; Ona Lee

Kindell, treasurer; Olen Herri-man, trustee. Named constables were Donald Warner and Larry Finley.

Tawas Township GOP Returns Same Ticket

Tawas Township's Republican caucus returned the same slate as that presently holding office. Edward Nelkie, who was named to fill the vacancy of Glenn Long, was nominated for his first full term as supervisor. Other nominees were Walter Miller, clerk; Irene Lorenz, treasurer; George Grits, trustee; Roger Earl, justice of the peace; Merlin Look and Merlin Warner, constables. About 29 persons attended.

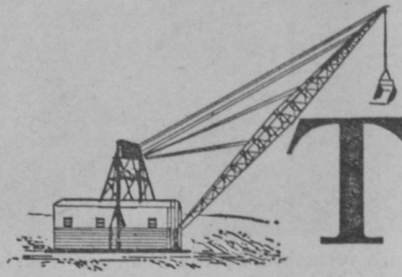

O'Farrell, Mielock Curry Win Primary

McCready and Harvey to Meet in November

Tuesday's historic primary election, first under Michigan's new constitution, saw a record turnout of Isoco voters as party selections were made for the coming November election.

An estimated 4,000 persons went to the polls, as compared to less than 1,500 for the 1963 primary election.

This primary also proved to be one of the biggest "headaches" for election workers, some of whom were still counting ballots at 3:30 this morning. At Oscoda, voting machines could not keep pace with voters and a long line of voters kept polls open after the 8:00 p. m. deadline. In other precincts, election workers struggled in counting the two-faced ballots, along with special ballots for party delegates, non-partisan and township races.

LOCALLY, Isoco Republicans renominated Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell, Coroners E. D. Jacques and E. John Moffatt and Road Commissioner Clarence Curry. All other members of the ticket were unopposed.

Sheriff O'Farrell, seeking his ninth term in office, was leading 1,426 with only Tawas Township remaining to be counted.

This was Rollin's first attempt in local politics and he gave a creditable account for himself, holding his own in a number of precincts and leading in a few.

With 13 of 20 precincts reporting, O'Farrell had edged to a 300-vote lead and, at about 2:00 a. m., Oscoda's First Ward reported a 143-vote margin which just about

eliminated Rollin from the race. THERE will be a two-way runoff for probate judge in the November election between William McCready and Paul Harvey. At press time, McCready had a total of 1,130 votes and Harvey had 829. The third candidate, Alf C. Watson, had 568 votes.

In the race for road commissioner, Curry piled up a substantial lead throughout the night over Elwood Bronson and had 1,285 votes in his favor as compared to his opponent's 699 at press time with five precincts to report.

The two incumbent coroners, Jacques and Moffatt, far outdistanced the third man in this race, Warren Bennett. Jacques was the leader after 16 of 20 precincts reported with 1,526 votes. Moffatt followed close behind with 1,424. Bennett was eliminated with 733 votes.

JAMES P. MIELOCK of Whittemore, by an unofficial count at 3:00 a. m., was in front of his nearest opponent in the race for 102nd district representative. Mielock had a total of 2,859 votes as compared to Henry B. Smith's 1,813.

Mielock, with 16 of 20 precincts reporting in Isoco, led Smith, 1,487 to 397. An unofficial final vote in Bay County gave Smith an 847 to 253 bulge, but a final in Arcadia gave Mielock 763 votes to Smith's 350. Ogemaw County gave Mielock a slight margin of, 356 to 219 in 15 out of 20 precincts.

The other candidates, Willis D. Andrews and Marshall Hier, were running far behind. No reports

An impressive display of aerospace power will be on view when Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda, opens its gates to the general public Saturday, September 19.

Highlighting the open house event will be the appearance of the United States Air Force Thunderbirds in a dazzling aerial demonstration of superb formation flying. The Thunderbirds will be followed closely by the Golden Knights, the official United States Army parachute team, who will demonstrate its aerobatic skill during 75 second, free falls from 13,500 feet.

Army Nurse Corps Assists Students in Drive for Nurses

The United States Army Nurse Corps needs 2,000 nurses. To help meet this requirement, the army is assisting talented young women in obtaining the educational foundation to become professional nurses. The Army Nurse Corps is an all-officer organization.

The student nurse who is qualified for participation in the army's program receives financial assistance in her last year of nursing education in a diploma program or the last two years in a college nursing program.

The army nurse program student receives complete medical and dental care, may make purchases at military commissaries and post exchanges and has other corps privileges. Although receiving full army pay and allowances, she does not wear a military uniform nor participate in military activities while in school.

Following graduation and licensure as a registered nurse, the student who has participated in the army's assistance program for two years will then serve in the Army Nurse Corps on active duty for 24 months.

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



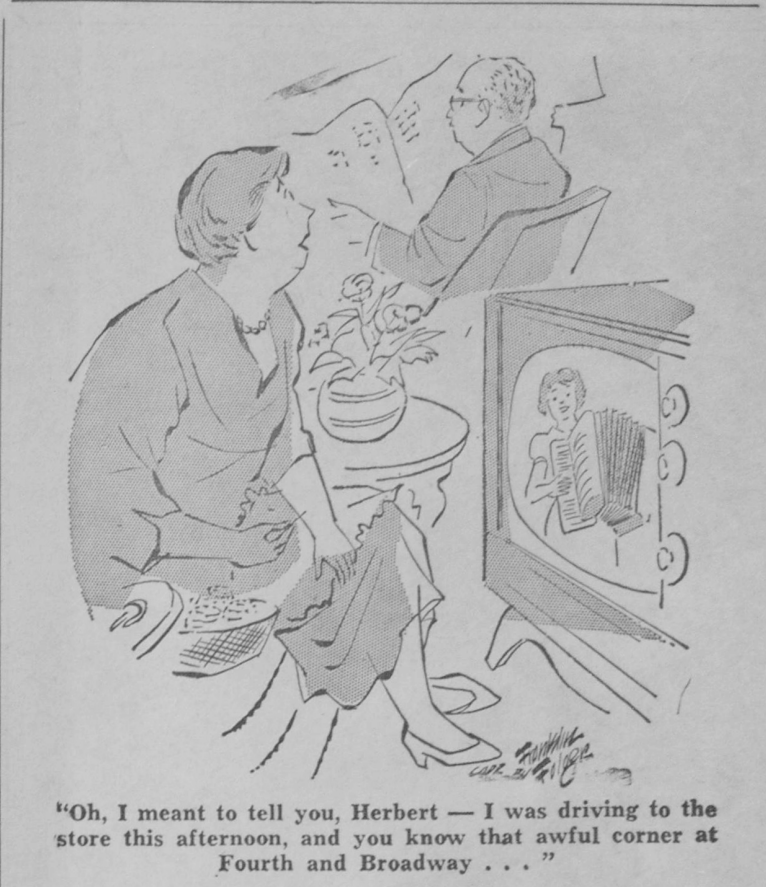

Far-Reaching SS Amendments Bill Passed in 1939

Twenty-five years ago, August 10, 1939, Pres. Franklin Delano Roosevelt took his pen in hand and signed into law a bill passed by the 76th congress and entitled the Social Security Act Amendments of 1939. There was little fanfare or publicity concerning this event because few people realized that the amendments would ultimately affect the lives of nearly every American family.

"The 1939 amendments," said Paul M. Ellifritz, district manager, Bay City, "made social security a family program rather than one for retired workers alone. Since then, the program has come a long way toward realizing the goal set for it in the 1939 and subsequent amendments—that of providing basic protection against loss of earnings when the family breadwinner becomes disabled, dies or retires in old age. Today, nine out of 10 working people are building protection for themselves and their families under the social security law."

Mr. Ellifritz noted that more than 100 billion dollars in benefits—about 80 billion to retired workers and their dependents and nearly 25 billion to survivors of deceased workers—have been paid in the period January 1940 through June 1964. The above figures do not include any benefits awarded under the disability provisions of the social security program.

A social security representative will be at the Isoco County Building, Tawas City, Thursday, September 10, from 10:30 a. m. until 2:30 p. m.
