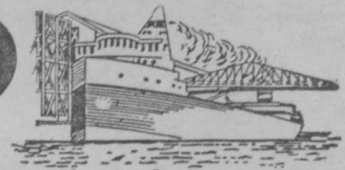

Plan Many Activities During Canoe Marathon

Grayling, Mio and Oscoda will be the scene of many activities during the 18th running of the AuSable River Valley Canoe Race, October 2-4.

The AuSable River Valley Canoe Race Committee met in Grayling last Saturday to put final touches on what promises to be a gala northland attraction. Queens, bands, parades, dance, reception, luncheon, carnivals, junior canoe races, awarding of prizes are all scheduled for the three-day event. Places and times for the various functions are to be announced next week.

The longest canoe race in the state, Grayling to Mio to Oscoda, will draw approximately 30 or more two-man racing teams from the United States and Canada who will compete for \$3,050 in cash prizes.

Race committee members present at the Grayling meeting from Oscoda were Harry Curley, promotion and Oscoda area chairman, and Charles Curley, president, Oscoda-AuSable Chamber of Commerce.

Cooperating agencies sponsoring the area event are Consumers Power Company, Oscoda-AuSable Township, Mio Chamber of

Commerce, Crawford County Chamber of Commerce, East Michigan Tourist Association and the Oscoda-AuSable Chamber of Commerce.



Retired Merchant Died September 15

H. E. Friedman, 72, retired Tawas City dry goods merchant, died Tuesday, September 15, at the Arnold Rest Home, Detroit, where he had been for the past five months.

The son of the late Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Friedman, pioneer merchants of this city, Mr. Friedman was a World War I veteran and a graduate of Alma College. Following his parents' retirement from business here, he had operated dry goods and clothing stores at East Tawas and Tawas City for a number of years. He was a member of Jesse C. Hodder Post American Legion.

Surviving are a brother, Isadore Friedman of Sherman Oaks, California, and a sister, Mrs. Casper Cutler of Detroit.

Gravestone services were held Thursday afternoon at Clover Hill Cemetery, Royal Oak. Mr. and Mrs. George Myles of Tawas City attended the funeral.

County Officers Get Salary Hike January 1

Iosco County Board of Supervisors granted nearly a full round of salary increases to county officers at its September session last Wednesday.

Annual salaries of all major officials were raised to \$6,000. This includes clerk, treasurer, register of deeds, sheriff and prosecuting attorney.

Probate judge's salary is to remain at \$6,000 and drain commissioner's salary is to remain at \$1,200.

Some officers, in addition, received fees for special duties. For instance, the clerk receives an additional \$1,000 for acting as clerk of circuit court, plus passport fees. The register of deeds receives one-half of all commercial photo copying fees in his office.

Largest increase was to the prosecuting attorney, which, at present, has no candidate listed for the November election. The prosecutor had received an annual salary of \$4,600. In addition, he is allowed to carry on a private practice from this office.

The present prosecuting attorney, William H. McCready, is a candidate for non-partisan probate judge. No candidate filed to succeed him in the recent primary election.

The board stipulated that all county officers were to remain open at least 35 hours a week and county officers were to have an annual paid vacation of two weeks. The last salary increase

received by county officers was 1962 when an additional 10 percent was granted. Former salaries of other officers were as follows: Treasurer, \$5,012.70; clerk, \$5,082; register of deeds, \$5,012.70; sheriff, \$5,250.

Payment of the new salaries is effective January 1. All officers will be elected for four-year terms in the November general election.

Iosco Republicans Join Goldwater Rally

Iosco County Republicans will travel by auto caravan to Midland Saturday morning to join in a giant welcome for presidential hopeful, Sen. Barry Goldwater, who is being accompanied on his East Michigan tour by Gov. George Romney.

The caravan is to form at 9:00 a. m. at the Oscoda Community Building and will be joined by a group from the Tawas area at the Iosco County Building at around 9:30 a. m.

The rally is to be staged at the Midland Fairgrounds, located off the expressway on Eastman Road. There will be an ox roast and chicken barbecue.

National and state candidates of the Republican Party will be in attendance.

The caravan from here is being sponsored by the Iosco County Republican Committee and Iosco County Young Republicans.

Tawas Band Going to U of M Band Day

On Saturday, September 26, Tawas Area Band will be one of 170 bands participating in the 16th annual band day at Ann Arbor. Under the direction of Dr. William Revell and the University of Michigan Bands, the pregame and halftime performances will feature 10,000 band members and 1,500 tourists from across the state.

Tawas Area Band will depart at approximately 3:00 a. m. in order to arrive for the scheduled morning rehearsal at the stadium. Three flag bearers, drum major, three majorettes and 70 band members will represent the Tawas.

Alabaster Crash Killed Livonia Man Saturday

Bert G. Tallman, 69, Livonia, became Iosco County's eighth traffic fatality of 1964 in a truck-crash Saturday morning four miles south of Tawas City.

Tallman's car collided with a semitruck trailer unit driven by George H. Briggs, 33, Pinconning, who was traveling north. The crash occurred just south of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway tracks in Alabaster Township.

Because of the heavy rain, state police were unable to determine the exact cause of the accident. Tallman, a carpenter, was returning to Livonia after a business trip to Alpena.

The truck driver said he was

unable to remember anything pertaining to the crash. He was treated and released from Tawas Hospital. The crash is still under investigation.

The Livonia man's car was a total wreck and, in order to remove his body from the twisted metal, James Sheehan of Huron Auto Parts used a cutting torch to remove the roof.

Following the crash, the car came to rest on the shoulder of the south-bound lane and the truck was in a ditch on the same side of the road.

The highway, presently receiving a new top of asphalt, was extremely slippery. Two other personal injury accidents were reported within a few minutes of the fatal crash, one at the Iosco-Arenac line and one at the M-65-US-23 intersection.

A 69-year-old Gary, Indiana, man was injured at the Iosco-Arenac line at 7:50 a. m. Lloyd Johnson, who was a passenger in a car driven by his son, Robert L. of Midland, was treated at Tawas Hospital for a severely lacerated nose. The younger man sustained skinned knees.

The Johnson vehicle was struck from the rear by a car driven by Nolan P. Smithers, 23, Wurtsmith Air Force Base. Both cars were headed north and Johnson was making a right hand turn.

A rear end collision at the M-65-US-23 intersection in Arenac County resulted in minor injuries to three persons, Joseph Varadi Jr., Sterling, struck a car driven by Robert T. Bertha, 46, Flagler, Florida. Varadi and three passengers received lacerations.

No injuries were reported in a crash at the intersection of US-23 and Mathews Street Saturday noon. A car driven by John L. McArdle, 36, Tawas City, pulled out of Mathews Street into the path of a state police patrol car driven by Trooper Dale Arnold, 36, East Tawas.

Iosco Gets \$38,331 in Fed. Road Money

Iosco County's share of federal matching funds for construction on secondary roads is \$38,331, according to a recent announcement of the state highway department.

The state's 83 counties receive \$5,410,235. Each county road commission must match the federal funds on a 50-50 basis and may be used for construction purposes only.

The state highway department received \$2,981,553 for use on its secondary system.

Clerk Suggests 'Forcing Issue' on Appeal Costs

Iosco Board of Supervisors has given its support to a plan suggested by Clerk George Prescott which could temporarily thwart a predicted drain on county tax dollars.

Under terms of the state's new judicature act, counties are responsible for providing free transcripts and legal counsel to persons appealing court decisions. Previously, anyone convicted in circuit or justice court was permitted to appeal the decision to a higher court. Now, it is a matter of right and counties probably will bear a tremendous increase in court costs.

Clerk Prescott has suggested that, should the cost of such appeals go beyond reasonable limits, he would refuse to make payment from county funds. "This would require a writ of mandamus from a higher court ordering such payment," said Prescott.

In gaining support from the board of supervisors, Prescott said that Oakland County was preparing an appeal of this act to the state supreme court.

Several cases have already been appealed here and Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller said Monday that he probably would have to ask the board of supervisors for an appropriation of at least \$3,500 to cover cost of additional transcripts and court appointed attorneys.

In other business, Drain Commissioner E. H. Stickney reported he had offered \$150 to two property owners for a proposed site of Tawas Lake dam. T. S. Dimmick of East Tawas is preparing a deed for his property, but Stickney reported that he had received no word from Charles Timreck, who owns property on the west and south end of the lake.

The drain commissioner was instructed to notify a property owner north of VanEtan Lake to remove an eight-foot dam which presently impedes the fall of water into that lake. A two-foot

P-TA Signed 148 Members Monday

Tawas Area Parent-Teacher Association signed 148 members Monday night as the organization started its new year under President Neil Luedtke. This was six members more than the total enrolled initially last year.

Supt. Reynold Mick was introduced and he announced that, as of Monday, total enrollment in Tawas Area Schools was 1,635.

He said that a five-year projected enrollment indicates that the entire high school building would have to be used for the upper four grades.

Under the final phase of a five-year building program approved by voters, provisions have been made to construct separate junior high facilities at the high school.

Principal Ernest W. Jordan introduced high school teachers and Miss Clara Bolen introduced elementary teachers.

A coffee hour followed.

Five Appointed to Park Board at East Tawas

Initial steps were taken Monday night by the East Tawas Council to organize a legally constituted park commission. Among duties of this new board would be to supervise the new city park, which is to be turned over by the department of conservation effective January 1.

Appointed as members of the new commission were M. F. Kiley, five years; J. E. LaBerge, four years; R. A. Meyers, three years; Wayne Pollard, two years; Lewis F. Besancon, one year.

Julius Hanslovsky, the city's financial consultant, has reported that revenue bonds may be issued to purchase park equipment and for improvements.

In other business, the council approved Mayor Clarence McKenzie's appointment of Emil Soss as the city's new gas inspector. He is to enforce provisions of the gas ordinance.

Other applicants were Paul Morton and Frank Block. The latter was ruled out as a candidate because he is a heating contractor.

The city announced that no more natural gas turn-ons were to be made until installations were approved by the gas inspector.

The council accepted the low bid of Northern Plumbing and Heating, \$387, for installing a new conversion gas burner in the city garage. A second bid was received from Bay Supply, \$395.

The city is to take steps to condemn property for a parking lot at the corner of East Westover and Main Streets east of the Newman Street business district.

City Attorney Michael Freel reported that the city had the legal right to condemn property for this purpose. He also said that money from parking meters could be used to purchase parking lots.

At present, funds from parking meters finance cost of the police department. Mayor McKenzie said that a portion of the city's operational millage could go for expenses of the police department.

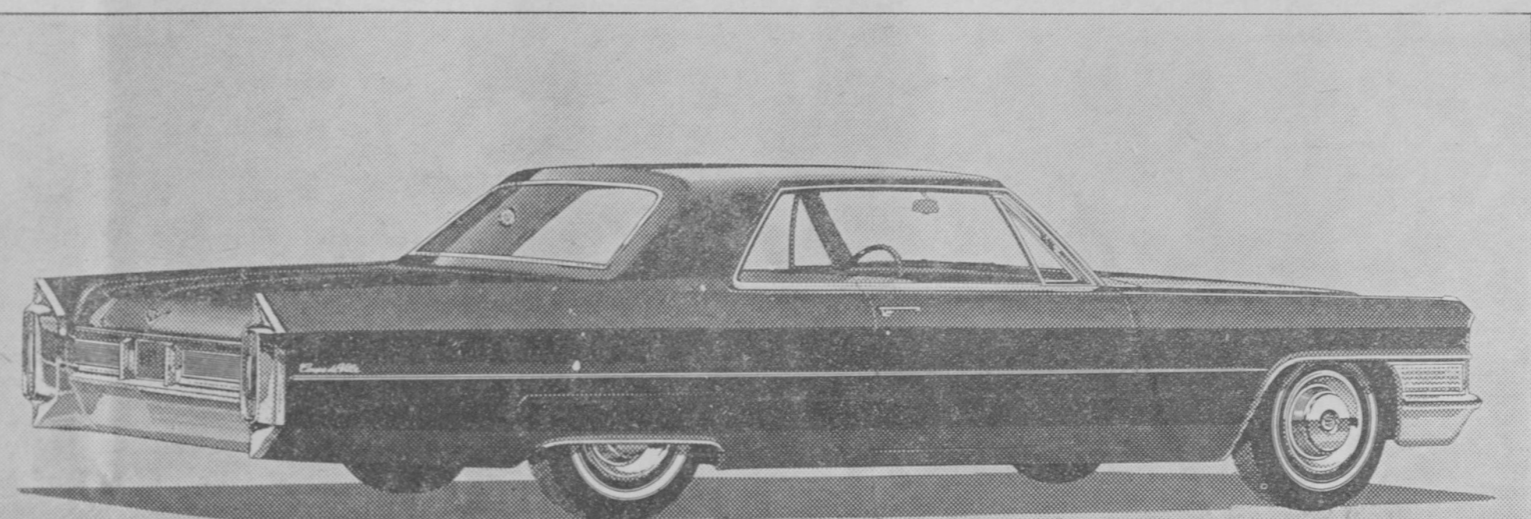

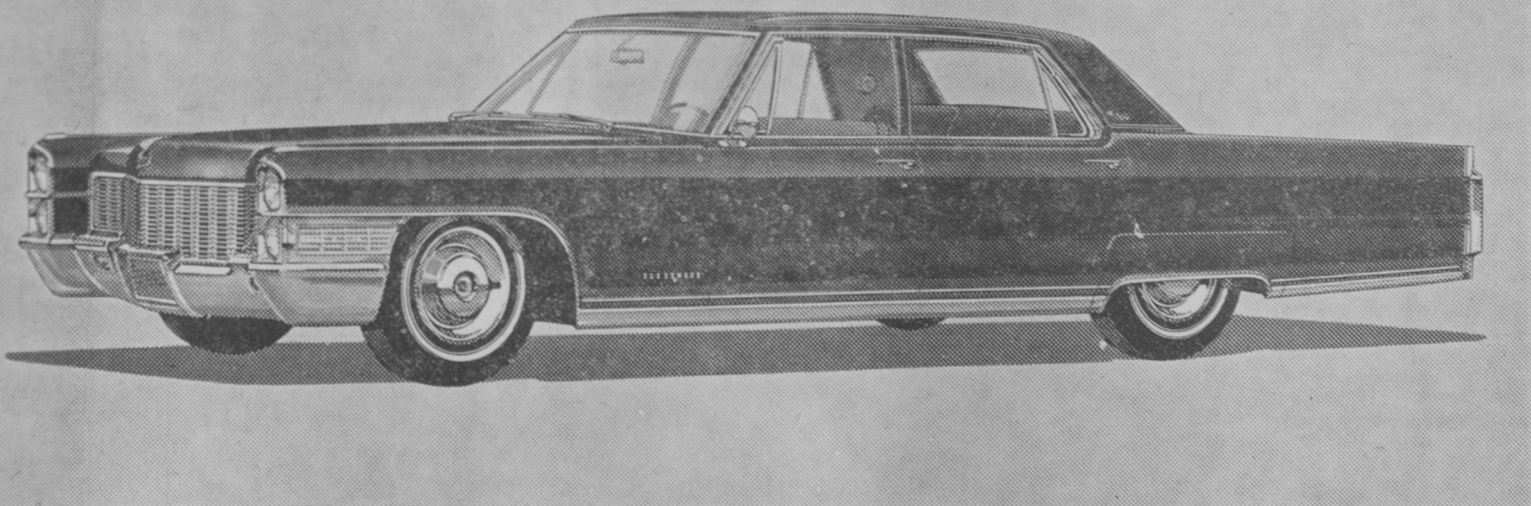

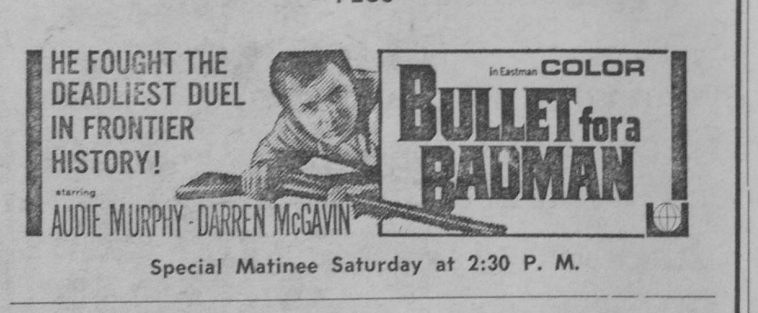

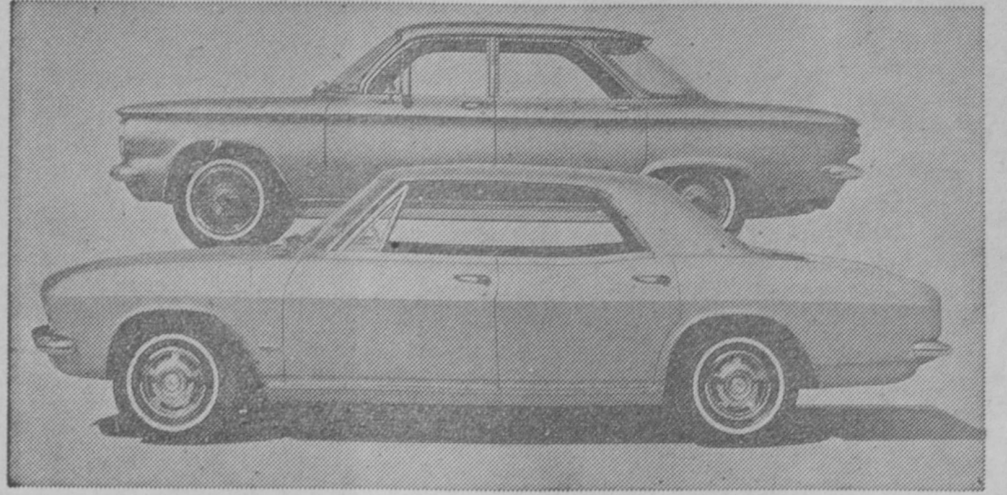

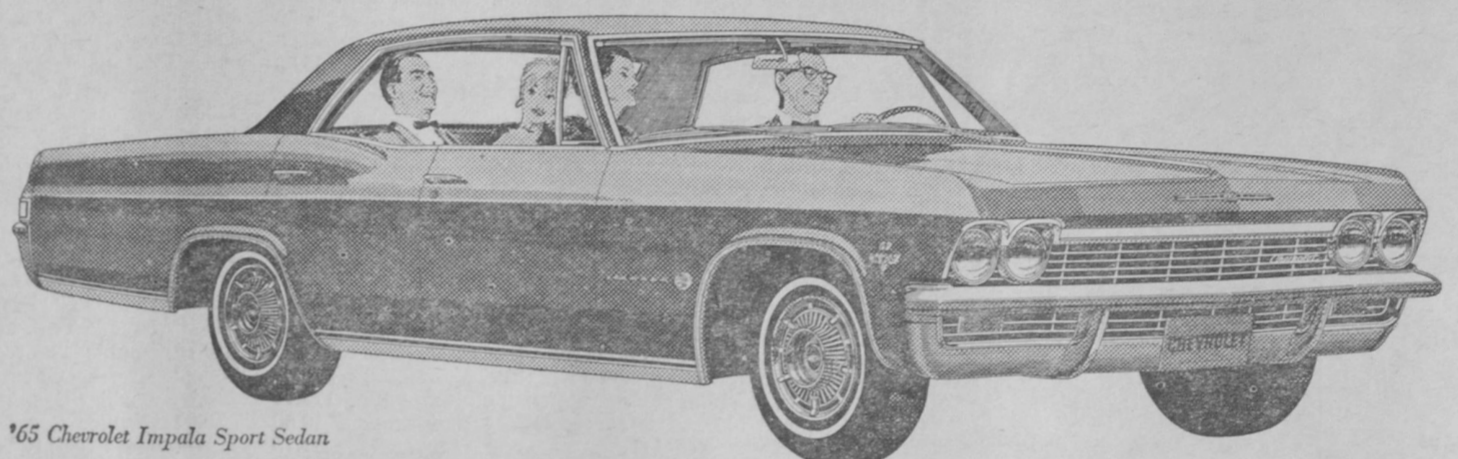

TA Braves Lose Opener; Streak Stopped at 17

Tawas Area Braves' long winning streak came to an end at 17 consecutive games Friday night, losing the season opener to class A Madison Eagles, 14-12, on the winners' home field.

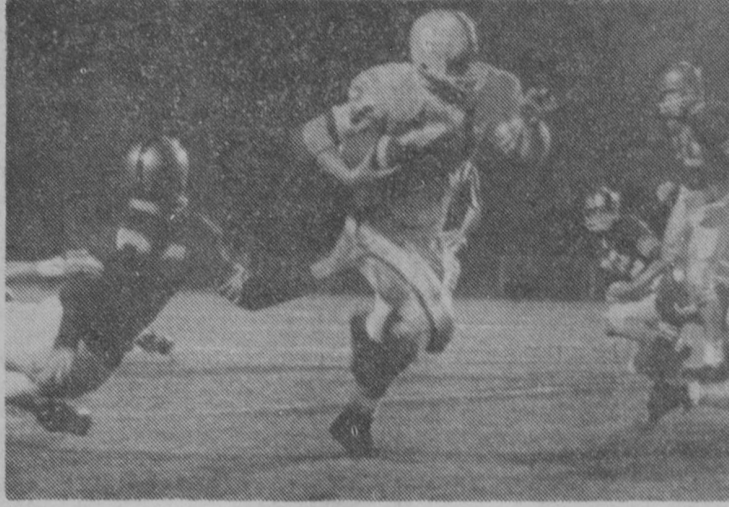
The defending champion of the Northern B Conference had several good scoring chances to upset a team figured to win the Oakland A League, but failed to be the opportunists of two previous undefeated seasons.

As it was, the Braves of Coach Herb Escott and Steve Sventko gave a good accounting of themselves against a team which fielded a senior line averaging more than 200 pounds in weight. The Braves also demonstrated they could come from behind when the chips were down.

Tawas plays its first home game this Friday night against Alpena Catholic Central. This game will be but a prelude to the conference opener at Oscoda October 3.

Friday night's game was a tough one physically for several Tawas players. Among the injured was Quarterback Dale Harten, who aggravated a knee injury sustained in the first week of practice and he will not see action for two games. Dick Grebe, starting quarterback, was shaken in the second quarter and did not see action during the rest of the game.

The two teams played an even terms during the first half, although Tawas had two good scoring opportunities but could not push the ball across. A drive early in the first quarter bogged down on Madison's 20-yard line and Co-Captain Herb Humphrey tried a field goal on fourth down.



The ball hit the goal post and the try failed.

Later in the quarter, Halfback Denny Harten broke loose and ran 57 yards to score. The play was called back, however, when a clipping penalty was called against Tawas. Later, Humphrey blocked a punt and Fullback Don Harten recovered on Madison's 30. The Braves penetrated as far as the 20 but the drive was stopped.

The Eagles scored their first touchdown with less than a minute to go in the first half. Senior End Jim Wolfong got behind Tawas' secondary and made a good catch on a long pass from Quarterback Jim Bowman. He raced 30 yards to score and Halfback Jim Combs ran the PAT.

The Eagles threatened again after Tawas lost the ball. Jim LaBlance, Tawas safety man, caught Russ Thurau from behind after the Eagle had broken away for 33 yards.

Madison demonstrated its line power in the third quarter when it dominated play throughout. The Eagles played control ball and their offense ground out six first downs as halfbacks alternated at slanting over tackle or confused the Tawas defense with reverses. Combs cracked over from three yards out for the touchdown and Halfback Jerry Dash scored the PAT.

Tawas, with good come-from-behind spirit in the final quarter, picked up good yardage. The Braves' first touchdown was set up when Don Harten moved five yards, Halfback Ed Cain had runs of 39 yards and three yards and Don Harten scored from six yards out. Humphrey's kick from placement was blocked and Tawas was behind, 14-6.

After Madison lost control of the ball on fourth down, Tawas again marched down the field. Behind good blocking, Cain showed great running strength as he picked up gains of 12 yards and two nine-yarders. Don Harten ran for 12 and Cain picked up three yards to the 33 of Madison. Don Harten picked up 12 and, with time running out, Quarterback Dale Harten stopped the clock with a pass out of bounds. Humphrey then made a great catch on a pass from Harten to set up the second TD. After Cain was stopped on the first play, Don Harten scored from one yard out on the second play. The run for extra point was stopped.

The Braves tried an on side kick with only seconds to go in the game, but the Eagles stuck to the ground and ran out the clock.

Whittemore-Prescott opens its NEM schedule this Friday night by playing host to Roscommon.

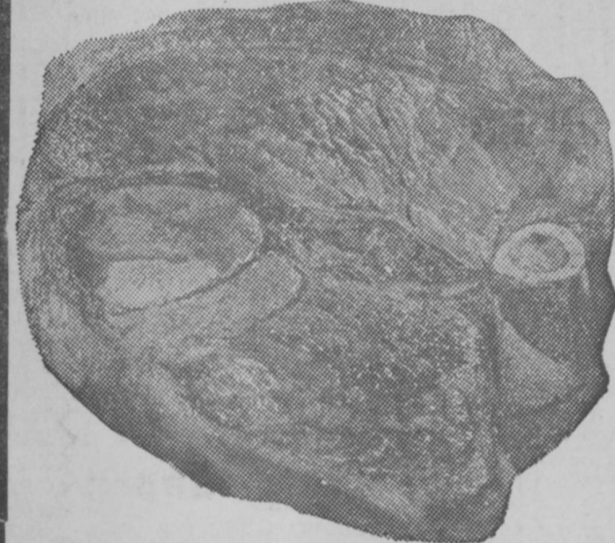
