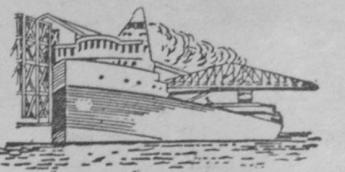

IOSCO COUNTY made its final payment on general obligation bonds for the county building and jail last week. Pasting payment coupons in official records as Treasurer Grace L. Miller and Clerk George A. Prescott. Issued October 1, 1952, by a tax levy of two mills for a period of 20 years, county building bonds of \$250,000 were retired at the end of 12 years. Last levy on this issue was two years ago when money was set aside, drawing interest, to cover the final payment. Voters approved a one-mill tax levy and bonds were issued in October 1955 for a \$125,000 bond issue to finance the jail. These bonds were to have been retired in 1969, but payment is ahead of schedule. Bonds are to be issued soon for the new \$300,000 county medical care facility, approved earlier this year by voters.—Tawas Herald Photo.

Ask P-TA Study of Discipline Code

A "code of conduct for parents," as drawn up by a group of parents at Carle Place, New York, and publicized recently in School Management Magazine, is to be suggested by the board of education as a possible project of the Tawas Area Parent-Teacher Association.

Initiated in the Empire State community more than a year ago, the school superintendent there stated, "We started with the principle that the quality of our educational program can only be as good as the quality and type of students we have."

Unlike many other codes, it makes no bones of the fact that discipline in such matters as dating, cars, dress, drinking and smoking falls squarely on the parents.

"And this is largely determined by the parents and how much discipline they provide in the home," he stated. "But it is very hard for a parent to say 'no' when a youngster says, 'Everybody is doing it, why can't I?' You see, the kids are organized. This code is simply an attempt to organize the parents."

Boy Scout Finances Discussed at Meeting

Robert V. Haverkamp, assistant national director of Iosco services for the Boy Scouts of America, completed four days of services to the Paul Bunyan Council last Thursday night with a presentation to the executive board at a meeting held at Hale. Twenty-four men were present from the seven-county council for a dinner served at Ellen's Evergreen Restaurant.

There was no general pattern of behavior or specific incident that prompted the code. Rather, it was simply the belief that parents could better support the school's goals if the schools showed a willingness to support parents in working out some of their problems.

Haverkamp has been assisting in the organization of community campaigns to raise funds for the Paul Bunyan Council operation for 1965. No independent campaigns are conducted in Midland County or in the Oscoda or Tawas area as community chests take care of council needs through fall campaigns.

The problem cited most by parents in trying to enforce discipline was that they lacked the backing of other parents. What they wanted was a very specific, clearly defined set of standards which would give parents a common basis for enforcing discipline.

Samples of crystal clear positions in the code included: "Students should not be allowed to smoke," "going steady is dangerous . . ." "single dating should be discouraged," "group dating is more acceptable," "disapprove of car ownership—the use of the family car is a privilege and not a right."

"I suppose," said Supt. Reynold Mick of Tawas Area School, "that some parents would not pay any attention to the code if it was adopted—maybe five percent of them would not and they are the ones who need it most."

"If we can keep that number down to five percent by giving this kind of support to the other 95 percent, then I think the code will have served its purpose."

Table Action on Hiring Full-Time Clerk of Board

Personnel changes and discussion on proposed reorganization of school offices, once the move is made to the new elementary addition at East Tawas, were considered at Monday night's meeting of Tawas Area Board of Education.

Of principle interest during the meeting was a motion by Trustee Clyde Soper calling for the transfer of all board records to chambers at East Tawas on or before November 1.

While the motion passed by a four to three margin, moving records to the new board room apparently is not a subject of controversy among board members, as this has been discussed in past meetings and met with complete approval of members.

The requirement that all records be maintained there, along with a second motion by Soper, later tabled until the next meeting at the request of Pres. Leonard Sarki, which called for hiring of a new clerk to perform actual duties of the board secretary and treasurer, met opposition.

The first motion passed with yeas voted by Trustees Harold Hammond, Mrs. Norman Payea, Sarki and Soper. Voting no were Walter Champion, Waldo Curry and Walter Niles.

Earlier in the meeting, the board adopted Roberts' rules of order and, according to standard procedures, could not discuss Soper's second motion until support was received. Mrs. Payea seconded the motion in order that members could discuss the matter.

Hiring of a full-time clerk to handle duties of the secretary and treasurer, working out of the new East Tawas office, had been proposed several meetings previously by Soper. Recording secretarial work and maintenance of board records is presently handled by Leonard Hosbach on a part-time basis. Some of the records, mainly dealing with salaries of personnel, are retained at his home.

During discussion, Hammond said he did not believe a competent person could be hired on a full-time, 40-hour week basis, as suggested by Soper, for \$2,500. He believed such a salary would be closer to \$5,000 annually.

"I cannot see jeopardizing our present excellent records system," said former treasurer, Waldo Curry.

Because of the lateness of the hour, discussion was tabled until the next meeting.

In other business, President Sarki requested that a new motion be submitted to hire Richard Wunderle as a substitute bus driver. The motion passed unanimously.

The board accepted Supt. Reynold Mick's recommendation of hiring Mrs. Harley Welch as head cook at the high school when Mrs. Leonard Gottleber moves to the East Tawas unit as head cook. Mrs. Stanley Misener, as a full-time cook, and Mrs. Harold Cook, as a part-time cook, are to be hired for the East Tawas unit.

was approved by the board. All members of the custodial staff are to receive on-the-job training to become acquainted with operation of heating equipment.

The board is to advertise for a new crossing guard at Lincoln and Newman Streets at East Tawas. Approval was given to purchase 20 robes for the school choir. It was reported that the choir now numbers 80 persons, with robes enough for 40. The band booster club has said it would purchase 20 robes and the board is to purchase 20 at approximately \$20 each.

Principal Ernest Jordan said that football tickets were being sold to students at school prior to games at 35 cents each. Students are to be required to pay 50 cents (See SCHOOL BOARD, page 10.)

H.L. Hammond Resigns School Board Position

Harold L. Hammond of Alabaster Township, a member of Tawas Area Board of Education since 1960, submitted his resignation at Monday night's regular meeting.

His resignation becomes effective October 12.

Hammond, who served as treasurer of the board, has been promoted by his employer, Consumers Power Company, and he and his family will soon move to their new home in the Bay City area.

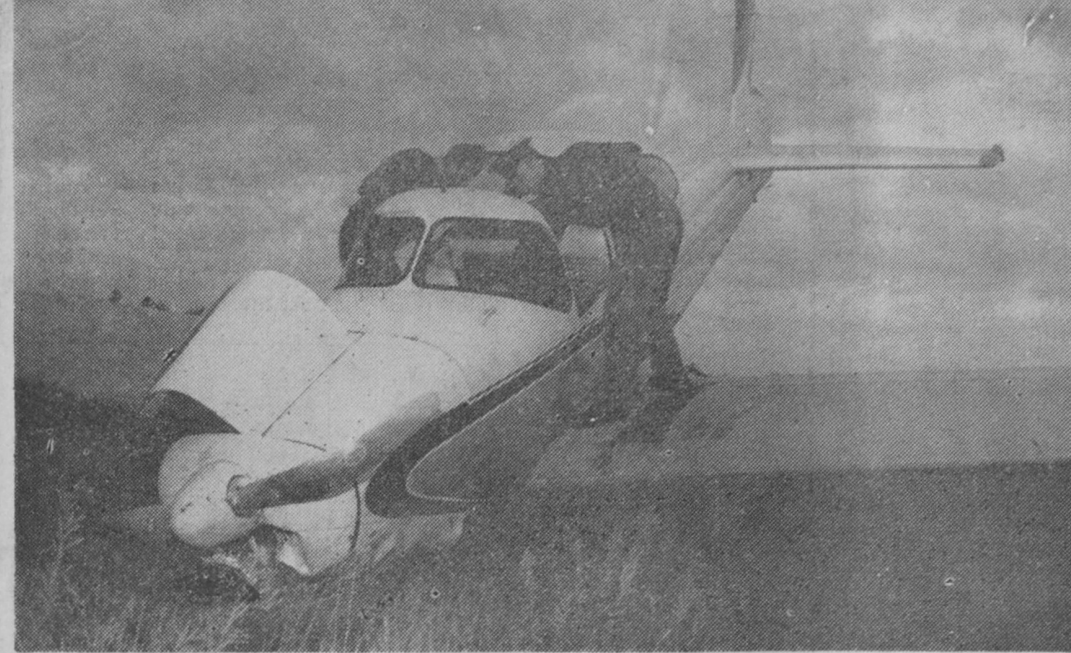
"It has been a privilege serving on the board of education and it has been a great education for me," said Hammond.

On recommendation of the outgoing board member, the vacancy will be filled out for the balance of the school year by Donald Deering, also of Alabaster Township. The position is to be filled at the regular school election in July.

Board Pres. Leonard Sarki said consideration of a successor to Hammond as treasurer should be studied prior to the October 12 meeting.

Hammond has been farm service advisor for Consumers Power Company here since 1950. His new duties will include supervision of the customer order section of the department and related customer service activities.

A native of Highland Park, he is a graduate of Hillsdale High School and Michigan State University. After joining Consumers Power in 1950, his first assignment was at West Branch and he moved to Tawas City that same year.

Three Injured in Forced Landing; Pilot Charged

Three Detroit area men escaped serious injury Saturday evening when their light airplane crashed in a farm field west of Tawas City.

Treated at Tawas Hospital and released were Virgil A. Stockton, 36, Taylor; Carl Sundberg, 36, also of Taylor; and Henry J. Mlostek, 34, Southgate.

Stockton, who has been charged with operating an aircraft without a pilot's license, told investigating state police that they were flying at 5,000 feet, enroute to Detroit from Harrisville, when the plane experienced engine failure.

The pilot made a good landing in a field owned by Carl Schmalz, about one-half mile north of the intersection of Plank and Spartan Roads. On landing, the nose gear was broken off, the propeller bent, undercarriage damaged and wing fuel tank punctured.

Stockton had borrowed the plane from James J. Manson of Detroit and told police "he was thinking of purchasing it."

The pilot had his upper teeth knocked out in the crash, Sundberg sustained a laceration over the right eye and Mlostek sustained a laceration of the right cheek.

Stockton entered a plea of not guilty when arraigned Monday before Justice of the Peace Carl E. Eckman. Bond was set at \$100. No trial date has been set.

Operating an airplane without a license is also contrary to federal regulations.

County Residents Back Judge Miller in Appeals Ct. Bid

A group of Iosco County residents met informally last week to organize a committee to promote Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller for the Third District Court of Appeals.

Purpose of the meeting was to raise funds to assist Judge Miller in campaigning throughout the huge 66-county district.

"We can promote Judge Miller to this important post," Mr. Werth stated in addressing the group. "His ability as a jurist is unquestioned and we need men of his caliber in high judicial office. His forthright stand on separation of powers in government is refreshing, to say the least."

Werth also stated that Iosco County deserves the honor of having one of the appeal court seats located here. "I am thinking of the economic aspect," Werth said. "Here is a central location for Northern and Upper Michigan. In states where appeal courts are already established, nearly 90 percent of all cases from lower courts are appealed. Iosco County will benefit tremendously economically."

Gould was elected chairman of the fund drive committee; Babcock, treasurer; Elliott, publicity chairman, and Prescott as secretary.

Gould stated that advertising soliciting funds would soon appear and urged everyone to contribute to help win this honor for the area and Judge Miller, a native son of the county.

World War I Vet Receives Medal

A 70-year-old ex-marine from Tawas City, wounded in the Battle of the Marne 42 years ago, was presented a medal from the French Government Thursday night.

Pinned with the "Medal of the Marne" was Andrew P. Klinger, who served as a private in the 17th Company, Second Division, Fifth Marines during World War I.

The medal was presented during a meeting of the Veterans of World War I, Andrew P. Klinger Barracks, held at Tawas Township Hall. Twenty members plus the auxiliary were in attendance.

It was on July 18, 1918, that Klinger was wounded by German machine gun fire. His platoon had the task of cleaning out four machine gun nests and, during the advance, he was struck by a slug in the upper right leg.

Klinger was not evacuated from the battlefield until the next day when he was found by two French poilu. He spent 10 days in a French hospital before being turned over to an United States hospital. The armistice had been signed by the time he reached New York.

Amputation of his leg was performed in a Chicago hospital. Klinger worked for the Ford Motor Company for six years and then he and Mrs. Klinger returned to Tawas City where they farmed for the next 12 years. During World War II and the Korean conflict he worked in defense plants. He worked five years for Tawas Industries when his eyesight began to fail. He is now completely blind.

Klinger's cheerfulness, in spite of his double handicap, has been and is an inspiration to many people. He and Mrs. Klinger reside at 1147 Bay Drive. He is a charter member of Jesse C. Hodder Post, American Legion, Tawas City.

AuSable Canoe Race Scheduled This Week-End

Grayling will kick off one of the northland's most popular fall outdoor attractions Friday when canoe racing teams from the United States and Canada compete in a preliminary pole position sprint on Lake Margarethe to determine starting positions for the 18th annual AuSable River Valley Canoe Race.

First leg of the race—Grayling to Mio—is slated for Saturday and the final lap—Mio to Oscoda—will be run Sunday.

Sportsman's Park at Mio will be site of the first leg finish line Saturday. Racers will stay overnight at Mio before starting the second leg of the race to Oscoda Sunday.

Most teams entered in the two-day event have participated in many summer warm-up races. However, the grueling pace set in the AuSable run will be a real test of strength and stamina as the precision paddlers try to equal or better the record time of Minnesota's Irvin Peterson and Oscoda's Ralph Sawyer, who last year completed the 240-mile river course in a little more than 15 hours.

Fall color has set the stage at all spectator viewing sites and many sidelight festivities are scheduled by the communities of Grayling, Mio and Oscoda.

Four East Tawas youths were treated and released from Tawas Hospital Saturday night following a crash on Sand Lake Road.

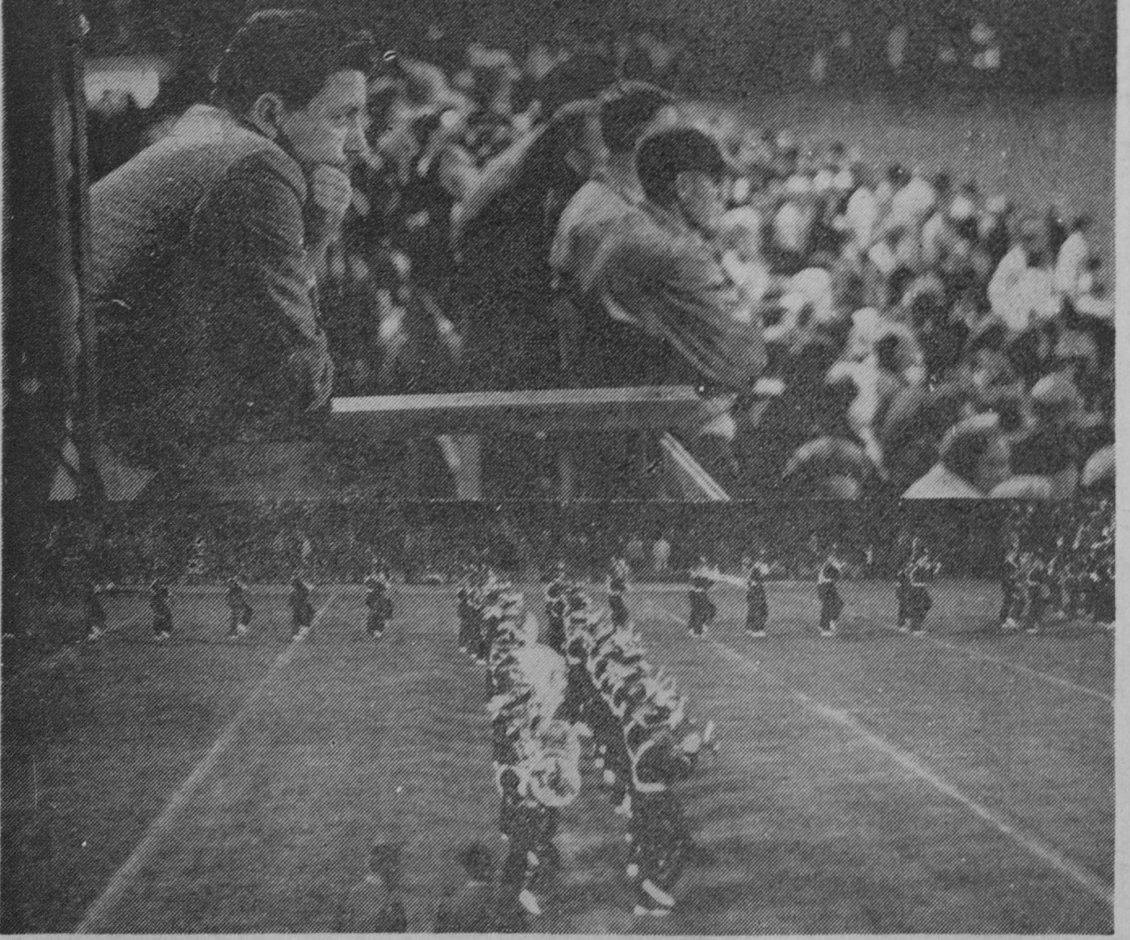
Receiving minor hurts were Thomas Crybliskey, 17; Jerry Lixey, 17; Randy Roach, 16; Charles Gould, 17.

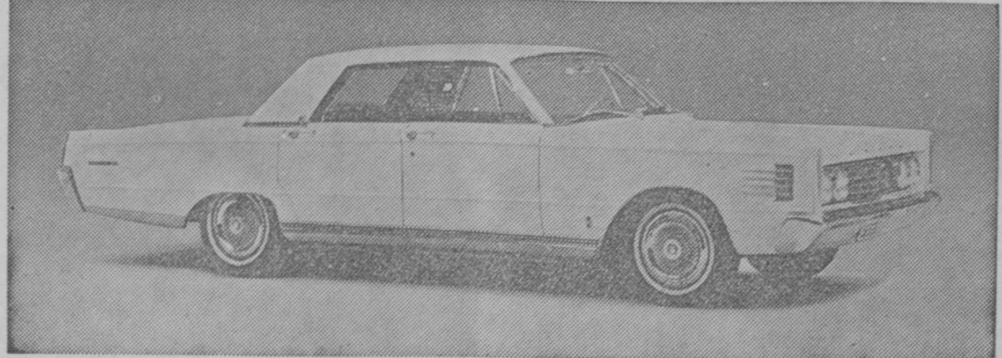

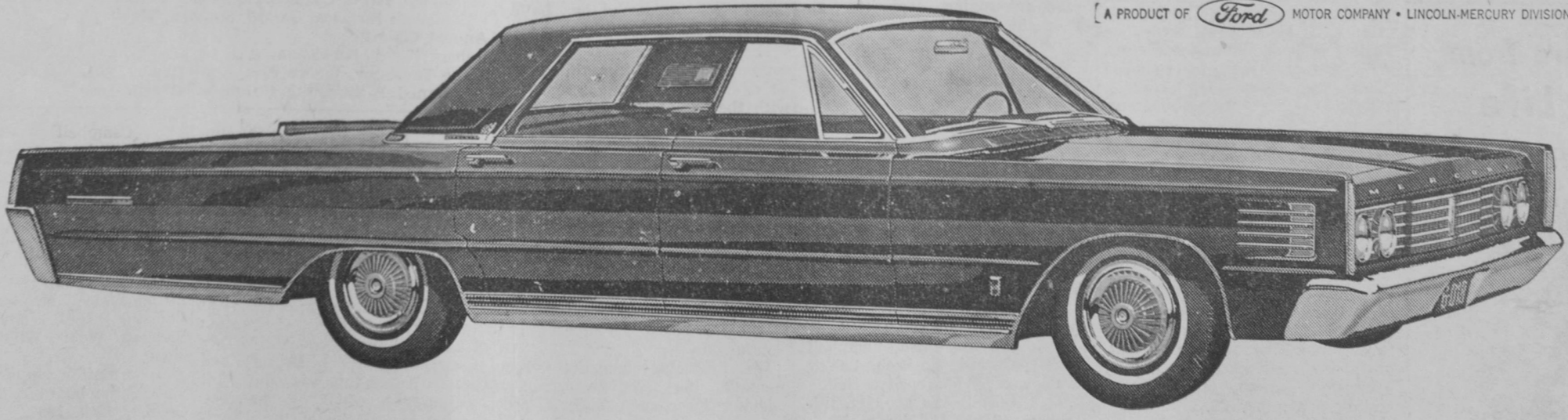

Iosco County Supervisors' Proceedings

SEPTEMBER SESSION September 16, 1964

The Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order in September session at 9:30 a. m. by the chairman, who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Abbott, Bellville, Blust, Campbell, Everett, Gerard, Hosbach, LaVoy, Little, Lixey, McKenzie, Nelkie, Oates, O'Dell, Savage, Smith, Stephan, Webb, Wilkinson.

Communications were read and referred to the proper committees by the chairman.

The clerk addressed the board regarding the possibility of a large increase in expenditure of the taxpayers' money in providing funds for appeal cases under new law. He stated that the new rules provide for free transcripts and court appointed attorneys in criminal appeals. The clerk stated that the principle involved is the continuing placement of added duties calling for the spending of county monies by both judicial and legislative branches of government. He asked for the support of the board in considering some sort of protest should the cost in this county reach large amounts. One way might be withholding payment whereby a court directive would become necessary.

Mr. Thornton, a member of the Regional Library Board, addressed the supervisors and reported on the efforts being made by the library board to secure the services of a librarian who would meet the state qualifications thereby insuring the continuance of state financial assistance. Mr. Thornton stated that a librarian for this position they are trying to fill must have a master degree in library science and four years of experience in library work. The state contributes \$4,800 toward this salary and the local board is presently advertising for applicants at a salary of \$7,500.

It was moved by LaVoy supported by Abbott that approval of the minutes of the August session be delayed until publication.

Mr. Forsyth, representing the Burroughs Company, addressed the board in regard to the purchase of a tax billing machine. Mr. Smith addressed the chair requesting that action be taken sometime during the day on the proposed zoning ordinances for Reno, AuSable and Oscoda Townships. The chair reported that the matter would be brought to a vote during the day.

Mr. Higgins again addressed the board on the progress of the Tawas Lake Dam.

Upon motion supported and prevailing, the board recessed until 1:30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Upon call to order at 1:30 p. m., roll call was ordered by the chairman. The same supervisors were present as at the morning session.

Mr. LaVoy read the following resolutions of the zoning committee:

Drain Commissioner Stickney addressed the board and reported that he made an offer of \$150 each to the Dimmick and Timreck interest for purchase of sites to construct the Tawas Lake dam. He further stated that a deed is being prepared by Mr. Dimmick but there had been no communications to date from Mr. Timreck.

Supervisor Smith addressed the board setting forth the concern of a number of people in his township over the dam constructed on Huron Creek by a Mr. Simpson. Mr. Smith stated that the dam was reconstructed this spring to a new height of about eight feet and holding back an approximate 80 acres of water.

Supervisor Smith moved that the drain commissioner be instructed to notify Mr. Simpson that the dam had now reached proportions greater than that granted by this board in the original permission. Mr. Stickney was further instructed to notify Mr. Simpson to reconstruct the dam so that natural flow of water is not impeded to the present extent thus removing a potential hazard. The chair announced that nominations would now be received for appointing a member of the Regional Library Board to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Mr. Egli.

Mr. Little nominated Mrs. Bernice Herriman of Route No. 1, Tawas City.

The chair called for other nominations and there being none it was moved by McKenzie supported by LaVoy that the nominations be closed and the clerk instructed to cast the entire vote for Mrs. Herriman. Chairman announced that Mrs. Bernice Herriman is duly appointed a member of the Regional Library Board for the term expiring 4-15-67.

Mr. Nelkie for the aeronautics committee moved that the request of Schaaf Lumber Company for permission to erect a portable office adjacent to the hangar at the airport and the request of a R. V. Herrington to take over the gas facilities at the airport be tabled while the committee studied the proposals. The motion was supported by Everett and carried unanimously.

Mr. Smith read the following report of the conservation committee: Honorable Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:

We, the conservation committee, feel that the proposal by Consumers Power to the forest service on land exchange in Iosco County be agreeable by this board.

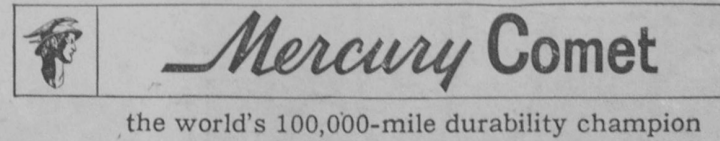

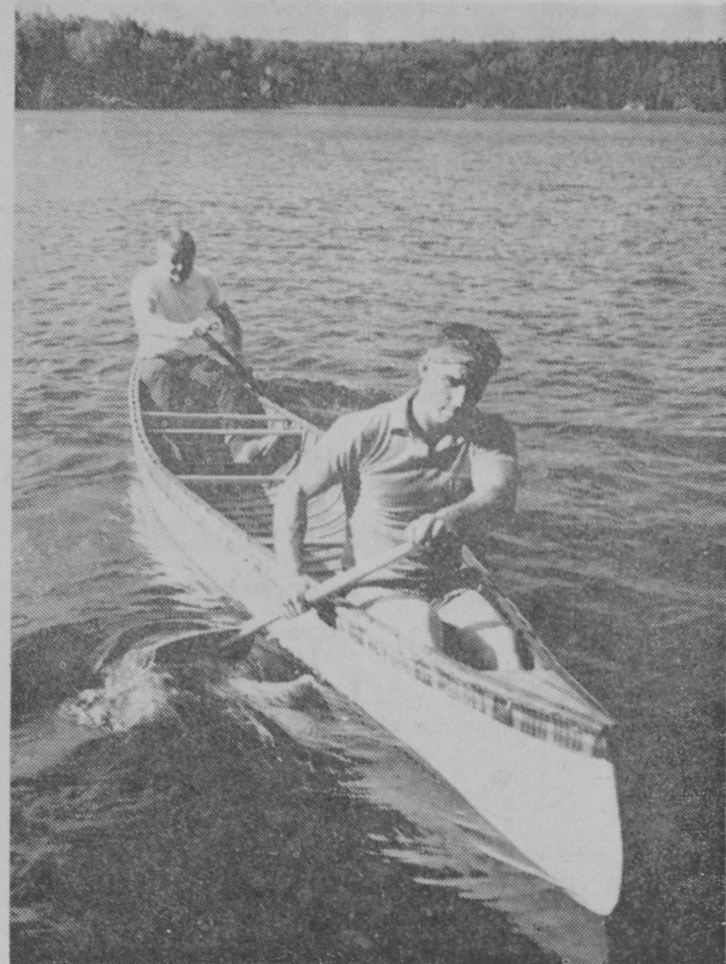

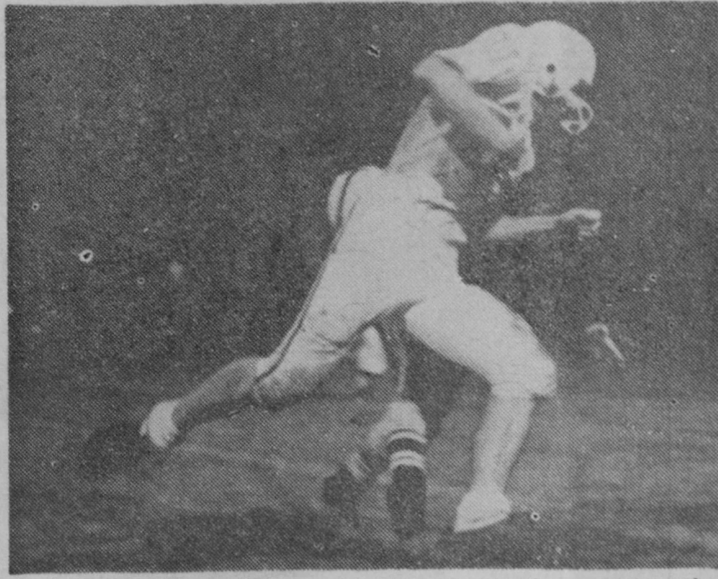
