

Iosco County escaped damage of storms which hit many Michigan areas Sunday evening, some as close as the Thumb and Bay Coun-

High wind caused a partial break-up of ice in Tawas Bay, but the thick shelf of ice from the tip of Tawas Point on a line to the mouth of Tawas River was still intact Monday.

All streams in the county were above normal level Sunday. Melfing ice and snow, plus a heavy rain Sunday night, caused Tawas River and Dead Creek to raise more than

a foot in a matter of hours. Only spot reporting serious flood damage locally was north of East Tawas on US-23. Water poured through a tube under the highway flooding the Four Seasons Resort owned by Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence DeBeau.

Harold Knight, owner of nearby Knight's Sunrise Cabins, which was threatened by high water, said that the state highway department had installed a larger tube under the highwy during construction last year. Melting ice and snow on the west side of US-23, combined with the heavy rain, rushed through the tube and had no place to drain but onto private property on the east side of the highway.

Knight said that the former tube had been connected with a private tile which drained surface water to the lake. He claimed that when the new tube was installed, no provision was made by the state to handle such a run-off.
