

City's Operating Budget for 1965-66 is \$104,285

An operating budget of \$104,285 was adopted for 1965-66 by the Tawas City Council at its Monday night meeting. This amount was \$6,845 higher than last year's budget of \$97,440, although expenditures amounted to \$98,468.

Under terms of the state constitution, a public hearing was held prior to adoption of the budget. There were no objections heard.

In his report to the council, Supt. of Public Works Reginald Publitz said that information for the budget was gained by a review of previous records of receipts and disbursements, along with an estimate of services and expenses to be incurred during the coming year.

The council adopted an appropriation ordinance of 9 1/2 mills to be levied against \$4,738,025 state equalized valuation, of which six mills is for contingent and 1 1/2 mills for street. The remainder was 1 1/2 mills for debt retirement and one-quarter mill for bond and interest, the latter two being voted taxes.

The above compared to 19 mills last year levied against assessed valuation of \$2,264,500 shows an increase of \$1,986, reflecting a slightly higher valuation.

Six mills allocated for contingent would bring in \$28,428 while 1 1/2 mills for streets would bring in \$7,107. This compared to \$27,174 and \$6,793 last year. The new millages for voted taxes would bring in \$8,291 for debt retirement and \$1,184 for bond and interest.

According to Publitz, taxes amount to slightly less than one-third of the city's receipts.

Anticipated revenue for 1965-66 is as follows: Current taxes, \$32,900; delinquent taxes, \$2,500; sales tax, \$16,800; Act 51, \$22,000; trunkline maintenance, \$13,500; liquor tax, \$3,710.

Some of the major disburse-

ments include city hall-garage, \$10,700; police, \$7,785; fire department, \$6,400; street lights, \$6,000; parks, \$2,550; new streets, \$5,400; state streets, \$5,850; local streets, \$17,600; disposal grounds, \$7,100; employee benefits, \$3,600; library, \$2,425.

Highway Dept. Plans Study of Shoreline Rippap Along US-23

Possible elimination of what has been termed by Tawas City Businessmen's Association and city council as an unsightly shoreline along US-23 is to be studied soon by the state highway department.

In a letter to the city council this week, Howard E. Hill, acting state highway director, said that rippap was dumped along the roadway for the purpose of minimizing erosion by Lake Huron during a high water situation.

"We are interested in doing whatever can be done within reason eliminating unsightly roadsides," said Hill. "In order to obtain a better understanding of the problem, I am asking our senior district engineer, Frank Deschamps, to meet with representatives of your city for the purpose of reviewing the situation. We are asking him to have a report submitted to this office as soon as possible."

Action was initiated by the city council's letter addressed to W. D. Nunn of East Tawas, a member of the state highway commission.


W-P Area Kindergarten Registration Set May 6

Iosco Adopts Budget of \$406,200

Include Part Payment of County-Wide Appraisal

A budget of \$406,200 was adopted by the Iosco Board of Supervisors for county operational expense during 1966. This was \$78,413 higher than that requested last April.

With anticipated fees of \$60,000 to be received from the various county offices, total amount to be raised by taxation would be \$346,200.

This is the highest budget ever adopted by the board of supervisors, as has been the case with each succeeding year in recent history. An increase is shown in nearly every department, through bringing salaries of all county officers to \$6,000 annually, plus increases in other departments and establishment of several new ones.

Last year, Iosco County had a state equalized valuation of \$55,978,584. This year's valuation is expected to be approximately \$57,000,000.

One of the big items in the budget increase came through a 16-2 roll call vote Monday morning when the board adopted a resolution calling for the hiring of a professional appraisal firm to make an equalization survey of the entire county.

This survey is similar to the one which was recently completed in Tawas City by Gem Surveys of St. Clair. This same firm started work Tuesday on an equalization survey of Oscoda Township, authorized at the last township board meeting. AuSable Township has also contracted with this firm to make the survey.

In his motion on the above resolution, Supervisor Charles Smith pointed out that, according to state law, the county must have a county equalization department established by 1968. He was of the opinion that the county would be better off by hiring an outside appraisal firm to complete the work.

Cost of the complete county appraisal was estimated at \$90,000 by Gem Surveys. Payment would be made over a three-year period. No firm was mentioned in the motion.

The two negative votes on Smith's motion were cast by Chairman Lloyd Little of Grant Township and Supervisor George Webb of Plainfield. Both men later voted in favor of adopting the 1966 county budget which included \$30,000 for this year's payment.

Other new items listed in the 1966 budget also involved collection of taxes. Included was \$8,000 for operation of the tax equalization department and \$10,000 as a building fund to provide additional quarters for the expanding Addressograph department and new tax equalization department.

Another new item was \$20,000 for medical care facility operation. Supervisor C. S. Everett, chairman of the board's welfare committee, said that the money would

Would Prohibit Noncamper Cars in ET City Park

At the request of Park Chairman Merton Killey, a regulation prohibiting cars from driving through the East Tawas City Park, other than those owned by campers, may be incorporated in regular park rules.

Killey appeared before the council Monday night and said that cars driving through the park during the camping season posed many problems.

Police Chief Donald Docking also pointed out that persons other than campers were responsible for a number of thefts committed at the park last summer.

The city is also studying the possibility of deputizing the park manager and his assistant as police officers.

East Tawas to Hire Third Police Officer

East Tawas is to add a third shift to its police department, according to action taken at Monday night's regular meeting.

In order to provide better protection during the summer months, a third police officer is to be hired from May to October. Applications for the patrolman position close at noon Monday, May 3, and the council is to make its appointment that evening.

At present, Police Chief Donald Docking is on duty from 9:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. daily and night patrolman, Robert Langlois, works from 7:00 p. m. to 3:00 a. m. Although a new schedule has not been adopted as yet, the new patrolman probably would work part of the time with Langlois and then continue on to an earlier hour in the morning.

Salary for the new position would be \$375 per month. The Michigan Waterways Commission is reportedly interested in a dock patrolman and the city is to investigate the possibility of joint participation in hiring of the new man.

In other business, the council directed Supt. of Public Works Paul Ropert to send his city crew to the shore of Tawas Bay and clean up debris from the old Anderson Coach Company plant and assess costs to Truman Barbier, property owner. It was stated that Barbier had agreed on March 29 to have such work completed by April 19.

Need Financial Wizardry to Meet Budget Requests

Iosco County Allocation Board held its annual reorganizational meeting Monday. After looking over operational budgets submitted by the four school districts, several townships and the county, it was the opinion of all that true financial wizardry or even magic would be needed to stretch available tax dollars to meet ever-expanding costs.

At the first of four official meetings, along with extra ses-

sions to be held between now and June 7, Arden Charters was re-elected as chairman of the allocation board and William Woreley Jr. was re-elected vice chairman.

Other members are Russell A. Rollin Sr., Henry Oates, County School Supt. William Tracy, County Treasurer Grace L. Miller and County Clerk George A. Prescott.

It appears that all budgets submitted will need revision downward in order to keep the tax levy within the 15-mill limitation. Although the allocation board does not have the power to actually alter specific budgets, the various taxing units would probably be asked to make revisions.

State equalized valuation totals were not available as of Monday, but it is believed that Iosco's valuation of \$55,978,584 in 1965 would be in excess of 57 million dollars this year.

(Because of possible confusion over changes from assessed valuation to state equalized valuation totals in several taxing units, the board of supervisors instructed its footing of assessment rolls committed to strike out increases and decreases on the new report. The board awaits the state equalized totals Wednesday or Thursday which would give a better picture of Iosco's financial structure.)

Last year, schools were allocated 8.55 mills for operation, the county received 5.25 mills and levied 5.21, each township showing a need was allocated one mill for operation and the intermediate school district received one-fifth of a mill. This added up to a total of 15 mills, although in Baldwin and Tawas Townships, only 14 mills were spread as these two units did not request the one mill for township operation.

This year, according to state law, schools are to receive a full nine mills in order to receive 100 percent of state aid. The budget submitted by the county would require six mills. Unless some action is taken, millage required for the above budgets would account for

the full 15 mills, leaving nothing for townships or the intermediate school district.

"With expanded cost of services to the people, it is a real tough job to determine the allocation to come within the 15-mill limitation," was the comment of Superintendent Tracy.

There was some discussion heard at the county building Monday concerning the possibility of a special election to ask taxpayers to allow an additional three mills above the 15-mill limitation.

In addition to the county budget as printed in another column of the Herald, school budgets submitted were as follows:

Tawas Area School submitted a request of \$252,848, with a total 1965-1966 budget of \$596,198. Last year, this district requested \$245,617 in taxes and was allocated \$227,899.47.

Oscoda Area School's tax request Monday was \$260,000 out of a total budget submitted of \$1,745,685. Last year, Oscoda requested \$205,324 in taxes and was allocated \$184,432.

According to the terms of the new city ordinance, Mark was allowed to make the above addition and changes as he had made an appearance at a public hearing prior to adoption of the new code. Had he not filed his intentions, the enlargement of a nonconforming use would not have been permissible as the residence is located in a business district.




Tawas Students Are Named to Dean's Honor List at Ferris

To be named to the dean's honor list a student must maintain at least a B average while carrying a full academic load.

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

Attends U. S. Navy Pre-Flight School At Pensacola, Fla.

On-the-Job Training Program at TA to be Expanded this Year

Expansion of the cooperative training program at Tawas Area High School, under which certain students are released from school to receive on-the-job training with local business and industry, is to be enlarged this year.

According to Robert Reasner, director of the program at Tawas Area, 15 students are now enrolled at 14 different businesses and plans are being made to continue the training during the summer.

Reasner said that students participating in on-the-job training during summer months could receive one school credit by working 15 hours a week for 38 weeks under such supervision.

He emphasized that there should be more participation by C and D average students, not just the better student, as is the case at present.

"This cooperative training offers the student a good opportunity to receive actual experience under working conditions," said Reasner. Any business in the community thinking of hiring part-time help during the summer is asked to call the school and possibly cooperate in this training program.

College Sophomores Now Allowed to Join NROTC Program

A new program started by the United States Navy this year will enable college sophomores to take navy reserve officer training (NROTC) in their junior and senior years, even though they have not previously been in the program. Closing date for applications is May 1.

Sophomores going to a university where the navy has a ROTC unit, may pick up naval science courses missed during their first year of college. They would spend six weeks this summer in a special course at Purdue University; University of California, Los Angeles, or at the University of North Carolina.

Besides the usual qualifications for navy ROTC, the students must be accepted for their junior years at an NROTC university before applying for the program. NROTC universities in or near Michigan include the University of Michigan; Miami, Ohio; Notre Dame, Indiana; Ohio State, and Purdue, Indiana.

Upon completion of the special course, the students will attend the university where they have been accepted, taking naval science classes in addition to their major curricula. They will be paid on a monthly basis and may be offered commissions in the United States Naval Reserve or United States Marine Corps Reserve upon graduation.



