## Woerpel is New Tawas Ranger

Loren S. Woerpel, 26, is the new ranger in the Tawas District of the Huron-Manistee National Forest replacing Joseph Blake, who retired effective July 31.

The new ranger comes from the regional office at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, where he had charge of audio visual information services of the region for the past 18 months.

A native of Stevens Point, Wisconsin, Woerpel attended school there and then graduated from Michigan Technological University, Houghton, in 1961, receiving a bachelor of science degree in forestry.

He joined the United States Forestry Service in June 1961 and his first assignment was in Hiawatha National Forest at Manistique. He later served as assistant ranger in the Gifford District of the Chequamegon National Forest in Northwestern Wisconsin.

With his service in the information and education division, as well as his experience in the field,

Woerpel has a good background for his new post here.

Upon his recent retirement, the former ranger said that such information and education of the public in regard to safety with fire had much to do with reducing the number of costly blazes throughout the nation.

One of Woerpel's first jobs on arriving here was to direct the local forest ranger crew in fighting a fire northeast of East Tawas which was caused by a smoldering campfire.

Woerpel and his wife, Donna, and their two sons, aged 4½ and three years, make their home at 412 Huron Street, East Tawas.

An expert photographer, he also lists this as his hobby.

### Smiths Ask Retrial on Damage Suit

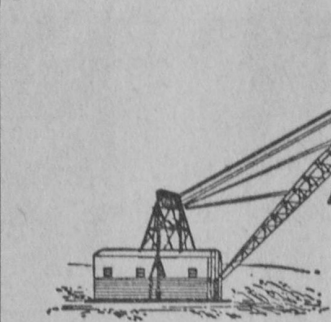
Hearing on a motion for a new trial asked by James B. and Emily C. Smith on a \$101,000 damage suit brought against Miss Burnetta Miller, Tawas Area School teacher, will be heard August 23 by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

This case was tried to conclusion starting June 15 and ended with an unanimous jury verdict June 18 calling for no cause for action on the Smiths' claim. The jury also ruled "no cause" on a countersuit filed by Miss Miller.

During the trial, the defendant placed two witnesses on the stand, Stanley Stasik and Donald Bennett, who testified as to the speed of the Smith vehicle at a distance from the scene of the accident.

Attorneys for the Smiths, state in their bill that testimony regarding Smith's speed at a remote distance from the scene of the accident was too speculative and that neither witness could establish the speed of the vehicle, nor was testimony material or reflective upon the speed of the Smith vehicle in the proximity of the scene of the accident.

The lawsuit resulted from an auto collision November 7, 1963, south of Tawas City, involving cars operated by Smith and Miss Miller.

## Campfires Touched Off Two Brush Fires Sunday

Careless use of campfires at two beer parties has been blamed as the cause of two brush fires in the Tawas district Sunday morning.

Ranger Loren S. Woerpel said Monday that evidence found at the two sites had been turned over to Michigan State Police for investigation.

Between three and four acres of brush land burned over southwest of the Iosco County Airport. "Had it not been for the quick work of the East Tawas Fire Department and volunteers living in the immediate vicinity, this fire could have turned into something serious," said Woerpel.

Men of the Tawas Ranger District were still watching the blaze Monday, in spite of the heavy rain which drenched the area Sunday night.

Firemen located the source of the blaze—a campfire started in the middle of the road. Beer bottles were found strewn about the area and neighboring residents said they had heard a party in progress Saturday night.

East Tawas Fire Department was joined by the Tawas City Fire Department's tanker truck and crew in battling the blaze.

The forest service crew had been called out earlier in the morning on a fire one mile west of Lumbermen's Monument. They arrived in time at the airport fire to dig a perimeter fire line.

"The fire had already started to crown in the taller trees and local volunteer firemen stopped the blaze before it reached a stand of jack pine," said the ranger.

Forestry crews said that the fire earlier in the morning had also started from a campfire, which apparently burned all night following a beer party. Only about one-quarter acre was burned. Oscoda Fire Department assisted.

Sunday's rain eased the explosive conditions caused by the long drought. A total of 2.12 inches of rain was recorded at the Silver Creek tower and 1.9 inches was recorded at East Tawas.

The forestry crew tended the airport fire until 6:15 p. m. Sunday and returned Monday morning to check furrows which had been

turned over by the plow Monday and were still burning.

Tawas City Fire Department answered six fire calls over the week-end. Three calls for grass fires were at the same location on First Avenue.

County Extension Director Marvin Davenport reports that last week-end's rains arrived too late to aid the area farmers' parched second crop of hay, but for those who did make a second cutting, the rain would help the third cutting.

The director said the rain helped all forages and corn, but was of little aid to small grains which are now ready for harvest. "Corn is in all stages of maturity in the fields because of dry weather and is too far gone for a good crop," said Davenport. A late frost would help, however.

Because of the severe drought, Iosco has been included in counties which are eligible to receive surplus grains.

## East Tawas Man Escapes Death When Tractor Turned Over

A 20-year-old East Tawas man miraculously escaped death Monday when a crawler-type tractor toppled over on him while the machine was being unloaded.

Reported in satisfactory condition at Tawas Hospital Tuesday morning was Mark Froelich, whose father, John, owns the tractor, a D-4 Caterpillar.

Froelich was riding on top of the machine when it was being unloaded by Robert Langlois and others at Sheehan's garage near the intersection of M-55 and Nunn Road (East Tawas cut-off).

The front portion of the machine had been removed and, when Froelich applied the brakes as it rolled down two planks, the machine pivoted on its front axle and turned over.

Froelich was pinned under the heavy piece of equipment and the right steering lever was imbedded in his abdomen. The machine had to be lifted off of him and the lever was cut off using a hacksaw.

One portion of the steering lever was removed later at Tawas Hospital.

### SKINS FINGER IN CLOTHES WRINGER

A 62-year-old Tawas City woman, Mrs. Augusta Reinke, caught one finger on her right hand in a washing machine wringer Monday. State police officers said that the wringer skinned her finger. Officers administered first aid.

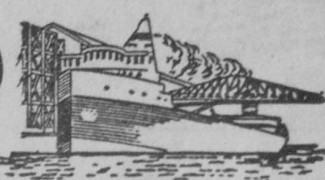
Potted plants will be judged in the horticulture division and specimen blooms are in section C. Competition is open to all amateur growers.

## Peoples State Bank to Utilize Automation

Peoples State Bank of East Tawas announces this week that its bookkeeping system will soon go automated.

Effective January 1, 1966, the bank will be using the latest IBM computers and National fully-automated Post-Tronic bookkeeping machine. It will become the first bank in the area to make use of such a modern system.

In order to make full utilization of this new electronic equipment, customer's checks are to be printed with the individual name, numerical code number and the bank's number in magnetic ink across the bottom of the check.

At present, all banks are required to have magnetically encoded numbers on checks and the other two codes are required effective January 1 by the Federal Reserve System.

Peoples State Bank already is equipped with a Post-Tronic machine in its bookkeeping department and this is being fully automated. A new proof department being established at the bank will be adding the magnetically-encoded amount for which each check is drawn.

An IBM computer is to be used to sort and list checks and to punch a paper tape which is used to drive the automated Post-Tronic machine, coupled with an automatic ledger feeder and a high-speed electronic tape reader. Data encoded in magnetic strips on the back of the statement ledger forms are read automatically.

Peoples State Bank processes approximately 3,600 checks and deposit slips daily and the new bookkeeping system will reduce computing to about one hour.

"Automation does not eliminate conventional bookkeeping controls. Rather, automation gives a bank more time to devote to such details as examining signatures, stop payments, dates and so on," states Richard Harwood, executive vice president and cashier.

"An important result is that, through electronics, Peoples State Bank can process checks with greater efficiency, thus being able to serve its customers better," Harwood stated.

New numerical code numbers are to be assigned to each customer and the bank asks that this number be included on checks and deposit tickets.

When new checks are ordered at the bank, the new numerical code number will be automatically printed on checks and deposit slips.

## Olympic Bike Races Here in September Get TV Coverage

Pre-race publicity for the Tour of Lumbermen's Monument will be featured on Channel 4, Detroit, on September 7.

Here last week-end was William Nicolai, a television photographer with the "Week-end" program, viewed by thousands of Detroiters, Canada and surrounding area.

Several top competitive bike riders and racing officials were here Saturday for the color and sound filming of a staged race. On hand from the Tawas area was James DeWyse, chamber president; Leonard Calabrese, race committee chairman, and William Grebe, committee member.

With special help from Police Chief Donald Docking and Under-sheriff Leon Putnam, the "race" was filmed at several locations.

Special shots were taken of Newman Street, the chamber of commerce grounds, starting and finishing points, scenic shots at the Tawas River bridge, Miner's Grove, Gnat's Hill, Lumbermen's Monument and the hill leading down to Old Orchard Park.

The Olympic-style races are to be held Friday, September 10, through Sunday, September 12.

This announcement was made last week by Conservation Director Ralph A. MacMullan.

He joined the department in 1937 after earning his master degree in forest recreation from the University of Michigan and served in the forestry section.

He married the former Rose Mary McKay of East Tawas and they have a son, Gaylord, a senior at the University of Michigan; a daughter, Janet, a sophomore at the University of Michigan; and another daughter, Martha, a sophomore at East Lansing High School.

The Smiths are summer residents of Tawas Beach Road, East Tawas.

Included were construction of a new Christian Day School in 1962, construction of a new steeple and renovation of the church in 1964 and renovation of the church parsonage.

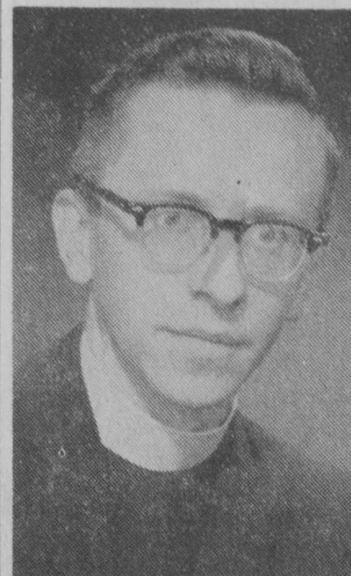
Since coming here in July 1960, he has also taken a wife. He married the former Miss Janice Howard and they now have two children.

Pastor Pieper received his degree of master of sacred theology from Concordia in 1959 and was ordained on October 11, 1959.

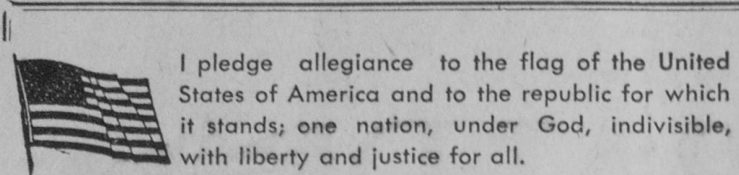

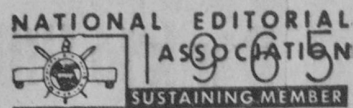

## Tawas Man Recalls Days of Early Youth

"When I was a baby, my parents did not think I would live more than two weeks. I was a sickly child with just too much fever and ague from the mud of Bay City."

Speaking was Louis H. Braddock, retired Tawas City businessman and Spanish-American War veteran, who will be 94 years old next month.

Recalling early incidents of his youth, one of the things that have been engraved in his memory over the years was the deep mud in Bay City's streets.

"Sidewalks had to be built on posts out in South Bay City where was born. Otherwise, a child could get lost in the deep mud," he recalls.

His grandfather, A. C. Braddock, came to Bay City in 1856 and drilled the city's first two salt wells. He developed a new type of evaporator used in the manufacture of salt, served as state salt inspector and became postmaster of Bay City when Grover Cleveland became president.

"Grandfather was sort of an 'old salt,' anyway, as he had been a boat builder, sailor and once owned a ship line which hauled ice from Nova Scotia to New Orleans.

"I can remember when, as a young boy, I used to go out with him on his inspection of salt blocks. The manufacturers were not allowed to ship any product which was off-color or not grained properly."

Braddock's father, N. Arthur Braddock, had been on the high seas when A. C. Braddock moved to Michigan. After several years aboard ship, Arthur and his cousin, Herb Gladwin, came to Michigan and walked from Flint to Bay City to visit A. C. Braddock.

Arthur settled in Bay City and served as a state lumber inspector. He also operated an oar factory on Fremont Avenue.

With both his grandfather and father interested in politics, Braddock recalls the presidential election of 1876 in which Rutherford Hayes won the disputed election over Samuel Tilden. He accompanied his grandfather when the latter cast his ballot at the township hall.

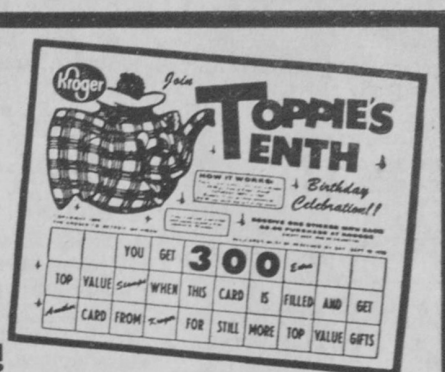

## Michigan Canoeers Follow Old Indian Routes, Says WSU Historian



DETROIT — Michigan canoeers can paddle routes rich in history on Michigan's 36,000 miles of streams or across one of the State's 11,000 lakes.

"Many of the canoe trails used today by vacationers follow the same routes used by the early inhabitants of Michigan," says Dr. Philip P. Mason, Wayne State University historian and archivist.

Indians, explorers, missionaries, fur traders and pioneers found traveling the rivers by dugout or birchbark canoe the most efficient way of penetrating wilderness unmarked by trail or road. The travelers portaged, or carried, their craft from one waterway to another.

"The Indians of Michigan moved often by canoe," says Dr. Mason, "not only on war excursions but to obtain game and fish to trade with neighboring tribes." Dr. Mason lists some of the historical Michigan canoe trails in use today, identified by numbers in the map above.

1. The Keweenaw cut-off was used by Indians to save a trip around the Keweenaw Peninsula. Modern canoeers follow the same river and lake pattern across the most northern point of Michigan.

2. The Menominee-Sturgeon River route offers a north-south passage from Lake Michigan in Marquette County both to Lake Superior and to Lake Michigan, with various portages.

3. The AuTrain and Whitefish rivers serve as a north-south route through the Upper Peninsula's Alger and Delta Counties. A portage connects the two rivers.

4. The Tahquamenon-Fox-Manistique route cuts through wild country in Chippewa, Luce and Schoolcraft counties with a lengthy portage separating the lower Tahquamenon from the upper Fox.

5. The Big Manistee-Au Sable route served historically as a "Panama Canal" route, cutting across the state in an east-west direction with only a few miles of land in Crawford County separating the two rivers.

6. The Muskegon River, which springs from Michigan's two largest inland lakes, Higgins and Houghton in Roscommon County, flows 200 miles southwest into Lake Michigan.

7. The Tittabawassee, Saginaw, Cass and Shiawassee rivers all converge near one point in Saginaw County. From that point one can paddle in several directions, including west. For the westward trip, the Tittabawassee River is followed to the Pine and a portage made across Mecosta County to the Little Muskegon and Lake Michigan.

8. A second western passage, starting from Saginaw, can be made south on the Shiawassee to the Maple and from there to the Grand. The Grand River empties into Lake Michigan at Grand Haven.

9. The Huron River route starts at Upper Straits Lake in Oakland County and winds through Livingston, Washtenaw, Wayne and Monroe counties with many choice campsites along the way.

10. The Kalamazoo River is most often traveled in two sections, the first from Albion to Kalamazoo and the second from Allegan to Saugatuck on Lake Michigan.

11. The St. Joseph River, beginning at Sturgeon Lake in St. Joseph County, swings down into Indiana and then up into Michigan, emptying into Lake Luce and Schoolcraft counties.

## TA School Board Opens Bids on Truck and Supplies

Bids on furnishing supplies for the 1965-1966 school year were accepted at Monday night's meeting of Tawas Area Board of Education. Action is to be taken at the board's next meeting.

Two bids were received on dairy products. The school used 193,000 one-half pints of milk last year and 36,000 dozen ice cream bars.

Nelkie bid 5.8 cents for one-half pint milk in glass, 5.7 cents in pure pack and 5.3 cents in a new type package; 14 cents per pound for cottage cheese and 83 cents per dozen for ice cream bars. The above prices included refrigeration furnished by the bidder, requiring his installation of three walk-in coolers. Without refrigeration, prices were 5.6 cents for milk in glass, 5.5 cents in pure pack, 5.2 in the special container. Prices were the same for cottage cheese and ice cream.

The second bid was from Ling Distributing, Dean's, as follows: one-half pint of homogenized milk, 5.3 cents; 84 cents per dozen for ice cream bars, 22 cents per pound for cottage cheese. Prices would be the same with or without refrigeration on this bid.

There will be no chocolate milk served in the school, according to past policy, which was reaffirmed at the last meeting.

Three bids were received on a four-wheel drive pick-up to be used for snow removal as follows: Inglis Ford, 1966 Ford F250, three-quarter ton, \$2,575, with plow; Ot-

tawa Equipment Company, Dodge D-200, \$2,953, with plow; Ottawa Equipment Company, International D1100, \$3,068, with plow.

Three gasoline bids were received as follows: Bublitz Oil Company, 13.25 cents per gallon; Barbier Gas and Oil, 12.94 cents per gallon; Graham Oil Company, 14.10 cents per gallon.

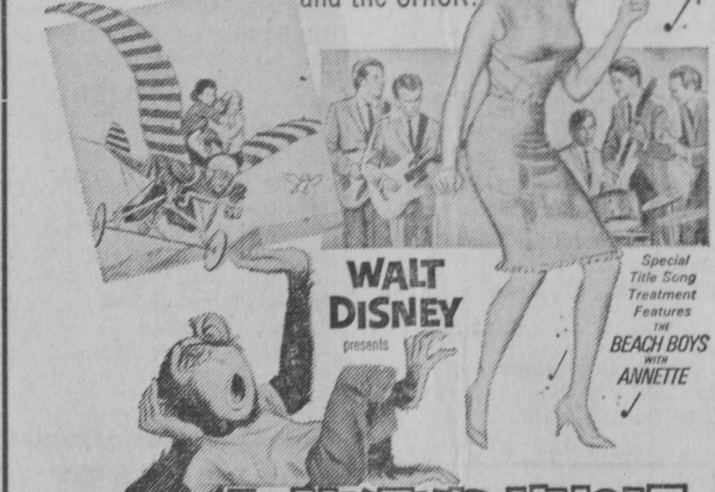

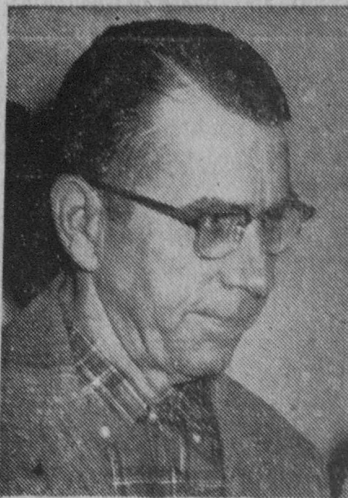

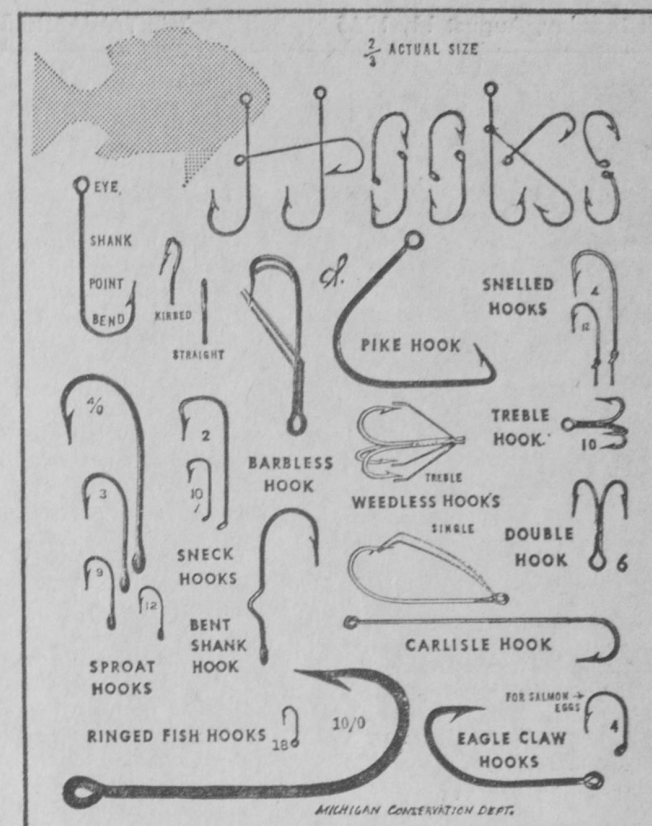

# Iosco County Supervisors' Proceedings

## JULY SESSION

July 21, 1965

The Iosco County Board of Supervisors was called to order in July session at 9:30 a. m. by the chairman who ordered roll call. The following supervisors were present: Abbott, Bellville, Blust, Campbell, Everett, Gerard, Higgins, Hosbach, Jocks, Little, Lixey, McKenzie, Oates, O'Dell, Smith, Stephan, Webb. Absent: Bolen, Nelkie.

Communications were read and referred to the proper committees by the chairman.

It was moved by Stephan supported by O'Dell that the clerk be instructed to make copies of the current state equalization report and to mail one to each supervisor. Carried unanimously.

Mr. Gerard gave a report of his attendance at a recent regional library meeting.

Mr. Higgins presented the monthly report of the civil defense director and moved that it be filed in the clerk's office. The motion was supported by Gerard and carried unanimously.

Committees were ordered to their respective duties balance of the board to be at ease subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 11:30 a. m., Mr. Campbell addressed the board and read a letter from the Flying H Service notifying the county that they were giving 30 days notice of termination of contract. Mr. Campbell stated that this put Iosco County back in the airport business.

Mr. Gerard presented the following resolution:

This board wishes to publicly reassert its fullest confidence in Mrs. Clarence McMullen for her very able and efficient administration rendered the Iosco-Arenac Regional Library in the capacity of acting director.

The board expressed this confidence orally to Mrs. McMullen at the April session and believes she should have a copy of this resolution for her files.

## AFTERNOON SESSION

Upon call to order at 3 o'clock p. m., roll call was ordered by the chairman. The same supervisors were present as at the morning session and Mr. Nelkie and Mr. Bolen took their seats. Mr. McKenzie was absent.

Mr. Smith addressed the board and reported that the new contract which will be tendered the county by Consumers Power in the operation of Old Orchard Park will be much tighter from the utility's standpoint.

Mr. Smith requested consideration of the finance committee for an amount of \$745.00 for Marble Electric for services on the water system at Old Orchard Park. He also requested an amount of \$112.00 for fire extinguishers from Alert Supply. Referred to the finance committee.

Committees were ordered to their respective duties balance of the board to be at ease subject to the call of the chair.

Upon call to order at 4 o'clock p. m., Mr. Smith reported for the conservation committee in regard to a recommendation on the Tawas Lake Dam. He stated that after conferring with the prosecuting attorney his committee had no recommendation to make and asked that it be discussed from the floor for possible decision.

Attorney Paul Harvey addressed the board on the behalf of the Tawas Lake Dam Association and urged the board to take action today. Mr. Harvey stated that much time has passed and the property owners at Tawas Lake deserve a yes or no answer and that the board was being asked for no money whatever, the benefitting property owners ready and willing to pay the entire cost through their special assessment district which has already been established.

Mr. Higgins moved that this board instruct the drain commissioner to proceed with condemnation proceedings for the erection and maintenance of the proposed dam at Tawas Lake, the entire cost to be borne by the special assessment district. ## '64 Winners to Again Race in Canoe Classic

Ralph Sawyer, Oscoda, and Irvin Peterson, Minneapolis, Minnesota, last year's winners of the AuSable Canoe Marathon, will again team up for the Grayling-Oscoda classic to be held August 21.

Sawyer, five-time winner of the AuSable event, has long been recognized as one of the top canoe racers in the Midwest, having won at least half of the races which he has entered. Starting his paddling in a duck boat which his father gave him when he was 12 years old, Sawyer entered his first AuSable marathon just three years later, at the age of 15. He has been on the winning team of six races so far this year.

The Sawyer-Peterson combination will be just one of many top two-man teams lining up at Grayling for the start of the "grand-

dy" of all Michigan canoe races.

The spectacular night time start, which will get under way at 12:01 a. m. in Grayling, will be completely illuminated by Consumers Power Company. The race from Grayling to Mio will be run mostly at night, with the first teams arriving at Mio about 6:00 a. m. Racers will paddle for some 16 continuous hours before the first team is expected to reach the finish line at the old US-23 AuSable Bridge, Oscoda.

Race officials and the Michigan Canoe Racing Association officials point out that the best advantage points to view the progress of the race will be where several bridges span the AuSable between Grayling and Oscoda; also, the six dam sites between Mio and Oscoda where teams will make their portage dashes.

Maps of the entire race course, which will provide a more detailed routing, may be obtained from chambers of commerce at Grayling, Mio or Oscoda.

Communities along the race route are planning special activities in connection with the race and the awarding of more than \$3,000 in prize money at the Oscoda finish line.

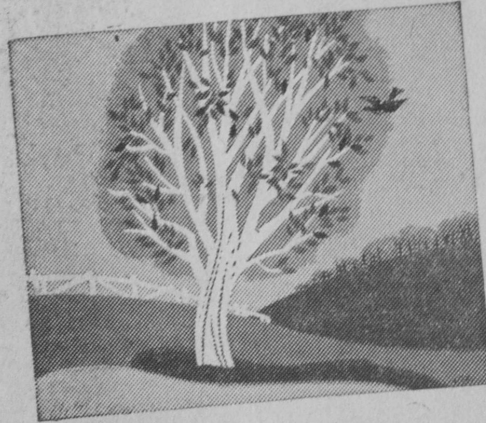
