## Traverse City Man is Bay Drowning Victim

Robert E. Lyon, 27-year-old Traverse City vacationer, Sunday became Tawas Bay's second drowning victim of the summer season. Visiting here at the home of his uncle, William Lyon, Tawas Beach Road, the Traverse City man drowned in about six feet of water off shore from Jerry's Marina on Tawas Point. Lyon was swimming with his sister, Mrs. Jacquelin Chandler, 29, Madison Heights, when his brother, Paul, kicked off one water ski while being towed by William Lyon's boat. Lyon started walking out in the water to retrieve the ski and found the water over his head. He tried to swim out to the ski, but turned

around and swam back to shallow water. A short time later, Lyon again attempted to swim out to the ski, but had to turn back. When he reached a point where he could not touch bottom he called to his sister for help. She is a nonswimmer and was about 15 feet away from him when he went under the water. Because of weed conditions on the lake bottom, Lyon's body was not recovered until about four hours later. Search boats were manned by state police, sheriff's department, city police department, skin divers from Wurtsmith Air Force Base and a rescue team from the Plainfield Township Fire Department. Investigating was E. John Moffatt, county coroner. Lyon was born May 21, 1938, in Grand Traverse County and is survived by his mother, brother and sister.

## H. R. Wendland Dies at U. of M. Hospital



## Tawas City Council OKs Revised Plans for US-23

Revised reconstruction plans for US-23 through Tawas City, as submitted by the Michigan Highway Department, were approved Monday night by the Tawas City Council. Anticipating such approval because of recent discussions with city officials, the state is advertising a September 1 bid opening on this project. Construction would start immediately with completion in the spring. The 2 1/2-mile-long section of highway was omitted from construction work last year when city officials did not approve original plans. This was the only section of US-23 in Isosco County not completely modernized during 1964 and it is deteriorating rapidly. By delaying action a little more than a year and one-half, the council gained important considerations from the state.

In addition to the reconstruction, the council authorized construction of a 10-foot-wide, 725-foot-long parking lane from a point in front of the post office to the eastern end of the city park. The special project's \$2,900 cost would be repaid from motor vehicle highway funds received by the city. Under the original construction plan, a number of gasoline service stations and other firms probably would have been forced out of business had the state insisted on reclaiming all of its right-of-way through the city. Under the new plan, the state is to operate on 120 feet of its 200-foot right-of-way from Townline Road east to the Tawas River bridge. The right-of-way narrows from that point east. Proposed curbed islands or guard posts under the old plan have been set back so as to allow, in most instances, servicing of existing gasoline pumps or parking areas on highway right-of-way. In some cases, pumps will have to be moved, but there would still be room for servicing. Starting from the Townline Road east, US-23 is to be widened and blacktopped to 24 feet, as compared to the present 20-foot width. There will be a new entrance to Bay Drive, eliminating the present dangerous intersection. There will be a turn-out lane for this area because of the number of resorts. All resorts on the lake side east from Sunset Motel will have private drives off US-23. Ninth Avenue intersection will be improved, but the river bridge will not be widened. The highway is to taper gradually from its 30-foot width on the bridge to a width of 52 feet within a distance of 400 feet from the bridge. This width is maintained at present east from Mathews Street. All rolled curbs are to be removed and replaced with straight curbs. A number of businesses with present entrances extending across the entire width of their frontage on US-23 are to be narrowed considerably. Fletcher's station will have two 50-foot drives, there will be a 50-foot drive at Barkman's, there will be no parking in front of Cavell's Dairy Isle and there will be one 36-foot entrance into Midway Drive-In. Guard rails on the lake side east of the Midway Drive-In are to be removed as the highway is to be widened and straight curbs constructed. The chamber of commerce will have two 35-foot drives and no parking will be lost. Members of the city planning commission attending the meeting were in full accord with the council's action. Contracts fixing the rights and obligations of the state and city were signed by city officials.

## Huron to Michigan Ride Started Here

Tawas City Park was the starting point Saturday morning for the coast-to-coast international trailride of Pony of the Americas Club, Incorporated. The riders, consisting of 21 children and 10 adults, left the Tawas following a parade through the business district and plan to ride the 220 miles of the Michigan Shore to Shore Riding-Hiking Trail in nine days. They are to arrive at

Elberta on the Lake Michigan shore Sunday, August 22. Heading the group of riders was James S. Bicknell III, Clare, president of the national club. The Pony of the Americas is a miniature cross between the Arabian and Quarter horse, having the Appaloosa color and characteristics. They are an all-around children's pony and stand between 46 and 54 inches in height. There were riders from Iowa, Indiana and Michigan. Some of the children are not novices, having participated in the 1964 international POAC Trailride from Perry, Oklahoma, to Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The children range from seven to 17 years of age and will be camping out and roughing-it the entire journey. Tawas Chamber of Commerce arranged for ceremonies prior to commencement of the ride. A welcome was given by Eugene Klenow, representing the chamber of commerce, and the Rev. Fr. John Kolevar gave a blessing for a safe journey.

## Council OKs Light on First Avenue

Installation of a new street light at the corner of First Avenue and Wheeler Street was authorized Monday night by the Tawas City Council. Two residents of the area appeared before the council and requested the action, stating that Wheeler Street was a dead end at the river and presented a dangerous situation for traffic. In other business, the council directed City Attorney Alf C. Watson and City Supt. Reginald Bublitz to investigate the possibility of adopting an ordinance to control the burning of trash in the fire zone. Bublitz said there had been a number of complaints concerning outside burning. He believed that such burning should be controlled in the fire zone from the US-23 bridge to River Street. The next council meeting is to be held Tuesday, September 7, rather than the preceding day which is Labor Day and a legal holiday.

## Flint Men Charged with Gambling Violation

Three Flint men were released on \$250 bond apiece while awaiting arraignment on a charge of violating the state gambling laws. Donald D. Smith, 38; James V. Young, 39; William Johnson, 40, are charged with operating a dice game at the Oscoda Chamber of Commerce's annual golf stag day event at the AuSable River Golf Club. Plain clothes officers of the state police and Oscoda Township Police Department arrested the trio. The charge is a circuit court misdemeanor.

Registration, measuring and a tune-up race are to be held Thursday. Following a skipper's meeting at 9:00 a. m. Friday, the first race is scheduled to get under way at 10:00 a. m. The second race starts after finish of the first if time and weather permit. A third race is to be held starting at 2:00 p. m. The same schedule is to continue Saturday. Social activities planned are being sponsored by Tawas Bay Yacht Club and members of the local National fleet. Competing from the local club are Richard Haglund, Matt Haglund and Robert Dillon, David Small and Henry Porter, William Anderson and Babcock, Tom Dillon and Bill Dillon. ## Legislation Assists Farm Disasters

Frank Light, chairman, Michigan ASC State Committee, announced provisions of new legislation which may assist farmers affected by natural disasters. Cropland acreages on participating farms which were not planted to corn, barley, grain sorghum or wheat because of flood, tornado or other natural disaster may be affected, he said. A participating farm is one which signed an application to participate in either the 1965 feed grain or wheat program. Farms not signed to participate are excluded. The benefit, stated Light, is that the new legislation states that acreage not planted due to disasters will be considered as planted acreage and may be eligible for price support or certificate payments. The recent legislation provides for relief on consideration that such acreage is not later planted to price support crop for 1965 harvest. Information and application blanks are available at local ASCS county offices, advised Mr. Light.

## Gill Netters Want Minimum Lowered on Size of Perch

A survey is to be made on Saginaw Bay to determine if the anatomy of yellow perch is changing. This is the claim of commercial fishermen, who say their businesses face extinction unless state laws are revised to allow the taking of smaller fish. At a hearing held Tuesday at the Federal Building, representatives of the Michigan Department of Conservation heard reports from fishermen that gill net catches showed that approximately 50 percent of the fish being taken here are under size. Commercial fishermen believe that the conservation department should reduce the legal size from an 8 1/2-inch minimum to eight inches, or remove all restrictions as to size. At present, when violators are apprehended, such undersized fish are confiscated by the department of conservation. Otto Friedman, a Detroit attorney retained by several fishermen, pointed out that many of these perch under 8 1/2 inches actually would be "legal," if they were filleted. He maintained that, in addition to the minimum length, the law provides that a perch fillet shall weigh a minimum of 1 1/2 ounces. John Anguilm, chief of law enforcement for the department, said that the minimum length of perch in the "round" was 8 1/2 inches and that the legal minimum weight of a perch fillet was 1 1/2 ounces. Because of the different interpretation of the law, the attorney general is to be asked for an opinion. It was Friedman's contention, after discussions with the fishermen, that Saginaw Bay perch were experiencing an anatomical change. He said that fish now being caught in twine with a mesh of legal size had fillets of legal weight, but were shorter than 8 1/2 inches "in the round." It was the opinion of some fishermen that red worms prevalent in perch being caught were causing the stunting of fish. Walter Crowe, who has charge of Great Lakes fisheries for the department, said that was inconsistent reasoning. He pointed out that if red worms were the cause



## AuSable Canoe Race Starts Early Saturday

The best of two-man canoe racing teams from the United States and Canada will gather at Grayling Friday, August 20, prior to the 12:01 a. m. start of the world's championship AuSable River Canoe Marathon, Grayling to Oscoda, August 21. Checking and rechecking of special gear for the 16-hour endurance run will be the scene at the Grayling staging area as race officials make sure all canoes pass rigid tests as to height, length, width and beam measurements. Plans are being finalized, with the cooperation of the Consumers Power Company, to illuminate the

entire staging area at the starting line and race officials state there will be ample free spectator space for those viewing the action. The community of Grayling is planning special events in conjunction with race festivities which include the appearance of Lauri Olson, Grayling's Miss Michigan winter sports queen. She will drop the flag signaling the start of the northland classic. Communities along the race route are also planning special activities in connection with the race and the awarding of more than \$3,000 in prize money at the Oscoda finish line.

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## Hot Lunch Program Big Business at TA

Serving hot lunches in Tawas Area Schools is big business, according to a report released last week by Supt. Reynold Mick.

During the 1964-1965 school year, hot lunch receipts amounted to \$50,625.16. Total expenses amounted to \$48,170.98.

Cafeterias in the three schools served 124,652 meals, 119,126 to children and 5,526 to adults.

A breakdown of expenses indicated that food cost \$26,548.30, labor amounted to \$18,183.55 and other expenses totaled \$3,439.13.

Average receipt per meal was 40.6 cents, which exceeded actual expenditures by 1.888 cents. Of the average receipt per meal, cost of food was 21.3 cents, labor amounted to 14.6 cents and 2.8 cents for other costs.

March was the peak month for serving with 17,854 meals. May was the low month with 8,488 meals.

If any man come to me, and hate not his father, and mother, and wife, and children, and brethren, and sisters, yea, and his own life also, he cannot be my disciple. (Luke 14:26)

The above text is one of the most misunderstood in the New Testament. Many people have either passed it by as being too harsh to follow, or have actually thought that Jesus meant that one has to hate his family or he cannot love Christ.

Jesus looked upon the home a man and his wife made and the children in it as blessed and said that such a home was intended from the beginning. Jesus also said that a man must hate his family in order to follow Him and do His will.

There seems to be a paradox in Jesus' teaching concerning the home and discipleship. The paradox is understood when we see that Jesus' strong words simply mean that we are to put Him and His kingdom first in our lives.

Putting Christ first in our lives and homes makes for the finest and strongest type of home the world knows. The home is destroyed only when we leave Christ out.



## Some Should Take Action to Protect Rights

Now that the president has signed the 1965 Social Security amendments, some people will want to take action right away in order to protect their new benefit rights. Most others will need to take no action at all. As legislation providing health insurance for the aged and making other far-reaching changes in the social security program became effective with the ceremony in Independence, Missouri, Friday, July 30, Robert M. Ball, commissioner of Social Security, proposed some "do's" and "don'ts" for the many millions of persons who will be affected.

"First of all, let me say to the 20 million people now receiving social security benefits: You do

not need to take any action at all in order to get the increased cash benefit payments the law provides. The amount of the increase for the months of January through August 1965 will be paid in a separate check mailed in the latter part of September. The first regular checks reflecting the seven percent increase will be mailed early in October, covering the month of September."

Second: Social security and railroad retirement beneficiaries now 65 or over will not need to take any action to secure their basic hospital protection under the new health insurance program. All aged persons now on the rolls will receive in September or October a full information kit directly by mail describing this protection, which becomes effective July 1, 1966. Before this effective date, a health insurance card certifying to their eligibility for the services will automatically be sent to beneficiaries 65 or over.

Third: Social security beneficiaries will not need to go to the social security office about the voluntary supplementary plan covering physician fees and other benefits. At the time they get the basic information kit, they will receive an enrollment post card giving them an opportunity to sign up for the added medical insurance program, which also becomes effective July 1, 1966.

Fourth: A special message to people 65 or over who have never worked under social security; although not qualified for cash social security benefits, these people

may qualify for the basic hospital insurance protection under the new medicare program. Those receiving public assistance from the states may be signed up for the basic hospital insurance by their welfare agencies. Enrollments in the voluntary medical insurance plan can be accepted beginning September 1, 1965. Therefore, persons over 65 who have not worked under social security should wait at least until September 1 before visiting their social security office. Then they can sign up for the basic hospital insurance and, also, enroll in the medical insurance program if they wish that additional important protection.

Certain other groups affected by the law do need to take action. They need only inquire at their social security office, the commis-

sioner said. The major groups involved are: Persons now 65 or over who are insured under social security but have never applied for benefits, persons 72 or older not now getting benefits because they (or their husbands) had not worked enough under social security to qualify under the previous provision of the law, widows age 60 or 61 at the time the law becomes effective, students 18 to 22 years of age whose social security benefits have been stopped, as well as others nearing age 18 who plan to continue in school or a severely disabled worker.



### ROUAL J. LaBERGE



### Iosco Co. Receives \$102,987 as Share of Highway Fund

Iosco County has received \$102,987 representing its share of second quarter Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections being distributed by the state highway department. Net receipts of the fund during April, May and June amounted to \$52,548,373.

East Tawas' share of the fund was \$8,466. Tawas City received \$4,407 and Whittemore received \$1,233.

All state gasoline and diesel fuel taxes and license plate fees go to the fund. After deduction of collection costs and the Michigan Waterways Commission's share, the money is distributed for use in state highways, county roads and city streets.
