Haglund and Dillon Win World's Championship

Matt Haglund and Robert (Barney) Dillon of East Tawas won second place in two final races Sunday and sailed off with the world's championship of the National One Design Racing Association.

It marked the first time that local sailors had ever captured such a championship, although Tawas Bay has hosted two North American championships in Lightning Class and, in 1962, hosted the National One Design world's championship regatta.

Haglund and Dillon had two firsts, three seconds and a third in six of the seven races run from Friday through Sunday.

A poor start in the fifth race Saturday saw the East Tawas boat drop into ninth position and Roy Christianson of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, eventual second place winner, moved up to threaten the front-runners.

"The only thing we had to contend with or think about Sunday morning was to stay ahead of Christianson in two races," said Haglund. Christianson was in third place in both and it was all over, except for a number of protests involving the lead boats. Judges spent about two hours deciding questions before announcing the final results.

Following Christianson in second place were three boats from Leeland. Fred Shoaff won third place, Bill Steel won fourth and Bill Steel, former world champion, fifth.

A total of 29 boats participated, coming from Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan, Ohio and California. Alan Ferguson and Brownie Gray of Palo Alto, California, were the lone West Coast representatives.

Next year's race will be held at Lake Leelanau, which furnished the trophy starting National One Design world's championship racing in 1938.

The veteran East Tawas sailors purchased their boat, No. 746, three years ago. Both had spent many years crewing with others in National One Design competition.

Haglund is an employee of National Gypsum Company and Dillon operates a flower shop at Pontiac. Third man in the team is Dan Cater, who crews with Haglund when Dillon is at Pontiac.

Tawas Bay Yacht Club hosted the event and served 104 meals at the annual banquet Saturday night.

Plan Final Drive for Chamber Members

Board Authorizes Architect to Prepare School Master Plan

Because of anticipated need of spending all available money on classrooms, coupled with a desire for an over-all school plant master plan, Tawas Area Board of Education has delayed any action on construction of restrooms at the high school athletic field.

Such a building had been considered for the past several years and the board had toyed with the idea of incorporating restrooms into a permanent bleacher setup. Some of the present bleachers seating 720 persons would be placed on the visitors' side of the field under the plan.

During his explanation of athletic policies for the coming year, Athletic Director Bill McIntosh said that a combination storage building incorporating restrooms would cost \$3,950. Constructing restrooms under permanent bleachers would cost around \$6,355.

While such facilities would be desirable, McIntosh said that they were not a must and that the athletic program could get along without them.

The school has accumulated about \$1,200 in cash from the sale

of paper pads and pens to go toward such a permanent building when it is constructed.

One of the principal reasons for delaying any action was emphasized by several board members, including Pres. Leonard Sarki, who thought that a complete master plan of the school property should be obtained before any permanent structures are constructed.

Waldo Curry, trustee, suggested that it might be possible to incorporate restrooms into a proposed new shop building to be constructed south of the school. Such facilities could serve both the athletic field and the shop building.

In any event, the school architect is to be asked to prepare a master plan for the school property, incorporating restrooms at the athletic field and location for a future track.

The board authorized purchase of two sections of collapsible bleachers to be placed on the visitors' side of the football field. These bleachers are also to be used in the gymnasium for basketball games, replacing an old set formerly used on the stage. Cost of the bleachers is \$890.

TA Board Accelerates Classroom Construction

A plan to accelerate the final phase of Tawas Area School's pay-as-you-go five-year classroom construction program was discussed at Monday night's meeting of the board of education.

Under original planning adopted in 1961, three new classrooms would have been needed by this year. Because of a downward trend in projected enrollment figures, this construction was to have been delayed in order to provide separate quarters for junior high.

Supt. Reynold Mick said that the closing of two classes in Tawas parochial schools necessitated immediate attention to the building of additional classrooms.

Both Immaculate Heart of Mary School and St. Joseph's School, faced with teacher shortages and a lack of adequate finances to hire replacements, have announced that first grade and eighth grade pupils would be attending the public school this fall.

Mick said that an additional 65-75 elementary and junior high school pupils could be expected in the public schools on opening day, September 7.

Arrangements have already been made to handle the new pupils by juggling some of the classes in elementary grades. There are fewer kindergarten pupils this year, four sections instead of six, and Mrs. R. J. Cooke has been transferred to teach the extra section of first grade. The board has also hired one additional elementary teacher, Mrs. Sandra Hanson, a 1963 graduate of Wisconsin State College.

A proposal outlined by the superintendent called for construction of five additional classrooms starting next spring. A conservative estimate of the cost is about \$25,000 per classroom, or a total of \$125,000. An additional \$7,250 in architectural fees would be added.

Total assets as of today in the school's building and site fund is \$29,187. Estimated taxes for 1965 amount to \$80,000. With transfers and money received from sale of the Alabaster school, the total by 1967 would be \$139,667. The school would also collect \$12,000 in delinquent taxes next year.

Rooms would be constructed at the high school and would allow for removal of seventh grade classes from the Tawas City Elementary Unit. Four rooms would be used for junior high school and the fifth room would be used for high school classes.

Mick said that plans for renovation of the shop area and the art room into five classrooms so that the seventh and eighth grade could be completely isolated would have

Beyerlein Attends Banking School

Sawyer-Peterson Win AuSable Race

Ralph Sawyer of Oscoda and Irwin "Buzz" Peterson of Minneapolis, Minnesota, won the one-day 18th annual AuSable River Valley Canoe Race on Saturday.

They paddled the 240-mile marathon in 16 hours, 11 minutes and 54 seconds, 13 minutes in front of Stan Hall, Oscoda, and Al Widling, Holly, who finished second.

While it was announced at the Oscoda finish line that Sawyer and Peterson had shaved six-tenths of one second off the old non-stop record, later investigation revealed that Ed Wojahn of Tawas City and Sanford McGuire of Mikado still held the record with their run of 16 hours, 11 minutes and 40 seconds set in 1960.

Chuck Crellin, Mount Clemens, and Jack Kolka, Warren, were third; Ed Adams and Jack Mandock, Flint, fourth; Jack Kent, Atlanta, and Robert Gillings, Lansing, fifth.

For Sawyer, it was the sixth time he figured on a winning team. He and Peterson split \$1,000 of the \$3,000 prize money for the winning effort.

Dr. Lambert Takes Dist. Health Post

Appointment of Dr. Leslie A. Lambert as director of District Health Unit No. 2 was announced last week.

Dr. Lambert of East Tawas, a retired medical and public health official, will fill the office formerly held by the late Dr. Earl Hasty of West Branch.

The new director has a record of many years in the public health field as well as in the general practice of medicine.

He received his medical education at Loma Linda University, Los Angeles, California, and served his internship at Hurley Hospital, Flint. He served his residency in neurology at Battle Creek Sanitarium in 1929.

He was Genesee County public health commissioner from 1930 to 1934 and it was during the last year of this service that he received his master of public health degree from John Hopkins University.

He served as city health officer in Flint in 1935 and was assistant state health officer in Idaho from 1936 through 1937.

In 1937, he entered private practice in Flint. He remained there until 1949 when he moved to East Tawas and started in the practice of medicine.

He remained in active practice until 1957 when he retired from private practice and returned to California where he took a position in the department of mental hygiene in a state institution, remaining there until 1962.

He then returned to East Tawas where he has since resided in retirement.

Dr. Lambert will continue the main office of the district at West Branch. In the district served, there are also offices in Losco, Alcona and Oscoda Counties.

The department has a director, two sanitarians and five nurses on the staff.

The new director said that he expects to maintain his same residence, but will be a frequent visitor in West Branch.

He has three children, two daughters, both married, and a son, who is a student in the school of aeronautical engineering at the University of Michigan.

City Superintendent Expresses Concern Over Tawas Lake Dam

Concern over possible reduction of the flow of water in Tawas River after construction of a proposed Tawas Lake dam was expressed last Wednesday by Reginald Bublitz, superintendent of public works for the city.

Speaking before the Losco Board of Supervisors, Bublitz said that should the dam materially reduce the natural flow of water in Tawas River, it could impair operations of Tawas City's waste water treatment plant.

The proposed dam has been under consideration here for many years. Legal high level of the lake was set by the circuit court in 1959, but construction of a dam to maintain the level has met many delays. Finally, last month, the board of supervisors voted 14-4 to proceed with condemnation of property for the project.

The dam is to be financed entirely by a special assessment district comprising property benefited around the lake. Property

Tawas School Finances Sound

Final budget for 1965-1966 as adopted by Tawas Area Board of Education shows that the district is in sound financial condition at the start of the new term.

A hearing was held at Monday night's board meeting on the new budget. It had been adopted and submitted to the county allocation board last spring and, according to law, was available for public inspection in August.

Grand total of expense as budgeted this year comes to \$800,107, as compared to an actual expenditure last year of \$562,509.

Estimated income for 1965-1966 amounts to \$598,418, as compared to an actual income of \$574,373 last year.

Difference between the actual expenditure and income of last year was caused by postponing construction of new shower rooms at the Tawas City Elementary Unit gymnasium. This money was carried over to this year and construction is under way at present.

The school opens the 1965-1966 term with a cash balance of \$189,000 for operation.

Total budgeted expense for elementary education in 1965-1966 is \$208,435, as compared to \$183,768 last year. Grand total of expense for secondary education is \$420,430, as compared to \$383,704 last year.

Total administration expense is \$23,275, as compared to \$21,887 last year. Total budgeted expense for transportation is \$45,790, as compared to \$42,110 last year.

Net state aid earnings to the school this year will amount to \$296,316, a little more than \$20,000 higher than last year. Taxes will bring in an additional \$245,952. Other income items include state assistance in transportation amounting to \$31,000.

W-P School Registration Days Told

According to Ray Kesler, superintendent, Whittetmore- Prescott Area School will start its 1965-66 school year with preregistration August 30 to September 3. Seniors will register August 30; Juniors, August 31; sophomores, September 1; freshmen, September 2; seventh and eighth graders, September 3. Registration hours are from 9:00 a. m.-11:30 a. m. and 1:15 p. m.-3:30 p. m. Parents are invited to attend with the student to work with the counselors in preparing the student's program. Counselors will be on hand to go over each folder and outline their program. Students are asked to pay their textbook and other fees at the time of registration.

School will open September 7 with a teachers' conference which will include a discussion of Michigan Education Association services and special education possibilities for Losco County area students in grades kindergarten through 12. Students in grades one through 12 will have a morning session Wednesday, September 8, and full day classes will begin September 9 with kindergarten classes in session at the Prescott Elementary School in the morning and afternoon sessions at the Whittetmore Elementary.

The school day will be from 8:35 a. m. to 3:25 p. m. at the high school and 8:50 a. m. to 3:40 p. m. in the elementary schools.

The high school staff has been enlarged to add some specific areas. New members to the high school staff are as follows: Arthur Freel, high school principal; Mrs. Norine Russell, librarian; Quentin Ciceron, speech and literature instructor; Miss Stevens, girls' physical education; Mrs. Freel, music; Miss Bielecki and Mr. Hoffman, junior high. Two additional teachers are expected to be signed to lower the pupil-teacher ratio.

In the elementary grades, James Galligan has been hired as Whittetmore Elementary principal and Mrs. Virginia Clark will teach second grade.

Drain Commissioner to be Named Soon

Appointment of a new drain commissioner to succeed the late E. H. Stickney of Oscoda is to be made by September 1, according to action taken by the county board of supervisors last Wednesday.

The board learned that work of the drain commissioner could not be turned over to the road commissioner, as had been believed previously. Prosecuting Attorney J. Richard Ernst said that such an enabling act applied only to counties with 12,000 or less population.

The new drain commissioner is to be appointed, under the law, by the county clerk, prosecuting attorney and judge of probate.

Three persons have filed application for the position. They are Joseph Reinke Jr. of Tawas Township, Elwood Bronson and Jack Larson of Oscoda.

County Clerk George Prescott said that it is hoped that more applications will be received this week in order that a drain commissioner may be selected prior to September 1.

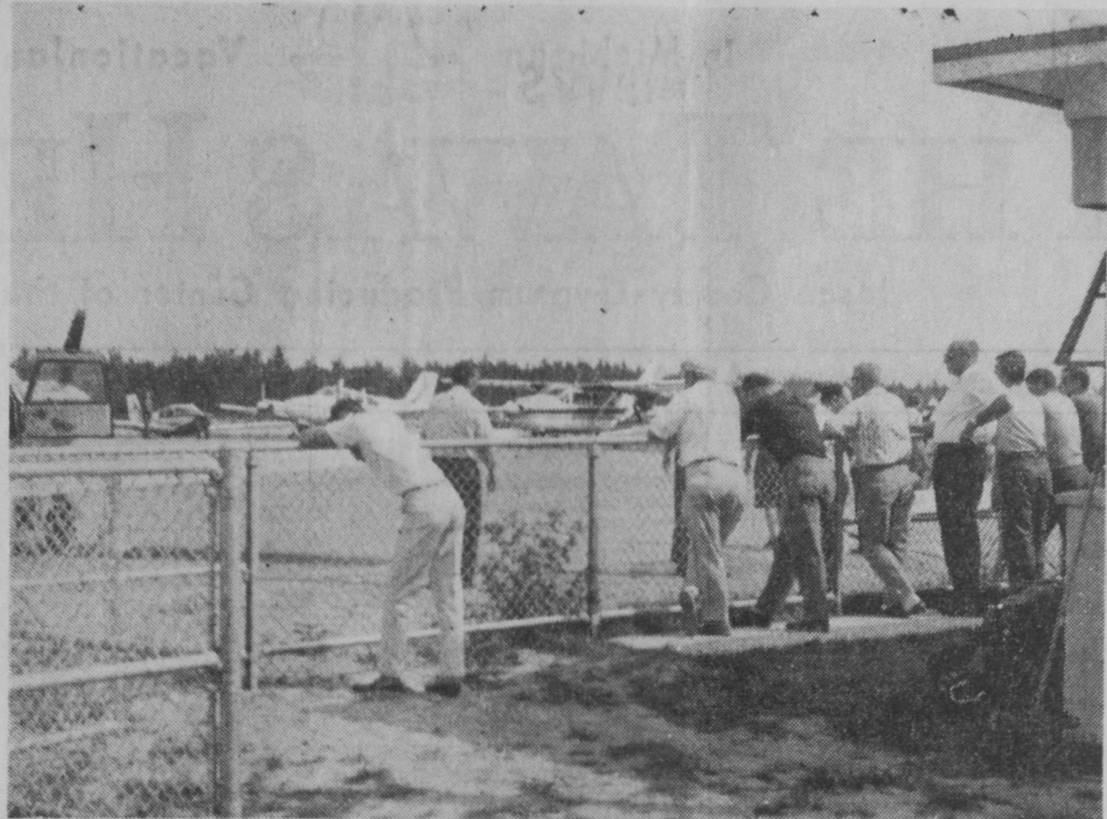

Funeral Services Held Monday for Rev. C. F. Miller

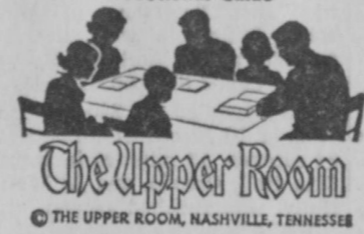

Rep. S. Charron Requests Drought Disaster Programs

Representative Sanford Charron has requested Sec. of Agriculture Orville Freeman to implement needed drought disaster program.

Farmers in Arenac, Bay, Iosco and Ogemaw Counties are suffering crop and income losses which will also affect the merchants in every community, he said.

"It is our responsibility to foresee this loss and make every effort to minimize the loss," he stated.

A survey of the area shows damage to every crop produced. It is ironic that when income prospects are brightest, farmers have the least to sell because of the weather.

Implementation of emergency haying and grazing programs can

offer some assistance to livestock farmers, Charron said. However, for their livestock this winter and the emergency livestock feed programs can also help.

(Continued from page 1.) creasing the amount of water which would actually reach Tawas River.

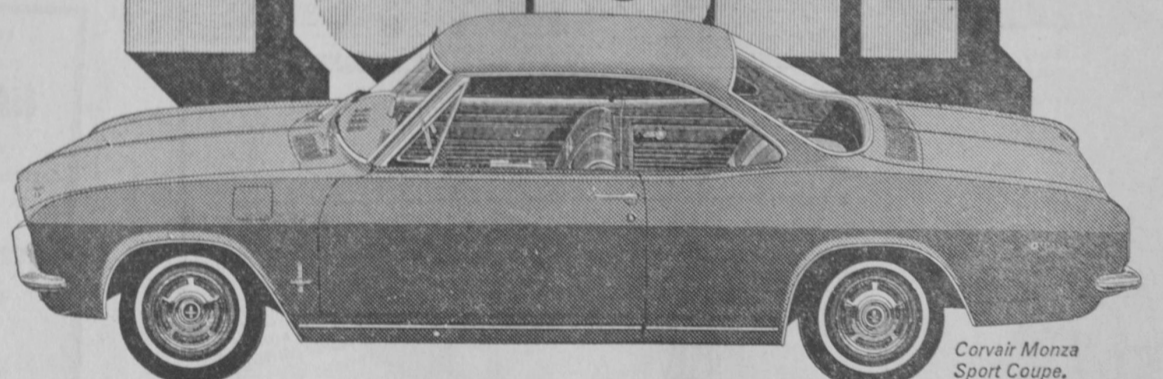
Supervisor Clarence McKenzie said that East Tawas was considering constructing a new waste treatment plant and probably would use the river to dispose of its purified water effluent. He said he was satisfied with reports from state agencies that the dam would have no effect on the flow of water in the river.

"While representatives of state agencies have said that a dam would not reduce the flow of water in Tawas River, we have never been able to receive any guarantee to that effect," said Bubiltz.

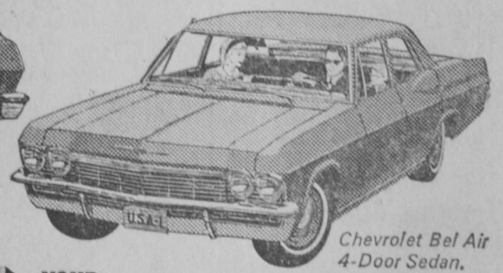

ond grade at Prescott. It is expected the staff will be complete for the opening of school although the teacher supply is extremely acute.

Bus routes will operate on the same routes as last year and any changes necessary will be made during the first week of school. Delivery of two new buses has been delayed due to a strike in the plant of one of the suppliers.

Among some of the changes in the high school curriculum will be enlarging the vocational curriculum and the six-hour day composed of six, one-hour periods and the elimination of study halls.

The school was fortunate in signing a fully-qualified librarian and a girls' physical education teacher. These areas are among the most difficult areas to fill.
