## New Work Pact Inked at National Gypsum

National Gypsum Company installations of Iosco County were back in operation Monday after being idled for nearly two months by a strike of Union Local 7-239, Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers, AFL-CIO.

Some 140 men had been affected by the strike, which resulted when men walked off their jobs at noon, June 5. The new two-year contract is to expire June 1, 1967.

## Railway - Union Reach Agreement

As a result of negotiations between Detroit and Mackinac Railway management, union representatives and a national railway labor mediator at a meeting held in Detroit July 14-16, an agreement was reached whereby nonoperating employees will receive an increase of nine cents per hour retroactive to June 1, 1964, and an additional increase of nine cents effective January 1, 1965. They will also receive a nine-cent hourly increase effective January 1, 1966, and employees with over 20 years service will receive a fourth week's vacation, an increase of one week.

According to a union representative, all crafts of nonoperating and operating employees are now covered by this agreement as a result of a national agreement reached in February 1965 conclusive to a wage movement dating back to May 1963.

## Feather-Lite Definitely Closing Tawas Plant

Industrial "climate" of the Tawas-Iosco area has suffered another serious loss, according to information revealed this week.

Feather-Lite Manufacturing Company is now in the process of dismantling its door manufacturing plant located in the Detroit and Mackinac Railway roundhouse for removal to its new Hot Springs, Arkansas, plant.

The firm started laying off employees several months ago and, until recently, it was generally believed that production on aluminum doors would again resume here.

The firm, with offices at Detroit, first established its plant here in 1952. The company reorganized about six or seven years ago under new ownership.

A company spokesman said that the firm planned to open a new window plant at some Michigan location. He indicated that the old roundhouse building would be unsuitable for such a plant.

Work on dismantling the equipment is not expected to be completed for several weeks.

## Police Investigate Vandalism Reports

East Tawas Police Department and Iosco Sheriff's Department are investigating several malicious destruction complaints.

Vandals scratched an obscene word on the door of East Tawas' new fire truck. A deep scratch in the paint will require complete repainting of the door.

Also under investigation is damage to highway signs on Tawas Point. Vandals used a spray-paint to damage these signs, along with a sign at Tawas Drive-In Theatre and at the East Tawas Roller-drome.

## Two Men Nabbed Sunday AM After Wild Tawas City Chase

Two Sherman Township men were apprehended early Sunday morning after eluding two police cars in a wild ride through Tawas City.

Arrested were James C. Koehn, 20, and James F. Norris, 19, both of National City.

Koehn, driving Norris' car, pulled out of the Midway Drive-in with tires of the 1965 sports car squealing. With Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell in pursuit, the men turned on M-55 at a high rate of speed, turned on Court Street and then raced to First Street, proceeded as far as Harris Avenue and then turned east on North Street. The men raced up First Avenue to M-55 and refused to stop for the Tawas City Police Department's car.

Racing down M-55, the car turned on Court Street again and, going through stop signs at a high rate of speed, reached the county

building, then sped through the Barnes Hotel parking lot and out onto US-23. Several motorists were forced off the highway at that point.

Sheriff O'Farrell, Police Chief Frank Roti and Patrolman George Westcott in the second car had sirens and flashing lights operating during the chase which probably prevented several head-on crashes. Two cars were forced over the curb by the speeding Norris vehicle near the intersection with Mathews Street and other cars took to the shoulder near National Gypsum Company's underpass.

After losing the car, officers later intercepted the men on Turtle Road in Alabaster Township.

Both entered guilty pleas when arraigned in court. Koehn received a 60-day jail sentence and \$100 fine for reckless driving. Norris was fined \$100.

## US-23 Crash Kills Two Airmen; Two Injured

Two Wurtsmith Air Force Base airmen became Iosco County's third and fourth traffic fatalities of 1965 early Sunday morning in a crash north of East Tawas.

Killed were Robert S. Ray, 20, Elizabeth, New Jersey, driver,

and Robert D. Barkes, 22, Columbus, Indiana. Ray was dead at the scene and Barkes died at the base hospital.

Investigating officers said Ray's northbound car struck a vehicle driven by Thomas J. Giltinan, 45, Flint. He sustained a broken hip and pelvis, laceration of tongue and chin. He was taken to Tawas Hospital by ambulance.

Giltinan told officers that the approaching vehicle appeared to be weaving and when it crossed the center line he drove his vehicle to the shoulder to avoid a collision. Nearly stopped at impact, Giltinan said the other vehicle did not appear to be speeding.

Injured in the Ray vehicle was Teddy Rushing, 19, also of Wurtsmith, who sustained a broken right ankle and concussion. He was held at the base hospital and officers were unable to question him.

### Lightnings Had Perfect Sailing on Tawas Bay

Dr. Leo Wassenburger, Pontiac, won first place in the three-day Michigan Lightning Regatta held on Tawas Bay last Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

The Pontiac skipper bested James Kohles, defending champion and president of Michigan Lightning sailors, who hails from Detroit's Crescent Sail Yacht Club.

Third place was taken by Dave Nickels, Fenton; Steve Benz, a new sailor from Devils Lake, won fourth place.

Henry Cawthra, two-time national champion, Detroit, Crescent Sail Yacht Club, won fifth place. One of his crew members fell overboard during the first race and Cawthra finished in the middle of the pack.

Five other skippers will join the top five to participate in the North American Championship in New Jersey in late August.

Charles Schreck of East Tawas finished out of the running in 14th place.

Thirty-eight boats were entered in the regatta and at least 30 were top sailors. Good wind and weather greeted all five races.

## Seek Zoning Change on M-55 Lots

Rezoning of two lots in Ferguson's Addition from residential to commercial has been turned over to the Tawas City Planning Commission for its recommendation.

A letter from Gene Ballinger, Collection Service Bureau, read at Monday night's council meeting, asked that lots fronting M-55 be rezoned from residential to commercial.

The firm wishes to make an addition to its present building and improve its parking lot.

City Attorney Alf C. Watson said the change in zoning would require a public hearing, expenses of which would be borne by the applicant.

A building application had been denied by City Supt. Reginald Bublitz because such construction was contrary to the new zoning ordinance.

In other business, Police Chief Frank Roti read a letter from the Michigan Liquor Control Commission and his answer in regard to the transfer of Krumrei Beverage Company's warehouse location to 612 Ninth Avenue. The warehouse is located temporarily at East Tawas while a new building is being constructed here.

A contract between the city and General Television Service, Incorporated, allowing the latter to install cable television in this community, is to be investigated by Attorney Watson. A contract had been signed April 1, 1963, and city officials were uncertain if the contract was still in effect. The firm has a franchise for \$5,000 performance bond for the installation.

A letter from the Huron Oaks Association was read to the council commending the fire department on its work at a recent fire in Alabaster Township.

## Tawas Point Station Joins Celebration—

# Coast Guard Observes 175th Anniversary

Men of the Tawas Point Coast Guard Station, along with their contemporaries stationed throughout federal waters and as far away as Viet Nam, today observe the 175th birthday anniversary of the United States Coast Guard.

This historic service, now being streamlined into a modernized establishment, has behind it a century and three quarters of service as an armed force and chief US maritime safety agency.

Its motto, "Semper Paratus"—al-

ways ready, is as meaningful today as it was in the heyday of shipping when Tawas Bay was crammed with sailing vessels. Instead of keeping a watchful eye on wooden ships carrying cargoes of lumber, salt and fish, the coast guard today has responsibility of protecting the thousands of small pleasure boats which ply the inland waterway.

The coast guard and its predecessors, the United States Revenue Service, United States Lifesaving

Service and others, have been a part of the Tawas area since its beginning.

One of its forerunners built the first lighthouse on Tawas Point in 1852. When the Whittemores founded Tawas City two years later, they were guests of Capt. Collin Graham, then keeper.

Throughout the years, many Tawas men have been numbered in the ranks of the coast guard and a number of them have since retired

and make their homes here.

Today, the Tawas Point station has a complement of 12 coast-guardsmen, whose primary mission is search and rescue of human life and property on Lake Huron.

Waters patrolled by boats from the local station extend from Point AuGres to Thunder Bay at Alpena, a distance of approximately 90 miles from one extremity to the other. The area actually encompassed extends out to the international boundary line in Lake Hur-

on, thus making Tawas Point responsible for the largest single area on the Great Lakes.

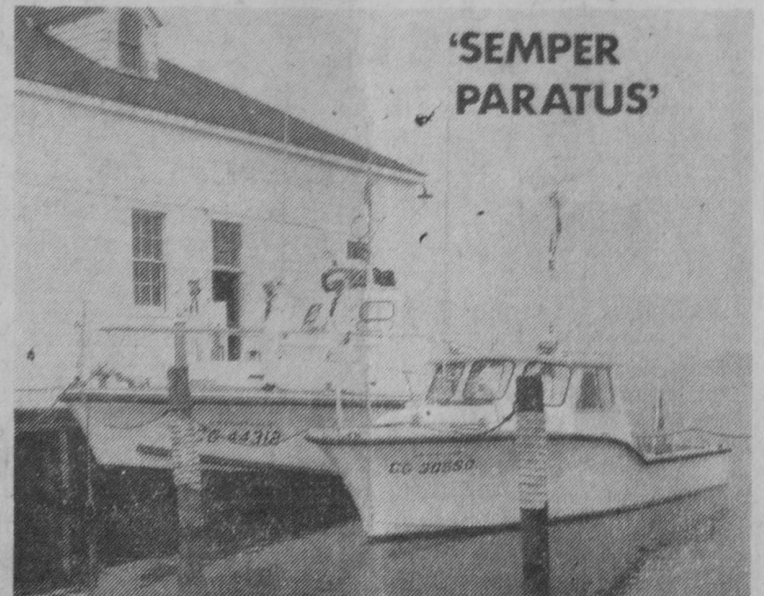
Station Commander John J. Kelly, BMCS, said this was a considerable amount of waters for his two boats to patrol—approximately

10,000 square miles!

The station's two boats are modern in every respect. The 44-foot motor life boat is capable of unlimited cruising on the Great Lakes, has a top speed of 13 knots and can weather most any storm.

The newest craft is a 30-foot plastic boat, capable of speeds up to 35 miles per hour. This is used for emergency purposes in the local area as its cruising range is limited

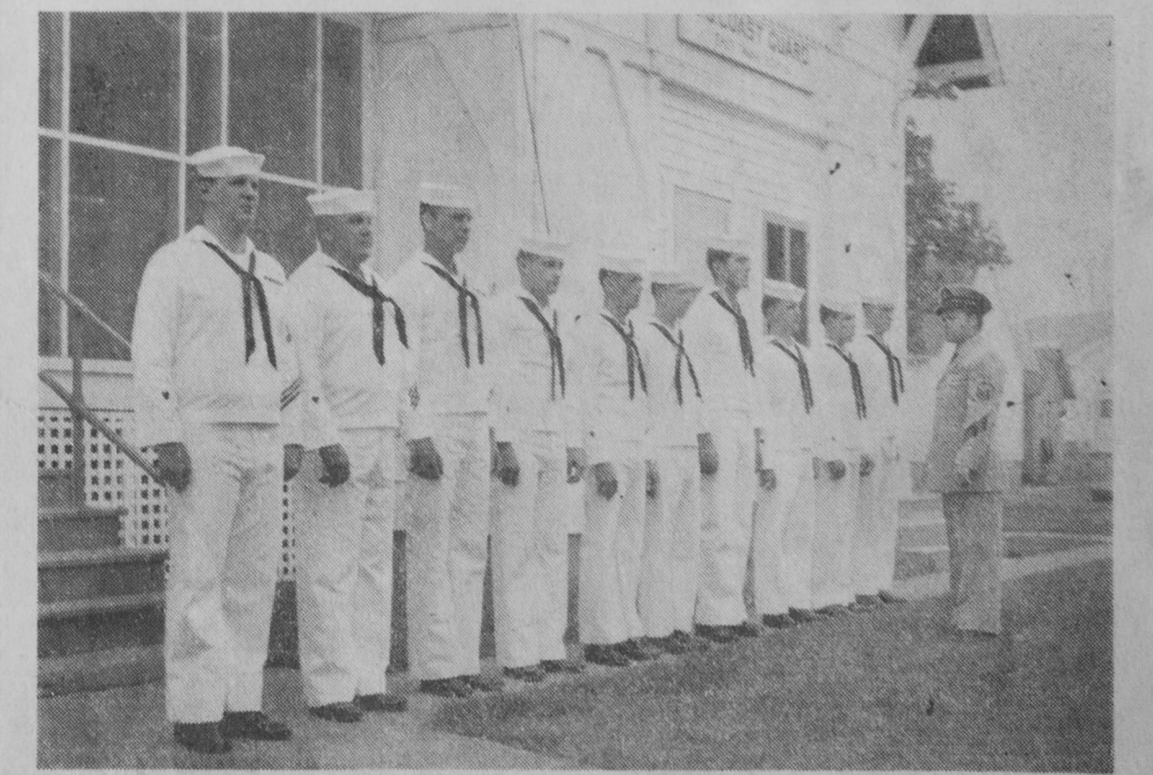

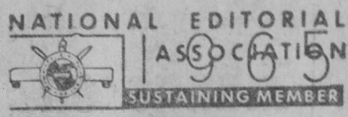

## 34 Iosco Students Pass Scholarship Fund Examinations

State Sen. Robert Richardson, 35th District, announced last week that 34 out of 51 students from Iosco County who took the state scholarship fund examinations qualified for the college grants.

"The 66.6 percent qualification certainly commends the educational system of Iosco County and points out the high standards that high school graduates reach in the county's secondary educational system," Richardson said.

Throughout the state, there were 785 schools participating, 752 of which had at least one taking the exams and 698 had at least one winner.

Senator Richardson urges more students to take the qualifying examinations in the coming years, because the goal of the state-wide program is to see that these scholarships are awarded to those who demonstrate the most academic promise and who also demonstrate financial need.

Interested students should contact officials of their respective schools, Richardson pointed out.

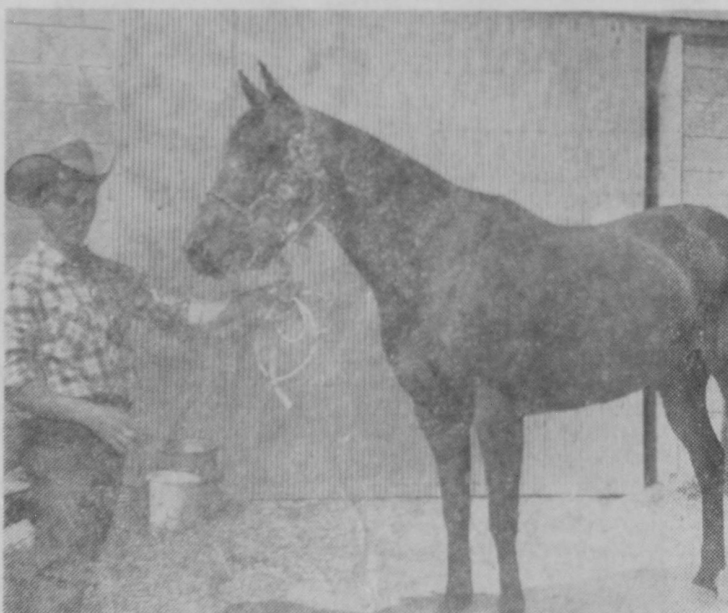

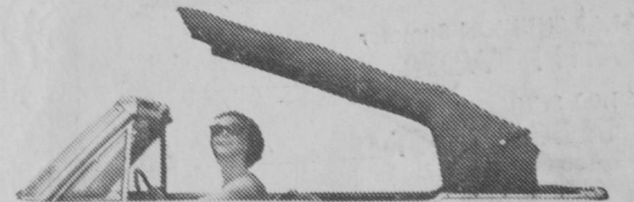

to 120 miles or four hours running time.  
Last year, men of the Tawas Point station chalked up 70 assists to all types of boat owners and were called out on four drownings. This compared to 11 drownings the previous year. The station also serves small boat operators in the area with its system of weather flags.

In addition, the station has responsibility for operating the Tawas Point Lighthouse and fog signal. The latter in a fixed tone diaphone horn signal, two blasts a minute, which may be heard for a distance of from seven to 10 miles under normal conditions.

The fog signal building, constructed in 1900, is headquarters for control units for operation of the Gravelly Shoals light, located 18 miles south in Saginaw Bay. Electronic equipment is also maintained there for monitoring the Huron light ship, lights on Thunder Bay Island, Harbor Beach and Port Austin.

Each coast guard unit, operating under the assistant secretary of the treasury, is a maritime law enforcement agency actively engaged in enforcing all federal laws on the sea and concurrently carrying out such drills and exercises as to be prepared for its military duties in time of war.

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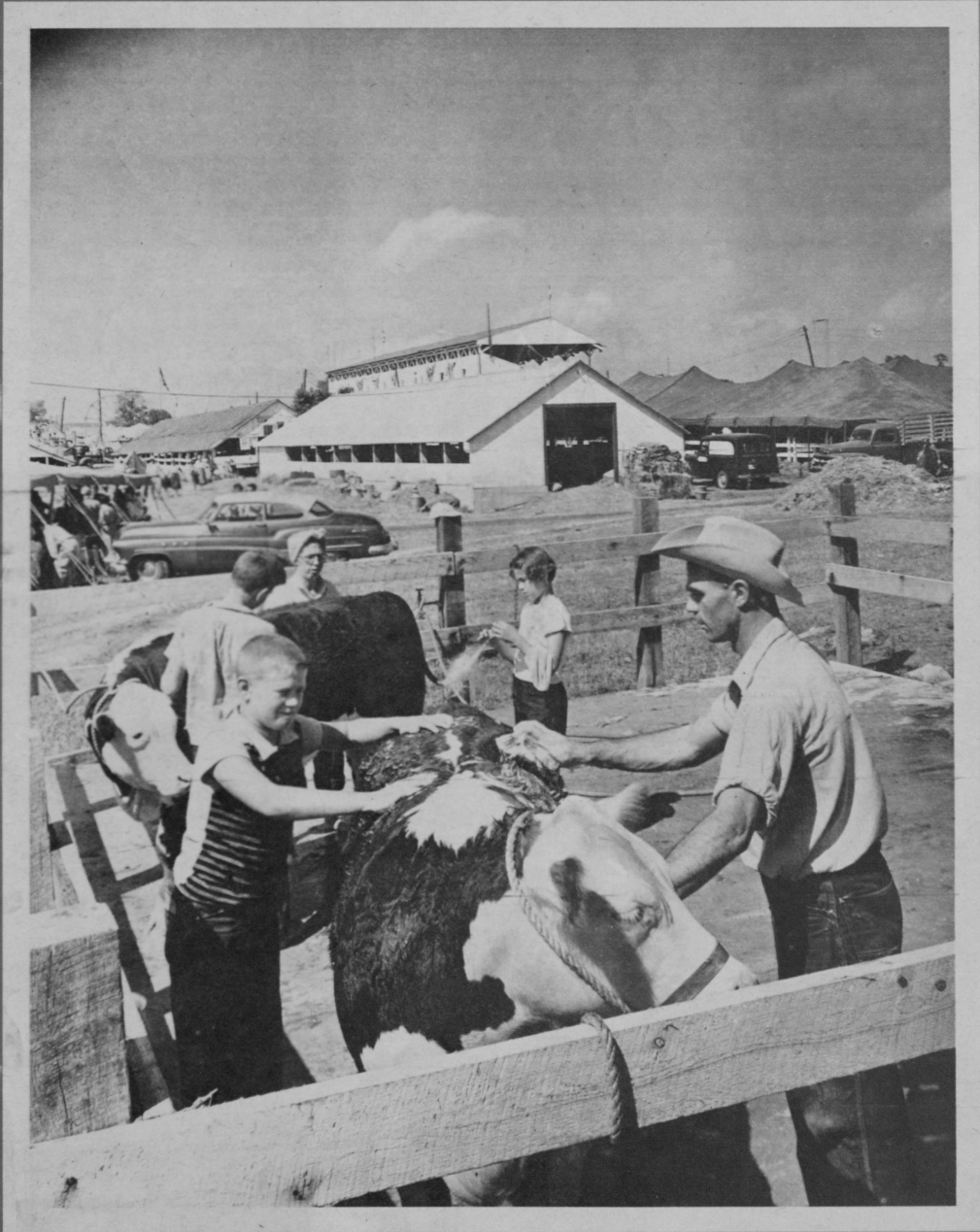

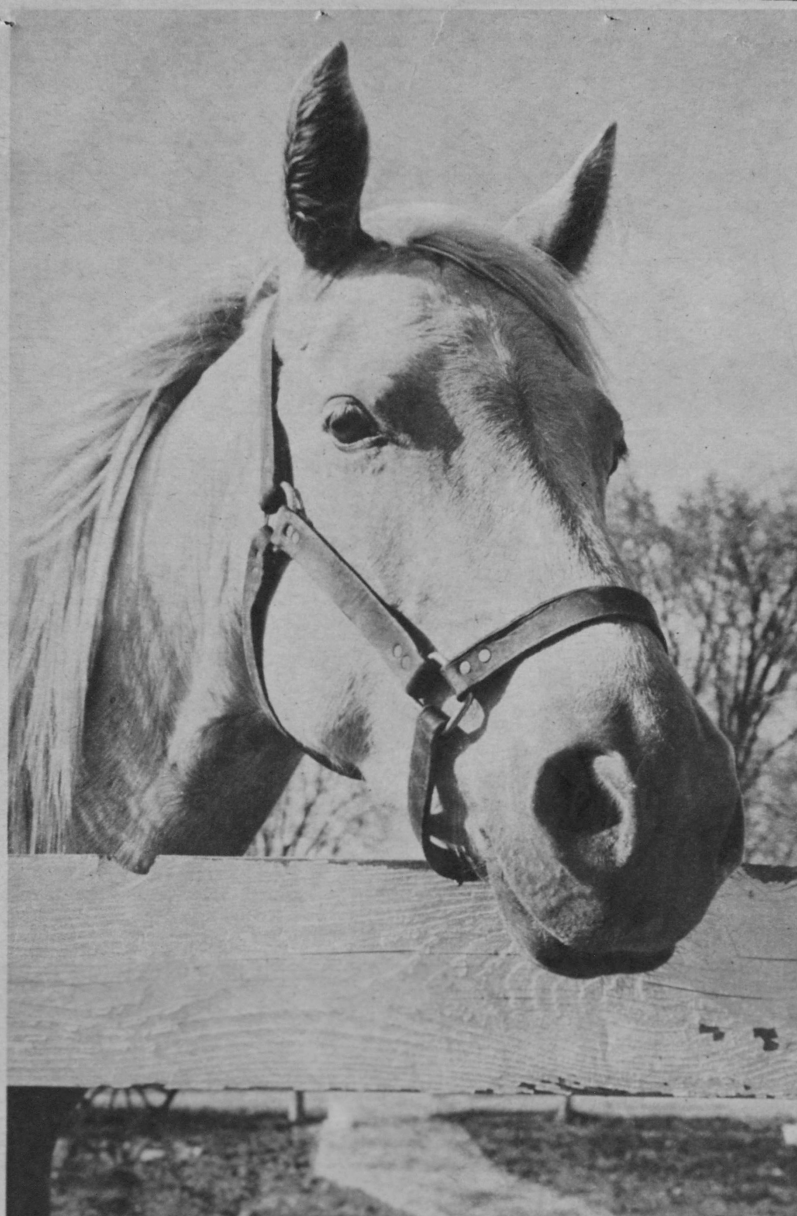

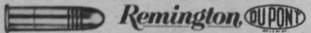


The Ross Drake farm, near Hartland, Wisconsin, specializes in class instruction in horsemanship. Classes vary in size from two or three riders to perhaps a dozen. Each class rides for one hour per week. When riders are ready to advance to a new riding technique, they are graduated to a new class. The Drakes also board and train horses.

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**F**OR the man who lives in town, or the city, the horse can be a source of great enjoyment . . . a means for relieving tensions . . . and, in fact a pretty good social status symbol. On the other side of the ledger, the horse can be a source of great enjoyment, as well as financial rewards for the country who caters to this popular sport.

Because the last census of agriculture did not count the number of horses, we do not know for sure how many horses there are in the country. However, calculated estimates indicate there are 2½ million head of horses, of which about 1.8 million are light horses.

While over the past decade or so the number of horses has gradually decreased, there is a decided trend now in the opposite direction. One of the biggest things that has caused this reversal is the suburban horse owners. There are an estimated 450,000 of these now and the number is increasing every year.

New opportunities are being opened up for the man who has the necessary land and know-how to satisfy the horse owner who must depend on someone else to provide the horse care. There are several avenues of service open. You can board horses; offer riding lessons; run a riding academy; provide horses by the hour with riding trails; raise breeding stock; or even provide the supplies horse owners must have.

The rate you can charge for your services will vary depending on what you offer. For boarding a horse you may get anywhere from \$15 to \$20 per month, to perhaps \$140 per month. The low figure provides little more than a place for the horse to get in out of the weather, a place to run and maintenance feeding. The high figure is for the care and feeding of race horses. The usual rate for most stables varies from about \$40 to \$65 per month. This usually includes a box stall, a good feeding program and a certain amount of available medications. Insurance on the animals is usually carried by the owner of the horse.

Riding lessons may carry a rate of perhaps \$2.50 per hour in classes — on up to \$10.00 or higher for more private lessons. Horses offered for use by the hour without instructions usually demand upwards of \$2.00 per hour.

Of course, it is not all profit to operate a stable, or even a few horses on the farm. It often costs about \$15 or more per month to feed a horse right. Then there are medica-

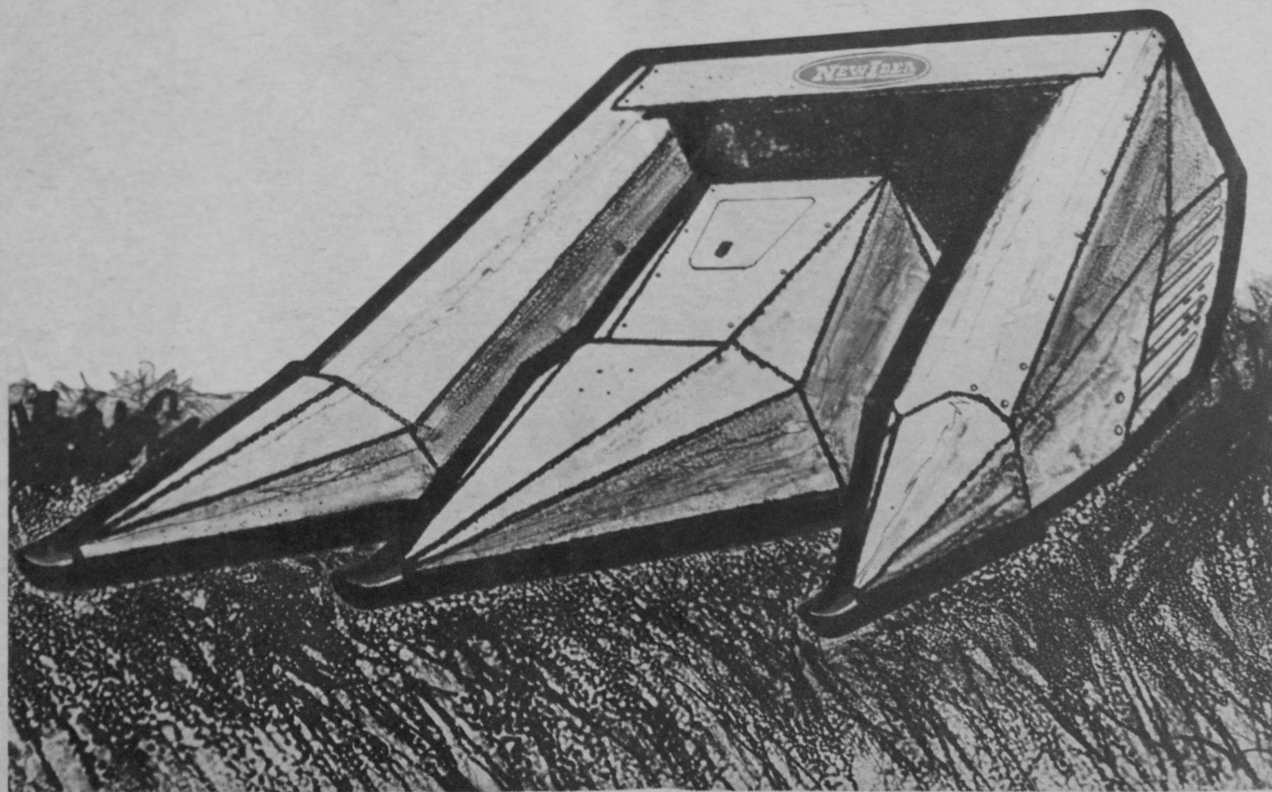

tions, shoes, saddles, labor, housing and a prorated cost for your land and taxes. But with careful planning and a price of \$50 or so per month you can come out with a good return per horse in your care.

To be a good horseman you should first of all love horses and then take the time and effort to learn all you can about their care, breeding, training and feeding. Knowing the fine art of riding and what to look for when you buy your horses shouldn't be taken lightly either.

Knowing how to teach what you know about riding is something that takes study and practice too. This is especially important when you consider that children represent a large percentage of the riding population. Most horse experts feel that a boy or girl who has reached his eighth birthday is old enough to learn to ride well. Sometimes, though, a six-year-old who is usually "not afraid of anything" can get behind the reins and do well.

On the other hand, some oldsters need more riding assistance than the youngsters . . . and there are 55 million Americans over the age of 12 who have occasion to ride horseback at least once per year. By 1976, according to a study made by Laurence Rockefeller, this figure will climb to 82 million. Most of them could benefit by having basic instructions in riding.

#### Buying Your Horses

The old saying "you can take it from the horse's mouth" is still a practical guide to go by. The wise buyer not only looks at the horse's mouth and general appearance, but at his personality traits. If you are inexperienced, here are a few guides that may be of help:

1. Select a horse you can manage according to your ability and experience. If the horse is to be ridden by others of less experience, consider this too.
2. Choose a horse that fits your size. If it is going to be ridden by children, get one that can be easily mounted by them.
3. Take your time . . . look at many . . . and ask to see them perform and ride it yourself.
4. Check for disposition. In addition to how he performs while you are inspecting him, you can get a fairly accurate indication to a good disposition if he has a wide, full forehead, well-carried ears and large prominent eyes.
5. Buy from a person or concern you can trust.
6. Check the horse's relatives for quality and performance. This may be a guide to the potential of the one you are thinking about buying.

#### About Housing

After you get your horses home, be sure adequate housing facilities are available. If you are offering riding lessons or even providing boarding facilities, you should have an area where indoor riding can be done at least to some extent. Horses have to have exercise even in cold weather. Box stalls should be about 12 x 12 feet and you'll need a tack room and a feed room. Several commercial building companies, as well as agricultural colleges can provide plans.

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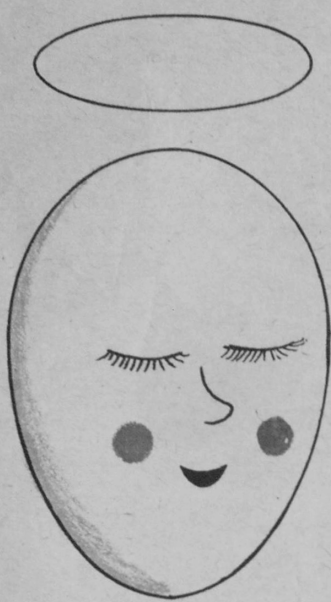

One quick meal which utilizes hard boiled eggs is Springtime Creamed Eggs. With the help of asparagus, toast and a creamy sauce you have a delicious, nutritious one-dish meal. If you wish, you can top the toast with a thin slice of ham,

turkey, chicken, cheese or luncheon meat before topping with the other ingredients.

There is a special technique for the preparation of hard-boiled eggs. The key to this technique is "no boiling". To get the best results, simmer in water which is just below boiling temperature for 20 to 25 minutes. Then plunge them into cold water to facilitate removal of the shell and also to prevent green coloring of the outer egg yolk. This method produces a firm yet tender egg.

Have you ever tasted a spiced egg? They're wonderful additions to most any meal. They are good as meat accompaniments or as a relish. You can use the recipe for Pickled Eggs or you can pickle by covering with beet pickle juice and refrigerating them. These eggs are especially colorful and tasty.

Eggs can be used in so many interesting and delicious ways. They're really "good eggs".



## EGGS AND COTTAGE CHEESE SPREAD

8 hard-cooked eggs, chopped	1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1 teaspoon salt	1 carton (12 oz.) creamed cottage cheese, well drained
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard	
1/4 teaspoon pepper	
4 to 6 drops Tabasco	

Combine eggs and seasonings. Chill. If desired, press drained cottage cheese through a sieve. Combine with egg mixture just before serving. Makes 2 cups. Serve this spread with wafers, crispy breadstuffs, celery pieces or radishes. The flavor and consistency make it an excellent sandwich filling too.

## SPICED EGGS

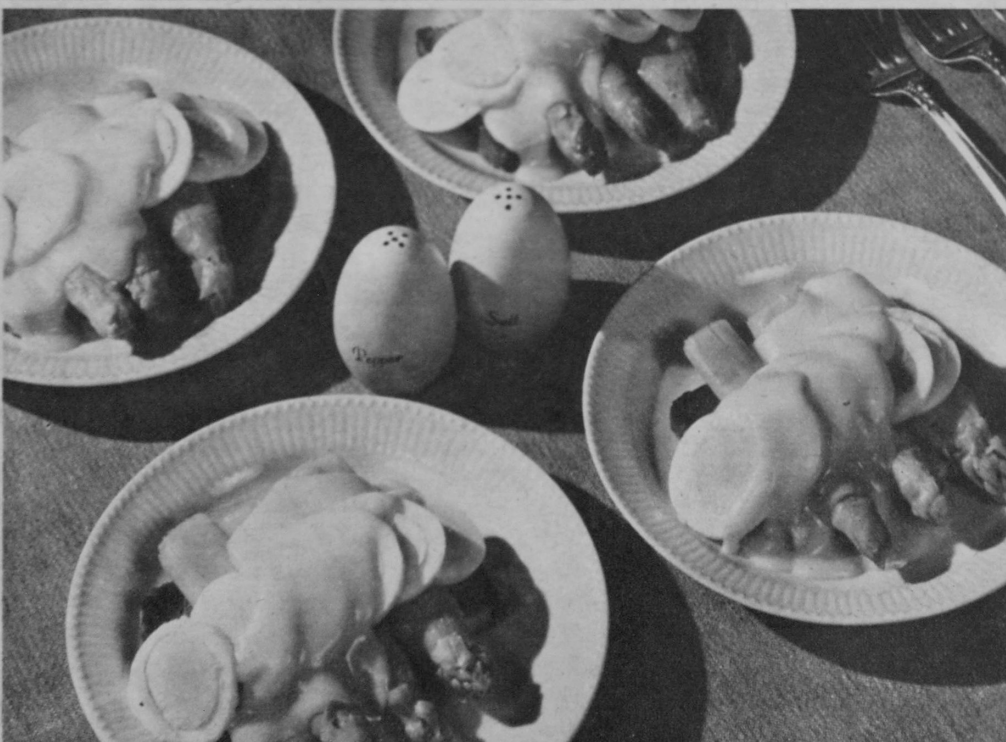
2 cups white vinegar	(4 peppercorns, 1 clove, celery seed, mace, piece of ginger root)
2 to 3 tablespoons sugar	
1 teaspoon salt	
1 medium onion, sliced	1 dozen hard-cooked eggs, peeled
1 teaspoon pickling spices	

In a saucepan combine vinegar, sugar, salt, sliced onion, and pickling spices; simmer 5 minutes. Pour over the peeled hard-cooked eggs in a quart jar. Cover and refrigerate. For best flavor, let stand several hours or overnight.

To give additional flavor, a sprig of dill, or a few caraway seeds, or a clove of garlic may be added to the pickling liquid. Strips of green and red pepper or carrot add color.

For variety, beet pickle juice may be used to spice hard-cooked eggs. Pour over peeled hard-cooked eggs. Refrigerate.

Spiced eggs may be refrigerated for as long as two weeks. After that time, they may become too pronounced in flavor for some tastes.



## SPRINGTIME CREAMED EGGS

4 tablespoons butter or margarine	12 spears asparagus, cooked or canned
3 tablespoons flour	4 hard-cooked eggs
1/4 teaspoon or more salt	Parmesan or sharp Cheddar cheese, grated or crumbled
1/8 teaspoon pepper	Paprika
2 cups milk	
4 slices toast	

Prepare the cream sauce: melt the butter or margarine, add flour and seasonings. Blend thoroughly. Add cold milk all at once and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened throughout. Place 3 spears asparagus atop each slice of hot toast arranged on a baking sheet or heat-proof platter. Over each serving place one sliced hard-cooked egg, cover with hot sauce and sprinkle with Parmesan or Cheddar cheese. Place in broiler until bubbly and lightly browned, 4 to 5 minutes. Sprinkle with paprika and serve promptly.

Combine cheese spread with noodles or rice, peas and onion. Spoon this mixture into two individual casseroles. Make a hollow in the center of each with the back of a spoon. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 15 minutes. Then break an egg into each hollow, season with salt and pepper and bake 10 to 13 minutes more or until eggs are softly set. Yield: Two generous servings.



#### BAKED EGGS IN POTATO CHIP CUPS (IN CORN CASSEROLE)

| 4 oz. package potato chips     | 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce |
| 3/4 cup diced celery           | 1/2 teaspoon salt               |
| 1/4 cup chopped onion          | 1/2 lemon thinly sliced         |
| 1/4 cup butter or margarine    | 1 cup coarsely chopped tomatoes |
| 2 tablespoons flour            | 6 eggs                          |
| 1 can (1 lb.) cream style corn |                                 |

Reserve 12 large potato chips; crush remainder and place in bottom of 2-quart shallow casserole. Cook celery and onion in the butter or margarine several minutes but do not brown. Stir in flour. Add corn and cook, stirring constantly, until uniformly thickened. Stir in Worcestershire sauce, salt, lemon and tomatoes. Pour over potato chips. Make 6 depressions for the eggs and break an egg into each. Border eggs with potato chips petal-style. Bake, uncovered, in a hot oven (400° F.) 15 minutes for soft eggs, 20 to 25 minutes for firm eggs. Makes 6 servings.



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
