

Hunters Overcome by Nonvented Gas Heater

Two Detroit hunters escaped a near brush with death last week when they used a nonvented gas heater in a cabin without proper ventilation. One man still is in serious condition.

Treated at Tawas Hospital after suffering the effects of asphyxiation were Kenneth Senkbiel, 45, and Robert McCanney, 22.

The two men came to East Tawas late Wednesday evening to go deer hunting and stayed at a cabin owned by Harold Roch, 126 Warren Avenue. They brought a small gas heater with them, set it up in the cabin and then retired for the night.

Elmer Roch of East Tawas, brother-in-law of Senkbiel, checked at the cabin the next day and left when he did not see anyone moving about, thinking the men had gone hunting. He stopped again Thursday night, looked through a window and observed the men sleeping, but did not awaken them.

McCanney awoke Friday morning about 7:30 o'clock and found his father-in-law asleep in a chair. He did not realize that they had been sleeping for 30 hours and he dropped off to sleep again. He awoke at 5:00 p. m. and found that Senkbiel was unconscious.

Police said that the two men probably owed their lives to the fact that propane in the bottle gas tank had been entirely consumed.

Roch saw someone moving in the cabin about the time McCanney awoke and went over to investigate. He found the two men were ill and called police. They were rushed to Tawas Hospital by ambulance.

McCanney was released from the hospital that evening but Senkbiel was still in a coma Saturday and was to be transferred to a Detroit hospital.

"I'm glad to be alive. An hour more and I probably would have been dead," McCanney told the Herald Saturday night.

Police said they had found an aluminum plate screwed in place over the heater vent hole. The men were affected by the fumes and lack of oxygen in the cabin.

This is the second such incident in Iosco County during the deer hunting season. November 21, a Detroit couple was asphyxiated by a nonvented gas heater while sleeping in their truck in Plainfield Township. They were found dead by a relative.

Fears Amish Lose Religious Freedom

The nephew of the Iowa superintendent of public instruction has called for an end to the "Get-stapo-like tactics" used to remove Amish children from their schools and homes.

The Rev. William C. Lindholm, pastor of Grace Lutheran Church, East Tawas, said in a letter to his uncle, Paul F. Johnston, subjecting the Amish children to ideas contrary to their religious views does in effect destroy the Amish religion "and hence may violate constitutional guarantees of freedom of religion."

Authorities have been attempting to take the children to public schools because the Amish teachers are not certified by the State of Iowa.

Pastor Lindholm suggested the Iowa officials grant Amish teachers exemptions from teacher certification laws, "such as conscientious objectors have from laws requiring the bearing of arms."

He said that "compelling Amish children to attend 'modern' schools will of course destroy the Amish religion and way of life." He added that he has been told by attorneys that such action may violate the constitutional guarantees of freedom of religion.

Decrying the inroads he said the government is making in controlling American freedoms, Lindholm said, "If Iowa sheriffs can

forcibly take children away from their parents and schools, and teach them ideas contrary to their religious beliefs, then how long will it be in America until we have thought-control?"

The Amish at Camden (Michigan) are facing a similar problem because their teachers also have only an eighth grade education and do not meet state certification requirements.

The Amish feel an eighth grade education is sufficient for persons who work the soil.

Deer Kill Seems Light; Hunters are Disgruntled

Many hunters in the Iosco area are asking: "What happened to the huge deer herd that was advertised last fall?"

Off to an inauspicious opening Saturday, November 20, when few hunters reported success locally, the deer kill has apparently not improved a great deal as the season progressed.

It is still too early to obtain an accurate estimate of the actual deer harvest throughout the county, but first reports indicate that there has been an exceptionally light kill and the majority of hunters are disappointed.

Business has been great this season in the north country. Some 80,000 cars passed through Standish in 72 hours at the start of the season and traffic was again heavy for Thanksgiving and over the second week-end.

Local restaurant, gas station and tavern owners have played a merry tune on cash registers, as the deer army roared into the area in a spending mood.

A few random inquiries around the county Tuesday by the Herald indicated that most hunters contacted believe that the pre-season deer population had been overestimated by the Michigan Department of Conservation.

The Lansky camp in AuSable Township reported excellent success with 12 hunters bagging nine bucks. James Lansky said that fewer deer were seen, however, and that doe were scarce this season.

Club 29 in AuSable Township, with five hunters, shot two deer. Dale Fisher said that members saw fewer deer in the woods than during the first two weeks last season.

Excellent success was reported at the Four Square Club near Curran, where 12 out of 14 hunters reported kills. This camp contains 420 acres of hunting land. Clement Stephan said that fewer doe and fawn were observed this season.

Hunting in Wilber Township, usually one of the prime spots in the county, had only spotty results. Elmer Werth said that hunters at his camp had shot four deer, but this was far below other years. He believed the deer herd had dwindled to a dangerous point over the past three years. Other camps reported similar light kills.

Hale Locker Plant on M-65 reported that it processed only about half the number of deer as was stored there during the first two weeks last season.

The O'Farrell camp in Burleigh Township reported a kill of two bucks, as compared to four last year. Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell said that hunters on his property saw fewer deer this year.

Arden Charters of Whittemore, who bagged a nice buck at his camp in Ogemaw County, said that deer hunting was very poor and that hunters were just not seeing the number of deer as in previous seasons. "Many local hunters are disgruntled with the any deer season," he said.

Eel Minard of Singing Bridge Grocery reported a very light kill in the Whitney Township area. He said, however, that there appeared to be a good number of deer in farm fields at night and believed there might not be enough hunters in the woods to move them.

He reported that fewer deer were seen on cars headed south on U.S. 23.

Nimrods in general, whether hunting on private or public land, seemed agreed that the deer population had been overestimated and that too many doe were being harvested in this particular area.

Many complaints were heard of hunters poaching on private property. "It is getting so that there is not much sense in owning expensive hunting property, on which you pay taxes, if you have to run people off all the time," said one local resident.

Another private land owner said that he had purchased his property as a measure of protection for his family against reckless shooting of meat hunters. "We are seriously considering selling our property," he said.

The deer hunters' "hot stove league" probably will be blazing again this winter when the 1965 season is discussed.

Thoughts of sportsmen and businessmen of the Tawas area this week turn toward coming winter sports activities on Tawas Bay.

Tawas Chamber of Commerce will hold its annual parade of fish shanties Saturday morning. Shanties are to be loaded on trucks starting at 10 o'clock and a parade leaves for Perchville one hour later.

Before arrival on the shore at the night of Tawas Bay, shanties are to be paraded through business districts of the Tawas to call attention to the coming season.

Anyone wishing to donate a truck or is willing to decorate the shanties for this parade is urged to call the Tawas Chamber of Commerce office or Arthur Ziehl, parade chairman, at Forest 2-3116.

During the past three years, the chamber of commerce has acquired some 28 metal shanties for use at the perch fishing village which is placed on Tawas Bay ice each season.

Percy Scott, veteran "mayor" of Perchville, is to perform his same duties again this season.

Expansion of the winter sports program this season on Tawas Bay, rather than at Silver Valley, is now in the planning stage. A festival is to be held the week-end of February 26-27 with a perch king and queen to be selected.

Plans are to hold many of the activities within the protected area at Michigan Waterways Commission Dock. A chamber spokesman said that skating events and other contests would be included.

A program is to be announced in the very near future.

Seek State-Wide Participation in Gifts for GIs

"Operation Michigan Christmas for Vietnam," a state-wide volunteer effort to shower gifts upon Michigan soldiers in Vietnam, was announced Friday by Gov. George Romney.

Romney is asking for the name of every Michigan soldier in Vietnam. Business, industry and agriculture are being asked to contribute goods and money, and organized labor is being asked to advise on the packing and movement of goods.

A special chartered plane will carry the all-Michigan product packages to Vietnam.

Romney said he had learned on his recent trip to South Vietnam that "several thousand Michigan boys are members of our armed forces there and will spend this Christmas thousands of miles away from home, many of them on the front lines of defense."

Since returning, he said he has "sought some manner of indicating to these sons of Michigan that their state has not forgotten them and will be especially thinking of them during the holiday season."

"I have determined that this can be accomplished by sending a representative gift package to every Michigan GI we can identify and locate in South Vietnam."

Romney was blocked by Pentagon regulations in an effort to get a defense department list of Michigan military men in Vietnam.

The governor asks that every-one knowing of a Michigan man or woman who is presently serving in the United States Military Advisory Command, Vietnam, to send his or her name immediately. It is imperative that the governor

Charron Tells Progress on Fish Net Proposals

New rules and regulations designed to preserve good fishing for sportsmen without unduly depriving commercial gill net fishermen of their livelihood, may come out of the public hearing held recently at East Tawas.

After the hearing, much of the groundwork in connection with solving the fish controversy has been handed to State Rep. Sanford Charron of Pinconning. He has met weekly with representatives of the Michigan Department of Conservation's fish division.

Charron said these suggested regulations appear to have a good chance of being made effective.

Limiting the number of commercial licenses granted within a given geographical area; limiting the operations of a licensee to a range of 40 to 50 miles from the base at which he is licensed; preventing netters from operating in less than 78 feet of water during the recreational season of early spring to mid-fall.

In all probability, removal of size limits on gill net-caught perch will be tried on an experimental basis next season.

Charron said he thought fishermen would see strict enforcement of an already existing law which prohibits gill netters from stretching nets across river mouths.

The Pinconning representative said he had received excellent cooperation in his investigation from Dr. Howard Tanner, conservation department fish division chief.

Charron Tells Progress on Fish Net Proposals

Search for the outstanding citizen of the Tawas area is now being conducted by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce. The person chosen is to be honored at the annual banquet to be held January 29 at the Holland Hotel.

An official ballot is being printed in this week's issue of The Tawas Herald. The ballot, along with a short summary of the nominee's qualifications for selection as citizen of the year, should be returned to the chamber of commerce on or before January 1, 1966.

A chamber spokesman said Monday that it is hoped that this citizen of the year selection will receive community-wide interest. Letters have already been sent to most service clubs and other organizations requesting nominations. Any group which has not received notification may use the ballot provided here and return it with the necessary information.

A panel of judges will make the final selection from ballots received. Name of the nominee will not be announced until the night of the banquet.

The candidate may be a man or woman, a resident of the Tawas Area School District. The award would be for his or her outstanding work or contribution to the welfare of the area for 1965, but such effort is to be outside his everyday occupational activities.

Iosco Finances Compare Favorably With State Avg.

According to the 21st annual report of the county's audit division of the state auditor general's office, Iosco County's finances compared favorably with other counties of Michigan with similar populations and valuation.

All counties were listed in the report according to the 1960 census to facilitate comparison. It was emphasized, however, that population is only one of several factors which might affect the amount of a county's expenditures.

During 1964, Iosco County had total governmental revenues of \$983,977. This included \$292,939

in taxes, \$3,765 in refunds, \$4,942 for health, welfare and medical assistance reimbursements, state aid of \$461,016 for highways; \$53,280 in state aid for health, welfare and medical assistance, and other state aid of \$7,819. Miscellaneous county revenue amounted to \$135,994, which included court fines, costs, interest, rentals, sale of property, contributions from local units for road purposes.

The county had total expenditures during the above period of \$946,092, of which \$193,273 was for administrative and operating expense; \$422,906 for maintenance

and construction of highways; \$140,213 for health, welfare and medical assistance. Construction of drains amounted to \$4,556, miscellaneous governmental functions amounted to \$62,241, capital outlay totaled \$119,326 and interest on debt amounted to \$3,547.

Miscellaneous expenditures included \$13,350 for airport expense, \$13,833 for park and recreation areas, \$34,768 for library expense (which is shared by Arenac County under the regional library).

Manslaughter Jury Trial Set Here Dec. 6

Manslaughter charge against Marvin J. Boger, driver of a car October 2 which was involved in a two-car collision near Whittemore resulting in the death of Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur B. Henry, is to be heard December 6.

When appearing Monday before Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller, Boger requested appointment of legal counsel. William McCready was named by Judge Miller to act in Boger's behalf.

Jury trial of James E. Gidcumb, who is charged with third offense uttering and publishing an insufficient check, is to be held January 4. Judge Miller refused a plea of guilty entered Monday by Gidcumb.

In other court matters, Judge Miller denied a motion for new trial requested by J. Berkeley Smith and wife in an auto negligence suit against Miss Burnetta Miller. This case was heard to conclusion last summer and a jury brought in a no cause for action verdict for both parties.

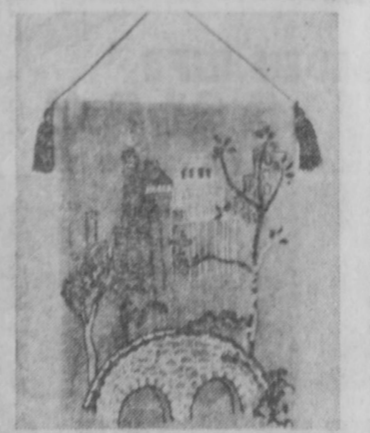

Tougher Targets In '65



Michigan's second modern-day elk season, set for Dec. 8-16 in the Pigeon River area of the northern Lower Peninsula, is expected to be sportier than last year's hunt. Although the area's herd is estimated to be as big as it was a year ago — about 3,000 — 3,500 elk — indications are that most of its easier-to-kill animals were picked off in 1964. Generally, that means this season's 300 licensees will have to move into the back country to find where these prized animals are. Even then, their shooting success isn't expected to approach that of last year when 269 elk were shot. Best guess of Conservation Department game men is that hunter take will be closer to 100 animals. — Mich. Dept. of Conservation

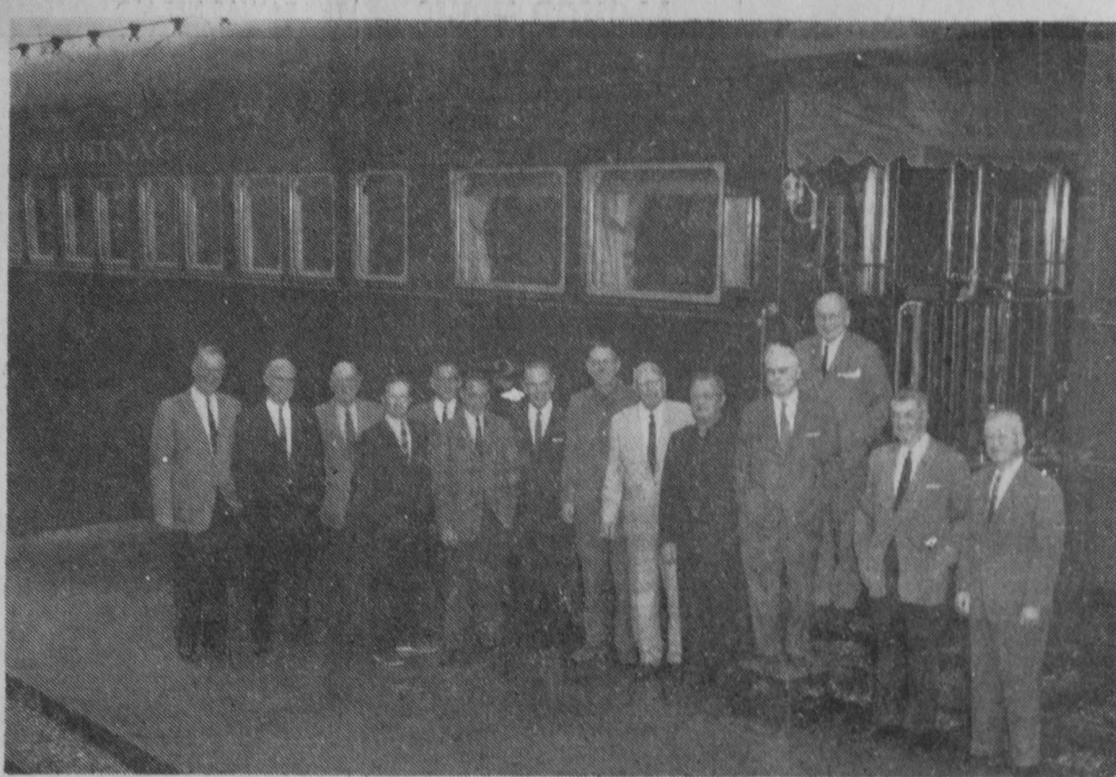

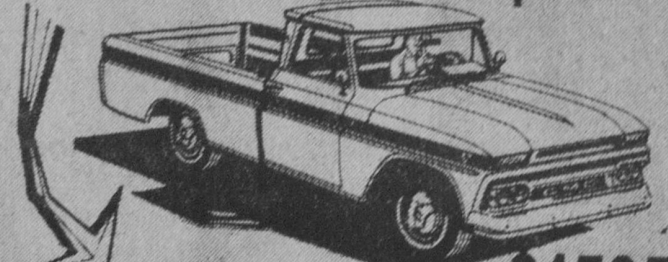

(Continued from page 1.) indicated that state aid amounted to 53.06 percent of the total.

A percentage analysis of county governmental costs indicated that 10.30 percent of revenue went for administrative and operating expense; 44.80 for maintenance and construction of highways; 14.82 percent for health, welfare and medical assistance; 48 percent for maintenance and construction of drains, 6.58 percent for miscellaneous county government functions. Percentage of total disbursements for county governmental functions was 87.01. Percentage for capital outlay was 12.61 and .38 percent for interest on debt.

Of the total administrative and operating expense, \$33,430 went for county officers' salaries, \$89,726 for other remuneration and \$37,623 for other departmental expense. The 1964 administrative and operating expense was \$193,272, as compared to \$169,953 in 1961.

Items listed under other departmental expense included cost of utilities, repair and maintenance of equipment and buildings, bonds and insurance, etc.

Iosco had a census of 16,505 persons in 1960 and a state equalized valuation of \$55,978,000 during the period January 1, 1964, to December 31, 1964.

Coach Ed Dudo and his W-P Cardinals have a big rebuilding job as they start the new cage season with 10 of the 12 varsity men missing from last season.

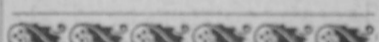

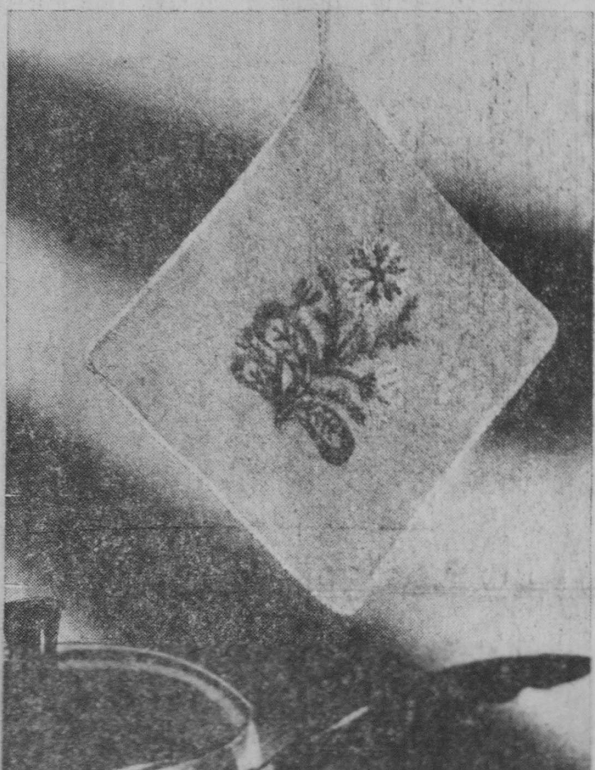
SIMPLE STEPS

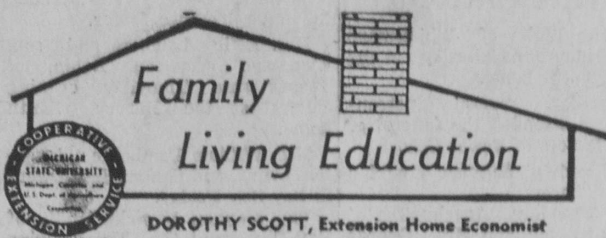

I would guess the recent massive power failure in the eastern United States brought the need for family emergency preparedness to your family's attention. We heard much about the millions of people who were caught without any means of providing some sort of light for themselves and their families. In colder weather, lack of heat would have been serious, too.

Electricity has been with us for

so many years we take it for granted. We forget that in many kinds of emergencies, power may be lost. The causes can vary from the recent eastern catastrophe to a single windstorm.

The question is have we profited from this recent eastern experience and made plans that would help our family in a similar situation? Here are a few suggestions:

Easier for Residents to Qualify for Social Security Benefits

It will be easier for Isoco County residents to qualify for social security disability insurance benefits as a result of changes made in the law this year. Paul M. Ellifritz, social security district manager, Bay City, announced today.

In the past, a person has been considered disabled only if his impairment was expected to be of long continued and indefinite duration. Now, a person can receive disability benefits if his disability impairment is expected to last 12 months.

However, Mr. Ellifritz stressed that there is no change in the degree of impairment which is considered disabling and no change in the amount of work required for benefits except for blind persons disabled before age 31. The disability work requirement generally is that a person must have social security work credit for five out of the 10 years just before he became disabled. Another change in the law permits a person who has started receiving retirement benefits to become eligible for monthly disability payments if he becomes disabled before reaching age 65.

A social security representative for this area will be at the Isoco County Building, Tawas City, on Thursday, December 9, from 10:30 a. m. to 2:30 p. m.
