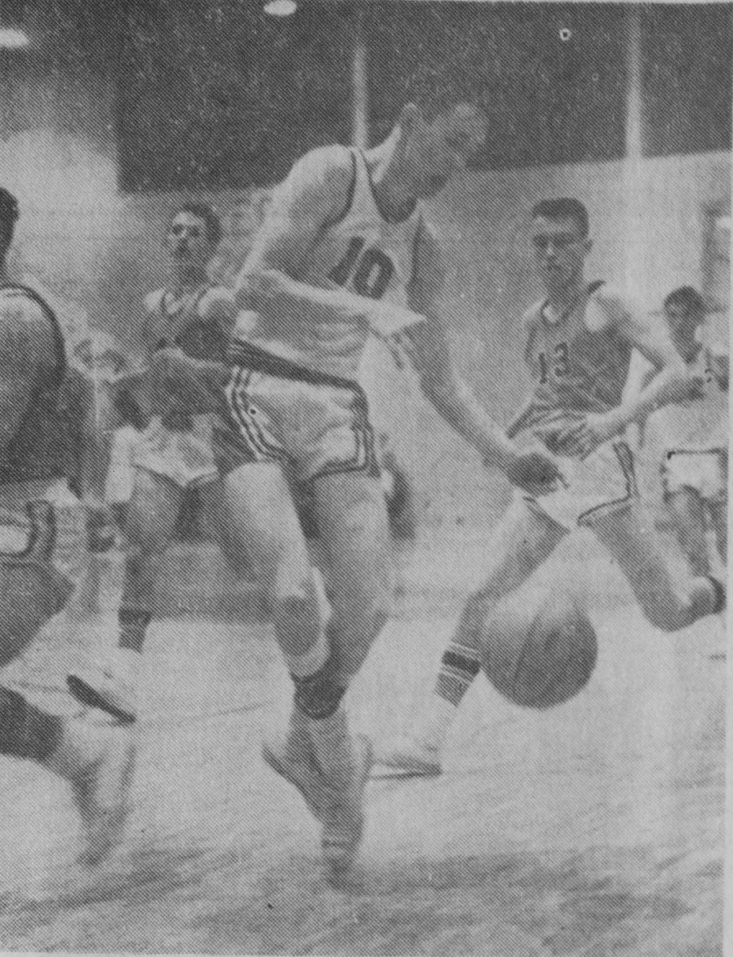

Braves Down Orioles for 1st Win of Season

Tawas Area won two exciting basketball games from the visiting West Branch High School team Friday night, the Braves taking the measure of the Orioles, 57-52, and the Tawas Junior Braves won over the West Branch JV, 53-43.

It was the first win of the season for the Braves as against two losses and the McIntoshmen outscored the visitors in the first three quarters before taking the short count in the fourth.

By all odds and in spite of the advantage in playing at home, the Braves turned in a rather amazing performance in downing the much taller opposition.

West Branch controlled the offensive backboards throughout the game but just could not put this advantage to good use. Tawas players were able to tie up the Orioles after taking the ball off the backboard, particularly in the late stages of the game when two or three tip-ins would have meant the difference.

The final outcome of this game probably was settled in the first half when Tawas made good on 50 percent of its shots, hitting on 14 out of 28 attempts. The Braves came up with a 44 percent shooting average in the second half, meshing 22 out of 50 shots.

The Braves also made fewer mistakes than in their first two encounters. Bad passing was costly in losses to Essexville and Oscoda but the Braves settled down considerably against the Orioles and it paid off.

Tawas jumped off to an early first quarter lead on its shots from the outside. Bob Sieloff led the way with three buckets and six points, followed by Wayne Fairfield's four points. Dick Grebe, Dick Lapeer and Howard Rollin each contributed a field goal for a total of 16 points. West Branch stayed within striking distance on the shooting eye of Guard Craig Rivard, who meshed four fielders.

The Braves scored 13 counts to West Branch's 11 in the second quarter. Rollin had two field goals, Lapeer and Grebe each had three points, while Fairfield and Sieloff had one field goal apiece.

Tawas equaled its first quarter effort in the third stanza when Fairfield meshed two field goals and two foul shots, Sieloff and Lapeer each had two field goals. Grebe and Rollin each added a free shot for a 16-point total, as compared to 11 for West Branch.

The visitors came to life in the final quarter when their height edge began to show on the backboards, but it proved to be too late. Scoring for Tawas were Lapeer with five points, Rollin and Fairfield with three charity tosses

each. Greg Dematio had six points for the losers.

Tawas had four players in double figures, led by Fairfield's 15 points. Following close behind were Lapeer with 14, Sieloff with 12 and Rollin with 10. West Branch also had four players in double figures, Rivard leading the pack with 14.

The two junior varsity squads were fairly evenly matched but the squad of Tawas Coach Dick Fairless built up a commanding first half lead and was able to stave off a good second half effort of the visitors.

The Junior Braves jumped off to a 15-3 lead in the first quarter and then outdistanced the Oriole JV in the third quarter, 13-11. It was a different story in the third quarter when the visitors poured in 18 points to Tawas Area's six but Tawas came on strong with a 20-11 fourth quarter bulge.

With three straight wins and showing much potential for future years with good height and ability, Tawas' JV had three players scoring in double figures. Top man on the scoring ladder was Gary Haglund, who meshed 14 points. Al Lickfelt was right behind with 12 points and Ron Doak had 10. Tawas' two guards, Gene Kushion and Dale Koepke, turned in outstanding defensive performances and each turned in six points, as did Mike Straley, who meshed three field goals.

Action this week finds the Braves moving to Pinconning for two games Friday night.

Hale Drops Hillman for Third Straight Win

Hale Area Eagles continued in the win column last week with victories over Arenac Eastern and Hillman. The Eagles downed Arenac Eastern Tuesday night in overtime, 56-50, and then trounced Hillman, 70-54, Friday night.

Tuesday night's game was a rough one and Hale Center George Maas picked up four personal fouls in the first quarter and had to sit out the next two quarters. His rebounding and nine points in the final quarter helped pull the game out of the fire.

Lyle McKenzie did a fine job of rebounding and scored 16 points to lead his mates. Sophomore

Danny Maas substituted for his brother for two quarters and turned in a fine job. McKenzie left the game in the fourth quarter with five fouls.

Arenac Eastern jumped off to a 12-8 lead in the first quarter and Hale held a 10-9 margin in the second quarter. Arenac came on strong with a 23-15 bulge in the third quarter but Hale scored 17 points to Eastern's six in the fourth to tie the game. The Eagles then scored six points in overtime.

Hale and Hillman got off to a slow start in scoring Friday night, with both teams turning in fine defensive play. Hillman scored eight points to Hale's six.

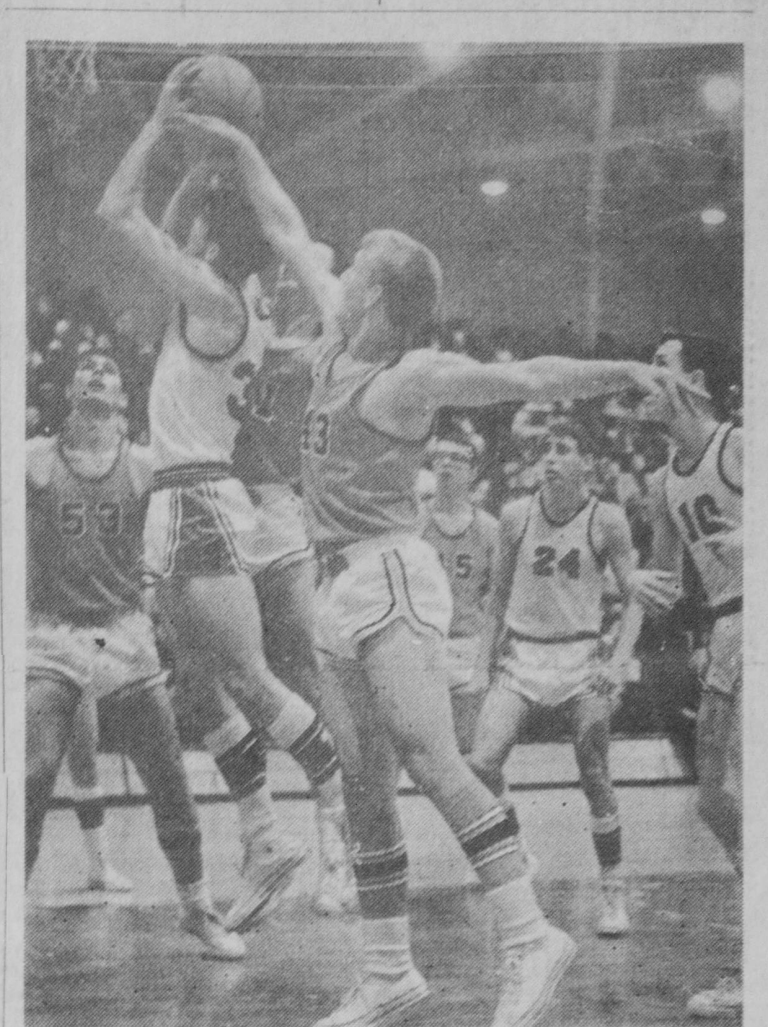

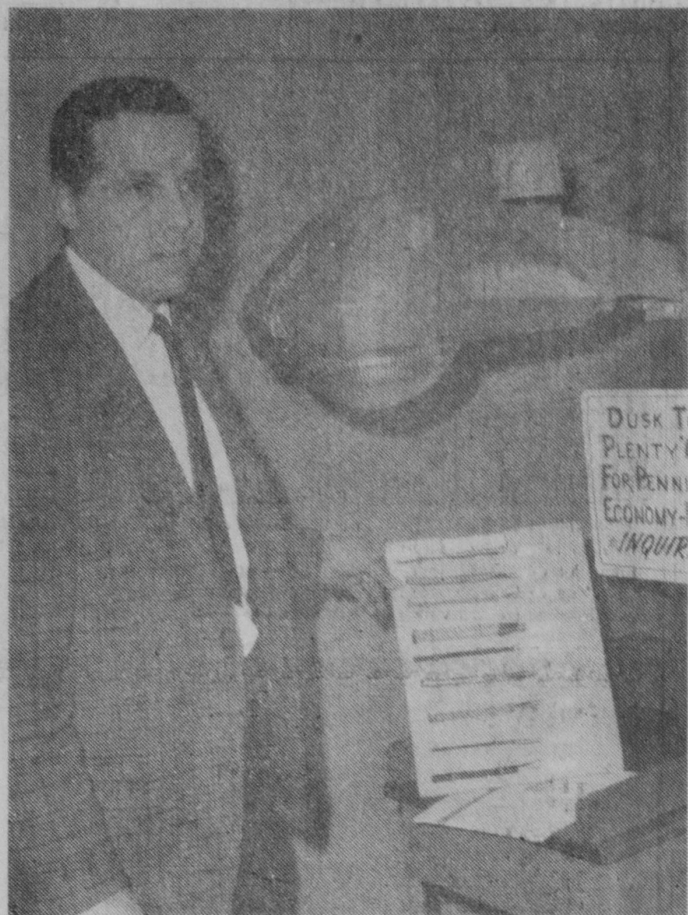

SS Mgr. to Acquaint Older Residents with Birth Record Needs

"You may be older than you feel—or younger, but just how old—or young are you?" With those words, Paul M. Ellifritz, manager of the Bay City Social Security Office, launched a campaign to acquaint Iosco County residents with revised proof of age requirements for those about to retire.

Every applicant for old-age benefits, Ellifritz explained, will be required to submit proof of age recorded before their fifth birth-

day or they will have to establish that such evidence does not exist. This means writing for a birth certificate. If the state record shows that the birth was not recorded, that notice must be retained and be presented to the social security representative at the time of application, along with other acceptable evidence of age. As a substitute for the birth certificate Ellifritz added, an infant baptismal record will be satisfactory proof.

What if there is neither an infant birth nor baptismal record in existence? Then the Social Security Administration requires that evidence of age, recorded before the 11th birthday be obtained. Examples of this are school records or census reports.

Anyone needing assistance in obtaining evidence of age should

get in touch with the Social Security Office, Bay City.

A social security representative is also available to assist area residents twice a month. He will be at the Iosco County Building,

Tawas City, Thursday, December 23, from 10:30 a. m. to 2:30 p. m.

Tangy Lobster-Lime Rice
 1/2 clove garlic, minced (optional)
 1/4 cup butter
 1 can (5 oz.) lobster, drained and cut in bite-size pieces
 1 1/2 cups water
 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
 2 teaspoons lime juice
 1 teaspoon grated lime rind
 1 teaspoon salt
 1 1/2 cups packaged pre-cooked rice

Sauté garlic in butter until light brown. Add lobster and sauté lightly. Add water, parsley, lime juice and rind, and salt. Bring to a boil. Stir in rice. Then cover and simmer 5 minutes, or until rice is tender. Makes 3 1/2 cups or 3 or 4 servings.

New Delicate Dessert

 1 teaspoon grated orange rind

Beat egg white until foamy throughout. Gradually add 2 tablespoons sugar, beating thoroughly after each addition. Continue beating until meringue will form soft rounded peaks. Set aside. Combine custard mix, 1 tablespoon sugar, the milk, and egg yolk in saucepan. Bring quickly to a boil, stirring constantly. (Mixture will be thin.) Remove from heat. Stir in orange rind. Pour into 5 custard cups or a 1-quart baking dish. Spoon 1 dollop of meringue over each individual custard or spoon 5 dollops of meringue over large custard. Lightly brown meringue in 425° oven for 5 minutes. Cool 2 hours, or until set. Makes about 2 1/2 cups or 5 servings.

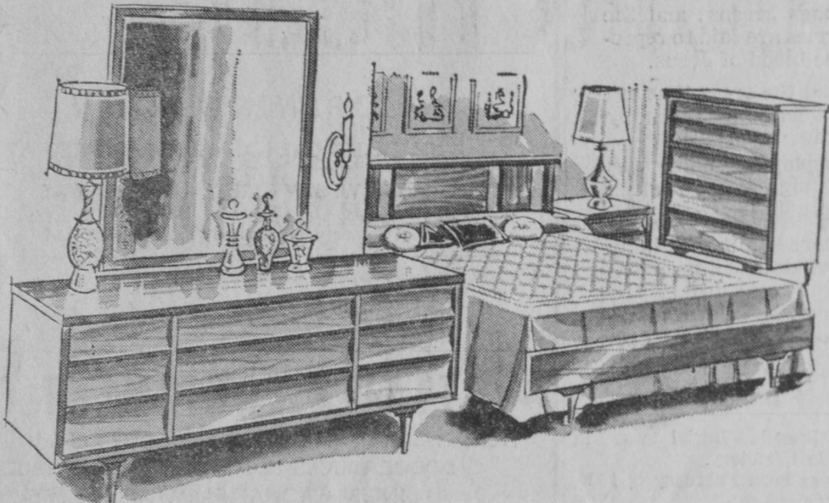

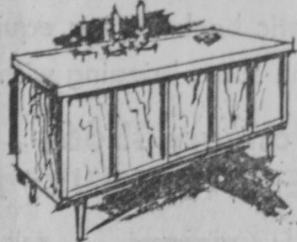

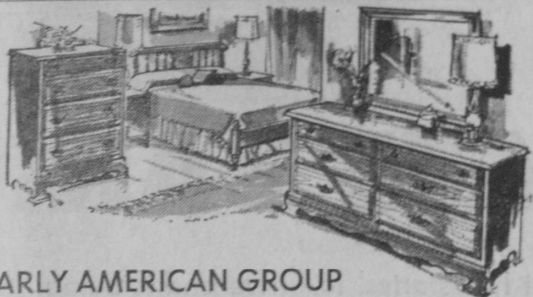

there are others we have not mentioned here.

The knitting class was conducted by Mrs. William Macklem, a 4-H knitting project leader who does many "plus" things with her girls. This means they learn more than the minimums required. She brought a dozen or so sweaters, an afghan and a coat knitted with a great variety of yarns.

Her project members learn about many more kinds of yarns than the old standby, four-ply worsteds. They learn that the 50-50 wool and nylon yarns increase strength, wear better and yet are warm and lovely to wear.

They learn about the whole range of yarn imports, mostly blends, about machine washable yarns and domestic yarns. They can learn to do two-color pattern in a stockinette stitch with a beautiful result. Then, there are moss and seed stitch, openwork, faggoting, feather fan, lace, edging and a whole line of cable stitches plus smooth seaming, shaping and blocking techniques.

Junior 4-H members who came to share in the knitting class decided they want to meet with Mrs. Macklem, bring needles and yarn and learn how to do many of these knitting techniques she is so willing to teach them.

We decided to plan such an opportunity for the girls and knitting leaders in January.

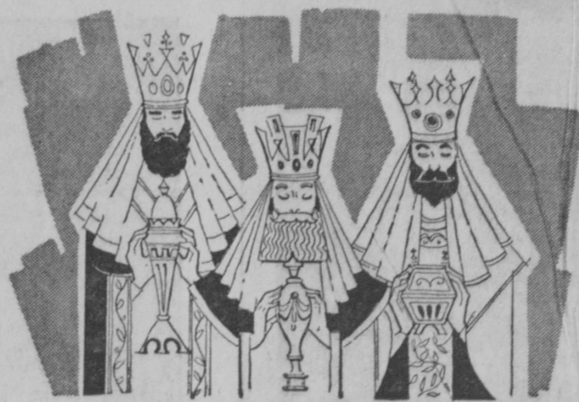

Folklore has it that holly in the window will keep evil spirits away from the house, and holly at a maiden's bedside, on Christmas Eve, will protect her from goblins!

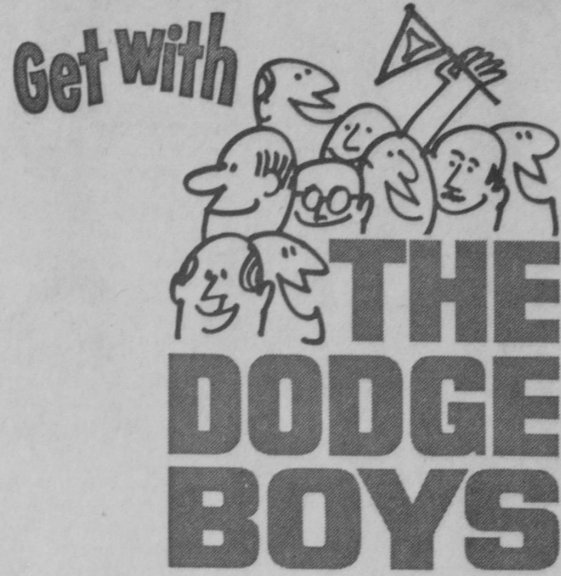

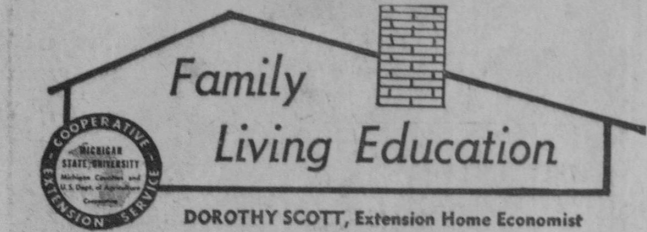

Hello Everyone!

Let's all share in some of the tips for clothing and knitting projects given at the meeting for 4-H leaders December 4.

Four clothing leaders had recently attended a training school at Camp Kett where the new consumer buymanship project was outlined. They are Mrs. Wilma Ruckle, Mrs. Lois Swartz, Mrs. Jean Myas and Mary Wakefield.

Consumer buymanship, they told us, can be built into the regular 4-H projects as outlined in the green-covered project outline. An insert sheet for this guide was provided giving suggestions for doing this.

Also provided were suggestions for teaching aids available from Michigan State University upon request. These are slides or filmstrips with scripts to help us show the 4-H members construction techniques, how to select fabrics, what to do special for wash and wear fabrics and many others.

Among the leaders present were several who explained that it has been a big help to them, in working with the 4-H girls, to have mothers taking part in some way and coming for the evaluation program at the end. This brings about better understanding and acceptance of what is done by, with and for the members.

One bit of buymanship information our 4-H girls should learn early is the different characteristics of natural and man-made fibers. Natural fibers "love" water. This means they absorb moisture and soil easily. They also take dyes easily and give us clear, bright colors. On warm summer days, they are cool to wear. Man-made fibers "hate" water. This means they do not absorb moisture and soil easily and they are apt to be uncomfortably warm on summer days. Blends let us take advantage of the best characteristics of each kind of fiber and

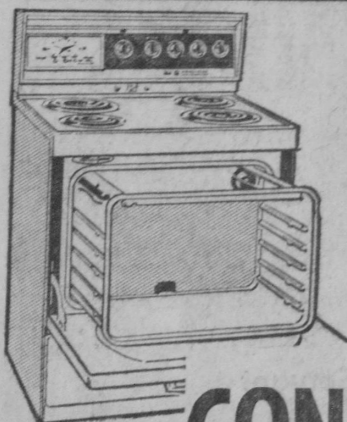

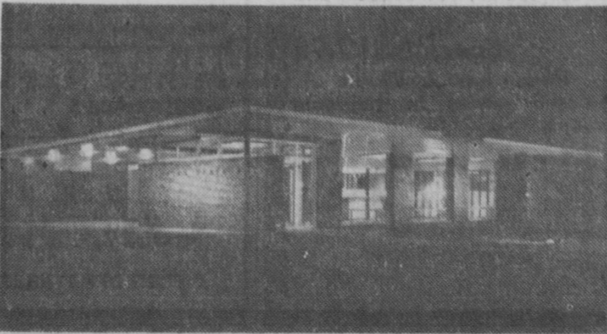

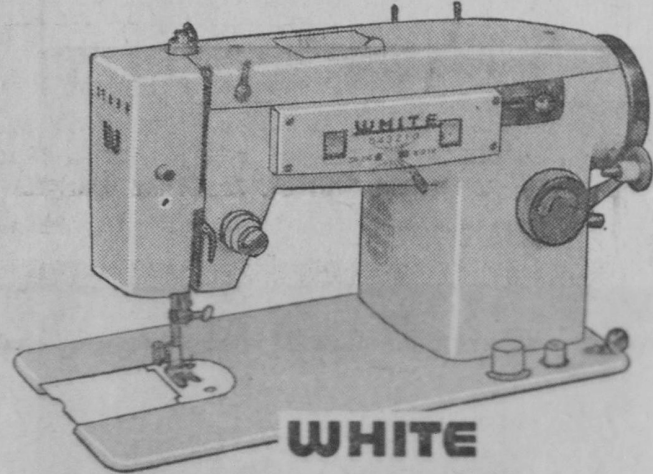
