

Status of Federal Aid on Sewers to be Told

A status report on East Tawas' application for federal aid in constructing an addition to its sanitary sewer system is to be made at the next council meeting. Julius Hanslovsky, financial consultant, and a representative of Spicer Engineering Company are to attend the meeting.

The city has applied for a loan of \$32,000 to cover engineering costs and a federal grant of approximately \$85,000 to finance cost of construction.

City Supt. Paul Roper reported that steps would have to be taken soon to enlarge existing disposal facilities. The present plant was constructed in 1934 to serve a peak load of 1,100 persons and normal load of the plant was designed for 600 residents.

Lawrence Everitt, Iosco Civil Defense director, was authorized to use part of the water filtration plant for storage of emergency supplies in case of a national disaster.

Newman Street is to be closed from Lincoln to Washington Streets on December 22-23, 6:30 to 9:00 p. m., for the live Nativity scene at the Methodist Church.

Merton Killey, park commission chairman, was authorized to purchase a used piano for the community building, with approval of the commission.

Vern Bowling of Yeo and Yeo Certified Public Accountants presented the annual audit of city books for the year October 1, 1964, through September 30, 1965. The report showed a surplus of funds at the end of that time and \$590 was transferred to the police department. An additional transfer of \$20,240 was made from the contingent fund to purchase the former Anderson Coach Company property. A surplus of \$6,000 remains.

The council authorized loaning \$1,000 for the city's ice rink scraper to the City of Flint. It was reported that

this was the only such piece of equipment in the state and would be used for United States Olympic ice skating trials to be held at Flint.

Two building permits approved during the past two weeks were as follows: Jessie Easter, 109 North Wadsworth, remove dwelling; Joseph Trudell, 108 Church, remodel garage, \$150.

Mrs. Cater Retires Dec. 31 After Long Service to Schools

"I'm not really retiring—just leaving after 20 years of pleasure at my work."

So stated Mrs. Dan F. Cater, who completes a 20-year career as an educational secretary in Iosco County on December 31.

Mrs. Cater has been connected with local schools since she first started to work in November 1945 for Russell A. Rollin, at that time the county school superintendent.

"Do you remember the day when something happened to the furnace and the old courthouse was filled with smoke," recalled Mrs. Cater. "I do, as the office was located in the basement and it was filled with choking fumes."

She worked for Mr. Rollin until reorganization of schools here as the Tawas Area School District in 1953. Then, she went to work as secretary to Supt. Reynold Mick.

Mrs. Cater held sway in the high school office until July 1962, when she returned to the county superintendent's office as secretary to Supt. William Tracy.

She was instrumental in organizing the Iosco Association of Educational Secretaries in February 1957. This group has grown to a membership of 21 and she was honored December 8 at a farewell dinner.

Two other charter members of the group, Mrs. Dorothy Blood of Hale Area and Mrs. Irene Dickey of Whittemore-Prescott Area, presented her with a gift and corsage.

Mrs. Cater has taken an active part in the Michigan Association of Educational Secretaries, which she joined in 1947, holding several state offices. She has also been a member of the national organization for the past four years.

She is a charter member of the Tawas Community Chorus, which was formed in 1958, and was a soloist during the recent concert.

She plans to spend a couple of months this winter visiting her sister in Florida.

Tawas Area Junior Hospitalized After Crash Saturday

A 17-year-old Tawas Area High School junior, Terry M. Gourneau, was seriously injured Saturday afternoon when the truck he was driving skidded on a patch of ice and crashed into a tree.

The accident took place on Essex Road, about one-tenth of a mile north of Camel Road and west of Monument Road.

Gourneau sustained a compound fracture of the left leg. He was taken to Tawas Hospital and immediately transferred to St. Luke's Hospital, Saginaw.

It is expected that he will undergo treatment for 22 weeks before an operation is performed on his injured leg.

State police said the youth was trapped in the truck and a passing motorist extinguished a fire under the front seat. A Huron Auto Parts wrecker was used to pry open the door in order to remove him.

Police Consolidation Suggested by ET Mayor

Investigation into the possible consolidation of city police departments of East Tawas and Tawas City is under consideration.

Mayor Clarence McKenzie of East Tawas directed City Attorney Michael Freil to search existing laws under the Fourth Class City Act to determine if a consolidation would be legal.

Contacted Tuesday morning, Mayor George Tuttle of Tawas City told the Herald that any discussion on the proposal would come only after all legal aspects were considered.

"Mayor McKenzie approached me some time ago to learn my thoughts on the matter," said Tuttle. "I can see possibilities in one police department for the two communities, but it is too early for much discussion."

Tawas City has not found a qualified replacement as yet for Frank Roti, who resigned over a month ago as police chief. George Westcott, part-time officer, is filling the duties.

In announcing his intention to investigate the possible consolidation, McKenzie said that such a move would mean a saving of money to both communities.

In other business transacted at Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council, Patrolman William Grossmeyer was authorized to attend a four-week course for law enforcement officers at Michigan State University. Cost of the schooling would be \$400.

Two Veteran USG Employees Retired Last Week at Alabaster

Two veteran employees of United States Gypsum Company's Alabaster installation retired last week after working there for a combined total of 87 years.

Ceryl Hughes, who started in 1917, and Chauncey Tate, with the firm since 1925, were honored guests Saturday night at a party held for USG employees at the Barnes Hotel.

"Cy's" crew has enjoyed a perfect safety record for the third consecutive year. He has served as mill foreman since 1944. Born March 15, 1900, he attended Tawas City High School.

Tate, born at Osceola in 1898, worked on the old AuSable and Northwestern branch of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway and then joined USG in April 1925. Starting as a steam locomotive operator, at one time or another he operated every piece of equipment in the quarry except the huge Marion draglines.

Tate worked as quarry foreman in 1944. The quarry crew has had a perfect safety record for the past six years. In addition to his regular supervisory work, he has assisted in training young engineers of the company in quarry operations.

He was a star baseball player at Osceola in his younger days and later played on Detroit semiprofessional teams. He was signed by the Bay City Wolves and played one year in the Michigan-Ontario League before going to work for USG.

Both men are in excellent health and said they would probably spend more time playing golf and fishing during their retirement.

Tate and his wife, Grace, are the parents of three children: Mrs. Donald (Marilyn) Hosbeck, Saginaw; Gordon, Miami, Florida; and Thomas of Dearborn Heights. They have six grandchildren.

Hughes and his wife, Margaret, are the parents of three children: Wilfred, who is an employee of USG at Alabaster; Mrs. Ernest (Ila) Waterhouse, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; and Jack Hughes, an employee of Dow Chemical Company at Midland. They have 11 grandchildren.

The Tates are to leave after Christmas on a Florida vacation. Mr. and Mrs. Hughes built a new home on US-23 three years ago. While interested in spending the winter in Arizona, they have made no plans as yet.

E. R. Burtzloff, Former Mayor, Died Dec. 17

Ernest R. Burtzloff, a former two-term mayor of Tawas City, died December 17 at Veterans Hospital, Dearborn, following a long illness.

He had operated a coal business here for many years and served as mayor in 1942 and 1943.

Mr. Burtzloff was born September 21, 1886, in Tawas City. He was married March 27, 1920, to Louise C. Remer at Rochester.

He was a veteran of World War I and a member of Jesse C. Hodder American Legion Post, a member of Zion Lutheran Church and the Zion Lutheran Men's Club.

During World War II, he had charge of civilian defense activities in Tawas City.

Besides his wife, Mr. Burtzloff is survived by one son, Harold, Tawas City; a daughter, Mrs. Norma Inman, Midland; five grandchildren; one brother, Edward Burtzloff, Tawas City.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at Zion Lutheran Church with the Rev. Walter C. Pieper officiating. Burial was in Zion Lutheran Cemetery on Plank Road.

Treasurer Offers Assistance in Filing Homestead Exemption

Assistance in preparing forms for persons over 65 years of age to qualify for a new homestead tax exemption is to be offered by the City of Tawas City.

Effective January 6 and continuing to the board of review meeting in early March, City Treasurer Ruth Albertson is to be at the city hall each Thursday to assist eligible persons with required paper work.

Under a new federal program, the state is to pay a portion of the property tax for eligible persons over 65 years of age.

"We are not yet acquainted with all of the requirements under this new act, but we expect to receive the necessary forms shortly," said Mrs. Albertson.

There is no compulsion on the city's part to offer this assistance in preparing forms but, according to Mayor George Tuttle, it was felt that it would be convenient for all concerned to have them filled out properly for the first year.

The mayor believed that nearly 50 percent of the homeowners of Tawas City would be eligible under the program. For this reason, it was felt that ward supervisors just would not have time to offer assistance with the forms.

City to Study Possible Park Expansion Plan

Study is to continue into possible financing the purchase of a parcel of property east of the Tawas City Park for park expansion.

A report from a recent meeting of the city park board indicated that a preliminary study had been made. While it was stated that the parcel was being offered at a price below the appraised value of the property, park board members felt that purchase was not feasible as returns from development would not be high enough to assume the obligation.

At its meeting Monday night, the city council authorized investigation into possible use of the property as a trailer park. The parcel has frontage of 280 feet on Tawas Bay and ranges from 350 feet to 250 feet in depth.

It was stated that approximately 35 trailer lots could be situated on the land.

State regulations covering municipal operation of a park are to be studied, along with investigation into cost of sewer and water facilities. Possible federal participation is also to be studied.

The concession stand at the park became property of the city this year on expiration of a 10-year lease arrangement. Annual lease revenue to the former owner was \$800 and this would now go to the city.

Andrew Oberla, owner of the parcel of land east of the city park, said the council could decide on the purchase between now and spring. Cost to the city would be \$34,000.

In other matters, Supt. of Public Works Reginald Buhltz reported that many persons were not complying with the new ordinance which requires a burning permit in the fire zone. A list of violators is to be presented at the next meeting and letters are to be sent advising violators of the new ordinance.

A public hearing is to be held January 17, 7:30 p. m., on proposed changes to the city's zoning ordinance.

Following a meeting of City Attorney Alf C. Watson and the planning commission, three changes were recommended as follows:

1. Add two alternate members to the six-man board of appeals, one from the planning commission and one from the council. They would act in the absence of regular members;
2. Change wording in one paragraph to allow for residences of owners or caretakers of motel or resort property in B-2 business district;
3. Rezone a triangular piece of property on Bay Drive from B-2 business to one-family residential. The three parcels are owned by Herbert Blust, Marie Delnaay and John R. Forsten.

TA School to Study Revision of Fees Under New Budget

As a preliminary study in preparing a budget for the 1966-1967 school year, Tawas Area School administrators are considering a revision of fees for expendable items used by students.

The report revealed that the elementary fee of \$2.50 per pupil yielded \$2,401.23 toward the total cost of expendable items amounting to \$2,465. This represented a 100 percent collection.

Secondary collections amounted to \$1,081.82, or \$1.66 per pupil from the 653 enrolled.

The report revealed that \$6,964.65 was spent for high school supplies and only \$4,967.71 for grade school supplies. This means that about \$9.16 was spent on each high school pupil for expendable supplies, as compared to \$5.49 per elementary pupil.

This year, secondary teachers will be using an estimated 800 reams of Ditto paper, as compared to 575,000 reams last year. There has been a drop off in sale of paper to students this year.

School administrators said this increased use is not for typing paper but has been used for teacher outlines of work to be done by students.

"It seems to me that a revision of fees and costs for consumable materials is in line," said Supt. Reynold Mick.

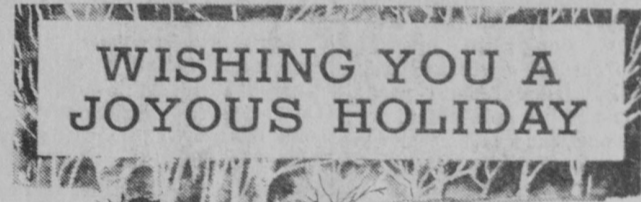



Braves Even Record at 2 Wins, 2 Defeats

Tawas Area Braves evened their season's record Friday night at two wins and two losses by downing the Pinconning Spartans, 75-70.

Bob Sieloff followed Grebe's 12-point effort and Guard Howard Rollin contributed four points.

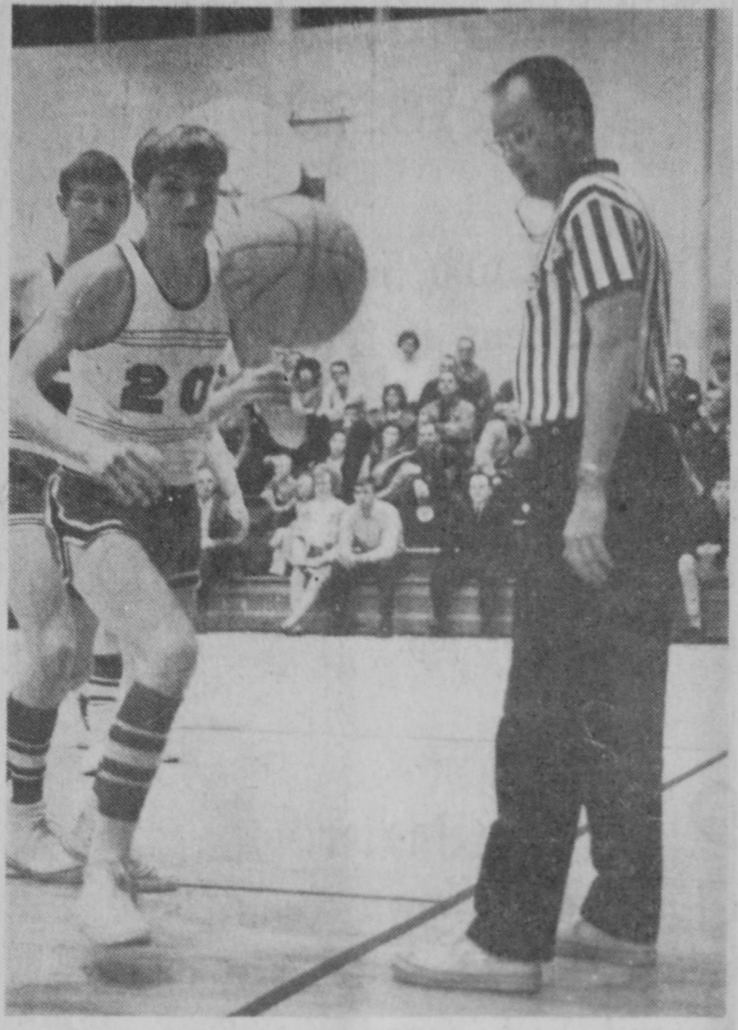
The two teams had identical records for the first two quarters, Tawas gaining 22 points in each and Pinconning had 18 points in each quarter.

He is survived by his wife, Lee; three sons, Richard Jr., Kenneth and William, all of Detroit; nine grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Saturday, December 18, at Christ Episcopal Church with the Rev. Robert Morrison officiating. Burial was in East Tawas Cemetery.

An analysis of hot lunch programs of Tawas Area Schools as of December 1 indicated that the district has been able to support the program on its proceeds.

Total expenditures through November for serving 53,301 lunches amounted to \$19,429.25. Total income amounted to \$19,684.91.

Per meal cost amounted to .36451 cents and per meal income was .3693 cents.

In his report to the board of education, Supt. Reynold Mick pointed out that income included receipts from ice cream, ale, carts and the special milk program.

"If we took the profit out of these three items, we would have lost money on the hot lunch program," he stated.

Inventories were not checked accurately and the information is to be regarded merely as an indicator, he said.

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Let's 'Travel' to the Land Where the Christ was Born

If Christ and His disciples were to visit the Holy Land today, they would find many parts of it unchanged. The hill on which Bethlehem stands looks as it did almost two thousand years ago when Christmas came into being, as do many other spots we've often read about in Sunday School.

Today one can visit the excavated walls of Jericho, one of the oldest cities in the world, and watch veiled women filling their water jugs at Elisha's Fountain just as they did 2,000 years ago. The Garden of Gethsemane with its ancient, gnarled olive trees, surrounded by a lonely landscape recalls that sorrowful night when Christ prayed as His disciples slept. And the lush tropical vegetation that made the Jordan Valley the land of milk and honey is still there to delight the eye of the beholder.

But within Bethlehem itself, many changes have taken place since Joseph and Mary went about seeking shelter on that holy night. Now there are modern stone buildings, and large churches have been built on the presumed sites of the inn and the manger.

On Christmas Eve, many pilgrims attend midnight mass in the Church of St. Catherine which is attached to the Church of the Nativity, built over the rocky grotto believed to be the birthplace of Christ.

Others may attend an evening service held under the stars in nearby Shepherds' Field, said to be the field of Boaz where Ruth once gleaned. One hundred and twenty miles away from Bethlehem lies Nazareth, home of Jesus, Joseph, and Mary for so many years. It stretches along a hillside, a humble little town with busy, dirty streets. Surrounding Nazareth are fields much like those Jesus knew so well. Even now one can see what is said to be Joseph's carpenter shop, and the Well of Mary, which still supplies the town its water. The artisan and craft shops of Nazareth seem to have changed surprisingly little over the centuries.

This year, as every year, thousands of pilgrims will come to Nazareth and other sacred spots in the Holy Land to honor the birth of Christ. There, beautiful services and glorious music will recall the event.

Spending 13.7 Million Dollars—

Whitestone Addition Included in Sag.-Mid. Expansion Project

Work has started on blasting through 31 feet of limestone for a new addition to the Saginaw-Midland Water Supply's pumping station at Whitestone Point.

This is part of a 13.7 million dollar project which is to be completed by October 1967.

Power Blasting Company, Incorporated, explosive engineers, were to commence blasting procedures

yesterday (Tuesday), according to William Grebe, maintenance and operations foreman for Saginaw-Midland Water Supply.

C. and C. Construction Company, Fort Wayne, Indiana, has the contract to build the addition at Whitestone Point.

The new addition will be again as large as the present 138-foot by 42-foot pumping station. It will house a new suction well, along with 40 and 60-million-gallon pumps.

Three local men are employed at Whitestone Point, besides Grebe. They are Fred Landon and Alton Long of Tawas City and Edward Seifert Jr. of East Tawas.

Roger J. Au and Sons, Mansfield, Ohio, construction firm, began installing huge 72-inch concrete water pipes three weeks ago along the Detroit and Mackinac right-of-way about one-half mile east of AuGres.

Au will lay 12 miles of pipe, stopping at the point where the new parallel line, built all the way on D&M right-of-way, intersects the existing 48-inch line at Old State Road three miles south of Omer.

Other contractors will build the line from Whitestone to AuGres, from the Pinconning pumping station to a point around Linwood and from the Junction pumping station about half way to both Saginaw and Midland.

Adding parallel sections of 72-inch pipe along half the line will increase capacity from the present 50-million-gallons per day to 80 million. The parallel lines reduce head loss on the existing 48-inch pipe, providing this extra capacity.

With 48-inch pipe running all the way, it became impractical to increase water velocity past a certain point because of the loss caused by friction against the pipe

sidewalls. Yet by paralleling the line for the first half of the run from pumping station to pumping station, velocity can be kicked up for the last half in the smaller pipe to get the extra 30 million gallons per day.

The present 48-inch line was designed for 30-year use and became too small in just over 15 years. Average demand on the system has grown to 41 million gallons per day. With a 50-million capacity, the line was overextended in periods of peak demand.

Plans provide for a second expansion, which can be completed at a very reasonable cost, that will enable Saginaw-Midland to furnish 192 million gallons of water per day to its customers. This is nearly four times the present capacity.

Communities considering a hook up with the line, like Standish and Pinconning, are being given permission to take water next October.

Water engineers estimate the 192-million-gallon capacity can serve the Saginaw Valley for 30 years.

The Magi Symbolized Ancient Priestly Caste

In New Testament history according to Matthew, the narrative of the three Magi who followed a star to Bethlehem in search of the infant Jesus describes them simply as three "wise men from the east" It was not until the 2nd century, according to the Book of Knowledge that they were known as "kings" in a charming legend that traces its origin to that time.

The Magi originally represented the priestly caste of the ancient Persian Zoroastrian religion. As this religion moved westward, it came into contact with Babylonian beliefs and practices and thus derived a strong interest in astrology demonology and magic.

By the time it had reached the Graeco-Roman world, Zoroastrianism was almost

identical with astrology and magic in the popular view. This explains the use of the term "wise men" in Matthew's New Testament account, for the three men described therein were actually astrologers and not kings.

The Empress Helena is credited with having brought the bones of the Wise Men to Constantinople, from there they were removed to Milan and afterward to Cologne. This explains why the Wise Men were often referred to as the Three Kings of Cologne. Their crowns are exhibited in the Chapel of the Three Kings in Cologne Cathedral, which is supposed to contain their relics.

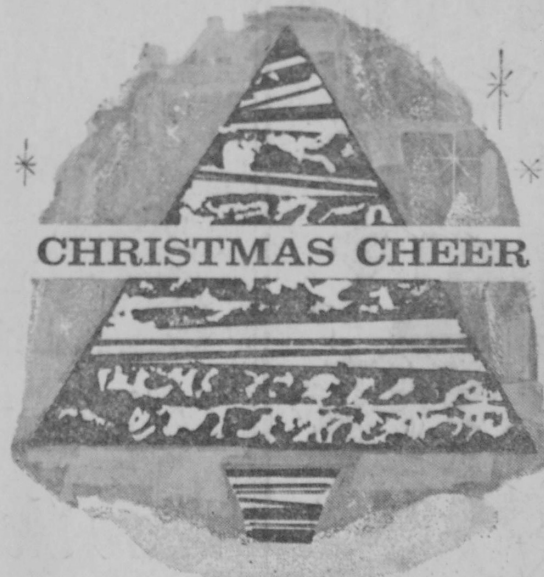

cious to eat, such gifts are always a delight. Teen-agers in particular like to give and receive creative gifts with a personal touch. And it is a perfect opportunity for teen-age girls to show off their skills in the cooking department.

One inexpensive gift suggested by the home economists at Carnation Company is Choc-o-nut Caramel Fudge. The fudge can be made easily the five-minute way with velvety evaporated milk. The convenient-to-use milk makes the fudge creamy smooth and gives it a firm consistency.

- 2-3 cup (small can) undiluted evaporated milk
- 1 2-3 cups sugar
- 2 cups (4 ounces) miniature marshmallows
- 1 1/2 cups (1 1/2 6-ounce packages) butterscotch pieces
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup (6-ounce package) semi-sweet chocolate pieces
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Mix evaporated milk and sugar in saucepan. Bring to a full boil and boil five minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat.

Add marshmallows, butterscotch and vanilla. Stir 1 to 2 minutes, until marshmallows are blended. Pour into buttered 9-inch square pan. Cool.

Melt chocolate over hot water. Spread chocolate over butterscotch fudge. Sprinkle with walnuts. Cool. Cut into squares.

Music the Heart-beat of Christmas

"Make a joyful noise unto the Lord, all ye lands". At no other time is this exhortation from the Psalms as appropriate as it is at Christmas, when joyful music seems as much a part of the season as gifts and decorations. You can make your holidays more meaningful and enjoyable with music . . . especially when you and your children are music-makers as well as listeners.

It doesn't necessarily take talent or training to play an instrument . . . there are many simple instruments that are almost like toys, they're so much fun and so easy to play! Their simplicity and inexpensiveness make them the ideal instruments for musical participation by everyone in the family from Dad on down to the youngsters.

The tambourine, for in-

stance, is perfect for setting a beat, and is easy enough for anyone to play. Maracas are also used for rhythmic effect and require only slaking to make a variety of interesting sounds.

The ukulele takes a little practice, but once three or four basic chords are mastered, there are hundreds of songs that can be accompanied by this instrument. Harmonicas require a great deal of practice but can produce beautiful music for all to enjoy.

A cross between the harmonica and the piano accordion is the Melodica, which has a two-octave keyboard similar to the piano. The player can play single notes or chords by blowing into the mouthpiece and playing the keyboard. The Melodica is especially good for experimentation, as it does not make harsh sounds.

An ancient instrument noted for its sweet tone, the recorder can be used to play simple melodies or in ensembles. It is available in different voicings such as tenor, alto and soprano.

WELL-LOVED LEGENDS GO THE ROUNDS

Christmas is many things to many people but regardless of custom or country, all Christmas celebrations are surrounded by legends. They vary from the religious to the nonsensical and seem endless in number.

One legend has it that those who perish at midnight on the Eve of Christmas will ascend to heaven; another claims that eating a dish composed of rice and blackeye peas, known as Poor John, will guarantee prosperity for the coming year.

Tradition says that a green Christmas portends a white Easter and that when Christmas falls on a Monday, the winter will be long and cold but when it falls on a Wednesday, there will be a splendid summer and a beautiful harvest.

Another legend says that the cock was the first to announce Christ's birth and that ever since, the rooster

crowds all night long on the eve of Christmas.

New work begun during Christmas week will never prosper. One tradition has it another cautions that whatever is done on New Year's Day will be done the whole year through, so pay no bills!

An especially lovely legend is the one concerning horses and barnyard animals, because their forebears witnessed the nativity it is believed that horses kneel at midnight on Christmas Eve, while barnyard animals have the gift of speech.

The fact that there were animals present in the manger on the night of the Christ child's birth is said to be responsible for the origin of the myth that animals spoke on Christmas Eve. Anglo-folklore gives credence to the belief that cattle in Devon and Cornwall fell on their knees in adoration and the bees sang in their hives.

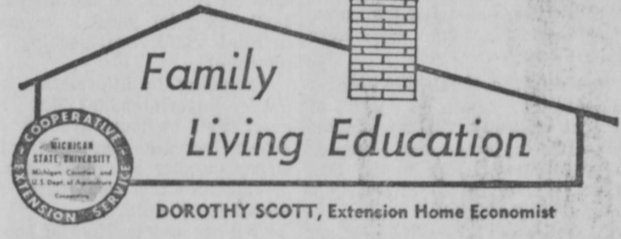

Hello there!

The evergreen tree, that small bit of forest wonderland that comes into your home each year, is the symbol of a living Christmas. It was first used by the Germans centuries ago. It has been part of our own heritage since the American revolution.

Maybe yours is selected, up and trimmed already. Maybe your family is one that waits until about now to install the Christmas tree. If you have yet to shop for one, these tips can help you find it.

Run your hand over the bough to see if the needles feel moist. Shake the tree. Bump it hard on

the ground. If the needles fall, the tree is already dry and probably too old to absorb water. Look for another.

When you get your tree home, throw cold water over it. Then cut off about an inch of the trunk, making a slantwise cut to open the pores and permit the tree to draw up water. Trees should be kept outdoors in a cool, shady place, in snow or a bucket of water until time to put it up.

Once indoors, be sure to keep your Christmas symbol safe and beautiful through the holidays, keep it well watered.

Does it seem as if there is no

end to your child's capacity for holiday sweets? Furthermore, do the goodies you have prepared disappear faster than you can replenish them?

Try letting the children make this one themselves. It is easy, requires no cooking and it is good . . . good to eat and good for them. Even the six-year-old can help.

Mix together six tablespoons of honey and one-half cup of peanut butter, add one cup of nonfat dry milk solids (regular style) and stir. Grease your hand with just a little bit of table fat. Make small round balls of candy and roll them in crushed wheat flakes cereal (about one-half cup). Put them where it is cold until firm. Try rolling some of the balls in coconut.

Besides the valuable peanut protein, there is the goodness of non-fat dry milk solids to enrich this confection.

Another version is made with dry milk solids and chocolate syrup. If you are interested, let me know.

There is much hustle and bustle in your home this week. I know, but please see to it that someone tells you want to attend the housing workshops on January 5 and 19. We explained them for you last week but if you have questions, ask us at the Cooperative Extension Service Office.

Enrollment Increase Expected Next Fall at Tawas Area School

A slight enrollment increase is expected next year in Tawas Area School District, according to a report last week from Supt. Reynold Mick.

The school superintendent said that his most recent estimate indicated there would be 2,069 pupils in the district, as compared to 2,035 during 1965-1966.

Of the total projected enrollment for 1966-67, 1,754 students would be in public schools and 315 in parochial schools, as compared to 1,719 and 317 students this term.

Enrollment in the two elementary units is expected to remain about the same level as last year. East Tawas unit has a total projected enrollment of 457 pupils in four grades and kindergarten, four more than the present year, and Tawas City unit's enrollment

for six grades and kindergarten is expected to be 411 pupils, down 13 from this year.

An increase is expected in junior high and high school grades, where a combined total of 886 is expected in 1966-67, as compared to 842 this year.

The present sixth grade in the public school numbers 121 pupils. Eight pupils coming from Zion Lutheran School would give a total enrollment of 129 in next year's seventh grade.

Enrollment of 131 seventh graders in the public school this year is expected to grow to a total eighth grade enrollment of 163 in 1966-67, through graduation next spring from the two Catholic schools of 32 seventh graders.

Three of the four high school grades are expected to show gains during 1966-67. This year's eighth grade of 158 students will be joined by 10 from Emanuel Lutheran School to give a total enrollment of 168 ninth graders in 1966-67. This is 18 students more than the present freshman class.

Present enrollment of 150 ninth graders is expected to be retained as 10th graders in 1966-67, but this is 10 more students than presently listed in the sophomore class.

Allowing the usual attrition of students who reach 16 years of age, an estimated 135 sophomores will move on in the next step of the enrollment ladder to the 11th grade. This would be 12 less than this year's junior class.

An estimated seven juniors will quit school at the end of the present term and the 1966-67 senior class will probably number 140 students, as compared to 116 this year.

Long range enrollment forecasts in 1958 and again in 1960 seemed to indicate an exceedingly large increase in number of elementary pupils in the mid-1960s, while it was predicted that high school grades would remain at about the 1960 level.

Two factors governing future enrollment here were not considered and the enrollments were actually reversed — elementary grades staying at about the same

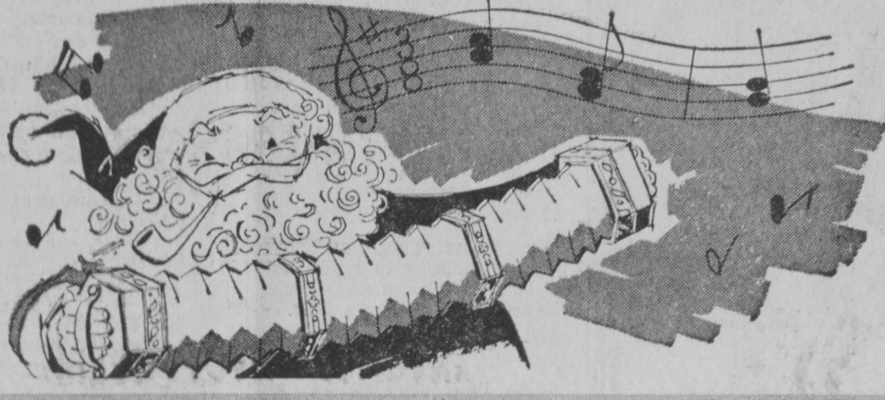

level and high school grades increasing in numbers.

Tawas' early elementary grades lost about 100 federally-connected pupils when new housing was completed at Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

Another factor has been an apparent change in societies. A number of younger couples with large families residing in the district in 1960 and prior years have moved to Flint and Detroit seeking employment.

According to information studied by Superintendent Mick, however, high school grades have shown increases because of a larger number of older couples moving into the area with high school aged children.

"We are not positive of the latter analysis, but it seems reasonably accurate," said Mick.

Because of this reversed trend, the board of education initiated steps last fall to construct new classrooms at the school building on M-55 which will be used for junior high grades. The present eighth grade wing will be used for high school expansion.

Bids are to be opened in February on this project as the final phase of the five-year building program approved by voters. If completed by next fall, the seventh grade would move out of the Tawas City Elementary Unit. This would provide additional space for already overcrowded elementary grades.

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Legends of Many Lands

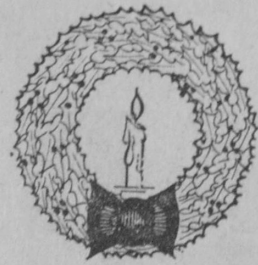
