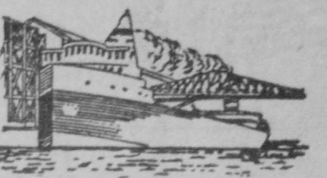

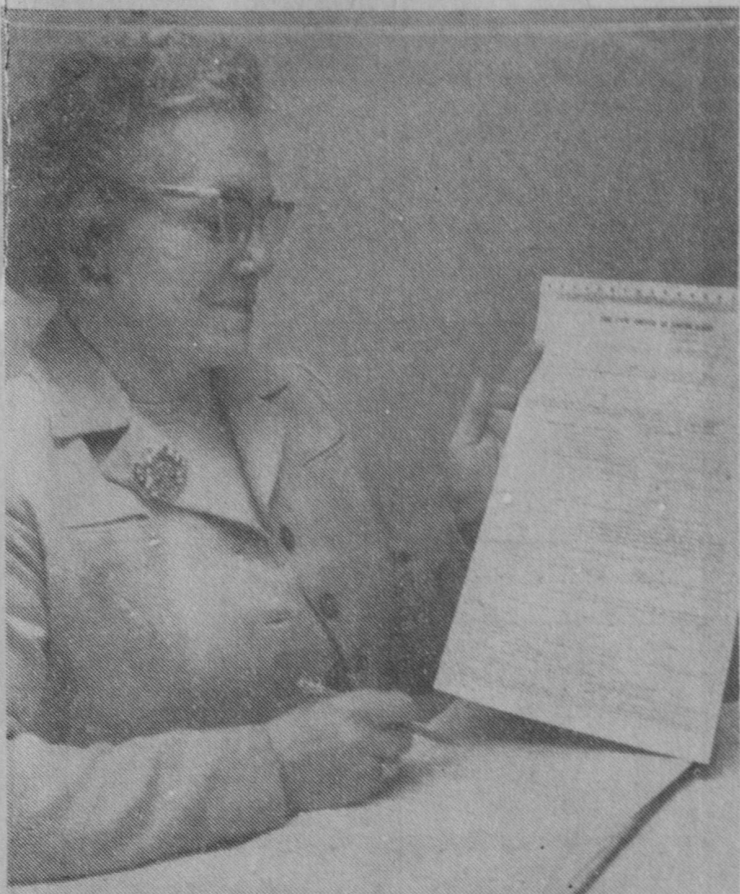

Receive Forms for Senior Exemptions

Application forms for senior citizens homestead tax exemptions are now available from City Treasurer Ruth Albertson. In other communities of Iosco County, forms may be obtained from ward or township supervisors.

In order to receive a \$2,500 exemption on state equalized valuation, eligible persons 65 years of age or older by December 31 may not have a total gross income exceeding \$5,000. In addition, the applicant's total state equalized property valuation in this state may not exceed \$10,000.

Proof of ownership of the homestead on which exemption is claimed must be furnished, along with birth certificate or conclusive proof of the applicant's age. This may be in the form of a baptismal certificate, an affidavit from the Social Security Administration, voter registration, family Bible or insurance policy.

The applicant must be a resident of the state seven consecutive years prior to filing. The law also requires that the applicant

must have resided in Michigan for at least six months in each 12-month period for those seven consecutive years.

Completed forms are to be filed between tax day on December 31 and final adjournment of the board of review in March.

Effective January 6, Mrs. Albertson is to be at the city hall each Thursday to assist eligible persons with the required forms. In addition to the new senior citizens homestead tax exemption, she is to assist applicants filing for veterans exemptions.

"No homestead is to be allowed more than one exemption under provision of the new act," said Mrs. Albertson. "In all circumstances, the exemption allowing the greater relief may be claimed and granted."

Her office hours at the city hall will be each Thursday from 9:00 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon and from 1:00 to 5:00 p. m.

Two Men Sentenced in Iosco Circuit Court

Two men received probation sentences when appearing Monday before Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Edward M. Akers, 51, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, entered a plea of guilty to simple larceny and was placed on six months probation. He was ordered to pay full restitution of \$260 to the American Legion Post at Oscoda prior to next May 15. Fine of \$25 and cost of \$25 was assessed.

Vern Robinson, 21, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, entered a plea of guilty to unlawfully driving away an auto with intent to steal. He was placed on probation for two years, ordered to pay restitution of \$246 to Consumers Power Company and \$102 to the car owner. He was fined \$25 and assessed cost of \$25.

Water Filtration Plant's Intake Clogged by Sand

Workmen battled the elements Monday and Tuesday in making emergency repairs to the sand-clogged intake line of East Tawas' water filtration plant.

A diver from John C. Meagher and Sons, Incorporated, Bay City marine construction firm, found a slight crack in a joint of the pipe Tuesday morning. Repair efforts were hampered by 20 degree weather and the shore was clogged by a sheet of frozen slush ice.

A break in the 16-inch cast iron pipe which feeds water from Tawas Bay to the filtration plant at the base of Newman Street was detected at 8:30 a. m. Sunday.

Harry Cater, a filtration plant employee, said that the gravely fed intake line quit operating and believing that the intake located off the Waterways Commission Dock had become clogged with sand, measures were taken to flush the line.

When water was forced back through the pipe a break in the line was detected about 40 feet off shore.

Service to municipal water users was not interrupted by the break, however, through the quick action of City Supt. Paul Roper, the East Tawas Department of Public Works crew and members of the fire department. Two fire trucks were pressed into operation and water was pumped directly from the lake to the filtration plant.

The system serves both East Tawas and Tawas City. The latter community's deep well pumping station on First Avenue, which has been maintained for emergency use, was pressed into operation Monday afternoon and normal water pressure was maintained on the stand pipe at the city hall.

The emergency pumping measures effected by both communities not only maintained normal pressure on mains but exceeded demands of the filtration plant. A temporary submergence pump was set up in the bay late Monday night to relieve use of the fire trucks and Tawas City's pumping station. Consumers Power Company provided emergency lines to operate the pump and flood lights to facilitate repairs.

Harold French, filtration plant operator, said that daily consumption of water was approximately 350,000 to 400,000 gallons. The plant operates 16 hours a day.

Fortunately, the break was located only about 40 feet off shore. Bolen Brothers, heavy equipment contractors, used a dragline to dig around the pipe situated on the lake bottom.

The cast iron water line was

originally constructed in the 1920s. Assembled in sections on shore, it was lowered through the ice one winter and then placed in operation to serve the old plant. This line remained in service after construction of the \$300,000 water filtration plant in 1957.

Former East Tawas GI Serves With US Forces in Vietnam

Thoughts of all Americans during this holiday season are focused on servicemen stationed in many far-flung military outposts around the world.

For an East Tawas family, the daily headlines concerning events in Vietnam, especially in and around the capital city of Saigon, are of utmost importance.

SP4 James G. Campbell Jr., 21, husband of the former Miss Antoinette Gavel and son of Mr. and Mrs. James G. Campbell Sr., has been stationed in the Republic of Vietnam since early November.

Assigned to the staff judge advocate section of Headquarters, United States Military Assistance Command, his duties as a claims adjuster for the army take him to many sections of the embattled capital city and other points of that country.

He writes that security measures surrounding the hotel in which he lives have tightened con-

siderably since recent Viet Cong bombing incidents.

The hotel is now guarded by United States military and Vietnamese police, who man machine gun emplacements, plus a CQ selected daily from personnel residing there. "In fact, I have CQ tonight from 1:00 to 6:00 a. m.—the worst possible time," he writes.

Viet Cong guerrilla fighters have struck several sections of Saigon in recent days and these raids have usually taken place in the early morning hours.

On December 11, Campbell wrote that there were no restrictions on travel around Saigon covering an area of about 30 to 35 miles. Since then, grenade throwing incidents by guerrillas have forced a tightening of controls and all military personnel not on duty are restricted to quarters at the curfew hour.

Campbell's TDY orders are "cut" for anywhere in the Republic of Vietnam. "Right now I get around the immediate area, but we are not allowed to carry arms. They told us when we got here not to cross more than two bridges. One time two weeks ago, my Jeep driver and I crossed three bridges and were near a fourth... we really moved after I examined a truck and snapped a couple of pictures."

Campbell's job is to adjust claims involving accidents between military and civilian vehicles. He has four Vietnamese civilians working under him. Before his overseas assignment, he had studied claims adjusting through a correspondence school, with the thought of following this line of work when he returns to civilian life.

Webb Named Director of Iosco Medical Care Facility

Douglas Webb, 32, St. Louis, has been named administrator of the new Iosco County Medical Care Facility. The appointment was made recently by the welfare committee of the board of supervisors and the county welfare board.

Presently serving as the purchasing agent for Gratiot Community Hospital, Alma, Webb has taken over partial duties of his new position and is to assume full-time responsibilities for the facility in February.

Webb was here Thursday to inspect progress on construction of the new \$550,000 home for the aged, which is being constructed by a \$300,000 general obligation

bond issue approved by voters in June 1964 and a \$250,000 federal grant.

The new administrator was introduced at the Thursday noon luncheon of Tawas City Businessmen's Association and later made the round of county offices.

Having served as purchasing agent for the past six years at Alma, Webb graduated from Central Michigan University in January 1960 with a bachelor of science degree. He was a mathematics major.

He served two years in the artillery branch of the United States Army, being stationed at Fort Devens, Massachusetts.

Webb was born at Jackson,

moved to Michigan City when about four years old and attended high school at the latter community.

He and his wife, LaVerne, have one son and one daughter, David, five years of age, and Cathryn, eight years old.

In his new position here, Webb will oversee the entire operation of the new medical care facility, which will employ approximately 38 people. He will have charge of purchasing approximately \$50,000 worth of equipment to be used in the facility.

According to Clarence Everett, chairman of the board of supervisors' welfare committee, the building was 50 percent completed as of Friday. Construction started in late July and Everett said he hoped opening to see the opening on June 1.

"I go over there every day to check on progress," said Everett. While this new position is an enlargement of responsibilities for Webb, he has been in charge of purchasing in the much larger Alma institution. The dietary department, shipping and receiving department were also under his jurisdiction in Gratiot County.

Last week's inspection of the facility was the first for Webb since he first saw it six or eight weeks ago.

"I am looking forward to moving to this area where I will make my new home," said Webb.

While his schedule here will be a busy one when the new medical care facility opens, he hopes to find some time to do a little fishing. He also enjoys golf and bowling.

Parent Participation Urged in Questionnaire

The second in a series of six questionnaires being used to determine if there is a need for area vocational training will be distributed January 3.

According to Iosco Intermediate School Supt. William Tracy, a questionnaire for parents is to be taken home by each 10th grade student in the county.

Some 11 schools in Bay, Arenac and Iosco Counties are participating in the survey. Included are schools at AuGres, Bay City, Bangor, Twining (Arenac-Eastern), Essexville, Hale Area, Oscoda, Pinconning, Standish-Sterling, Tawas Area and Whittemore-Prescott Area.

Last week, the first questionnaire in the series went to high school seniors.

Purpose of the second questionnaire is to gather information and opinions from parents of 10th grade children about long-range plans for education and training.

"You can aid in this study by completing this brief questionnaire for the committee," states Tracy. "Results will be for statistical purposes only and parents are not asked to sign the forms."

Included in questions being asked is the length of time the family has resided in the area, occupation, amount of education of parents, expectations for long-range plans for children after leaving high school, opinion as to how well the parent feels the high school prepares students for life after high school.

The questionnaire asks parents how schools could better prepare students, if local schools provide an adequate opportunity for 10th graders to learn the trade or vocation in which he is most interested, if high school guidance and counseling programs assist students to make educational or occupational plans.

Current plans for financing college education and training of the child is being asked, along with what additional education, if any, would the head of household be interested.

A list of 38 fields in vocational technical training programs are listed and the questionnaire asks parents to select courses in which

they would be most interested, either for the 10th grade students or themselves.

The questionnaire asks parents if they are concerned about the high school dropout problem, if they think that expanding the vocational opportunities in high school would keep more students in school longer, if there is a need for offering additional vocational program at the high school level.

The final question asks parents to specify action which would be best for the vocational program: 1. Each school district establish programs and expand facilities in accordance with ability to raise (See QUESTIONNAIRE, page 8.)

Jr. High Wing Plans in Final Review by TA

Final plans for constructing a new five-classroom junior high school addition were viewed Monday night by members of Tawas Area Board of Education.

Any corrections in the plans are to be submitted immediately to the school architect, Brysselbout, Starke and Hacker, Bay City, as preparations are being made to receive construction bids on February 28.

This is the final phase of the five-year pay-as-you-go construction program approved by district voters in 1961.

It is hoped that construction may be completed in time for classroom use next fall. Because of heavy construction demands on school contractors in the Saginaw Valley and the relatively small size of this project, it is thought that local contractors probably would be low bidders.

The school will have approximately \$125,000 from its three-mill special levy to construct the 72 by 100-foot addition. This figures out to approximately \$17.36 per square foot, which includes bathroom facilities and corridors. It does not include equipping the building.

When completed, the seventh grade would be moved from its present quarters in the Tawas City Elementary Unit to the new addition.

Board President Leonard Sarki said that immediate steps were to be taken to activate a special citizens committee which has been named to study the possibility of extending the three-mill special tax levy for one year. Money received would be used to convert the present high school shop area into classrooms and to construct a new shop building.

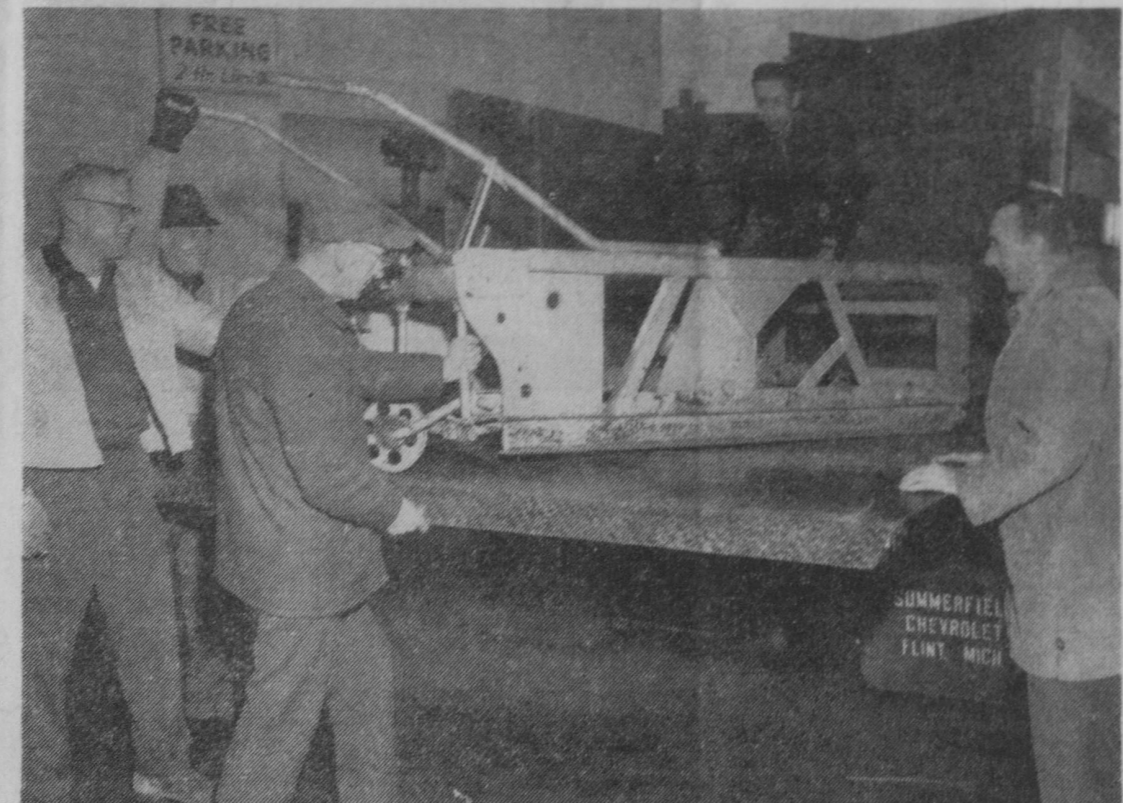
The latter plan would relieve use of the classrooms presently being utilized by the eighth grade for use by the high school. High school rooms are now at capacity and are expected to be overcrowded next term.

In other business, Supt. Reynold Mick reported that the 1965-66 school budget of \$619,625 would probably exceed income by about \$5,383. However, this year's budget absorbed a \$13,000 expenditure approved during the preceding year for construction of locker room facilities at the Tawas City Elementary Unit.

It was noted that increased enrollment and additional state aid has increased expected revenue by about \$15,824.

In other matters, the board is to investigate if there is need for this district to participate in "Operation Headstart," a federal program designed to provide education.

Hello Everyone!
It's almost the end of another year. Has it passed very quickly for you, too?
No doubt you will begin soon to close the books on 1965 and to think about that annual headache—income tax reporting. Have you used good tools, sharpened with know-how all year? If you have, then the chore isn't going to be so bad. If you didn't, no doubt you will have plenty of headaches trying to remember . . . more important, to verify the facts.
If it happens this time, make a resolution that it will not happen again. A good record keeping book, one that does the job easily and clearly, is indispensable in meeting your goal. Stop in and see the ones we can provide for you. There is one for the family record where income is mainly

from wages, another for the tourist and resort operator, and a third for the family in agribusiness.
Would you like to peek into the future and know a little about what is ahead in 1966 . . . food-wise?
Forecasters are telling us there will be higher pork prices, the highest since World War II, and they are not expected to go lower until the new pig crop is ready to market. That won't be until well into 1966.
Okay, we will eat eggs, you say. Yes, there will be available fresher than ever eggs, 307 of them for you if you consume the average amount in one way or another. The automated egg farms have speeded up distribution to one or two days, compared to two weeks only five years ago. This year there will be a smaller number of laying hens, so prices will be higher than a year ago for the next few months.
Wheat supplies are expected to drop eight percent before the end of June. Some analysts are warning this could endanger our marginal reserve for national security. Certainly there will be increased prices of foods made from wheat.
On the other side of the coin, there will be tastier orange juice. That's because of new methods that capture natural flavor essences formerly boiled away. Prices should remain to our advantage because the crop is above average.
