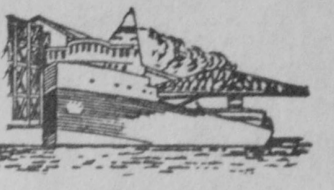

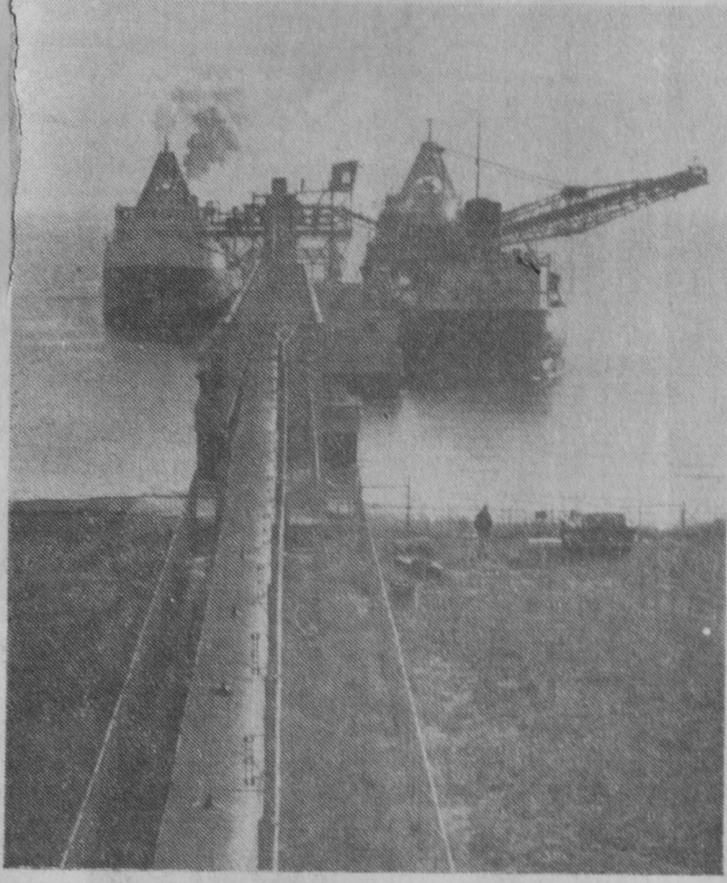

Council Discusses Change in Zoning

Possible modification of certain provisions contained in Tawas City's new zoning ordinance are to be discussed soon by city officials.

At Monday night's council meeting, members were generally agreed that a provision in the zoning ordinance which prohibits remodeling of a residence in a B-2 business district should be amended.

Such remodeling in the B-1 or B-2 business district along US-23 is presently prohibited because it extends the life of a nonconforming use.

While it was felt that prohibiting residential remodeling was useful for future planning in the B-1 district from Mathews Street to Wheeler Street, councilmen said that a three-mile business district, excluding all residential dwellings, was too long and was detrimental to present and future growth of the city.

Because of the present provision in the zoning ordinance, Supt. of Public Works Reginald Bublitz has been required to deny three recent residential remodeling applications in the B-2 district.

One application requested by Milton Snover, for remodeling a cottage formerly owned by Joseph Luhaway along the bay shore, is scheduled for an appeal board hearing next Monday night at 7:30 o'clock.

The council directed Bublitz and City Attorney Alf C. Watson to meet with the city planning commission in the near future to discuss proposed amendments to the ordinance.

One amendment, recommended by the planning commission at its last meeting, was to allow owner-caretakeer residences on motel and resort property.

Examination Today on Firearms Count Against W. J. Davis

Justice court examination of William J. Davis, 35, East Detroit, charged with negligent use of firearms causing the death of William Nash, 13, East Tawas, will be held Wednesday (today), 1:30 p. m., at the Iosco County Building.

Davis is charged with fatally wounding Nash on the opening day of deer season. Purpose of the examination would be to determine if Davis should be bound over to circuit court on the misdemeanor, which carries a maximum prison sentence of two years.

Conducting the examination will be Justice of the Peace Carl Eckman of East Tawas.

Hunting at his family's camp in Baldwin Township northeast of East Tawas at about 7:00 a. m. on November 20, the boy was shot in the elbow and abdomen by Davis. The boy had cut across one corner of the Davis hunting property and was about 90 feet from the shooter.

The victim was an eighth grader at Tawas Area High School and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clair Nash.

Eye Reorganization—

Five Area Schools Seek Study Costs

Two school districts in Eastern Arenac County and three districts of Iosco County are to seek information on the cost of studying the feasibility and practicality of reorganizing area schools into one huge district.

This action was taken at a meeting held Monday night at Whittemore-Prescott Area School attended by school board representatives from AuGres-Sims, Arenac Eastern, Hale Area, Tawas Area and the host district.

MAIN PURPOSE of this exploratory meeting was to determine if there was an interest in conducting such a study and all districts indicated a desire to cooperate in the joint venture.

It was the general desire of the group to obtain costs from professionals to conduct an independent study. Such services are available from the University of Michigan, Michigan State University or Central Michigan University.

Supt. Reynold Mick of Tawas Area emphasized that the main purpose of such a study would be to determine if there would be an advantage to the children under a larger school district.

During previous meetings of the Iosco schools, it was felt that a reorganization would provide means for obtaining an enriched curriculum, which would outweigh problems caused by transporting students over a large area.

APPROXIMATELY 3,800 children are numbered in the five schools involved, well above the minimum of 2,000 students which the state requires for any new school reorganization.

(Oscoda Area School had been invited to join in on original discussions in Iosco, but that district felt that its present large enrollment precluded any reorganization in the immediate future.)

Some 32 persons attended the meeting including superintendents from the five schools. Besides Mick, taking part in the discussions were Supt. Ray Kesler of Whittemore-Prescott Area, Supt. Paul Southerland of Hale Area, Supt. O. E. McCormick of Arenac Eastern and Supt. Loren Hulsizer of AuGres.

Each district was also represented by at least three members of the board of education. Tawas Area sent six members.

Action at this meeting grew out of the final report last Tuesday night of the Iosco County Reorganization Study Committee.

While this committee, in its report to the state department of public instruction, recommended that no change be made in the present organization of school districts within the county, it urged that a study be conducted between all districts in the area for possible reorganization.

AN INVITATION is also to be extended to Standish-Sterling Central to join in on the reorganization discussions.

Superintendent Hulsizer said that, because of discussions on reorganizing five schools in the two counties, it would also be necessary to discuss changing existing boundary lines of school districts. As a point of illustration, he said that because of discussions on reorganization the district would be closer to Stan-

dish-Sterling than to the proposed new reorganized district.

First work of the districts would be to determine the availability of outside professional help and the cost of these services.

Discussion was also had Monday night on the possibility of hiring a professional consultant and then conduct the actual survey work with volunteers from each district to form a citizens advisory council. This latter method, it was stated, would reduce the cost considerably.

"Everyone appeared to be interested in seeing if some good might come from such a reorganization," said Mick. He said that cost of the proposed study is the principal factor to be considered at present.

Citizens Advisory Study Committee in Briefing Soon

A briefing is to be held sometime this month for newly appointed members of a citizens advisory committee for the Bay-Arenac-Iosco Vocational Study Group.

This group is to come up with suggestions for improving vocational education throughout the three-county area.

George Stickle of Bay City, who heads the study group, said that his steering committee had no idea of what type of a plan would come out of the study. A large amount of state money is available to finance the proposed vocational educational services.

Two questionnaires are ready for distribution to parents of 10th graders and to this year's graduating seniors. Results are to be computed at Bay City Public Schools.

Stickle is aiming for a committee report by April and a consultant vocational instructor from the University of Michigan will be on hand to work with committee members at this month's meeting. Members of the committee are to be looking over area high schools and see what facilities they have and what they need to best serve the vocational educational needs of students.

East Tawas OK's \$20,000 Land Deal

Final authorization to purchase the former Anderson Coach Company property adjacent to the city disposal grounds was given Monday night by the East Tawas Council.

The property is being purchased at a cost of \$20,000 from trustees of the company. The city is to pay 1965 county and school taxes on the land.

Money for this project is to come from surplus funds remaining in various accounts of the city at the end of the fiscal year.

In other matters, the council agreed to assist with the removal of snow from the parking lot on Sawyer Street between Bay Street and West Westover. The parking lot serves the business district on the west side of Newman.

City Attorney Michael Freel is to investigate possible condemnation of an old dwelling in the Third Ward owned by Herbert Farrand. City Supt. Paul Roper reported that the building had deteriorated rapidly in the past several months, the windows and doors were missing and that children were playing in the structure.

Mayor C. L. McKenzie reported that the annual city Christmas party would be held December 16 at the Holland Hotel. City officials and employees have been invited to attend.

An invitation to attend the open house December 12 at the newly remodeled East Tawas Community Building was extended to councilmen and other city officials by City Park Commission Chairman Merton Killey.

Open House Sunday at ET Community Building

Open house at the newly remodeled East Tawas Community Building will be held Sunday, December 12, 2:00 to 5:00 a. m., according to an announcement this week by the city park commission.

Work was completed last spring on the project and the building was used in conjunction with operation of the city park during the past summer.

Park Chairman Merton Killey reports that his committee has directed the spending of \$16,000 on renovating the building, which was originally constructed during the early 1920s. Some \$12,000 was spent on the building and \$4,000 went for fixtures.

When the city acquired the former state park early this year, one of the first projects considered was renovation of the community building. Since work was completed, the building has been used extensively as a place for wedding receptions, public hearings and club meetings.

The old stage was removed and kitchen appliances donated by Michigan Consolidated Gas Company were installed in the vacant area. A new park manager's office was constructed, a new ceiling installed and the building was completely redecorated.

Killey said that new draperies were installed only last week. The building is equipped with enough dishes to handle a banquet of 200 persons.

The park chairman said that the general public is cordially invited to attend the open house. Refreshments are to be served.

Nine-Year-Old Blast in Shotgun Blast Fired by Brother

A nine-year-old Whittemore boy was wounded in the left thumb December 2 by an accidental blast from a 12 gauge shotgun.

Treated at Tolfree Hospital, West Branch, was Timothy Hall, son of Mr. and Mrs. DeWayne Hall.

Investigating state police said that David D. Hall, 17, a brother, was leaving the house about 4:30 p. m. He stopped on the back porch to check two guns which were propped against the wall.

One gun was empty but when he attempted to operate the shotgun action, the gun discharged. The blast went through the back door and struck Timothy.

Relocation of M-65 in Highway Plans for 1969

The Michigan State Highway Department Monday made public an engineering report for the proposed reconstruction and relocation of M-65 from Hale to Glennie.

State Highway Director Howard E. Hill said that the proposed project, estimated at 2.69 million dollars, would reduce the distance from Hale to Glennie by six miles, provide a 24-foot wide pavement between the two towns and furnish access to the Huron National Forest. Existing M-65 from Wicker Road to Glennie will then be turned back to Iosco and Alcona Counties, Hill said.

The project calls for:

1. Extension of curb and gutter approximately 200 feet north in Hale.
2. Reconstruction of existing M-65 to a 24-foot pavement from Hale north to Wicker Road and improvement of vertical grades.
3. Relocation of M-65 from Wicker Road north to Glennie.
4. Construction of scenic turnouts wherever possible.
5. Construction of a bridge over the AuSable River.

Highway programming schedules call for the letting of contracts on this project in June of 1969, Hill said.

Peoples State Bank Announces Change of TC Office Hours

Several changes in the operation of Peoples State Bank of East Tawas, with branch office at Tawas City, are announced this week by Richard Harwood, executive vice president and cashier.

New automatic bookkeeping equipment has started to arrive and is being placed in operation soon, bringing with it better banking services, said Harwood.

Starting in January 1966, the Tawas City branch will be open Friday evenings and closed all day Saturday. New hours at Tawas City will be 9:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. on Monday through Thursday; 9:00 to 3:00 p. m. and 6:00 to 8:00 p. m. on Fridays.

Office hours at East Tawas are to remain at 9:00 to 3:00 p. m. Monday through Friday and 9:00 a. m. until noon on Saturday.

Hunting alone, Duengel had lunch at Whittemore and then returned to the camp. The bullet, believed to have been "spent" after traveling a considerable distance or following a ricochet, went through the window on the driver's side.

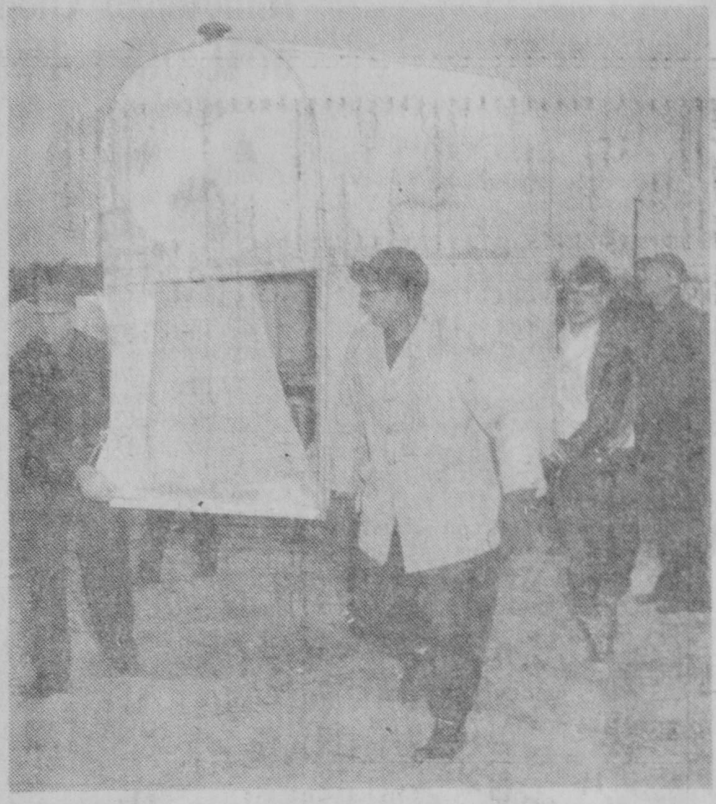
Three building applications were approved during the past three weeks by the East Tawas Department of Public Works.

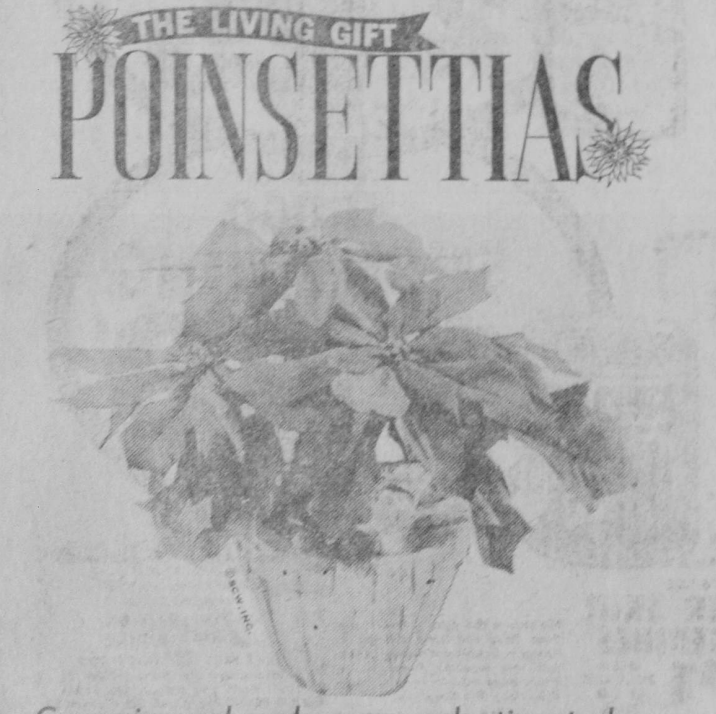

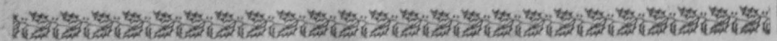

The winners lengthened the lead by four points at the end of the third stanza by outscoring the visiting Tawas team, 20-16.

Despite the fact that Tawas had three starters fouling out before the game ended, the Braves outscored Essexville, 16-10, in the final stanza and held a 69-64 lead with two minutes, 58 seconds to go.

With instructions from Coach Bill McIntosh to avoid taking any unnecessary shots at the basket unless it was a sure thing, the Braves suffered a relapse and gave the ball away three times, two on field goal attempts and one on a bad pass. The Dukes converted three field goals and, coupled with two foul shots, spelled defeat for Tawas.

Except for the last three minutes of the quarter, Tawas was pretty well in control of the fourth as Essexville had only one other field goal to its credit.

Whitney, six-foot, three-inch center, who looked impressive here a month ago as Essexville's football quarterback, was the big gun in the Dukes' offense. He had 29 points on 11 field goals and seven foul shots. Tawas just did not have any player tall enough to cope with Whitney and this was the reason for his numerous foul shots.

While the Braves were supposed to lack on offense this season, they came up with four players in

double figures. Dick Lapeer, not counted on as a starter in pre-season practice, led his mates with 16 points on seven and two. Fairfield as the other forward and Center Dick Grebe each counted 13 points, while Howard Rollin meshed 10.

Two other players, Sieloff and Powers, were close behind with nine and eight points, respectively.

Deciding factor in the final outcome of the game can be found in the number of shots taken by each team. Essexville connected 26 out of 79 times for a 32 percent average, most of the attempts coming near the basket or on rebounds. The Braves compiled a 45 percent shooting average, a respectable figure in any game, but they had only 53 attempts. Fewer mistakes in passing could have meant the difference.

Each team had 28 shots from the foul line and Tawas connected on a surprising 21 attempts while Essexville converted 18.

Action moved to Tawas last night (Tuesday) when the Braves played host to Oscoda. The Braves play West Branch here Friday night.

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

Family Living Education

Hello everyone!

Sliding glass doors—more and more people are using them, in new and in remodeled homes. Like the big picture window, they give a home an up-to-date look.

Before you decide to have one though, maybe it would be a good idea to find out the good and not so good features.

First, the plus ones: They add attractiveness and give a modern look. They bring the outdoors and indoors close together. Then the problem ones: Increased heat loss in cold weather means a higher fuel bill (heavy full length draperies minimize the loss).

Moisture condensation, particularly at the bottom, is apt to occur. If it freezes, doors open with difficulty—might even cause wet door sills, floors and draperies.

The security factor is easily overlooked. Glass door locks are often less sturdy than regulation ones.

Safety—accidents with the glass doors accounted for a considerable number of the 1964 deaths attributed to glass injuries.

Cleaning—all of us know glass surfaces require more frequent cleaning. Probably not because they are less soiled than other surfaces, we just cannot help seeing it, can we?

Last but not least is expense. The cost of sliding glass doors is much more than a conventional door with a good-sized picture

window near it. The best welded, double-plate safety glass is most expensive, although there would be less heat loss, less danger of breakage.

Now that your family has the facts assembled for us by Carlton Edwards, Michigan State University housing specialist, only your family can decide whether yours will be a conventional or glass-type door.

By the way, Mr. Edwards is bringing us more information about home building or remodeling soon. A calendar-check reminds me the dates are not far away.

The first will be Wednesday, January 5, and the follow-up consultation day will be Wednesday, January 19.

If your family intends either remodeling or building within a couple of years, you are already looking for facts and ideas to help you get convenience, comfort, beauty and economy. Perhaps you will soon try to put your plans on paper with words and drawings.

Mr. Edwards and I can help you assemble the facts, consider the alternatives and develop a picture plan.

The first meeting will include the all too common problems; moisture, peeling, insulation. There will be construction pointers, too.

Take action now. Mark that new 1966 calendar with these two im-

portant meetings, January 5 and 19. Ask your builder (if you will hire one) to come with you. Mr. Edwards suggests this program will be most useful and helpful if both the Mr. and Mrs. come. Tell your friends about the meeting.

It will help us plan if you pre-register. Call or write your Iosco County Cooperative Extension Service office in the Federal Building, East Tawas.

Do it before Christmas—today would be fine.

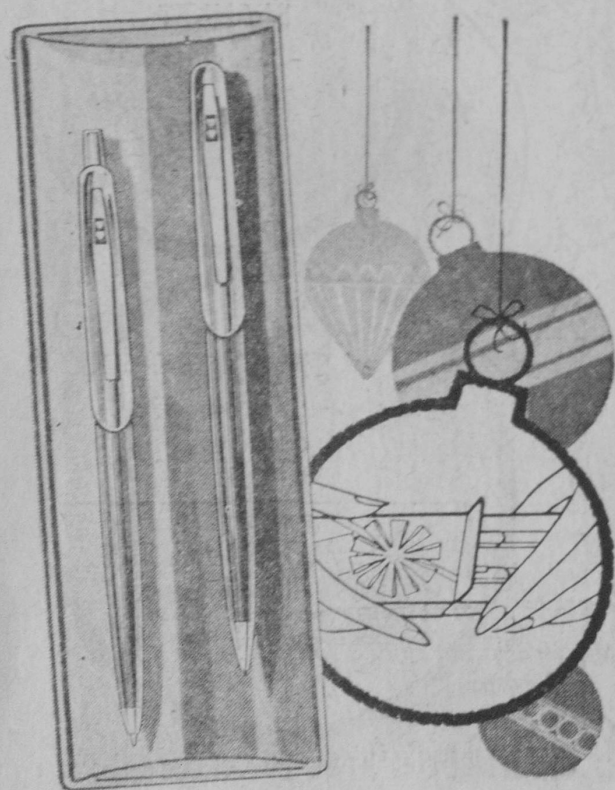

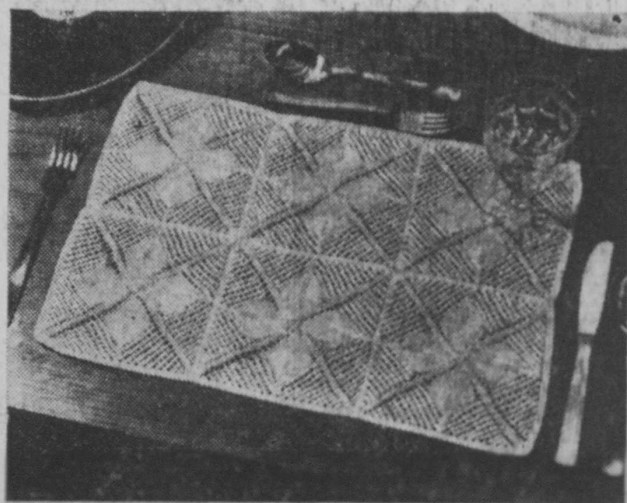

Iosco County Ranks Above State Avg. in Heart Disease Deaths

Iosco County ranks above the state-wide average of cardiovascular deaths in Michigan last year, Dr. James B. Blodgett, president of the Michigan Heart Association, announced today.

In Iosco County, 61.0 percent of all deaths were caused by cardiovascular disease, the state-wide average was 55.2 percent. Percentages are based on the 1964 statistics of the Michigan Department of Health.

The lowest in the state was Macomb County's 49.4 percent; the highest, Oscoda, with 69.2.

While the percentages empha-

sized the magnitude of the problem of cardiovascular fatalities in Michigan, analysis of the figures showed only that with some exceptions the highly industrialized counties with younger populations had lower percentages than the quiet, more aged populations.

Of adjoining counties, Arenac had 58.5 percent; Ogemaw, 59.3, and Alcona, 50.7.

Wayne and Oakland Counties had 53.7 and 53.6 percent respectively, while Kent County, whose seat is Grand Rapids, had 55.5. The Upper Peninsula counties averaged 59.64 percent.

The heart association is a Michigan United Fund agency.

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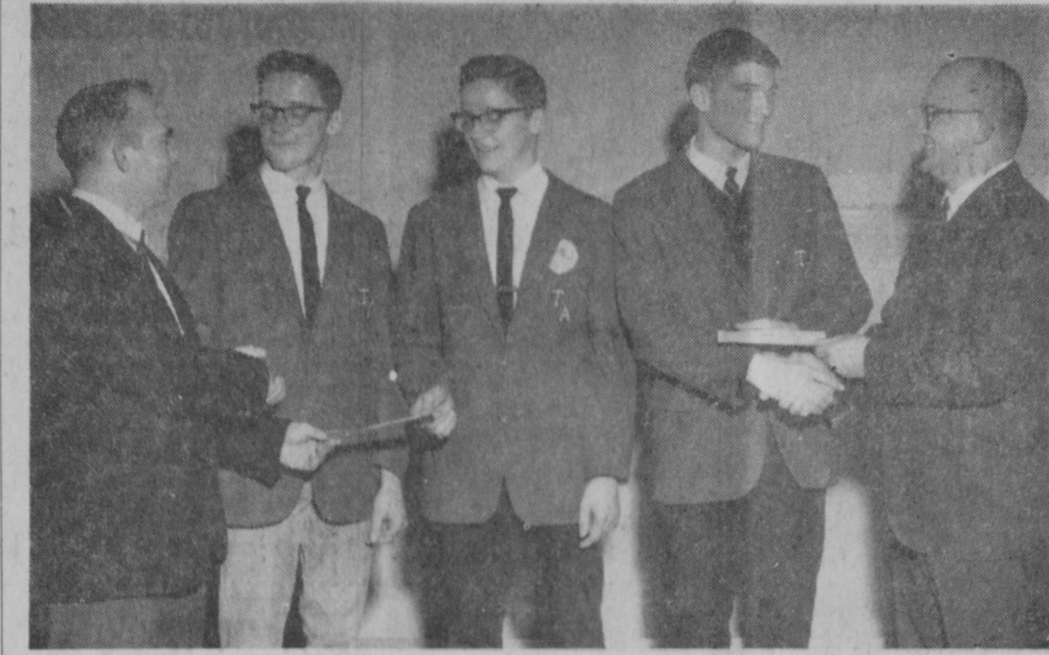

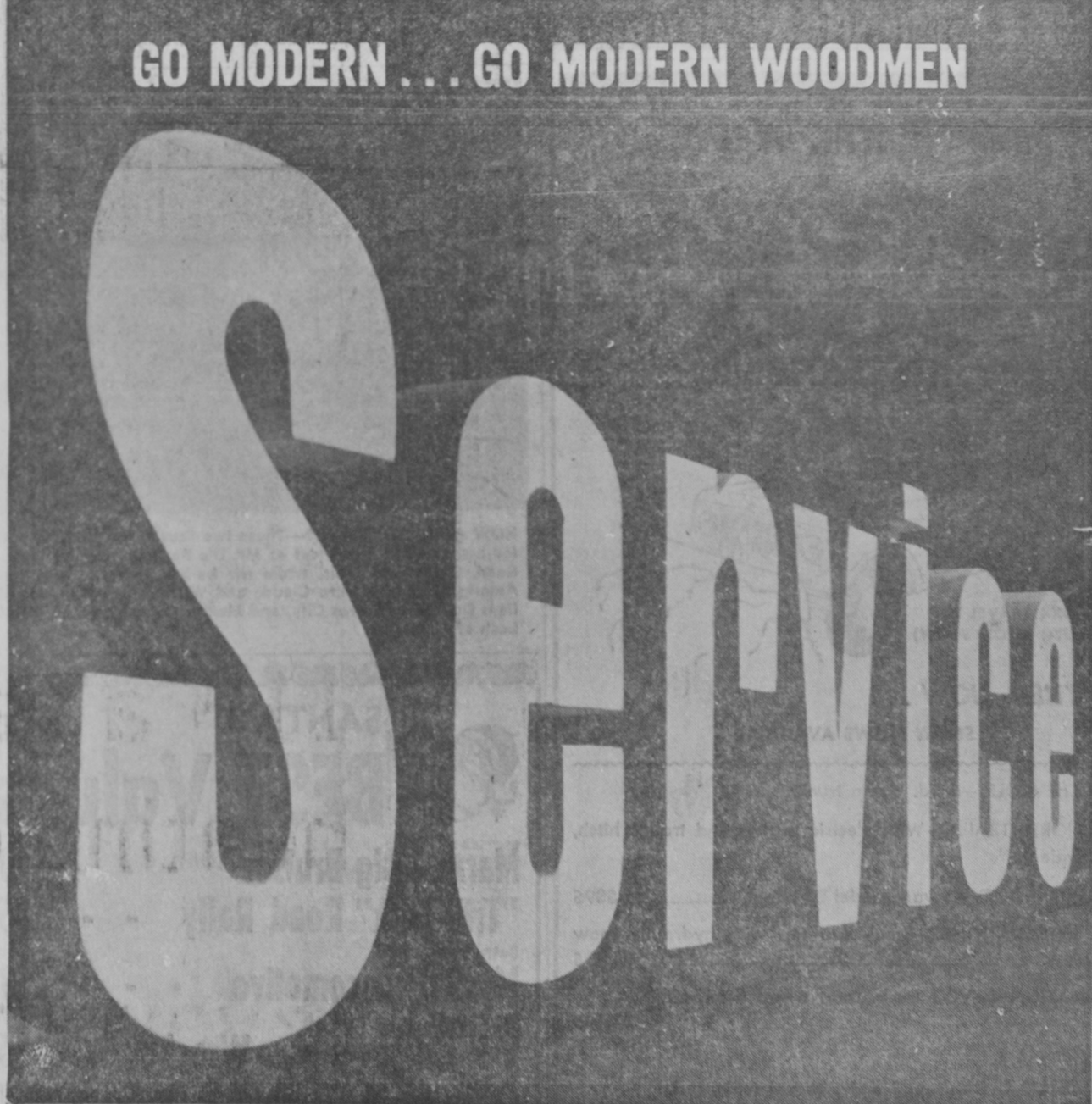

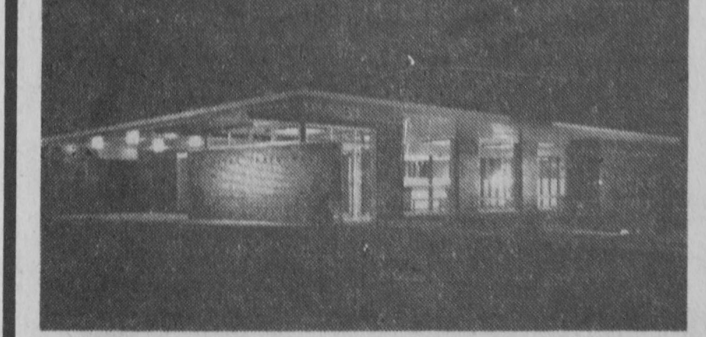

After developing a program, it would be submitted to state officials at Lansing for approval. Michigan has been allocated approximately \$35,000,000 in Title One money.

The coordinator said this money was being made available to schools, on an experimental basis. He emphasized the fact that while the amount of money received is based on the number of economically deprived children to be served, the program is for the benefit of educationally deprived children.

Tawas Area School is to make application for an entitlement under a program of communications. This could include remedial reading and other courses to improve the over-all communications of students.

Such a program would supplement the remedial reading courses conducted at the school during past summers.

Alexander said that the first step in receiving approval of the proposed program would be to appoint a committee of lay people to work with the school board in developing a course of study. He said that the committee should not get bogged down in a long range study, but should plan for the immediate future.

It was emphasized that the program, if approved by the state, would be open to students of both public and parochial schools.

Funds received could be utilized for training staff members, purchasing teaching materials to be used in the training program, transporting students to school.

Funds available would provide the means of expanding summer educational programs of the past. Administrators are to meet with faculty members Thursday to determine interest.

Alexander said that schools were probably the most expensive buildings in the community and were not now being used to the fullest. He said this program

New Man-Made Lake Near Whittemore OK'd by Board

Michigan's lake builder, James H. Cole, was authorized Wednesday by the Isosco Board of Supervisors to proceed with his plans for a new man-made lake in Burleigh Township.

While final approval is contingent upon opinions of the prosecuting attorney and action of the drain commissioner and road commission, no serious obstacles are expected to block what might very well become one of the biggest assets of Western Isosco County.

Cole appeared before the supervisors Wednesday and outlined some of his plans for the huge undertaking. Brushing operations have started and earth moving

equipment will be moved to the site before the end of the year.

"Our goal is to have the lake fairly well completed by next fall but, just as is the case of any construction project, much will depend upon the weather," said Cole.

This new lake will be the largest and deepest of the 12 Cole man-made lakes in Michigan. Located in Sections 20, 21 and 22 of Burleigh Township, the lake will be 3½ miles long, its width will vary up to three-quarters of a mile, it will cover an area of approximately 800 acres and will be 54 feet deep at some points. About 1,400 acres is included in the entire project.

"This lake is going to be unique—nothing has been done like it before in Michigan," Cole told the Herald Thursday.

Cole was referring to his plans for a series of four 11-foot-high "natural" waterfalls connecting ponds in the lake arrangement. Limestone rock to be used in constructing these falls has been purchased from the Siegrist brothers, owners of land on which the former Isosco County stone quarry was located.

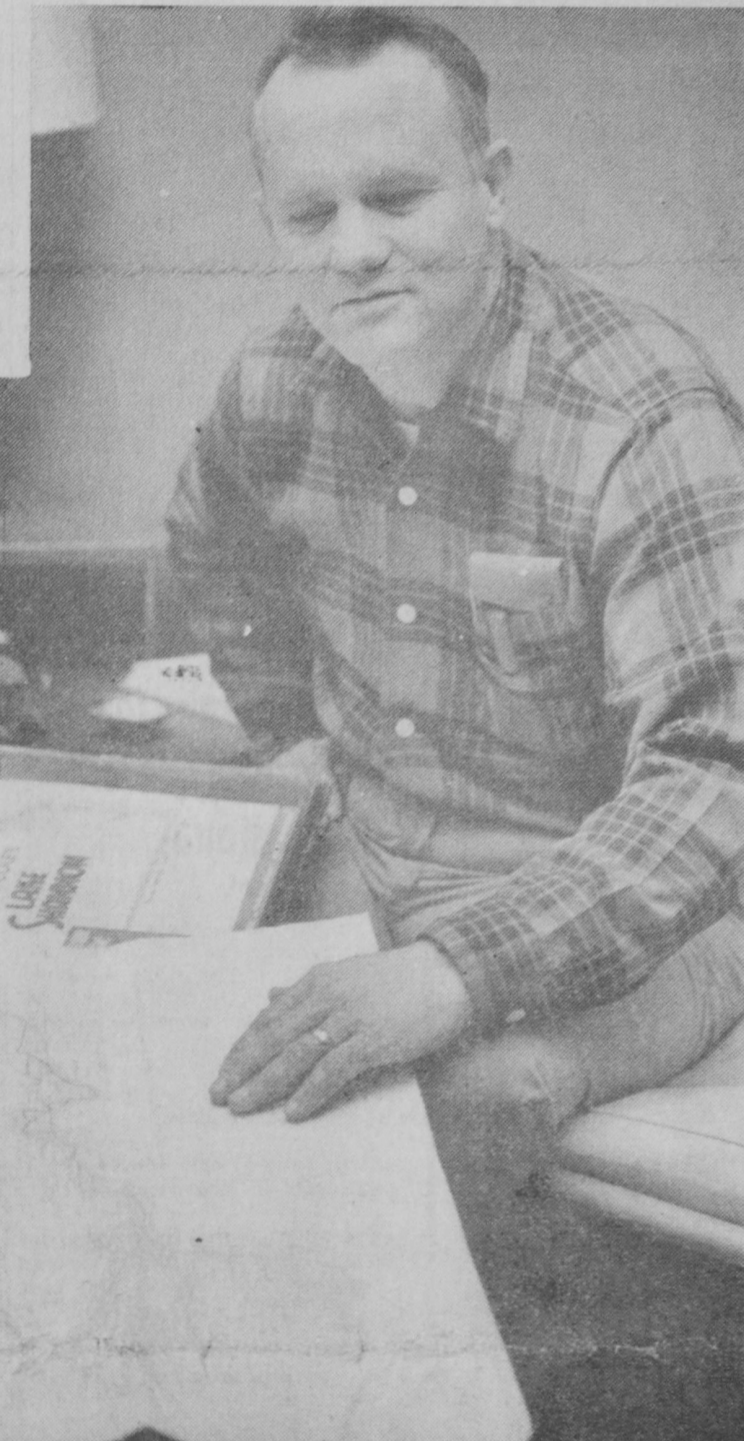
There is only one man in Michigan with any experience in constructing waterfalls and Cole is now conferring with him on plans for his new lake here.

He is very enthused about the lake's location, which is to parallel M-65 on the west side starting at a point about 1½ miles south of Whittemore. The lake will have an abundant supply of good water, being fed by Johnson Creek, which drains a watershed of approximately 40 miles. The area to be flooded is mostly rolling woods, brush and some wild pasture land and will not cover any good farming areas.

Exact size of the earth-filled dam will depend upon surveys, but will be about 3,000 feet long, 59 feet high and 450 feet wide at the base. Plans call for the dam to blend in with the surrounding area through the planting of trees and shrubs.

At the suggestion of the board

of supervisors, Cole is to consider construction of a parking lot off (See COLE, page 6.)

Supervisors Seek End of State's Doe Season

Isosco County has officially joined other areas of Northern Michigan in a protest against the state's any deer season.

In a resolution passed unanimously last Wednesday, the board of supervisors went on record recommending that doe hunting in this county be discontinued "due to the depletion of the deer herd."

The resolution was sent to area representatives in the state legislature, the department of conservation and conservation commission.

The above action was recommended by the board's conservation committee composed of Supervisors Richter Lixey, C. E. Smith, Edward Nelkie and George Blust.

2 Primary Contests Assured at E. Tawas

Two contests are assured for the February 21 primary to select city officer candidates at East Tawas. Deadline for filing is 4:00 p. m. Monday, January 3.

Filing for the office of mayor are L. F. Besancon, former city hall office manager, and James G. Campbell, who presently serves as First Ward alderman.

Mayor Clarence McKenzie has announced that he will not seek re-election.

The other race is for Third Ward alderman. Robert C. Bolen has filed for re-election and will be opposed by Merton F. Killey.

No candidate has filed as yet for the First Ward alderman's chair being vacated by Campbell. Officers unopposed thus far are Treasurer Grace C. Felton, Clerk F. B. Lomas and Second Ward Alderman Edward Higgins.

If not more than two candidates file for an office in the February primary, an April election will not be required.

Burglars Busy; Three Business Places Hit

Thieves cracked open one safe, attempted to open a second and entered a third business place in a series of burglaries here last week.

Latest burglary was at Cliff's News Agency, M-55, Tawas City. Clifford Bennington, owner, reported the break-in to state police at 6:40 a. m. Sunday. A few minutes later, Bennington discovered that the nearby Wojahn Floor Covering building had been entered.

Thieves entered the Bennington building by breaking out a 14x15-inch window on the west side. Entering the garage, the burglars then tried open a sliding door to gain entrance to the main structure.

A 17-inch safe weighing between 80 and 100 pounds was stolen from the building. Police said it contained approximately \$187.

Bennington said that an employee had been in the building at 3:45 a. m. and later recalled that a counter had been moved. He did not realize that a burglary had been committed.

Police said that a two-wheeled cart which had been stored at the rear of the building had been used to move the safe.

The cart was later found at the rear of Wojahn's building. Hugo Wojahn, owner, told police that it appeared as though nothing had been stolen from his building.

On Friday night, burglars broke into the Zaiger Beverage Company warehouse, East Tawas, and attempted to steal a large safe. Police believe that the thieves were apparently frightened away.

The burglars entered the warehouse through a 12x18-inch window on the south end of the garage. A large double door connecting with the main structure was opened by removing hinge pins on the door.

A small, two-wheeled cart was left under the safe. The thieves apparently tried to move the safe toward the northeast corner of the building, but were then frightened away.

County Operation 'In Red' Before End of December

A report from County Clerk George Prescott and County Treasurer Grace Miller indicates that Isosco's general operating fund will be about \$15,000 in the red at the end of December.

The treasurer's records indicated that \$11,677.39 remained in the general fund as of December 1. County payroll during the month will be \$9,600 and the board of supervisors approved \$8,000 in outstanding bills. The above expenditures do not include some fixed operational costs for the month.

Trial balances in the clerk's office indicated that the social welfare fund had a balance of \$85,328 as of December 1. This reflects a \$50,000 transfer from the general fund in November 1964, which is to cover the first year of operation of the medical care facility.

Approximately 90 percent of the new medical care facility's operational cost is to be repaid to the county from state and federal funds, but the \$50,000 would probably not be repaid to the general fund until after about one year of operation.

Prescott said that a complete picture of county finances would not be available until later in the month.

TA Booster Club Seeks New Sports Program

A Saturday athletic program for boys and girls of the area is now under study by the Tawas Area Athletic Boosters Club and members of the coaching staff.

John N. Brugger, club president, appeared before the board of education Monday night and said that the reorganized group was interested in helping the school adopt such a program.

While stating that the new group would be willing to cooperate in the program by supplying adults to help with supervision, Brugger felt that responsibility should basically rest with the school.

Under consideration is an intramural basketball program for boys and volleyball for girls.

Interest in the program was expressed by Board President Leonard Sarki and other members. He said that cost of supervision and exact responsibility for liability should be determined.

He also indicated that present school finances may not be available to cover the cost and that assistance may be required from the community, similar to the summer program. He said, however, that gymnasiums would be made available.

Athletic Director Bill McIntosh stated that varsity athletes would probably be willing to help supervise the program.

In other matters, the board adopted a new policy of ticket sales for athletic events. Effective at the start of the next semester, an improved accounting method for gate receipts is to be instituted. Teachers not actually performing duties at functions, as well as board of education members, are to pay a general admission.

A financial report from the athletic department indicated that receipts and expenditures nearly balanced during the past year. Receipts, including \$1,907 from football and \$2,475 from basketball, totaled \$5,754. Total expenditures were \$5,462.

Chamber Seeks Special Permit to Open Silver Valley

Efforts are now being made by the Tawas Chamber of Commerce to obtain a temporary permit from the United States Forest Service for reopening the ski area at Silver Valley for the winter season.

James Campbell, who headed the winter sports committee several years before it was officially "closed" at the end of the last season, told chamber directors last Wednesday night that the committee still owed bills totaling \$2,500.

"If we had a break in the weather after Christmas with good skiing conditions and a minimum of maintenance costs, we may be able to recoup enough to close our books in the black," Campbell stated.

Some equipment remaining on the ski slopes was damaged by vandals, but Campbell believes that the ski area could be put into operation temporarily at a minimum of effort.

Last spring, the chamber of commerce relinquished its lease with the federal government for operation of the park. Its facilities had grown outmoded in competition with other area facilities and a lack of snow helped to doom the project, one of Michigan's oldest winter sports areas.

William J. Davis, 35, East Detroit, was bound over to circuit court last Wednesday by Justice of the Peace Carl Ekman.

He is charged with negligent use of firearms causing the death of William Nash, 13, East Tawas. The shooting took place on the opening day of deer season, November 20, in Baldwin Township.

Testimony of three persons was heard, including the Rev. William C. Lindholm, Robert Elliott Jr. and State Police Trooper James Ewer.

Prosecuting Attorney J. Richard Ernst said that date for the circuit court arraignment would be set in the near future by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller. Davis is represented by Joseph Louisell, Detroit attorney.

would be used to purchase science, mathematics, English, reading and other elementary teaching materials.
Elementary teachers were given permission to use \$1,047 in a special fund to purchase a new piano and other materials for the lower grades. Miss Bolen said that

money in the fund was derived from sale of pictures to students.
Principal Ernest W. Jordan said that the board must decide between now and the end of December on its policy toward baccalaureate services at graduation time next spring. The state attorney general recently ruled that baccalaureate was a religious service and in violation of the law.
On recommendation of a special committee report, the board approved an expenditure of \$1,584 for 12 new band instruments and the purchase of 10 new uniforms at a cost of approximately \$85 each.
The board also authorized raising instrument rental costs to band students from \$4 to \$5 per semester. This fee only provides cost of servicing instruments.

Division buyers have been instructed to give owners an alternative of either a partial taking or a total take when only a part of the property is required for highway purposes and such acquisition would result in a use that does not conform with local zoning regulations.
In some instances of right-of-way acquisition, the department has needed only parts of properties. The law requires that the department retain only that part of the property needed.

Parents Cautioned to Keep Children off Dangerous Ice

Parents are cautioned by state police to keep youngsters from playing on icy surfaces of lakes and streams because the winter freeze has not yet been severe enough to make those surfaces safe.
To safely bear the weight of humans, ice on outdoor water locations should be about four inches thick. Advisably, the safety thickness should be checked by an adult and children should be warned about thin ice.

Board Recognizes Education Group as Bargaining Agent

Tawas Area Education Association has been recognized by the board of education as the collective bargaining group for teachers in Tawas Area Schools.
This group was formed recently from the former Tawas Teachers' Club. Its organization was necessitated under terms of the teacher tenure act and other new state regulations.
John Alexander, president, said that formation of such groups had support of the Michigan Education Association and were not responsible to any national labor organization.
Under terms of the state law, a special committee of citizens not connected with the school is to check over signatures of teachers signing the petition forming this new organization to see if they coincide with signatures on present school contracts.
